Dog fouling

Please be responsible and don't let your dog foul a public right of way or open access land. The countryside is used by children, walkers, cyclists, wheelchair and pushchair users throughout the year, and everyone has the right to enjoy it.

Dog mess can spread some very nasty infections and diseases. A pile of dog poo can contain one million microscopic Toxocara eggs. Toxocaris is highly infectious, especially to children. Typical symptoms include dizziness and nausea, asthma and epileptic seizures. More seriously, it can lead to serious eye damage, even permanent blindness.

Dog mess, especially from unwormed dogs, also harbours parasites that can harm farm animals especially cows and sheep. Please clear up your dog's mess and dispose of it in a dog waste bin.

If there isn't a bin nearby, please don't leave it behind on the path or hang it on a tree in a bag. Instead, dispose of it safely at home by double wrapping it and putting it in your standard household refuse or a litter bin.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting for all electors was held at Crowmarsh Gifford Primary School on Thursday 16th May. This is a chance for any resident to raise issues of local concern and ask questions of the parish, district and county council representatives.

Wing Commander Caroline Viles gave an interesting presentation on 32 (The Royal) Squadron, currently based at RAF Benson while their runway at RAF Northolt is renewed. The squadron (formerly the Queen's Flight) transports government ministers, royalty and other VIPs efficiently and often at short notice, mostly using quiet BAE146 aircraft. Most of us will hardly notice their presence nearby over the summer months.

Cllr Rowley showed pictures and a short video of the construction and opening of the new playground.

Our neighbourhood police officers (PCSOs) were there to answer questions and there was lively discussion about traffic and speeding, still among the top concerns of the public. 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Past Times: The Ipsden and North Stoke Parish Magazine

The picture below is the front page of the Ipsden and North Stoke Parish Magazine: the month of issue is April 1916. The magazine covered Ipsden, North Stoke and Mongewell and was first printed in 1908 and continued until 1937. The magazine was started by the vicar of North Stoke, the Reverend Herbert Coombes.

Easter fell in April 1916, and much of the magazine was devoted to the church services at Ipsden and North Stoke.

There were comments about how beautiful the bluebells were that year, particularly in Foxberry Wood, which was situated on the road to Forest Row. It was cut down in the 1950s and the area was ploughed up.



It was reported that a Zeppelin passed over Ipsden at about 10.00 p.m., thought to be on its way to bomb London.

Under the heading of War Notes, it reported that the three villages had suffered no casualties during the month of March. Mr John Fraser (of Mongewell Park) had returned after serving with the French Red Cross and Miss Dora Dodd had finished her six months' engagement with the British Red Cross. The magazine reported that Mr Ambrose Dodd had a narrow escape when his horse was killed while he was riding it. The promotions of Harry Anderson and Oliver Brown to Sergeant were noted, and Harold Stanwell and Frederick Prior had been called up. Other months must have made very grim reading.

The Ipsden Boy Scouts would parade on Palm Sunday, and on Easter Monday they would take part in a ten-mile cross-country run, followed by a day and night camping in the woods.

A Miss Annie Edhouse was appointed Assistant Mistress to Mongewell School, and Colonel R.B. Roe had been appointed School Manager to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Frank Woodley.

There was an announcement that the Boys Carpentry classes, run by George Wear, would be closed for the summer months. All 141 articles made by the boys were taken to the Red Cross depot in Reading: they included 13 pairs of crutches, 5 footrests, 2 bedside tables and 108 splints.

Mr Fraser and Mr Wormald were thanked for donating money to pay for heating apparatus in North Stoke Church, and Mr Fraser was thanked for the beautiful windows he paid for in the church.

The magazine had several pages of adverts, which of course helped pay the cost of producing the magazine. These adverts were mainly for Wallingford businesses, of which only one, Champions, is still in business today.

This little magazine gives an interesting snapshot of life in the villages during war-time..




Crowmarsh playground and outdoor gym

Oxfordshire in the British Civil Wars



Stephen Barker will talk to The Wallingford

Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) on Wednesday 12th June about 'Oxfordshire in the British Civil Wars 1642-51'. The talk is at 7.45 for 8pm, at St Mary le More Church, Wallingford. Visitors (£4) are most welcome. This presentation will be fully illustrated, with personal accounts, archaeology and what can be seen today.

