Planning Appeal Hearing Land East of Benson Lane

Bloor Homes/Hallam Land Management has appealed against the SODC decision to reject its application to build 150 houses on land east of Benson Lane. The Appeal Hearing will be held at the Fountain Building in Howbery Park and will start on Tuesday 27 March at 10am. The Hearing will continue into the following week with a break for the Easter weekend. It is scheduled to last six days.

Allowing building to commence on such a large space behind Benson Lane and The Street has the potential to become a development that could later expand to more than 700 new homes. This would be an estate that would be separate from the rest of the village and would straddle the Marsh Lane byway. Many of us believe that such a radical addition to Crowmarsh Gifford would threaten the sustainability of the village. It would also destroy our rural setting and completely change the character of Crowmarsh Gifford from a rural village into a part of Greater Wallingford.

Both Crowmarsh Parish Council and the Crowmarsh Residents' Action Group have full representation at the Appeal. They will each be represented at the Hearing by Advocates, who will have the same standing as the Barristers that represent the Local Authority and the Appellant. We believe we have a strong case.

We encourage all parishioners who have an opinion on this application, to speak at the Hearing. To do this you need to be present on the first morning to register your interest as a speaker. The Inspector will then inform you when the public presentations will be heard. The more of you that do this the better our case will be. You may be passionate about our protected species in the field, the owls, bats, adders and stag beetles, or protective of high grade agricultural land, your concern might be our rickety sewage system, or it could be access to schools for your children, or perhaps competition to get an appointment with your GP or dentist... Whatever it is, please tell the

Inspector at the Hearing.

The most important thing of all is that the village shows a presence and solidarity behind rejecting the proposed housing development. You may not be able to attend all six days and we do not expect you to do this, but it would be excellent if as many of you as possible could turn out on the first morning and make your feelings known. After that, please attend the Hearing as and when you can – there is an excellent café next door to the Fountain Building, so it is an excuse for a bit of socialising as well.

We can win this fight and we shall. The 100 new houses recently approved by South Oxfordshire District Council at Newnham Manor is enough for the village to absorb in one go; there are another 266 new homes already approved elsewhere in the Parish. No more please for the moment. Your Parish and your village need your voice and support at the Appeal Hearing.

Past Times

The Elm Tree Murder from David Beasley

Sunday 3rd March 1946 was a cold, grey day with the threat of snow in the air. Florence Honey did her usual Sunday morning job making sure St Mary's Church, Crowmarsh was clean and tidy ready for morning service. After attending the service, Miss Honey returned home and cooked Sunday dinner for herself and her sister Elise, who had recently moved in with her due to ill health. After the meal, they listened to Tommy Hanley on the radio until tea time.

After tea Miss Honey left her home in the Street, Crowmarsh to visit her friend Mrs Harriet Lay at 3 Compton Terrace, Wallingford, who was bed ridden, something she did 3 or 4 times a week. It must have been a nervous walk for the 60-year-old spinster, for there were many British and Polish soldiers from the transit camp at Howbery Park in Crowmarsh and Wallingford drinking in the pubs, and roaming the streets causing a considerable disturbance in the town.

She stayed with Mrs Lay until after the epilogue on the radio, when she left to walk the mile home. Near Leonard Shepherd's Grocery shop (formerly Launderama but has now been converted into two flats) she passed Thomas Beesley, who was returning from visiting a friend in Crowmarsh. Just as she left Wallingford Bridge, someone stopped and dragged her into Wilder's yard, where she was attacked.

At about 6.30am on Monday, Walter Green a lorry driver of 14 Wood Street, Wallingford, was walking to Crowmarsh where he garaged his lorry. As he passed Wilder's yard he saw in the field opposite the body of Miss Honey, she had been assaulted under the under the elm tree in Wilder's Yard, her body was then dragged across the road to the field. Robbery was not thought to be the motive as her unopened brown handbag was lying nearby. He immediately informed the police.

