



People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) is calling on all wildlife enthusiasts to help monitor signs of the UK's disappearing water voles this Spring as part of its annual National Water Vole Monitoring Programme.

Affectionately portrayed as Ratty in childhood favourite book The Wind in the Willows, water voles were once a common sight along our riverbanks and waterways. However, over the last century they have experienced the most severe decline of any wild mammal in the UK as they face threats from invasive American mink, habitat loss, agricultural intensification and river pollution.

In response to this dramatic decline, PTES launched the National Water Vole Monitoring Programme (NWVMP) in 2015, appealing to members of the public to help look for signs and sightings of water voles. The annual survey started on 15 April 2018 and runs until 15 June.

Emily Thomas, Key Species Monitoring and Data Officer at PTES explains: "Volunteers are crucial to helping us collect robust data about the state of our water voles across the UK. We use the data gathered to monitor population trends year on year, which in turn help guide our conservation efforts and inform us where action is needed most."

Over 200 volunteers have taken part in the NWVMP since 2015, and last year volunteers collected data from 222 sites across England, Scotland and Wales, of which 82 had water vole signs present (48% of sites surveyed).

Volunteers are asked to survey one of the nearly 900 pre-selected sites across the UK, recording all sightings and signs of water voles along a 500m length of riverbank once during the two-month period. No prior experience is required, but volunteers will need to learn how to identify water vole field signs. Clear instructions on how to do your survey and a field signs ID guide, will be provided.

Past Times:

A workhouse money hoarder

Wallingford's Workhouse has had many characters within its walls over the years, like Jimmy White, who was found sleeping under Wallingford Bridge with his wife and four children. Even though his wife and children left the Workhouse, Jimmy never did.

Another character was Shadrack Savage, born in January 1851 in Dorchester. His parents were Mary and Robert Savage: Robert worked as a general labourer in Dorchester. In June 1853 Shadrack's sister, Mary Emma, was born, but in 1856 tragedy struck: in April his mother died soon followed by his father in June. As no-one could be found to care for Shadrack and Mary they were admitted to Wallingford's Workhouse. In 1856 Shadrack's sister, Mary, also died.

Shadrack was to spend the rest of his life in the Workhouse: at the time of his death, in December 1901, he had been an inmate for 45 years. As an adult he worked as a messenger, running errands into Wallingford.

He was very careful with any money he earned: the money given to him would only be farthings, halfpennies or pennies. All this money he kept in the lining of one trouser leg, and over the years this accumulation began to weigh a considerable amount, causing him to lean to one side and walk with a limp.

The reason for his limp was only discovered when, in 1898, he was taken ill and his trousers were removed by the Workhouse nurse. Their considerable weight caused the trousers to be examined and the money was discovered. The money weighed some 14lbs (nearly 7kilos).

There is no record of what happened to the money, but it was noticed that Shadrack later walked without a limp and upright.

In his last few years he suffered with poor health and died of tuberculosis on 30th December 1901 aged 50, having moved into the Workhouse when he was just five.

Oxford to Cambridge growth corridor and expressway – How can we get our voices heard?

The Campaign to Protect Rural England (CPRE) is asking for public consultation on the Oxford to Cambridge Growth Corridor.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer has backed the National Infrastructure Commission's concept of an Oxford to Cambridge 'Growth Corridor' of a million new houses, of which 300,000 would be in Oxfordshire.

That would be equivalent to six new cities the size of Oxford, or to put it another way would more than double our present housing stock and population by 2050.

Part of the scheme is a new Expressway road from Oxford to Cambridge to "facilitate" the development.

At the moment this transformative change is being proposed without any public consultation. CPRE Oxfordshire is demanding a full statutory public consultation followed by a Public Inquiry, at which the clear environmental and social costs of the Growth Corridor can be weighed against the potential economic benefits envisaged. This would also mean the need for and routing of any Oxfordshire Expressway would at least be decided in an open and transparent manner.

CPRE Oxfordshire is asking local residents to join its call for a Public Inquiry by contacting local councillors, MPs and the Secretary of State for Transport.

District Council by-election



Wallingford U3A

At our April meeting the inimitable Ken Fitt sang, played and talked us through the life and music of Nat King Cole. As ever it was a tour de force. Nathaniel Cole was born in Mississippi in 1919, one of 13 children of whom 5 survived to adult life. When he was four the family moved to Chicago to escape the crippling racial suppression of the Deep South.

Musically gifted, at ten he was playing for the hymns at his father's church. He was entranced by jazz. At eighteen he founded his own trio of bass, piano and guitar. He had also married Nadine. He began writing his own songs, and it was while he was giving a performance of "Sweet Lorraine" that a friend 'crowned' him with a paper crown and he became 'Nat King Cole'.

