Neighbourhood policing news

Current priorities for the Wallingford area include theft, in particular bag/purse thefts. This has mainly occurred in the Wallingford Market Place area and Waitrose. Reports of this crime had increased over the last three months but are now in decline. Please can we remind everyone to be extra vigilant and not to leave any valuables on show or bags open and unattended?

We have received an increase in reports of dog fouling. Although this is a common complaint we make sure all reports are considered. We can issue tickets retrospectively for dog fouling if the incident is supported by a witness.

Crime prevention

Theft from vehicles: We remind everyone not to leave items on show in your vehicle. We have seen an increase in vehicles being broken into, in particular tools being stolen from work vehicles. Do not leave tools in your vehicle overnight and make sure all vehicles are locked and secure. Also consider where you are parking and what other crime prevention options you have available: CCTV, alarms, blocking access to doors by reversing up against walls, garages, etc.

Shed thefts: We have been patrolling around local allotments after an increase in thefts from sheds. Make sure that your sheds are secure: use strong padlocks and check the doors are solid. Consider securing tools inside the sheds using anchor posts, chains and padlocks. You can also buy shed alarms from most DIY stores. Please contact us for further advice.

Dog fouling in Crowmarsh is a real problem, our paths and grass verges are becoming unsightly: please consider

your community. Pick up after your dog. In order to maintain high standards of street cleanliness, PSCOs, acting on behalf of South Oxfordshire District Council, can now issue Fixed Penalty Notices (FPNs) of up to £80 (reduced to £50 if paid within ten days) to anyone over the age of 18 for allowing a dog to foul on a pavement but not picking it up.



Spring is the season of new life. You don't need to be a gardener to notice the buds, blossom, shoots and flowers. 'Now the green blade riseth', as the Easter anthem goes. Seeing our gardens spring into life reminds me of the importance of gardens as the backdrop for Holy Week and Easter. On the night that he was betrayed, Jesus prayed in the garden of Gethsemane: John the Gospel-writer informs us that in the place where Jesus was crucified. there was a garden, and that in the garden there was a new tomb. And on the third day, Mary Magdalene, glimpsing Jesus through her tears, at first mistakes him for the gardener.

The Bible is a story of three gardens. It begins in the Garden of Eden, where the first humans succumb to temptation and reject God, 'not God's will, but ours be done'. As a result, humanity is banished from this garden to the wilderness of a fallen world, paradise lost.

The next garden is the olive grove of Gethsemane, where Jesus is tempted to save himself and abandon God's plan for redemption. But Jesus resists temptation with the prayer, 'not my will, but thine be done'.

Lastly, there is the garden of resurrection. The 'garden tomb', in which the body of Jesus was laid at sundown on Good Friday, becomes the empty tomb of Easter Day. It is there that the angels announce to the women, 'He is not here, he is risen', and it is also there that Mary sees Jesus, before returning to the others exclaiming 'I have seen the Lord!'.

Over the next forty days, many more see Jesus, touch him and eat with him. Through their testimony and the witness of the Holy Spirit, the presence of the risen Jesus begins the long, slow task of transforming the wasteland back into God's garden, paradise regained – a work that will come to completion when God brings in his new heaven and new earth (Revelation 21, 22): 'Behold, I make all things new!'

As spring comes, I look forward to spending more time outdoors. Hopefully I can keep the vicarage garden in a reasonable state, although my gardening skills involve mainly pushing a lawn mower! Whether you will be gardening or not, I hope that, like me, you will find time to reflect on this story of the three gardens and what it means for us and for our world.

Wishing you a blessed Holy Week and a Happy Easter!



'Excavations at St Brieuc, Brittany – an Iron Age town?'



Tim Allen will talk at the Wallingford Historical & Archaeological Society (TWHAS) about the archaeological excavations at St Brieuc, Brittany on Wednesday 12th April, 7.45 for 8pm. at St Mary's Church, Wallingford.

Tim is Senior Project Manager at Oxford Archaeology Ltd (OA) and has directed and written up OA archaeological excavations for over 30 years. He has also directed research excavations and surveys built around public participation for the Earth Trust at Little Wittenham.

In 2009-10 OA excavated a major late Iron Age settlement at Tregueux, near to St Brieuc, Brittany ahead of road construction. Stretching over nearly 1km, this consisted of a defensive enclosure, a unique monumental timber courtyard building, a series of metalled roads and a very large settlement parcelled up by drainage ditches, with a series of wells along its line.

This is one of very few such 'agglomerated settlements', as the French describe them, in NW France, and marks the emergence of towns in Brittany. It also provides an important contrast to late Iron Age settlement in Southern England.