Oxfordshire's Chief Constable Lt. Col H. Rutherford informed Scotland Yard, it was normal then for Scotland Yard to be called in to assist rural police forces. Chief Inspector Fabian (a TV series was made of his career in the 1950's, starring Bruce Seaton as Fabian) and Detective Sergeant Willis were given the case. To protect the crime scene from the snow, which had been falling for some time, a tarpaulin tent was erected over the body. The local police awaited the arrival of Chief Inspector Fabian and the Home Office Pathologist Professor J.M. Webster, both arriving by late afternoon.

Meanwhile P.C. Peachy the Crowmarsh "Bobbie", spent several hours outside a house at the bottom of Crowmarsh Hill, keeping watch on a family who were new to Crowmarsh. He was ordered away by an irate Inspector Day of Thame, who was assisting in the inquires, because he knew the family. British and Polish soldiers at the Transit Camp in Howbery Park were confined to the camp; and the perimeter of the camp was patrolled by Military Police.

Elsie Honey made a statement to the police that she wasn't concerned when her sister didn't return home that night, she assumed Mrs Lay's condition had worsened and Florence had stayed the night.

In the evening Professor Webster performed a preliminary examination. The post-mortem was performed in Royal Berks Hospital, Reading on Tuesday and revealed she had been physically and sexually assaulted and had died from shock.

A Polish soldier from the transit camp spent all day with the police helping them with their inquiries and was later released. An examination of footprints found at the murder scene revealed that they were of a rubber soled shoe and were not Army issue boots. The ban on British and Polish soldiers leaving the Transit camp was lifted at 5pm.

The inquest was opened at the British Legion Hall, Crowmarsh, (formerly the village school, where Miss Honey was once a pupil). Evidence of identification was given by Horace Honey, Miss Honey's brother, then the inquest was adjourned until the 5th April to allow the police to make further inquiries.

The Coroner, Mr Arthur Lett, paid a tribute to Miss Honey saying that 'she was a most lovable person, who was full of charity for others, and that it was a tragedy that she should die this way'. After the inquest, Horace Honey appealed to the press to spare the feelings of the relatives, as many of their statements were inaccurate and in bad taste. Miss Honey was buried in Newnham Murren Churchyard on Wednesday afternoon.

On Friday 8th March inquiries moved to R.A.F. Benson where several airmen were interviewed. The inquest was re-opened at Henley Town Hall on the 5th April and further adjourned until 3rd May.

The re-commencement of the inquest at Henley Town Hall was attended by the Deputy Chief Constable and Chief Inspector Fabian. The Coroner, Mr A. Lett, started by outlining the evidence and stated that he would not call any evidence from the police. Evidence was given by Horace Honey, Walter Green, Elsie Honey, Richard Ferguson and Thomas Beesley. Professor Webster's report was read to the jury, by the Coroner. The jury brought in a verdict of "Murder by a male person unknown" the words "male person" was included because Miss Honey had been sexually assaulted. The inquiries continued but got no further forward, in fact there was talk of a "wall of silence" at the Transit Camp.

Chief Inspector Fabian was taken off the case. As the investigation dragged on, the Scotland Yard officers returned to London, and the local police were moved to other local cases. The case was never officially closed, and Miss Honey's murderer has never been found. Local people still think the murderer came from the Transit Camp at Howbery Park.

Crowmarsh Playground and **Gym Update**

We are pleased to report we have planning approval for the play area upgrade and addition of a gym area.

Some of the plans have been on display at Crowmarsh Primary School and the February Coffee morning at Crowmarsh Village Hall. They will be local residents of two events they are running on display at the next Coffee morning on Saturday 10th March between 10.00-12.00.

The design has considered requests for equipment made in our previous survey in spring last year, which had 215 people supporting the principle of a new improved playground and 126 supporting the gym.

