Music at St Peter's - May 2015


Music at St Peter's celebrates its 30th season this year – 30 years of bringing first-class classical chamber music to St Peter's Church, Wallingford, with its splendid acoustics for this kind of music.

To get the season off to a good start, the first concert on Saturday 16th May is an all-Mozart programme given by DeNote, a periodinstrument ensemble consisting of clarinet, violin, cello, viola and fortepiano – the kind of instrument Mozart himself would have played. They perform a trio for clarinet, viola and piano, a violin sonata, and the Gran Partita – featured in the film *Amadeus*. Then on Saturday 30th May the internationally renowned tenor, John Mark Ainsley, will be giving a recital of songs by Purcell, Schubert, Fauré and a group of British composers.

Conservative Fete at Howbery Park, 1908

On Wednesday 5th May 1908, Mr Harvey du Cros allowed the Conservatives of North Berks and South Oxon to hold a fete in the grounds of Howbery Park. The day started showery during the morning, but for the whole afternoon the sky was a true blue; some Tories may say that this was a sign that they had the support of the Almighty.

The Reading Borough Prize Band provided an excellent programme of music. The attendance numbered some several hundred; there were very few local party members, and most came from some distance from Wallingford. Most of the leading local Conservatives put in an appearance, if only for a short time.

There were performances from a Pierrot troupe, pastoral plays, steam roundabouts, swing boats, and a good tea for 6d (2½p) per head, plus a tug-of-war between South Berks and North Oxon Conservatives. The tug-of-war was easily won by the North Berks team, as they consisted of sturdy men from Wallingford Brewery. As these men were unable to vote, their loyalty to the Liberal and Tory parties was

not challenged.

Two political plays were performed, called "The Suffragette" and "What Free Trade did for Bill", and caused considerable unbiased amusement. This was followed by what was called a "Mass Meeting" when Mr Arkwight, MP Valentian Fleming and Major Henderson (who by the time of the General Election of 1910 had become a Liberal) addressed the meeting on The Unionist adhering to the Policy of the Tariff Reform.

The Mayor of Wallingford proposed a vote of thanks to the Speakers for their addresses, and Mr H W Wells proposed a vote of thanks to Mr du Cros for the use of his Park.

This was followed by another tug-of-war competition which once again was won by North Berks with their team of burly brewery men. And as the shadows began to lengthen with the sun setting behind the keep in the Castle Grounds, the ladies were admitted and dancing was held well into the night on the main lawn.

Science Exchange Wallingford What is so special about groundwater?

Groundwater is a vital source of fresh water in the UK. On average, it supplies almost onethird of public water, but in some areas, including south-east England, groundwater makes up nearly 90% of public supply.

The British Geological Survey (BGS) undertakes research on environmental issues related to groundwater. This includes security of supply, in terms of quantity and quality, through to the effects of pollution, flooding and, more recently, shale gas extraction.

But what is groundwater, where can it be found, and why should YOU care?

Come and find out at the Science Exchange Wallingford talk on Wednesday 20th May. It will be given by Katya Manamsa, a hydrogeologist with BGS, who previously worked for the Environment Agency. Her

current job involves research into the types of compounds found in groundwater, groundwater flooding and the national methane baseline.

Charity abseilers to scale 100ft tower of Dorchester Abbey

Ten intrepid charity supporters will be abseiling down the 100ft tower at Dorchester Abbey as part of the village's 10-day festival. The abseilers will scale the tower at 12 noon on Saturday 2nd May – the second day of the biennial Dorchester-on-Thames Festival.

So far they have raised well over £5000 jointly for Dorchester Abbey and family support charity Parents And Children Together (PACT) – but the team is aiming to double this total.

PACT has been building and strengthening families since 1911 through adoption, long-term fostering, award-winning therapeutic services and community projects across London and the south. It hopes to use the funds raised from the festival to provide therapeutic support services to Oxfordshire families to help adopted and fostered children to address painful issues from their past.

Among the abseilers are PACT chief executive Jan Fishwick; Rector of Dorchester Abbey and PACT Trustee Sue Booys; Leader of SODC John Cotton; and PACT adopter Julie Bignone. Jan Fishwick said: "Abseiling down the Dorchester Abbey Tower is one of the most challenging things I have ever had to do but I am prepared to do it because I am passionate about the work PACT does." Julie Bignone said: "In 2011 we were incredibly lucky to bring our amazing little girl home to our family and all of this was made possible thanks to the wonderful social workers and adoption support team in PACT."