Past Times

The Elm Tree Murder

Sunday 3rd March 1946 was a cold, grey day with a threat of snow in the air. Florence Honey, a 60-year-old spinster who lived in The Street, Crowmarsh, went out early. She liked to ensure that the parish church, St Mary Magdalene, was always clean and tidy before the morning service. After church, Miss Honey returned home and finished preparing Sunday dinner for herself and her invalid sister Elsie, who had recently moved in with her. The sisters spent the afternoon quietly at home, listening to Tommy Handley and others on the radio.

After tea, Miss Honey walked into Wallingford to visit her bed-ridden friend, Mrs Harriet Lay, at 3 Compton Terrace. This was something she did three or four times a week. However, there was considerable disturbance in the town in the evenings, due to the number of British and Polish soldiers (from the nearby Transit Camp at Howbery Park) drinking in the pubs and roaming the streets, so walking there and back at night was not for the faint-hearted.

Miss Honey stayed with Mrs Lay until the radio closed down for the evening. On her way home, close to Leonard Shepherd's grocery shop (which was in the building that used to be Launderama, but is now two flats), she passed Thomas Beasley, who was returning from a visit to a friend in Crowmarsh. All was well until Miss Honey walked over Wallingford Bridge. As she reached the Crowmarsh side someone stopped her, dragging her into Wilder's Yard.

At about 6.30am the following day (Monday), Walter Green, of 14 Wood Street, Wallingford, was walking over the bridge and into Crowmarsh, where his lorry was garaged. As he passed Wilder's Yard he saw Miss Honey's body lying in the field opposite, her unopened brown handbag close by.

He immediately went to the police, and Scotland Yard was called in (it was not unusual at the time for this to happen with local police cases). A tarpaulin tent was erected over the body to protect it from falling snow, while local police awaited the arrival of Chief-Inspector Fabian (later the subject of a 1950s TV series, Fabian of the Yard, starring Bruce Seton as Fabian). A Home Office Pathologist, Professor J.M. Webster, also travelled down from London and both arrived in Crowmarsh later that afternoon. Under the glare of some strategically-placed car

headlights, Professor Webster crawled beneath the dripping wet tarpaulin that evening, to perform a preliminary examination of the body.

Meanwhile, the Crowmarsh 'Bobby', PC Peachy, had been standing outside a house at the bottom of Crowmarsh Hill, keeping watch on a family who had just moved to Crowmarsh. He was eventually ordered away by an irate Inspector Day, of Thame, who was working on the case and happened to be a friend of the family.

A Polish soldier was questioned that day, but later released. The ban on British and Polish soldiers leaving the Transit Camp was lifted at 5pm, allowing the Polish soldiers to meet their English wives, who were lodging nearby. There was talk locally of a 'wall of silence' at the Transit Camp. However, the footprints found at the murder scene were found to have been made by rubber-soled shoes, not Army issue boots. Several airmen at RAF Benson were also interviewed later in the investigation.

The inquest was opened at the British Legion Hall, Crowmarsh (formerly the village school, where Miss Honey had been a pupil) and then adjourned. It was re-opened at Henley Town Hall. In a statement given to the police, Miss Honey's sister Elsie explained that she had not been unduly concerned about her sister's absence on the night of the murder, as she had assumed that she was staying with Mrs Lay, whose condition had worsened. Miss Honey's body was formally identified by her brother, Herbert Honey.

The post-mortem showed that Miss Honey died of shock following a physical and sexual assault. She had been attacked under the elm tree in Wilder's Yard, and afterwards her body had been dragged over the road to the field.

At the inquest, the Coroner, Mr Arthur Lett, paid tribute to Miss Honey, saying 'she was a most lovable person who was full of charity for others', and that it was 'a tragedy that she should die this way'.

Eventually, the inquest concluded that Miss Honey had been murdered 'by a male person unknown' (because she was a victim of sexual assault). She was buried in the churchyard at Newnham Murren and the police investigation into her murder dragged on. The case was never officially closed, and to this day it is still open. After all this time Miss Honey's murderer has not been found, though local people still think he came from the Transit Camp at Howbery Park.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 2nd March 2017

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Francesca Jones, Stephen Sherbourne, Nigel Hannigan, David Mannering, Stuart Soames, Andrew Johnson, Denise Hall and David Topliss; Sue Rance (Clerk); Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer); County Councillor Mark Gray. Mr David Rowley was co-opted to fill the vacancy on the Parish Council.

Apologies: from Councillors Ann Sharp and Fleur Stevenson, District Councillors Felix Bloomfield and Richard Pullen.

Matters from previous meeting

Cllr Sherbourne will ask Mr Cottrell for a quote to prune the overhanging branch of the ash tree at Jethro Tull Gardens (not subject to a tree protection order). Trees on Botany Allotments will be pruned on 21st March.

