

Neighbourhood police update

Dog fouling

Dog owners have a duty of care to ensure that they clean up any mess their dogs leave. We are looking at cracking down on this with the Parish Councils working with SODC to start issuing fines for dog fouling. These can be issued retrospectively, so if you witness anyone not cleaning up their dog mess, please get in touch with your local council.

Crime prevention advice

As the days are getting colder and your cars are likely to be frosted in the morning, please remember that it is an offence to leave a vehicle unattended with the engine running. It also leaves you vulnerable to an opportunist stealing your car - and as you have left the keys in the ignition you are likely not to be covered by your insurance. This can and does happen. We had several reports last year of vehicles being stolen on drives or on the roadside. Please ensure that you keep your property safe and secure at all times and don't leave valuables in vehicles.

Women at War, 1914-1918



This month's photograph shows four local ladies working at Walter Wilder's Iron Foundry (Jethro Tull Gardens now occupies the site). They must have found the work very heavy, hot and dusty. During the First World War, nearly two million women took over jobs traditionally done by men.

Without this effort from the women of the nation, the armed forces would have been short of men to do the fighting, and the war would undoubtedly have lasted longer. They became tram drivers and ticket collectors, they worked in factories on lathes and milling machines, they drove coal carts and carried large sacks of coal and coke on their backs, they became lumberjacks. In January 1917 the Land Army was formed and 16,000 women joined up.

Possibly the worst job was working in the munitions factories. There had always been a female work force in munitions manufacturing (212,000) but by 1918 there were nearly a million female workers. The girls' faces and hair would turn yellow due to the lyddite, and because of their colour they were known as "canaries". They also suffered with bad coughing, burns and swelling of their hands. 109 are recorded to have died of lyddite poisoning.

There were several large explosions in the munitions factories, too. At Silvertown in the east end of London in 1917 there was a huge

explosion that destroyed or damaged 70,000 houses and killed 73 people, most of them female workers. At Chilwell munitions factory on the outskirts of Nottingham, there was an even larger explosion. The factory employed 10,000 people, and produced around 45,000 shells a day. On 1st July 1918 eight tons of TNT exploded without warning, killing 134 employees, of which only 32 were positively identified.

The pay in the munitions factories was high compared with work elsewhere. A woman could earn £2 a week for a 12-hour shift. If she worked with TNT, she was paid £5 a week. Initially most of the "canaries" were single or child-less, but the number of wives and mothers increased as the war went on and childcare became a problem.

By the end of the war there were around 100 nurseries nationwide, but most children were looked after by friends, relatives and elder daughters who had to miss school so they could look after their younger brothers and sisters. Many of the munitions factories had their own ladies' football teams to give the girls exercise, and works canteens were introduced so the workers could be fed at the work place and ensure they had healthy diet.

To me the women who worked on the Home Front are the unsung heroes of the First World War and their sacrifice should not be forgotten.

Wallingford U3A

At our November meeting, Alastair Lack gave us 'An Anecdotal History of Oxford University'. He packed 800 years into a cheerful and interesting talk.

The University began in the 12th century with students, often aged between 11 and 14, living in 'residences'. They could be wild, and there were frequent gang fights with boys of the town. In 1249 the Bishop of Oxford put up the money to pay for University College, to train 12 Clerics to serve the Church and the State. The Bishop of Winchester founded New College, the Bishop of Lincoln paid for Lincoln College.... and so it went. And still the Great and the Good found Colleges. In the 20th Century, Lord Nuffield founded Nuffield College, for example. And some Trusts and benefactors give huge sums of money to Colleges and to the University.

Oxford gives back: 27 Prime ministers, 13 from Christchurch alone. And President Clinton was a Rhodes Scholar. The Ashmolean is the oldest free public museum in the world and has over a million visitors a year. The Bodleian is one of the world's great libraries. And the Oxford University Press, among other things, knows that thousands of families worldwide have a 'Concise Oxford Dictionary' lying around somewhere. The University did not admit women until the 1870s (600 years!) but in 2017, for the first time, women students outnumber men, and Louise Richardson is the first woman Vice Chancellor.

The city's architecture spans the centuries: medieval, Adam, modern - the Westgate, anybody? - but Oxford University is consistently recognised as one of the greatest Universities in the world. And it's ours.

District Councillor's Report

Local Plan

The South Oxfordshire Local Plan 2033 is now live and the documents can be viewed on our website. The publicity period is more formal than the previous four consultations, as the Planning Inspectorate dictates the specific questions we must ask relating to the soundness and legality of the plan.