Also taking part in the abseil are former High Sherriff Richard Dick, parish councilor Sue Graney, Dorchester Abbey organist Jeremy Boughton, Oli Goodwin, Violet Allmark and Tabitha Atkinson-Seed

Festival Director Steph Forman said: "It is great that so many people are giving their time to make this year's Festival programme and fundraising the best yet!"

More than 3,000 people are expected to

attend Dorchester Festival and enjoy almost 50 events including The Tallis Scholars, a Come and Sing with John Rutter, OSCAR winner Ben Morris, a Food Fair with cookery demonstrations and a wide variety of children's entertainment.

Make tracks for Wallingford's first model railway show

Wallingford will host its first ever model railway exhibition on Sunday 21st June. The event is being held at St John's School, Wallingford.

More than 15 model railway layouts, along with a number of trade stands, will be on show in a variety of scales from tiny Z gauge to garden-sized G scale. The exhibition is being well supported by clubs and modellers from around Oxfordshire, Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Hampshire, and many of the layouts are new to the exhibition circuit.

Of particular interest is Kuritu Line, a two dimension layout of both rural and urban Japanese scenes. There will also be a selection of layouts: Plas Halt, Dawes Creek and Halland. You will see Oxfordshire based layouts in the Abingdon Branch Line and Witney Euston and Dowdan International, an airport layout; and for the American modeller, Southern Renegades.

St John's Primary School is located at Paddock Road, Wallingford, there is free parking onsite at the school. Just down the road is Wallingford station, which is running Father's Day steam specials on the day between Cholsey and Wallingford.

The exhibition will be open from 10am to 4.30pm. Admission is £4 for adults, £1.50 for children and families £10 (2+2).

Wallingford U3A Saxon and Medieval Wallingford

Our ever welcome and distinguished local historian, Judy Dewey, spoke on Saxon and Medieval Wallingford at our April meeting. She gave us a wealth of fascinating details, some of which are the results of very recent archaeological research.

Wallingford was a busy Saxon settlement even before Alfred the Great. Evidence has been unearthed of houses dating from the 5th century, and of a large cemetery from the same period. Alfred included Wallingford in his great line of fortifications against the Vikings. Some remains of this wall still run alongside Croft Road. And the straight town roads we now drive on were laid out by our Saxon forbears.

The Vikings were here in 1006, and in 1066 William the Conqueror is known to have been here for policy decisions before going on to London to take formal possession of his kingdom. The Norman Castle built to secure Wallingford was on a par with the Tower of London and Windsor, and was one of the three great Royal Castles on the Thames. Although Wallingford Castle was demolished, as with Alfred's Wall, there are still some remains for us to see.

There were dozens of churches and chapels and a small Priory from Saxon times onward. Shoppers at Waitrose's delicatessen are standing above where people once prayed in St Martin's Church. The Church is long gone but the street name remains. Do Sunday shoppers ever hear a muffled bell?

Wallingford seems to have been a thriving township until the 13th century when, oddly, it contracted, reviving from the 17th century. One possible explanation is that the bridge was built at Abingdon. A road then connected this with the bridge at Henley, by-passing the loop in the river where weirs and mills slowed down commercial traffic. So Wallingford lost out.

But what we do have, Judy told us, is documentation: tax rolls, company records,

property transactions all dating from the late 13th century. These are unique in their scope and condition and are only now being researched extensively. Among the trades mentioned are "bridgemen" who were hired to repel "foreigners" from Crowmarsh. As historians work on this treasure trove, Judy suggested text books may have to be revised to recognise Wallingford's importance. She reminded us that the town Museum is packed with recently discovered information.

After her talk there were so many eager questions that the Chairman had to be very firm in case we ran out of time for tea.





Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 9th April 2015

Present: Councillors Nigel Hannigan (Chair), Francesca Jones, Andrew Johnson, Stephen Sherbourne and Stuart Soames, and Melanie Malcolm (Finance Officer, acting Clerk)

Apologies: from Councillors Faye Cheeseman, John Griffin and Fleur Stevenson, and from Sue Rance (Parish Clerk).

Matters arising from minutes of previous meeting

The council's revised publications scheme had been posted by the Clerk on noticeboards and the website. Cllr Sherbourne reported that the water leak on the allotments had been fixed.

Finance

Payments made in March were agreed. The main grass-cutting contract for the 2015-16 financial year had been awarded to Scofell, including North Stoke Recreation Ground. The contract for cutting Newnham Murren Churchyard was awarded to Tom Cottrell.

Cllr Hannigan would be the Crowmarsh village contact for Scofell. Cllr Soames would be the contact for North Stoke. Cllr Johnson would be meeting with Scofell regarding work needed on the Nature Reserve.