Two salt/grit bins have been installed in Park View. The County Council decided the other two bins we had requested were unnecessary.

Cllr Gray will arrange for an officer from OCC Highways to meet councillors to discuss the proposed pedestrian crossing on the A4074.

A piece of land has now been transferred to the County Council enabling adoption of the new Riverside Park access road.

Cllr Soames has publicised the North Stoke defibrillator locally: 35 residents have requested training. The two defibrillators in Crowmarsh Gifford will have new pads for use with children.

The Parish Council has written to the Chairman of Thames Water in support of a local resident who has had problems with the mains drain across her property.

Cllr Sherbourne reported that an underground pipe had been installed to carry flood water where the ditch had been filled in. County Cllr Gray will investigate further work needed.

County Councillor's report

County Cllr Gray reported that the Oxfordshire County Council tax will increase by 5% in 2017-18, and 3% of this is for social care.

Secondary school places for September 2017 have been allocated and 90% of students have been given their first or second choice. From 1st April, community groups will run the remaining 34 children's centres in Oxfordshire. The 12 centres in the South and Vale area plan to work together on fundraising.

Keith Stenning (Oxfordshire Highways) will visit to inspect potholes in Thames Mead. Everyone is encouraged to report any road problems at https://fixmystreet.oxfordshire.gov.uk.

A vote will be held at the County Council in March on the 'One Oxfordshire' proposal for unitary local government. Oxford City Council is opposed to this arrangement, but South Oxfordshire District Council is now supportive.

Finance

Payments agreed included £888 to Arrow Fencing for repairs to playground equipment, £489 for the Clerk's laptop, software and virus protection and £293.86 subscription to Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils, which gives legal and financial advice.

The Parish Council's precept for 2017-18 (which determines the council tax) will remain at this year's level of £38,201.

It was agreed that requests for grants/donations would be considered at the meeting on 16th March. Section 137 of the Local Government Act 1972 allows Parish Councils to spend money to benefit our area and its inhabitants. There is a maximum we can spend in a year.

Cllr Soames reported that he has obtained £10,000 lottery funding for the refurbishment of North Stoke Village Hall's kitchen.

Mr John Warburton spoke on behalf of the Corn Exchange Roof Appeal, reporting that the Sinodun Players have already raised 50% of the cost of the major project to replace the 150-year-old glass roof and improve the theatre facilities. The work is planned to start in June and is expected to take 17 weeks. Mousey Lane will remain open throughout.

A grant has been requested to install a bench at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall in memory of Mrs Maie Knight, who lived in the Old School next to the Village Hall and worked at the primary school for about ten years. The Emery & Owen Charity (which runs the allotments between The Street and Thames Mead) has also received a request for a grant towards the cost of a specially-adapted tricycle for a disabled local child.

Planning

SODC decisions:

P16/S2961/FUL: Erection of two detached houses with new (shared) highway access (as amended, removing car ports, alterations of parking arrangements and reducing extent of flat roof to the side of the dwellings). Land fronting Wallingford Road, North Stoke, OX10 6BD. PERMISSION GRANTED.

Parish Council responses to SODC: P17/S0435/HH: New porch to front elevation. 28 Park View, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8BL. RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

P17/S0448/HH: Garage building with storage, home office and guest bedroom/bathroom. Larkrise, Mongewell, OX10 8BP RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

The Chair of Planning had attended a meeting with the SODC officers recently, concerning the large planning applications in the Parish.

A member of the public asked the Parish Council to request Rule 6 status (to appear as a main party at the appeal inquiry into SODC's decision to refuse CABI's application P15/S3387/FUL.

Environment and recreation ground

Scofell will continue to maintain the nature area and will discuss with Cllrs Hall and Topliss the best treatment of nettles.

It was agreed to appoint a separate subcommittee (including Cllrs Griffin, Johnson, Rowley, Sharp and Sherbourne, and the Finance Officer), to discuss plans for the proposed new play area and to apply for grants, once we have demonstrated community support. Five estimates will be obtained, including one from Arrow Fencing, who built the current play area. Local people are asked to sign the petitions displayed on noticeboards in the village shop and primary school, or to sign the petition online on the Crowmarsh Gifford website: www.crowmarshgifford.org.uk.

Traffic and transport

The 134 bus service is now operating for Wallingford School students, but bus passes have not yet been issued. The 134 timetable has changed, and buses only run one way, through Crowmarsh Gifford towards Wallingford.

Correspondence

An allotment holder had requested a tap so that allotments may be watered with a hose. A tap fitted in the past had been removed after it was left running for long periods, resulting in high water charges. It was therefore decided that a new tap should not be installed.
