PACT calls for key workers to consider adoption

Adoption charity Parents And Children Together (PACT) is appealing for people from key worker professions to consider adoption.

The agency would really like to hear from key workers such as nurses, teachers, police officers, social workers, doctors, ambulance staff, childminders and those in the care sector, as given their professional experience and skills they typically make strong adopters, and they are particularly valued by local authorities looking to place a child.

Rated outstanding by Ofsted and offering its families award-winning adoption support services for life, PACT has been building and strengthening families since 1911. Last year it placed 89 children with 66 families through its adoption services.

Throughout the Covid-19 pandemic, children have continued to come into care and the need for adoptive families is increasing.

Over the last 21 months PACT's enquiries team has spoken with many people considering adoption and heard how this year has given people the time to consider their route to completing their families.

PACT is a warm, welcoming and professional agency open to a wide range of people including couples or single people, people from the Black and Minority Ethnic community and LGBT+, who can consider adopting children over four years old, sibling groups of two or more children, children with a black or minority ethnic background and children who may have physical or learning disabilities.

Past Times

The death of Colonel Roberts

Tuesday 11th of April 1916 was a sad day in Wallingford and in the surrounding villages, for on that day Colonel Charles Roberts of Bridge House, Wallingford, died.

He was the cousin of Lord Roberts of Kandahar. He served in the 93rd Highlanders (Sutherland Highlanders), in India, Burma and Canada. He fought in the Afghan War of 1878-80 and took part in the march from Kabul to Kandahar under the command of Lord Roberts.

After leaving the Army he bought Bridge House in 1905; in 1909 he became a Justice of the Peace for Berkshire, was a member of the Town Council and was on the Board of Guardians for St Peter's Parish. He helped raise the Volunteer Training Corps and commanded the Corps when on exercise and during their drills. At the outbreak of World War I, he offered his services to the War Office, but received a very curt reply, "Too old".

But in 1915 he was invited to help train young officers in Scotland. He drove himself to Scotland, a journey of some 600 miles, completed the training course and drove back to Wallingford. This proved too much for the 70-year-old man and in April 1916 he passed away after an attack of bronchitis.

His funeral was held at St Mary's,
Crowmarsh. The funeral was attended by a
large number of people, from Town
Councillors, serving and retired officers, and
members of the Police Force. The road to
Crowmarsh church was lined all the way with
members of the public. Only relatives and the
Corporation were allowed in the Church, all
other mourners had to use the churchyard. A
squad from Aldershot fired a volley over the
grave. During the whole the time the funeral
was being conducted, it never stopped
pouring with rain.

The Vicar writes...

Good news! As we celebrate our risen Lord at Easter, so we return to our regular weekly Sunday service at St Mary Magdalene's at 11am, following the same COVID safety precautions as before Christmas. The livestreamed service will continue to alternate each Sunday with the earlier 9.30am service from Brightwell. People are welcome to attend either in person at the church or online via our live stream on Facebook (also available on the righthand sidebar of our website www.wallingfordcofe.org.uk). We recognise that there are very diverse responses to the risks from coronavirus, so we leave it to each individual to decide how to join in.

For our Family Festival Communion on Easter Sunday at 11am, we ask people to pre-book their places (i.e. the number attending in their household bubble) so that we can make best use of the available seating. Easter Sunday will be especially poignant this year as it also marks the anniversary of the death of our much loved organist Derek Nightingale. Easter reminds us of the empty tomb and we worship our risen Lord, who promises us life after death for all who believe in him.

Despite the pandemic, we continue to host funerals with up to 30 mourners (and live streaming for anyone who cannot attend). We are now rebooking the weddings that have been postponed from last year to a time when more guests are allowed (the current limit of 6 guests increasing to 15 at Step 2 (<12th April), to 30 at Step 3 (<17th May) and no limit at Step 4 (<21st June).

We are looking forward to being able to restart our Community Café at the Village Hall on the 2nd Saturday of each month from 10.30am-12.30pm, whilst continuing virtually on Zoom in the meantime. We may be back as early as June, but should certainly be on again by July. Like many village organisations, a year of lockdown has drained financial reserves to a critical level, and so we hope that some stalls will be able to help with fundraising. We rely on the support of the village, including fundraising and legacies towards the maintenance of our Grade 1 Listed Norman church.

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met on-line on Thursday 4 March.

Present: Cllrs John Griffin, Ken McCrea, Julian Park, David Rowley, Liz Ryall, Stephen Sherbourne, Robin Smith, Stuart Soames and Fleur Stevenson, Mrs Sue Rance (Clerk), Dr Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer), District Cllrs Sue Cooper and Andrea Powell.

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs Andrew Johnson and David Topliss.

District Cllr Sue Cooper and the Chairman have met with Thames Water to discuss sewerage issues. Cllr Ryall reported on the generator provided as a temporary measure at Newnham Farm: plans to replace the pumping station are in hand. Thames Water will survey the pipe from this pumping station to the village of Crowmarsh Gifford.