Subscriptions for annual membership of the Oxfordshire Rural Communities Council and Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils were agreed. The fixed price contract with British Gas will be renewed for one year.

Planning

SODC decision:

P15/S0059/HH (Householder): Three-storey rear extension with third storey in roof space. 10 Jethro Tull Gardens, Crowmarsh Gifford,

OX10 8DS: PERMISSION GRANTED.

Parish Council responses to SODC were agreed as follows:

P15/S0625/FUL (Full Application): Erection of two 2-bedroom semi-detached dwellings with associated parking adjacent to The Old Coach House, The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8EJ:

RECOMMEND REFUSAL for the following reason: the erection of two 2-bedroom semi-detached dwellings is over-development of this site and has the possibility to cause problems for the adjacent properties which share the access road.

P15/S0704/HH: Demolition of garage and erection of a double garage with home office over. 1 Park View, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8BJ:

NO STRONG VIEWS.

P15/S0868/LB (Listed Building Consent): Removal of modern paint and cement-based renders from the interior and exterior of the building and replacement with breathable limebased materials. Kimberley Cottage, The Street, North Stoke, OX10 6BL: RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

Appeal decision:

Lister Wilder Ltd appealed against a decision by South Oxfordshire District Council to refuse to remove condition 2: that the development at Old Reading Road, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8EW should be carried out in accordance with details shown on approved plan 364-PL02A, soft and hard landscaping. Appeal Ref: APP/Q3115/A/14/2218449, SODC Ref: P11/W1965.

THE APPEAL WAS DISMISSED.

Environment and Recreation Ground Committee

The next meeting would be held in May. The

committee was looking for a new contractor to work with on the Nature Reserve and Cllr Johnson would meet with Scofell. He reported that there seemed to be a lot of rubbish alongside roads in the parish, particularly on Clacks Lane. Councillors discussed the possibility of having a "litter pick".

Cllr Jones advised that a car and caravan have been parked on the A4074 opposite the turning to Mongewell. Should the vehicles still be there at the next meeting, the matter would be raised with OCC Highways.

District Councillor's report

District Councillor Crabbe submitted a written report. She will not be standing for re-election.

Riverside access from Stephens Place

Monson (SODC's engineering contractors) carried out a flood risk assessment as required and consulted with the Environment Agency. The previous delay was due to a conflict between protecting the trees and protecting floodwater storage.

There is a need to remove some soil from elsewhere in the flood plain in order to compensate for the access ramp into the Riverside Park. The next step is to submit a planning application, which should normally take 8 weeks to determine. If approved, the aim is to carry out the work this summer, before the school holidays begin.

Thames Water

Thames Water have now cleaned the drainage system and work in Winters Field is complete, but the council are still waiting for the reports of the flow survey from Thames Water (due in mid April) which are a precursor to them returning to Crowmarsh to update the residents on the position.

Developments at Mongewell

There was still no news on whether or not the Secretary of State will "call in" the application for the former Carmel College site. CABI had yet to submit a new application, but Councillor Crabbe understood that the number of houses

proposed on their site following consultation has fallen to around 80.

Correspondence

More than 50 people attended the SODC Local Plan 2031 consultation in Crowmarsh Gifford pavilion on 14th March. SODC are collating the responses and feedback from all consultations prior to posting on their website and announcing the next stage of the consultation process.

Wallingford is to produce a Neighbourhood Plan. Wallingford Town Council are consulting on the area to be covered by the plan, which follows the new parish boundary of Wallingford.

Councillors have been invited to Thames Chiltern District Scouts' St George's Day Parade and Service at Dorchester Abbey on Sunday 26th April – the Chairman hoped to attend.

A commemoration of the 70th anniversary of VE Day is to be held on 8th May, involving nationwide beacon events.

Other business

Cllr Sherbourne asked that the new council should hold a strategic spending review to formulate a spending plan and investment plan.

Cllr Soames raised the problem of North Stoke and Mongewell residences not connected to mains sewerage, and whether this might change as a result of the proposed development at Mongewell. Cllr Hannigan suggested this should be added to the agenda for discussion at the next meeting.

Cllr Soames reported problems with school transport for North Stoke children. Although North Stoke falls into the Langtree School catchment area, OCC would not pay for transport to Langtree as Wallingford School is nearer. Cllr Jones suggested Cllr Soames contact Alan Field, OCC Bus Service Manager, and try to attend the next Transport and Travel representatives meeting on 20th May, where School Transport will be covered, as she could not attend.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 14th May, starting at 7.30pm. The Annual Parish Meeting will be on Tuesday 19th May, starting at 7.30pm, at the school.