Neighbourhood Plan update

Dorchester-on-Thames Parish Council has submitted its draft neighbourhood plan to SODC. Three neighbourhood plans were approved in October - Brightwell-cum-Sotwell, Chinnor and Long Wittenham. These will now form part of the South Oxfordshire development plan.

Go Active Juniors

Do you know a sports club that needs support to help young people become more active? We've launched Go Active Juniors - a new project for anyone up to 18 years old. The project aims to increase participation in sport and physical activity by getting young people active in our area. The team offer a range of support including helping to find new coaches to deliver sports sessions, assist clubs to set up new activity sessions and help clubs with equipment.

New community lottery

We're setting up a new online lottery for our residents to help raise funds for local community groups and charities. Residents can enter a £1 weekly online draw and be in with a chance of winning prizes ranging from free prize draw tickets right up to the £25,000 jackpot. Each £1 ticket bought has a 1 in 56 chance of winning a prize and nearly 60p of each ticket price will go to a local good cause. We are working with Aylesbury Vale District Council to set up our scheme and website and will use an external lottery manager to run it on our behalf. To get an idea on what the online lottery will look like, you can visit the Aylesbury Vale Lottery website.

New permanent offices in Crowmarsh

We've announced that we intend to return to our Crowmarsh Gifford site. Since moving to Milton Park we've investigated a wide range of options for a permanent home and have now concluded that the most cost-effective solution is to move back to the site. We will now work to prepare and build a new, smaller headquarters, which is more suited to our needs. The building will include a new council chamber for South's committee meetings, whilst Vale's meetings will continue to take place at The Beacon in Wantage.

Recycling, rubbish and waste update

Our new fleet of vehicles are now out and about on collection rounds. There are two different types of vehicle - one large truck for recycling and household waste and a smaller type for food waste recycling. Previously waste was collected in different compartments on the same lorry - but this has now changed. This means that collections are being carried out at different times of the day. There aren't any changes to collection days or the way you will need to put out your bins.

Community Safety Partnership

'Don't bin your batteries' call following waste and recycling truck fires. Residents in South Oxfordshire are being urged not to put batteries or other items which could cause a fire in their waste or recycling wheelie bin. Recently two small fires started in rubbish while it was being transported in waste and recycling trucks. Both were potentially very dangerous incidents to the crews, other road users and pedestrians. They also caused delays to collections and could have resulted in significant damage.

The fires were caused by items residents had put in their bins, most likely to have been standard lithium-ion batteries – like the ones found in most mobile phones.

Batteries should be put in a clear plastic bag and left on top of the green recycling bin, while small electrical items, that may also contain batteries, can be put out in a carrier bag alongside the grey refuse bin for separate collection.

If an item in a waste truck or at the deport catches fire then it could be extremely dangerous. I urge all of our residents to check that they are not putting items in their bins which could cause a fire.

Reminder - Councillor grants - applications needed

We've started receiving applications for councillor grants and have made our first three decisions with payments now on their way. I have a total of £5000 to distribute to local community groups and can make an award of £500 up to the full amount. If you need help financing a project please go to our website www.southoxon.gov.uk/grants or càll 01235 422405. The deadline for groups to apply is 20th December.

Finally, please remember to support all our small independent businesses in the run up to Christmas. I know many towns and villages are organising festive shopping evenings too so do pop along and help keep your local community thriving.

Apologies for absence from Councillors John Griffin, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames and David Topliss, District Councillors Bloomfield and Pullen and County Councillor Mark Gray.

Matters arising from the October meeting

The grass at Botany Allotments play area has now been cut. The road verges along the A4074 Portway have recently been cut, but it would have been helpful if the County Highways had informed us about this in advance.

The draft letter to neighbouring councils about ways we could work together will be re-drafted in the light of SODC's decision to return to their Benson Lane site.

There had been no objections to removing the noticeboard at Park View. Designs have to be approved by the County Council Highways department. Cllr Jones will obtain quotes.

Cllr Sherbourne attended the recent meeting of trustees of the Wallingford Bridge Estate Charity: this charity has some funds available to distribute as grants.

Request for a scout hut

Mr Ross Edmonds (Chairman of the Scout Group) addressed the council on the need for a scout hut in the parish. Cubs use Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on most Mondays, while Scouts meet at North Stoke village hall. This can hamper the progression of cubs to scouts. The Parish Council is fully committed to help them find a suitable.

community facility in the area. It was suggested that the scout group should publicise their need in *Crowmarsh News* and keep the Parish Council informed. There may be several potential sites to explore. Cllr Hannigan reported that it might be possible to have a corner of the SODC site on Benson Lane for community use: plans for the new offices are being drawn up.

