

### A Crowmarsh play area Odyssey

I took over from John Bellamy as chair of the environment and recreation committee of the Parish Council in 2012. Our committee focused on getting the pavilion shipshape and reducing its running costs. We added solar panels, more insulation, an efficient boiler, low energy lighting, new carpets and chairs. Then Stuart Soames asked, 'have you noticed our dilapidated play area and how much we are paying to maintain it?' On a wet lunchtime in March 2017 I went to review our maligned play area. Two things hit me: firstly, the wood was disintegrating and, secondly, I was the chair of the recreation committee!

I knew the Parish Council did not have enough funds to purchase a first class play area. However, there were grants that could be applied for, so this was not a hopeless situation. It was clear we needed a demonstration of community support. With the help of our local shop, the school (thanks Mrs Barton) and the Crowmarsh website (thanks Fleur) we soon received a handsome response of enthusiasm for a new play area (and outdoor gym) from young and old residents. I pulled all this information into a series of graphs. At this point my efforts became supercharged thanks to the energy and determination of fellow councillor David Rowley and Michelle Reynolds (a school parent) and further support from the school and the Crowmarsh community café. David encouraged us to think big because applying for a large amount of money was usually no more onerous than applying for a

small amount! We were wowed by the design from Ebie using ideas from David's research, and this entailed a planning application which David successfully saw through with his ingenious flood alleviation plan. David had been impressed by the Abingdon play area done by Ebie but thought of many ways we could do even better!

In January 2018 David and I started the online application for our grant money. I would arrive at work an hour early every day to focus on the application. Our major applications to SODC and the WREN (Landfill tax fund) came to over 200 pages each, including a minimum of 40 separate attachments. These included everything from our constitution, to bank statements, site safety reports to management structure, community support analysis to detailed publicity plans! Together with Parish Council funds, a grant from Fields in Trust/ Active spaces and donations from local people and businesses we knew it was possible to reach our target of just over £200k. David presented our proposal to the SODC grant committee and we expected to get 75% of the grants we asked for. However, we were delighted to learn we had succeeded in getting 100%. We were complemented on the diversity of the vision, going from tunnels for toddlers to outdoor gym for older residents. But if I had thought that I could now sit back and enjoy the construction I was shortly to be disabused of that notion! More documents were needed, and the Parish Council would be paid in arrears based on satisfactory reports, photographs, invoices and publicity activities. Nevertheless, Ebie started in January 2019 and their work

was managed by Michelle O'Donnell of Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association and assisted by Chris Strange our Caretaker and David. Although the Parish Council was swiftly running out of money it was exciting to see the construction happening. I loved seeing children pressing their faces against our security fences as the play area took shape!

Finally, the great day of the opening arrived, and we could breathe a temporary sigh of relief. The problems of parking and toilets for a popular play area became part of our 'rewards for success'. However, the true reward for everyone involved in the project remains the happy sounds that emanate from the play area daily, together with the contented faces of parents. If I feel a bit down from a heavy day at work, I cycle home via the path alongside the play area and invariably arrive home with a smile on my face!







Wallingford Museum re-opens on 3rd March with two new special exhibitions, and many family-friendly events.

'Plague, Pus and Pills' is our main exhibition. It traces the history of Wallingford's hospitals from medieval times to the present day. Its portrayal of the challenges of dealing with leprosy, smallpox, as well as more common illness, brings the past vividly to light. Don't be squeamish – come and explore our fascinating exhibition and find out just how lucky we are to live in the 21st century!

Our second exhibition of 'Willis family of Wallingford - artists and artisans' brings to life the work of a local family. The Willis family came to Wallingford from Hagbourne in the early 19th century living and working in what is now The Dolphin public house. An industrious Quaker family, all of their six sons had artisan or professional careers. This exhibition spotlights the careers of George an artist, and William whose main business was engraving and inventing ways to fix early photographs.

Our first family-friendly event will be 'Can You Face It' during the school Easter holidays. Create your own facial reconstruction at one of our workshops being held on 7th, 9th, 14th and 16th April. ### TWHAS Talk



Tim Allen's (Oxford Archaeology) topic will be 'New light on Wallingford's southern suburb: excavations at the former Police Station, Reading Road'. Excavations in advance of redevelopment have revealed a settlement of the late Saxon and Norman periods outside the south gate of the defended burh. Pit clusters and ditches suggest a series of plots alongside the road leading out of the burh, and several half-cellared buildings were found, two of which were particularly well-preserved. Finds indicate domestic settlement, and that the inhabitants were involved in several cottage industries, the most important being textile processing. The evidence will be discussed to see what it adds to the recently published 'Burh to Borough' project, and in the context of excavations of similar sites at Oxford and Winchester.

Oxford Archaeology's Tim Allen is well known to TWHAS and we were delighted that he was the archaeologist for this site.

This talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) will be held on Wednesday 11th March, 7.45 for 8pm, at St Mary's Church, Wallingford.