A meeting has been held to discuss the future of the former SODC offices site following the recent survey. Options are being drawn up.

Cllr Sherbourne will write to Greene King to enquire about the future of The Bell.

Planning

There were no consultations this month. The neighbourhood plan is now under examination.

The Newnham Manor major application is not expected to come to planning committee until the Spring after a 21-day consultation on an amended layout:

District Cllr Cooper has asked for a consultation with Thames Water.

Finance

A donation of £250 was made to Riverside Counselling Service,

Expenditure included £109 for boiler service at the Pavilion, £414 for repairs to the train in the play area plus renewal of subscriptions to Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association and Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils.

The financial risk assessment was reviewed and approved with minor amendments. The asset register was reviewed and a few items added including new sanitisers and benches.

Environment and recreation

The playground has been used a lot and parts of the ground are very muddy. Parents are reminded that there should be a maximum of 30 children at any one time and to note the need for social distancing. Chris Strange is keeping the toilets and the car park open.

Please do not park in Bellamy Way.

Traffic and transport

Highways Officer Lee Turner will be asked for advice on a pedestrian crossing and other traffic management for North Stoke, as well as possible crossings in Crowmarsh Gifford.

Double yellow lines have been repainted in The Street including the bus stops.

Toc H Trees for Crowmarsh

Some readers will remember that before the pandemic we had started a branch of Toc H in the village. Toc H is a national and international movement whose principles are to promote Friendship, Fair Mindedness, Service and Reconciliation.

Unfortunately, our plans were stymied by Covid. As it is still probably some time before we can organise live meetings, we have devised a plan to reintroduce Toc H to Crowmarsh and at the same time promote care for our environment in the village.

We propose to obtain about 50 tree saplings that Wessex Toc H branch will provide as a gift to the village. People will then be able to claim them to plant in their gardens, or in a public place or on farm land where they have permission. This will be a way of raising the

profile of Toc H in the village ready for when we start live meetings and also improve the local and global environment.

John Howell MP writes....

I hope that the hint of Spring and the progress that we are making nationally to emerge from the restrictions that the pandemic has forced upon us bring a note of optimism to many. I say that knowing the wide range of difficulties that the prolonged lockdown has brought for many people which we will need to work through together in the coming months and years.

It was a delight to see such positive reports from teachers and children as they returned to school. It was also moving to hear children say what they had missed and the hopes that they have on going back. Mindful of the mental health concerns that the pandemic has given rise to I was pleased at the recent announcement of £79 million to expand mental health services for children and young people. I know from many emails sent to me that young people across the age range have faced many difficulties in this time.

Last month I mentioned new legislation coming forward to help protect our communities from illegal encampments. This is a problem that has been prevalent in the last year. Mindful of concerns to cut crime and build safer communities. the Government has now laid the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill before Parliament. This Bill seeks to ensure that the police have the powers and tools they need to protect themselves and the public. It also looks to overhaul sentencing laws to ensure that there is better protection from serious sexual and violent offenders and also to place greater emphasis on rehabilitation for offenders to help them rebuild their lives and prevent reoffending. This Bill will now make its way through due process in the coming months.

I know that Climate Change is an issue dear to many hearts. Whilst there are many big things that Government can do and is doing, I have often said that there are also many things that we as individuals and households can do that will also make a significant difference. The recent Food Waste Action Week focussed on one such issue. This was led by the Waste and Resource Action Programme and supported by Defra. Some of the data produced to support this campaign is very revealing as indeed is the impact that we can make if we all try to reduce our waste - for example, the fact that around 20 million slices of bread are thrown away at home every day. It has been said that stopping this would do the same for greenhouse gas emissions as planting 5.3 million trees! Such data certainly focuses our attention and, of course, reducing food waste also saves us money. For more information on this do go to the WRAP website.

Also on the subject of the environment there is also good news from the Department of Transport on the planned introduction of a new blend of petrol for cars and motor bikes to be available later this year which will help reduce harmful emissions. This is not to discourage the move towards electric vehicles but E10 fuel will mean greener fuel available to help reduce emissions from millions of vehicles already on our roads. When it is available it will be important to check compatibility with your own vehicle before use.

Many of our communities have completed, or are working on, Neighbourhood Plans. I continue to lobby Government where there are concerns related to these. I know that there have been concerns over the work involved in producing a plan, especially in smaller communities. I was therefore pleased this month to see some new funding come forward to pilot a simpler approach. The aim of this pilot is to test a simpler approach which aims to overcome the perceived complexity of the process and lack of volunteer capacity that can often result in low uptake for producing a plan despite a strong appetite in the local community to shape their areas. I have written to both SODC and Cherwell DC to encourage them to consider taking part in the pilot.

I hope that Parliament will soon return to a more normal pattern of working but in the meantime the work continues albeit largely remotely.