He was noticed early and was engaged by Capital Records. But by 1946 he had met Maria Ellington, for whom he left Nadine. She became the major influence in his life. All he had really wanted was to be a jazz pianist, but, fiercely ambitious, she insisted that he become a singer. Maybe she was prescient. Maybe we should be grateful. Nat earned huge amounts of money but paying steep alimony to Nadine and getting into a mess with the tax authorities meant that life was not always easy. He toured abroad and mixed with the rich and famous, but Maria controlled his life and lifestyle. She became a millionairess. Nat King Cole died in 1965 aged 44. His songs do not fade: "Nature Boy", "Mona Lisa", "Walking My Baby Back Home", "When I fall in Love", "Rambling Rose", the list goes on, "Unforgettable". Unforgettable! Thanks, Ken.

Our meetings are held on the first Wednesday of each month at 2pm at Crowmarsh Village Hall. Visitors are always welcome for the talk, tea and a chat afterwards. Our next meeting is on Wednesday 2nd May when Christopher Baines will speak on "Paul Nash and the Wittenham Clumps".

Science Exchange Wallingford

Carl Champness (of Oxford Archaeology) will talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) on Wednesday 9th May, 7.45 for 8pm, at St Mary's Church, Wallingford about the 'Excavations of a multi-period site with

Prehistoric and Early Saxon settlement in Winterbrook, Wallingford'.

The talk will discuss the preliminary results and finds from excavations undertaken over summer 2017 at Winterbrook, Wallingford. The work was undertaken as part of a proposed 2ha housing development that produced a series of settlement enclosures, round houses and burial remains.

An unexpected discovery of ten burials was also made during the excavation, along the length of a boundary ditch, which shared a similar alignment to a Bronze Age / early Iron Age enclosure.

Some of the burials were poorly preserved, but the better preserved ones indicated an unusual range of burial positions including crouched, prone and on their sides. The lack of grave goods, the location, the nature and position of the burials, may indicate deviant or execution burials.

The settlement appears to form part of a much larger prehistoric settlement that continued to the west for some distance and headed towards Slade End Farm. Iron Age activity was previously considered sparse within Wallingford, until the results of this and the nearby excavation at Slade End Farm become more widely known.

Carl Champness joined Oxford Archaeology in 2004. He has worked on many large infrastructure projects, including High Speed 1, Framework Archaeology, M25, Crossrail and Thameslink. Carl has also been lead geoarchaeologist for several nationally important early prehistoric wetland sites in London, Carlisle and East Sussex, and he actively promotes archaeological outreach through public talks, articles and open days.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 29th March

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Francesca Jones, Andrew Johnson, Elizabeth Ryall, Nigel Hannigan, David Rowley, Denise Hall, Stuart Soames and Stephen Sherbourne, plus Sue Rance (Clerk) and Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer).

County Councillor Mark Gray attended some of the meeting.

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors David Mannering, Fleur Stevenson and David Topliss.

Matters arising from the 1st March meeting

Cllr Soames has discussed the culvert at North Stoke with County Councillor Gray and will arrange to meet with him.

Information has now been received about the new General Data Protection Regulation and will be circulated to councillors before the next meeting.

The Chairman has written to the District Council about possible community facilities that could be provided when the SODC offices on Benson Lane are rebuilt.

Finance

A schedule of payments was presented and agreed, including subscriptions of £70 to Community First Oxfordshire and £42 to Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association.

Invoices for allotment rents will be sent out soon: the annual rent for a full-size plot for the coming year will be £15, as agreed in 2017.

The Finance Officer will try to find out why the £10,000 grant from SODC for our Neighbourhood Plan has still not been paid.

It was agreed to allocate £19,250 from the council's funds for the playground project in addition to the £10,750 fee required to support

the WREN grant, if awarded. An application will be made to SODC for 50% of the cost of the project: the closing date is 26th April. Cllrs Johnson and Rowley and Mrs Michelle Reynolds had attended a Capital Grants Workshop on 8th March.

Planning

Decisions: The Council noted two decisions by SODC:

P18/S0406/LDP (Lawful Development): Formation of habitable room in roof space with side and rear dormers. 78 The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8ER: PERMISSION GRANTED.

P18/S0526/D: Demolition of fire damaged office building. South Oxfordshire District Council, Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8AX: PERMISSION GRANTED.

Applications: The Council agreed its response to SODC on the following applications:

P18/0827O (Outline): Outline planning application for up to 150 dwellings together with associated access, public open space, landscaping and amenity areas. Land to the east of Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8ED. RECOMMEND REFUSAL.

Application withdrawn

P18/S0179/FUL: Demolish existing barn and erect three new terraced dwellings with parking. The New Barn, Mongewell Park Farm, Wallingford Road, Mongewell (in the parish of Crowmarsh), OX10 8BS. This application has been withdrawn by the applicants and no further action will be taken on it.