#### **Past Times**

During the week beginning the 1st of September 1798 a subscription was started in Wallingford to raise funds for the widows and children of sailors killed in the Battle of the Nile, one of Nelson's greatest victories. The battle between the French and British fleets over trade routes, was fought just one month earlier in Abu Qir bay in the Mediterranean near Alexandria in Egypt.

The sum raised was £61-8s-6d, of which a third was raised by the inhabitants of Crowmarsh. The money was sent to Lloyd's Coffee House in London, by John Hedges, the Town Clerk of Wallingford.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the people who sent me Get Well Cards and their best wishes for a speedy recovery. You don't know what a difference those wishes made - thank you all very much.

### Wallingford U3A

Jack Telling, our February speaker, enthusiastically reminded us that for a hundred years canals provided the fastest and most efficient form of transport, for people and freight, in the UK. Canals brought coal to static steam engines in mines and mills, powering the Industrial Revolution. But the railways killed the canals, and one by one canals were abandoned and left to rot. By the mid 20th Century rural canals had become marshy havens and urban canals septic dumping grounds for refuse and dead cats.

In the 1970s, people began to consider what canals might offer for leisure, education and the environment. Jack became enthralled by the possibilities, and he held us spellbound with the story of his family's involvement in the on-going restoration of the Thames and Severn canal. This wonderful canal was opened in 1779 linking the two Rivers to the 2,500 miles of waterways in the Midlands and the North. It was abandoned to dereliction in 1954.

Twenty years later a great restoration project began. Jack became treasurer and explained the costs were, and still are, staggering. Volunteers have raised millions of pounds for the project. Volunteer skilled tradesmen have taught volunteers hosts of skills. The Prince of Wales and Princess Anne have supported the project.

From the West the reconstruction has reached Lechlade. Jack hopes to see it completed, a year ahead of schedule, in 2039, the year he will be 100! Thanks, Jack, and good luck.

March brings us Springtime and daffodils, reminding us to celebrate St David's Day on the 1st of the month at our Family Service. which will feature some great Welsh hymns! We also use daffodils in our Mothering Sunday posies.

Traditionally, Mothering Sunday (22nd March) was a special occasion because workers were allowed time off to return to the place of their upbringing - their mother church, where they were baptised and to the community which raised them. Remember the African proverb: "It takes a village to raise a child". This is true also for us in Crowmarsh, with our Pre-School, Primary School, Cubs, Scouts, and Football Club leading the way. Thus, the church celebration is of mothering in its widest sense rather than the more American style "Mother's Day", so hopefully we will make enough for everyone to receive a lovingly made posy.

One of the earliest talks that I remember in church was from a scientist who was also a Christian and saw no conflict between his work and his faith. As his illustration he used a simple daffodil and explained that the daffodil

stem is of great interest to scientists and engineers because of its ability to survive strong winds. Its special structure: the twisted, helical shape and an elliptical cross section, has been found to reduce drag and eliminate side-force fluctuations which have brought disaster to man-made constructions such as chimneys and bridges. The daffodil's "vortexshedding" ability has inspired sports aerodynamicists too, influencing designs of golf club shafts and motor-racing suspension struts.

I hope such things will be of interest to dads, children and mums at our "Posy Party" on Saturday 21st March from 2.30pm in church, where we will prepare bunches of flowers for all the mother figures in our lives, so please join us, and bring some flowers or greenery.

#### Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 6th February 2020

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Stuart Soames, David Rowley, Ken McCrea, Liz Ryall, Andrew Johnson, Fleur Stevenson, Sue Rance (Clerk), Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer). SODC Cllr Andrea Powell, OCC Cllr Mark Gray and one member of the public for part of the meeting.

Apologies were received from Jon Grove, Gaynor Hopkins, Julian Park and David Topliss.

#### **Finance**

Payments approved included £1098 for grass cutting and landscape management at Newnham Murren churchyard in 2019.

Payments in January came to £2292; receipts including VAT were £2762. County Cllr Gray was thanked for his grant of £1000 towards the new speed indication device.

We agreed to continue with the current grass

cutting contractor, who had done a good job and will maintain the price, but it was noted that the play area at Robert Sparrow Gardens was not cut at all last year. The charges for cutting the North Stoke recreation ground will be reduced this year.

A grant request from Citizens Advice Bureau will be discussed at the next meeting. CAB reported that 49 Crowmarsh Gifford residents had received advice in 2018/19 at a cost of £1764.

We discussed detailed proposals from the Environment and Recreation Committee and the council authorised spending up to £10,000 to have plans drawn for new accessible toilets and other improvements to the pavilion, retaining two full changing rooms and reorganised changing facilities for match officials. The plans would include:

 Dividing changing room 3 to create two new toilets with external access (one for disabled and baby change) and extending the external ramp landing.

- Converting changing room 4 into a meeting room.
- Extending the kitchen into part of changing room 1 and moving the existing showers into the adjoining storeroom.
- Replacing internal doors to meet disability access requirements.