There are few places in the county with no connections to the Civil Wars. Oxfordshire played a significant part after Oxford became the Royalist capital in late 1642 and the county was on the front line with parliamentary Buckinghamshire. The county's story is that of King Charles, Prince Rupert, Cromwell, Fairfax, Waller, as well as a number of women who played significant parts and whose stories are being widely told for the first time.

Oxfordshire's story is that of the battles at Chalgrove and Cropredy, of amazing castles that once stood at Wallingford and Banbury and of Cromwell's raids in the Spring of 1645.

Stephen Barker is an independent Heritage Advisor who specialises in military history, particularly the First World War and British Civil Warsi. He is currently working with the History Faculty, University of Oxford, and the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum.

John Howell MP writes

In recent weeks we have seen concern about climate change growing to unprecedented levels with it moving firmly into our national consciousness. It is an issue that I too take very seriously and am pleased that in Parliament we have declared a climate emergency, which now needs to be followed with action.

At the end of last year the Government asked the UK Committee on Climate Change for advice on setting a 'net-zero' emissions target. This committee published their findings on 2nd May and the Minister is now looking at this evidence-based advice to determine just what actions we need to take. I look forward to some practical proposals with targets to which we can commit. Although historically in the UK we had indeed contributed to the problems, our more recent track record of action is good and I am confident that we can rise to the challenge.

Whilst we cannot, and must not, be complacent, there is some good news. The UK passed the world's first Climate Change Act over a decade ago with cross-party support. This gave us both a framework to set statutory carbon budgets and set up the independent Committee on Climate Change. Since 2000, independent analysis shows that no other major industrialised country has done more than the UK to cut CO_2 intensity (the measure of carbon for each pound of GDP).

Overall the UK has cut emissions by more than 40% while growing the economy by more than two thirds, the best performance on a per person basis than any other G7 nation. We are on track to meet the 2050 target to reduce emissions of all greenhouse gases by 80 per cent, but now we may need to move the goalposts and set more ambitious targets.

I am aware that there are differing views on the merits of different measures, and rightly we should continue our research. But above all I would encourage positive action. We must all ask what we can do as our contribution to resolving this problem. I am pleased to see some of our local councils making their own Climate Emergency commitments. I am also pleased to see community groups getting together to see what each of us can do in our everyday lives. Often small changes replicated across the country can make a big difference. However, climate change is too broad a challenge for us to tackle alone. It is a global problem which needs global commitment to the solution and I am pleased that we are playing an influential role in this.

London-based wildlife charity People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) and Royal Holloway University of London have launched a national beetle survey to conserve the beautiful but threatened noble chafer beetle.

They are seeking volunteers to look for noble chafers over a two-week period in June, to find out where they are still living in the UK, allowing conservationists to help save them from extinction. Instructions and equipment will be given to all volunteers and noble chafers don't bite, so it is safe to handle them.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 9th May

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), David Rowley, Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames and Liz Ryall, Sue Rance (Clerk) and Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer) and County Councillor Mark Gray.

Apologies for absence were received from Cllrs Fleur Stevenson and David Topliss and District Cllrs Sue Cooper and Andrea Powell.

Election of chair and vice-chair

Cllr John Griffin was elected as Chair and Cllr Sherbourne as Vice-Chair, both unanimously.

Matters arising from the April meeting

County Councillor Gray will remind Oxfordshire Highways that we are still awaiting further information from Mr Marshall and Mr Sherwood about developer funding from the Newnham Manor application, which still hadn't come back to SODC's Planning Committee.

The additional cost of grass cutting at the new playground will be discussed with the contractor and our groundsman Chris Strange. Some areas in the Crowmarsh Hill area that have not been cut will be included in the schedule. Cllr Sherbourne will report back. It was agreed to continue with Cottrells as the contractor for grass cutting at Newnham Murren Churchyard.

County Cllr Gray reported that the County Council will do a seven day trial of a new road arrangement at the riverside with no parking in Stephens Field. He and the Chairman will organise a consultation with residents beforehand, early in June.

County councillor's report

County Councillor Gray congratulated the Parish Council on the new playground and the successful opening event. A vote of thanks was made to County Councillor Gray for funding £1000 for the North Stoke culvert repairs.

Six recycling centres are due for a spring clean: Oakley Wood will be shut on 23rd and 24th May.

More than 93% of primary school applications were awarded their first choice of school.