Appeal under Section 78 of the Town and Country Planning Act, ref: APP/Q3115/W/17/3186858

P16/S3608/O (Outline): Outline planning application for up to 150 dwellings together with associated access, public open space, landscaping and amenity areas. Land to the

east of Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8ED. Cllr Hannigan gave a brief account of the proceedings of the public inquiry which had taken place over the last three days at Howbery Park: a vote of thanks was made to him for all his work on the appeal.

Neighbourhood Plan

Two events have been held to update the public on the Neighbourhood Plan. The first at Crowmarsh Gifford School on 13th March was well attended and Rona Knott, our SODC Liaison Officer, was also there. A smaller event was held in North Stoke on 15th March. All policies and documentation are now available on the website, www.crowmarshgifford.org.uk. Contact Nick Robins: nicks.robins@gmail.com.

County Councillor's report

County Councillor Gray had attended the planning appeal inquiry for the site on Benson Lane but had not been permitted to speak. He will make a written submission to the inspector about the housing land supply following the recent Growth Deal agreed by all the Oxfordshire councils. The first infrastructure projects to receive funding under this Growth Deal will include new roads at Didcot but no other funding in the south of the county.

The emerging SODC local plan has been suspended and John Cotton has resigned as leader of the District Council.

Councillor Gray has booked an automatic traffic speed survey to be sited near the entrance to Newnham Manor in The Street and another on Benson Lane opposite the Village Hall.

One of the telephone cabinets in Crowmarsh Gifford has been upgraded to superfast broadband.

Secondary school places have now been allocated and 90% of applicants have been given their first choice.

Environment & recreation ground committee

An electrical check is to be carried out on the wiring at the pavilion. A contractor has been found to replace the damaged wall at the pavilion. Two quotes have been received to supply and fit a smart lock at the pavilion to

allow controlled access to the toilets for recreation ground users. It was agreed to accept the lower quote of £1010.

Update on playground project

Cllr Rowley reported on the exhibitions held at the school for over six weeks and at the Community Café on Saturday 10th March. Letters and messages of support have been received from 140 children and 30 adults.

Advice has been taken on suitable gym equipment and quotes are now being obtained. Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association has provided excellent feedback which will help in the grant submissions. Cllr Johnson is working on the Capital Grant application form and has drafted a project management plan. Cllr Hall has asked for donations from local businesses.

Replacement noticeboards

Cllr Hall and Cllr Jones are obtaining estimates to provide and install new noticeboards, including a half-glazed noticeboard at North Stoke Village Hall, and for installation from Arrow Fencing and another contractor.

Traffic and transport committee

Councillor Jones reported that Benson Parish Council will meet on 24th April and discuss Howbery Park's request for a pedestrian crossing and bus shelter on the A4074 near the north end of Benson Lane for employees who use the bus layby. Howbery Park has done a survey of employees who use the bus stop; Cllr Griffin will investigate the level of use at the Centre for Ecology & Hydrology.

Review of strategic priorities

The list of strategic priorities had been recirculated. This had last been updated in January 2017 and needs review in the light of planning decisions and other changes. Cllrs Sherbourne and Ryall will meet to review the top five strategic priorities. Cllr Sherbourne recommended having a professional design drawn up for a pedestrian crossing in The Street in Crowmarsh, which had been costed a few years ago.

Correspondence

Details were received about the Evolvis speed camera (passed to Clir Hall for investigation).

A letter from the Chilterns Conservation Board outlined their 'Beacons of the Past' project to survey hill forts in the Chilterns using LIDAR.

Cllr Soames had met a representative of the Springs Golf Club who were considering new development plans.

Reports from reps on outside bodies

North Stoke Village Hall

Cllr Soames reported that North Stoke Village Hall is not registered with the land registry, which would have to be done by the Parish Council, following a valuation. Community First Oxfordshire might be able to give advice on how the valuation and registration may be carried out.

Agrivert Liaison Group

Cllrs Griffin and Sherbourne attended the annual liaison meeting with Agrivert, who operate the composting and anaerobic digestion plant opposite the north end of Benson Lane. Agrivert are expecting to apply to build two more digesters to add to the existing five and will consult on this if they decide to proceed. Cllr Sherbourne suggested asking Agrivert to sponsor one or more of the new noticeboards.

River Users Group 3 (RUG3)

RUG3 brings together parish councils, the Environment Agency and those with an interest in the River Thames between Sandford and Cleeve locks. The minutes of the recent meeting attended by Cllr Mannering had been circulated. One of the subjects discussed was the proposal for a marina adjoining the Wallingford bypass bridge, which would first require a gravel extraction application.

Date of next meeting

The next meeting will be held on **Thursday 3rd May** at North Stoke Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. At this meeting there will be an election of a Chairman and Vice-Chairman for
