Report of District Councillors, Andrea Powell & Sue Cooper

New Council Structure and Appointments

Following the recent District Council elections, there has been a significant change in the structure and membership of South Oxfordshire District Council. After a long period of Conservative control, the new Council is run by a Liberal Democrat/Green partnership, with Sue Cooper as Leader. Council Priorities

It was clear that we were elected not just because of Brexit frustration and other national issues, but because South Oxfordshire residents are unhappy with the level of housing development already taking place and the unsustainable further development proposed in the SODC Local Plan. We need to build new houses, but they need to be the right kind of houses (number, size, affordability and environmental factors), in the right places, and with the appropriate infrastructure so that the increased burden on local services is minimised. The emerging plan, if approved, would unlock some funding from the Oxfordshire Growth Deal.

Our priority, is to take a good look at the emerging Local Plan (2011-2034), currently sitting with the government inspectors, and assess how to make it acceptable to our communities. We are reviewing options from a financial and legal as well as planning point of view. A huge amount of work has already gone into the development of the LP2034, but we are committed to doing everything in our power to reduce the impact of new housing on the environment and the Green Belt. We are determined to provide more truly affordable housing in our district, and we need to be creative about ways to do this. We want to make it very clear that this review has no bearing on the validity or enforceability of existing Neighbourhood Development Plans, or those currently under development, for

example, in Crowmarsh.

Climate Crisis

The outgoing Council, declared a climate emergency, urging the Council to reduce carbon emissions and to be mindful of environmental concerns in all aspects of its operations and decisions and this we intend to do.

Cooperation with Vale of the White Horse District Council

SODC and Vale share officers, premises and facilities, so we were also delighted that Vale transferred to Liberal Democrat control in the elections, giving us an excellent basis for a partnership. Sue and new Vale Leader Emily Smith are discussing how such collaboration will work in future and have agreed shared priorities for the coming year and beyond.

New SODC Website on its way

Andrea's cabinet position covers Corporate Services and Communication. Having had a sneak preview of the new SODC website, it is much more modern and built around what people want when they visit the site. The launch date is not yet known but watch this space!

Recycling

South Oxfordshire was recently ranked the top recycling district in the South East of England, and third nationally, recycling 63% of its waste. Well done to all our residents. Keep up the good work!

Past Times: A Comedy of Errors

The night of the 27th January 1865 had been particularly cold, and the next day being a Sunday, residents of Wallingford had hoped to linger in the warmth of their beds a little longer than in the week. But they were sadly disappointed, because around 4.40am they were roused by the cry of "Fire! Fire!". On staggering into the street, it was discovered that the building used by Mr Thomas Lovelock, a Wallingford grocer, as a storeroom and a drying room for bacon, was on fire.

The Wallingford Fire Engine was called out. At this time the engine was stored under the Town Hall and was soon at the scene of the fire. The fire engine was just a hand operated pump, and unfortunately it took an hour before water could be pumped onto the fire, because they had difficulty in finding a good water supply. The engine was moved to the wharf just north of the bridge to get water, but by then the fire had such a hold on the storeroom that it could not be saved. Instead the water was pumped onto the buildings next to the fire with great success and they were undamaged. During the time the fire engine was used the hose broke twice, it was thought this was because the engine was never regularly maintained and only checked when there was a fire.



SODC 'Turn it off' Campaign



Councils are asking drivers to 'Turn it off' if they are stopped for a minute or more. South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils have launched a joint campaign to help improve air quality across southern Oxfordshire. The campaign called 'Turn it Off' has been endorsed by Public Health England and is aimed at drivers who leave their engines 'idling' - still running even when the vehicle is not moving. This often happens when a vehicle is parked but the driver is still inside, at traffic lights, waiting for someone outside a school or a shop.

Did you know?

Just one minute of sitting with your car engine running and the vehicle not moving produces the equivalent of 150 balloons of harmful pollutants into the air. One minute of idling produces twice as many emissions as a moving vehicle. People inside cars are exposed to high levels of air pollution, with children especially at risk of harmful effects The campaign launched on Clean Air Day (June 20th) and will be followed by awareness events across both districts.