On Wednesday 12th June the 3rd stage of the Ovo women's cycle race will start in Henley and will pass through Crowmarsh Gifford. The race is expected to bring in £2 million to the Oxfordshire economy.

The recent road works at the CABI development caused major traffic disruption and Councillor Gray will try to ensure that future utilities work is better organised to minimise delays.

Finance

The schedule of payments was agreed, including £4,352.26 for two speed indication devices, £3,623 to Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association for project management for the playground project, £660 grant to North Stoke Parochial Church Council for grass cutting, as well as further payments for the playground and for grass cutting.

Some issues remain to be resolved with Eibe on the playground and some payments will be withheld until they have been dealt with.

The accounts for the year ended 31st March 2019 were reviewed and approved, along with the annual governance statement and accounting statement. These now go to the auditors.

The Finance Officer and Mr Chris Strange have revised the asset list to be included in the annual return, coming to a value of £816,154.

Chris Strange's salary for looking after the pavilion and recreation ground was reviewed and increased to £6,268 from 1st May 2019. It

was agreed to pay him an additional month's salary as a bonus in recognition of the extra work he has done during the playground construction.

Update on allotments

Plot 13 is vacant. Two allotment holders have not yet paid for the year.

Strategic priorities

A pedestrian and cycle crossing on the A4074 Portway remains the top strategic priority, followed by a pedestrian crossing in The Street. Cllr Sherbourne had suggested that a survey of residents could be carried out inviting ideas for other projects and this will be discussed at the June Parish Council meeting.

Names and numbering

The new dwelling at 150 The Street will be named The Old Forge, adjoining the house on the corner of Meadow Lane (148 The Street) known as Chiltern Villa.

Environment and Recreation Ground Committee

The grand opening of our new playground and outdoor gym was a great success. The scouts ran a barbecue, the Pre-School had a cake stall and the school PTA served drinks. Waitrose donated recyclable cups. Music was provided by the Roke and Benson Brass Band.

Since the opening the use of the playground has exceeded all expectations. Some problems have been caused by the number of families travelling by car and therefore needing parking facilities. Priority parking at the pavilion needs to be for hirers. Playground users are reminded not to park in Bellamy Way: please park at the Riverside or elsewhere if you can. The situation will be monitored. Cllr Soames suggested re-marking the parking bays to provide more spaces.

As more people are using the front door of the pavilion to use the toilets, Mr Strange has suggested opening the side entrance to allow use of the toilets near the changing rooms.

An email has been received from a resident expressing thanks for providing the new facilities with equipment for all ages and abilities. The family cannot use the riverside car park as their vehicle, which is adapted for a disabled child, is too high to pass under the barrier. Quotes are being sought for a platform to enable small children to reach the zip wires.

Quotes are being obtained for new racks so that bicycles are not parked against the fences.

Cllr Soames reported that Scottish and Southern Electricity have laid a cable and damaged the track leading to the recreation ground at North Stoke. They have also left a one metre high pile of soil in front of the gates where access is needed for the mowers. Cllr Soames will draft a letter of complaint for the Chairman's signature.

Traffic and transport committee

The Chairman reported that Amanda Griffin is willing to become the Parish Transport Representative following Francesca Jones's resignation.

The Clerk will write a letter for the Chairman's signature to the County Council formally requesting again a Toucan crossing on the A4074.

Representatives on outside bodies

Emery Owen Trust Cllr Johnson reported that the trust maintains the allotments near to Thames Mead and makes grants available to local causes. He and Helen Aplin are our appointed trustees. This year a lot of tree work has been done and the footpath across the allotment land has been maintained. Shrub planting may be considered later this year. The trust is spending more than its income but does have some reserves. North Stoke Village Hall Cllr Soames reported that he had contacted the solicitor on behalf of the Parish Council, as custodian trustee. It was agreed that Cllr Soames may act on behalf of the Parish Council on this matter.

Other business

Invitations have been received to the RAF Benson Annual Reception on 23rd May.

Cllr Sherbourne reported that a scaffolding platform or cherry picker will be needed to install the speed indicator devices and help will be asked for when a date has been arranged.

An allotment holder has requested that a tap to be fitted at the allotments: this will be discussed at the June meeting.

Cllr Sherbourne will investigate broadband speed in the Park View and Robert Sparrow Gardens area.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be on Thursday 6th June at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall starting at 7.30pm. All are welcome.