Wallingford U3A

At our February meeting Ian Keeble gave us a fascinating and funny introduction to James Gillray, perhaps the greatest political cartoonist of all time. Gillray was born in London in 1786 and began publishing in 1792. We were treated to a number of his cartoons. lan sketched in the stories behind them, explaining quickly the significance of the people ridiculed. Gillray satirised High Society, in which, in London then, everyone would know everyone. His prints were expensive but eagerly awaited and passed about. He was rude, vulgar and vicious; he could be bawdy, ribald and obscene. Some of his personal attacks might not be publishable today. Indeed, the Prince of Wales bought up all the copies of one print run and paid to have the plate destroyed.

For years Gillray lived with a Mrs. Humphreys, also a print maker, above her shop. In 1810 his sight began to fail and he stopped working. He began to drink heavily, and some people said he became insane. Mrs. Humphreys looked after him until he died in 1815.

This was a hugely enjoyable talk about a ground breaking political satirist. We really hope that Ian Keeble will come to speak to us again.

Science Exchange Wallingford

Science Exchange Wallingford's next meeting is titled Sex Hormones in the Water, by Andrew Johnson from the Centre for Ecology and Hydrology. The meeting is on Tuesday 6th March at 7.30pm in Wallingford School Library, St George's Road, Wallingford.

Back in the 1990s it was noticed that male fish living in proximity to sewage effluent in our rivers were showing signs of changing sex. These male fish were developing female characteristics such as the presence of eggs in the testes. This phenomenon was most closely associated with the escape of human excreted estrogens, both natural and synthetic, from sewage treatment plants. At the same time. concerns over human health developed with the concept of the 'testicular dysgenesis syndrome' being raised which included issues like declining sperm counts. The talk will discuss how these topics developed and where we are now.

Andrew Johnson is an environmental scientist employed as a Principal Scientific Officer at the NERC Centre for Ecology and Hydrology in Crowmarsh Gifford. In addition, he is a Visiting Professor at Brunel and Kyoto Universities. He is also a member of the Defra Hazardous Substances Advisory Committee

Meetings are very informal. Speakers talk for about half an hour, then we break for refreshments and return for a lively question and answer session. 

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 1st February

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames, Nigel Hannigan, David Rowley, Denise Hall, and Stephen Sherbourne; Sue Rance (Clerk) and Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer).

Apologies for absence from Councillors Francesca Jones, David Mannering, Fleur Stevenson, Elizabeth Ryall and David Topliss. No district or county councillors attended.

Finance

The financial summary for the year to 31st January 2018 showed total receipts of £54,000, compared with £55,000 last year. Total payments were £40,000, compared with £53,000 last year. Last year's expenditure was higher because of payment for the basketball court, bus stop and computers for use by the clerk and finance officer. A VAT repayment of £837.73 has been received. SODC has acknowledged receipt of the precept application forms. The parish element of the council tax is not due to increase.

Grass cutting expenditure is split into different areas of the parish (Crowmarsh Gifford recreation ground, North Stoke recreation ground, road verges and open spaces). Berinsfield Community Business is willing to hold the current prices for the next 2-3 years, Mr Strange is happy with this company's performance and we plan to continue to use them for the next season's grass cutting. Detailed arrangements will be reviewed at the 1st March meeting.

Two years' accounts will be presented to support the playground grant applications. The list of strategic priorities will be circulated again to councillors for review at a future meeting.

The council reviewed its financial risk assessment, financial regulations and publications scheme and approved them with only minor amendments. Our publications scheme will need to be reviewed again in the light of the

General Data Protection Regulations. The Clerk will obtain a model privacy policy which is also needed under these regulations.

Chairman's report

Cllr Griffin reported that Crowmarsh News is now running well as an independent concern, thanks to the editorial team and other volunteers. Funds have built up gradually and a laptop and software have now been purchased to provide a dedicated system that can be used by any member of the editorial team. A countywide network for community magazine teams has been set up by Community First Oxon to cover topics such as insurance, recruiting volunteers and printing: two of the Crowmarsh News team attended its inaugural meeting.