Finance

- a) A schedule of payments made since the last meeting was approved, including £330 for the traffic survey at Portway and £293 for dog bin emptying. The grass cutting invoice included two cuts at North Stoke recreation ground in October and one cut in September. A grant of £645.55 has been received from Oxfordshire County Council towards cutting grass verges and other areas. £20 affiliation fee was paid to the Allotments and Gardens Society.
- b) Accounts for the year to date were presented. Expenditure was broadly in line with budget and there is enough money to pay for new noticeboards. £1688 has been received so far this year from hiring the pavilion for indoor activities, which is an increase over previous years.
- e) Requests for grants and donations: It was agreed to donate £100 to the British Legion Poppy Appeal for Crowmarsh Gifford and £100 for North Stoke.

Requests for donations from Sue Ryder and from the Chilterns Conservation Board will be considered at the next meeting.

South Oxfordshire Local Plan 2033

The Chair of Planning and Dr Nick Robins attended the Launch Forum for the publicity period of the SODC Local Plan 2033 at the Didcot Civic Hall on Wednesday 11th October, 2017. Consultation continues until the end of November.

Neighbourhood plan

Dr Nick Robins reported on a very informative meeting with Rona Knott of SODC on 12th October. Most of the work done so far has been very useful and the baseline report was accepted with a few modifications. There is a government funded outreach organisation which can provide grants for neighbourhood plans with specific projects. A step-by-step guide to the neighbourhood planning process is also available.

The next step is a strategic environmental assessment (SEA), which SODC has already done as part of the local plan. Each site that has been considered in the past needs to be looked at in terms of access, flooding, the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and other environmental factors.

The SEA will be sent to Rona Knott, followed by a policy statement on where new houses should be allocated. It is suggested at the moment that the majority of the houses should be allocated at Newnham Manor. Land also needs to be allocated for industry (business).

The intention is that our neighbourhood plan should be completed within 18 months. Once it is made, the planning authority will have to take notice of it in deciding planning applications.

The questionnaires issued at the recent Parish Plan meetings included a question on the site preferred by residents for development. However, one week after these were received, SODC announced their intention to return to the Benson Lane site. As this site was the favourite location identified in the survey responses, another survey will have to be carried out. The new questionnaire will include a question about the number of people living at the house who would prefer to have their own accommodation.

Environment and recreation committee

Pavilion and recreation ground

The minutes of the committee meeting held on 23rd October had been circulated. A quote of £375 had been received for painting lines on the basketball court. This will be considered at the next meeting.

Quotes are being obtained for a smart lock on the front door in order to provide access to the toilets. The Finance Officer confirmed that this would not affect the council's insurance cover.

Play area action group

Following a meeting to discuss the flood compensation scheme, Cllr Rowley has now submitted a proposal to the planning authority. Compensation has been calculated based on the volumes of the proposed mounds.

Traffic and transport committee

The traffic survey will be discussed at the next meeting. Cllr Jones was unable to attend the recent county meeting of Parish Transport Representatives. An apology has been received from Thames Travel bus company for the sudden changes to routes into Oxford following the opening of the new Westgate Centre.

REPORTS OF REPRESENTATIVES ON OUTSIDE BODIES

Cllr Mannering reported on a recent meeting of the River Users' Group (RUG3), which focused on boat licensing, moorings and clearing trees. The minutes had been circulated to councillors.

Other business

Cllr Soames has obtained a quote of £515 plus VAT from Arrow Fencing for repairs to the fence at North Stoke recreation ground and for supplying and fitting a new gate.

Mr Ian Nutt of Lister Wilder will speak to the council at 7pm, before their next meeting on 14th December about plans for some expansion at their Crowmarsh site.

The next liaison meeting between parish councils and Grundons will be on Monday 20th November. Cllr Mannering will enquire about the daffodil bulbs which have been allocated for the parish.

Following Cllr Hannigan's letter to SODC about contesting the CABI appeal, a reply has been received from the leader of the council, John Cotton. He stated that there were no legal grounds for judicial review as no legal mistakes had been made and in view of the existing permission on the site.

Cllr Jones reported that the disaster plan report has been sent to the County Council. Information from SODC on Section 106 developer payments and a slide presentation on capital grants scheme will be circulated to councillors.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be on Thursday 14th December at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. All are welcome.