#### **County Councillor's report**

The County Council budget will be agreed in the next week. An extra £30 million is planned for social services, plus more money for schools from new housing developments and £30 million for roads in the coming year, with more for road safety over the next ten years. The Council Tax for the County Council will increase by 3% this year, following government permission to add 1% for social services over the cap of 2%.

Cllr Gray will follow up the lack of action by the County Council officers on parking restrictions at Stephens Field and the Riverside Park access. He will contact Oxfordshire Highways about lane markings at the Mongewell roundabout. He reported that Jewson's delivery drivers are expected to park at the layby near Fairmile in Cholsey if they are ahead of their appointed delivery time.

#### **District Councillors' report**

The District Councillors' report included the unresolved situation on the Local Plan, the proposed council budget, an exhibition of designs for a new council headquarters building in Crowmarsh, action on fly-tipping and anti-idling, and reduced funding for neighbourhood planning groups.

P19/S4673/FUL New lodge house adjacent to plot 5 Mongewell Park Mongewell OX10 8DA. RECOMMEND REFUSAL – too large a house on a cramped plot, projecting forward of the historic wall, with inadequate space for parking on site.

P20/S0267/FUL 'The Sycamores' - Land east of 206 Crowmarsh Hill Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BG Erection of five dwellings and associated works. NO OBJECTION to the 5 energy-efficient houses, but concerned about damage to trees already inflicted. Cllr Ken McCrea declared an interest and took no part in the decision.

P20/S0296/RM Benson Lane Wallingford OX10 8ED

Reserved matters application for the erection of 150 dwellings pursuant to outline permission P18/S0827/O. [Duplicate application] Concern about poor integration with the village, traffic generation on Benson Lane and potential for flooding offsite (repeat of response to P18/S4138/RM).

P16/S3852/FUL Land south of Newnham Manor, Crowmarsh Gifford. Erection of 100 new residential dwellings including new access road off the A4074, public open space (full application) and provision of school land (outline). Amendments on 26th November, 18th December & 14th January. SUPPORT (by a majority vote): This is a well-designed housing scheme on a site that fits neatly within the village. Part of this site (the previously-developed land) was the favoured site for

housing in successive public exhibitions and surveys. Although partly in the AONB, this now has the support of the Chilterns Conservation Board. Traffic access is directly onto the main road network, rather than via village roads. The development provides a safe pedestrian and cycle Toucan crossing of the A4074 road that divides the village, reducing current car journeys to take children to school. Land will be given to the primary school for off-site parking and outdoor facilities, improving safety on Old Reading Road. Developer contributions should be sought towards construction of these facilities. This application will be resubmitted to SODC's planning committee in the coming months and the parish council and residents will have the opportunity to speak.

#### Neighbourhood plan

The Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) Scoping Report is now approved for publication on the web and the SEA assessing and reporting stages (scoping, reporting, drafting the plan) are clearer. The SEA Draft Report for Consultation can go live soon and we hope to go out to consultation in March after the documentation has been signed off by SODC and published on the parish website, although we still await comments from SODC, promised before Christmas, on the actual neighbourhood plan. Local exhibitions should be advertised for early April: the consultants O'Neill Homer have already prepared exhibition material for us.

#### Other planning matters

The following names were submitted for streets on the Benson Lane development (from 23 suggestions): French Gardens (reflecting the former French gardens across the road, where the council offices were built), Giffard (historical landowner), Willis (recent head of Wallingford School), Cromwell (whose soldiers were stationed here during the Civil War), Rush (one of the names on the village war memorial), McCulloch (founding director of the Institute of Hydrology), Little Hitchen (old field name) and Marshfield (field adjoining Marsh Lane).

#### Strategic priorities

A local resident expressed concern about the delay in providing a crossing at the A4074 Portway. The Parish Council have previously had drawings and some costings done and it remains our highest priority, but are awaiting a decision on the proposed Newnham Manor housing development which includes a Toucan crossing funded by the development. If the development does not go ahead, the council will look into other possible sources of funding with help from our County Councillor.

Cllr Soames felt that erecting white gates alongside the B4009 at North Stoke would not slow the traffic and that some form of physical feature such as a chicane would be necessary. Consideration will be given to providing speed indication devices (SIDs) and Cllr Ryall will investigate traffic calming installed at South Stoke.

# **Environment and recreation ground committee**

The committee met on 20th January. Proposals for toilets and improvements to the pavilion are reported under finance above. Funding is anticipated from SODC for tree planting: ideas for locations and types of new trees are welcome. Discussions will be held with the Wallingford Wildlife Group and Earth Trust.

#### **Traffic and transport**

On 13th January a minibus had reversed into and destroyed a memorial bench outside the Bell. The Clerk will write to request compensation, estimated at £1000.

#### Other matters

Arrangements are in hand for the future management of Crowmarsh Village Stores when the current lease expires. The council agreed to apply to SODC to register the shop as an asset of community value to protect it in the long term.

#### **Next meeting**

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 5th March, at 7.30pm. All welcome.