SODC Planning Committee Meeting

Cllr Hannigan reported on the SODC Planning Committee meeting on 16th January where he spoke against planning application P16/S3852/FUL for the erection of 100 new residential dwellings including new access road off the A4074, public open space and the provision of school land at Newnham Manor OX10 8ED. The application was approved by the committee on a vote of 7-2.

Planning appeal at Benson Lane site – ref: APP/Q3115/W/17/3186858

P16/S3608/O: Outline planning application for up to 150 dwellings with access, public open space, landscaping and amenity areas on land east of Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8ED. The Public Inquiry into this application will start at 10 am on Tuesday 27th March at the Fountain Conference Centre, Howbery Park, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8BA and is expected to last for 6 working days. The Chair of Planning had submitted the Parish Council's Pre-Inquiry Statement.

Neighbourhood Plan

Dr Nick Robins reported on progress with the Crowmarsh Neighbourhood Plan. The data gathering is mostly complete. Policies have been drafted and six of them are now on the parish website:

http://crowmarshgifford.org.uk/2017/04/15/local -community-plan/

- Environment safeguarding.
- Crowmarsh Gifford housing development.
- Type of housing.
- North Stoke and Mongewell local plan policy for small rural villages.
- Development needs education, medical and recreational facilities keeping pace with housing.
- SODC site help to reintegrate into the community.

The seventh policy will be the Strategic Environmental Assessment report from SODC.

The housing needs assessment has arrived at the number of new houses that Crowmarsh Gifford will need as 110, the figure in the emerging SODC local plan.

The landscape survey has considered nine sites in terms of landscape value, habitat and heritage. The site assessment report has considered each site in terms of its suitability for new housing. Two sites were looked at for employment use. A letter had been received from a company interested in providing retirement homes in the area.

A Parish Transport Survey is to be carried out in Crowmarsh Gifford and North Stoke and it is hoped to recruit volunteers for this – please get in touch if you are interested in helping with this or any aspect of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The next step will be to consult the parish: village meetings will be held at Crowmarsh Gifford School and North Stoke Village Hall including a Powerpoint presentation on progress so far. Printed copies of the reports will be available at various sites in the parish as well as on the website.

Environment & recreation ground

The Environment and Recreation Ground Management Committee met on 22nd January. Three quotes have been obtained for electrical testing of fixed wiring. The quote of £540 from G A Electrical will be accepted.

Some of the chairs need replacing. The Photographic Club has requested additional chairs and offered to pay half of the cost. We agreed to purchase better quality chairs at £900 for 30, as long as they are stackable.

It was agreed to rebuild the brick wall at the rear of the Pavilion incorporating a steel reinforced safety barrier (£2,500).

Update on playground project

The following project stages were approved:

- Application to SODC for 50% of the capital Council. project cost, deadline 26th April.
- Application to WREN for £100K by 13th June.
- Application to local businesses for donations.
- Apply for letters of support from the community.

Cllr Johnson has been given authority to authorise the Parish Council applications to SODC and WREN as agreed.

The Parish Council agreed to fund 10.75% (£10,750) as a third-party donor (required for the WREN application), and will pay for future inspections, insurance and maintenance of the playground. The Council will also pay for signs at the car park directing drivers to other parking areas if the recreation ground car park is full and requesting them not to park on the road. There will be improved pedestrian access with signs between SODC's splash play area and the new playground, and access to toilets and baby changing facilities in the pavilion.

Cllr Rowley had drawn up a provisional project programme. We will apply to SODC for a grant by 26th April and then apply to WREN by 13th June. SODC will announce their decision by 30th June giving time to then amend the WREN application financial model. The decision by WREN is due by 5th September. If successful, installation could start by December and the new facilities could be open by Easter next year.

Traffic and transport

Cllr Jones will attend a Parish Transport Representatives' meeting in February. Cllr Hall had asked the police for information on the traffic at Portway.

Reports from outside bodies