Air pollution has been identified by several organisations including the World Health Organisation, United Nations and the Royal College of Physicians as the biggest environmental risk to health. A recent report from Public Health England estimated that within the UK, air pollution is linked to up to 36,000 deaths each year. Older people and children are most sensitive to air pollutants. South Oxfordshire District Council cabinet member for housing and environment Cllr David Rouane said: "The message is simple - if you are in your car and stop for a minute or more then you should turn off your engine for cleaner air." Family Archaeology Day




On Saturday 27th July from 11am – 4pm, Wallingford Museum has organised



Universal Credit being used in new scam – Citizens Advice

Universal Credit has well and truly arrived - but now scammers are using the benefit as a pivotal part of a new sting to target vulnerable people. Citizens Advice says scammers are offering loans to their victims and then using their personal banking details to apply for Universal Credit in their names.

The scam is usually carried out by telephone, so do not accept a loan if you have been contacted by cold calling. If you are contacted in this way, just hang up. In general, personal details should not be divulged on the telephone or in an email.

The Universal Credit scam is also being carried out in public places. Victims are approached by smartly dressed people claiming to be from the Department of Work and Pensions, who then offer "government loans". Instead, the victim is signed up for Universal Credit. The scammers then apply for an advance payment of the benefit. This payment goes to the victim's bank account, but the scammers then charge a huge fee, around 50 per cent, for this unnecessary "service".

Citizens Advice has its own free service to help those applying for Universal Credit for the first time. "Help to Claim" is available over the telephone, face to face, and online through "webchat" and Internet content.

The national Freephone number for Help to Claim is **0800 144 8444.** Telephone and webchat services are available from 8am to 6pm (Monday-Friday).

Cllr Griffin was elected as Chair and Cllr Sherbourne as Vice-Chair, both unanimously. We welcomed Julian Park who was co-opted unanimously as a new parish councillor.

Matters arising from the May meeting

Some areas on the original plan for grass cutting have been missed: we will contact the contractor. Newnham Murren Churchyard has only been cut once this season: Cllr Griffin will contact Tom Cottrell.

Cllr Gray has contacted Oxfordshire Highways about the severe traffic problems caused by the road works at the CABI development. A new system will require utility companies to obtain a permit from OCC before embarking on road works.

The cabling work by Scottish and Southern Electricity at North Stoke is still incomplete and causing an obstruction. Cllr Soames will draft a letter to be sent from the Parish Council.

The council's solicitor has now agreed that the Parish Council as custodian trustee should register the land at North Stoke Village Hall: the Clerk will draft a letter.

Finance

The schedule of payments made in May was approved, including £201.60 for geraniums

planted in the flower tubs by Cllr Sherbourne.

After discussion, it was agreed to raise staff salaries by 2.5% with effect from 1st June 2019 as they had not been reviewed last year. A further discussion on pay will take place at the December meeting.

£745.08 has been received from British Gas as feed-in tariff for the solar panels on the pavilion. All allotment rents have been paid for this year.

Forms to register for Internet banking with Lloyds Bank were distributed by the Finance Officer and signed.

Strategic priorities

A survey of residents will be carried out in the autumn inviting ideas for other projects. The use of our Community Infrastructure Levy money will be considered. £32,000 has been received to date.

County Councillor's report

County Councillor Mark Gray reported on OCC's £3.5M highways improvement programme and new screening methods introduced by social services.

The whole Oxford Park and Ride system will soon be brought together under the Oxford City Council. There is new funding for alcohol reduction initiatives. A new chief fire officer has been appointed, who has many years' experience.

Cllr Gray was thanked for his donation of $\pounds1000$ for repairs to the culvert at North Stoke and he advised that a further $\pounds1000$ is available this year.

Ipsden Parish Council are erecting gates and warning signs to assist with reducing speeding along the A4074.

Jewson's lorry traffic is a continuing issue,

particularly first thing in the morning when lorries are waiting to make their deliveries. This causes congestion and some vehicles are parking in the bus layby, creating problems for bus passengers. The parish transport rep (PTR) will be asked to raise this at their next meeting.

Cllr Gray reported on plans for a week's trial at Stephen's Field starting on 17th June, when roadside parking will be stopped and the old riverside access road will be closed. This will be accompanied by a consultation with residents.

District Councillor's report

District Councillor Andrea Powell gave her report – see separate article.

Planning

Decisions by SODC:

P18/S0827/O Outline application for up to 150 dwellings together with associated access, public open space, landscaping and amenity areas. Land to the east of Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford. OUTLINE PLANNING PERMISSION GRANTED..

Applications with the Council's responses:

P19/S1564/HH Remodelling of the front of the house and opening up of the kitchen/family room. 91 The Street Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EF. NO OBJECTION.

P19/S1536/FUL The reorganisation of tourism facilities to deliver a Spa and Reception building, a replacement green keeper maintenance and laundry building, extension to the existing clubhouse and provision of 43 hotel lodges at The Springs Golf Club, North Stoke, Wallingford, Oxfordshire, OX10 6BE, including demolition of the former Hotel, Staff Accommodation Block, Storage Shed, Committee Building, Stores 1 & 2 and Greenkeeper's Shed, Maintenance Building and removal of Caravan. The Springs Golf Club, Wallingford Road, North Stoke OX10 6BE. RECOMMEND REFUSAL: The scale of the proposed development is excessive, particularly the number and location of lodges, with associated lighting, roadways and other urbanising features within the site. The parish

council objects strongly to the lodges proposed near the Ridgeway National Trail (near Hole 10). Buildings and associated lighting and activity here would be intrusive development in the open countryside that would fail to conserve or enhance the Chilterns AONB. Building in this part of the site, well beyond the settlement, would be harmful to the landscape and would begin to urbanise this green area and potentially establish a basis on which conversion to permanent residential use could be envisaged in future. The parish council does not object to redevelopment of the hotel site itself for a spa complex with hotel accommodation and leisure facilities, subject to good design and conditions to manage the impact on the environment, including sustainable drainage, low impact lighting, traffic management and planting for biodiversity and carbon storage, but the number of lodges and the extent of expansion to the north is excessive. The visually intrusive area of additional parking near the club house will impact on the North Stoke Conservation Area and the Chilterns AONB. If this redevelopment or a modified scheme is permitted, the additional traffic generation on the B4009 should require developer contributions to a traffic calming scheme to enforce the transition from 50 to 30 mph where southbound traffic enters the built-up area of the village.

P18/S1420/RM Reserved Matters application following Outline approval P15/S3387/FUL (The demolition of existing buildings and erection of a new headquarters for CABI) for the approval of layout, appearance, landscaping and scale. Discharge of conditions including drainage. CABI, Nosworthy Way, Mongewell OX10 8DE. Not subject to consultation.

Neighbourhood Plan

Mr Nick Robins and Mr Nigel Hannigan reported that the draft plan and related documentation are almost complete. There have been some delays in the District Council, who have now carried out a "health check". A total of over 300 homes have been included in the plan, projecting the local housing needs to 2034, but these include the approved schemes at CABI, Mongewell and Benson Lane. Two significant documents are still to be drafted by Mr Robins and submitted to the district council: a public consultation report and a compliance report. The advice from SODC is to recruit a technical consultant to go through the whole plan and make sure the format is correct. After discussion it was agreed to apply for a grant from Locality for the cost of this (£3000-£4,000) and to begin recruiting a consultant. It is hoped to have the work completed in the next two or three months and then to post the plan on the website for consultation for a period of six weeks. It is hoped that the referendum will be held by the autumn, after which the plan can be made.

Environment and Recreation Ground Committee

Cllr Rowley reported a few minor issues with the playground, but Mr Strange is keeping a regular check on everything. After discussion it was agreed to accept the quotes from Arrow Fencing for installing a cableway platform, five cycle hoops and a replacement signpost for the gym. A few incidents of antisocial behaviour have been reported and the head teacher of Wallingford School has asked to be informed of any incidents involving his students.

Traffic and Transport Committee

Very positive feedback has been received on the speed indicator device (SID) installed in The Street. The existing small device on the A4074 Portway will be removed so that the new solar powered one can be fitted. It was agreed to order a third device for Benson Lane and to request £1000 from County Councillor Gray's budget towards the cost. Consideration will be given to purchasing one for North Stoke.

Amanda Griffin will attend the next meeting of Oxfordshire Parish Transport Reps on 3rd July.

Other business

Notes of the Annual Parish Meeting on 16th May have been circulated by the Clerk. Issues raised included traffic and transport, particularly the problems of speeding.

It was agreed to pay £5 per month to upgrade the hosting of the website so that full-sized images can be posted and available space maximised.


