

Neighbourhood Development Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan exhibitions held at Crowmarsh Gifford and North Stoke in September were enthusiastically attended. Great interest was shown in the plan process and the objective of the plan.

151 questionnaires were completed, with 70% in favour of building at the SODC site, 24% at the Newnham Manor site, 3% at Newnham Green and 3% on land east of Benson Lane. The SODC site is no longer an option for housing development now that South Oxford-shire and the Vale District Councils are planning to return there. Redistributing the figures to include second choices, where SODC was put as the first choice, clearly shows a majority preference for the Newnham Manor site. Interestingly, the overall key concern in the parish is traffic levels rather than schooling or access to a GP.

The Steering Group currently comprises
Francesca Jones, John Griffin, Nigel
Hannigan, Simon Millsop, David Topliss, Fleur
Stevenson and Nick Robins. We have recently
met with our SODC case officer, Rona Knott,
who will help guide the process to fruition. The
Steering Group is now focusing on the
Strategic Environmental Assessment, evaluating all the potential housing development sites
that have been identified in and around
Crowmarsh Gifford.

This will underpin our Housing Planning Policy in the Neighbourhood Plan, which will be published in draft form for everybody to add to it, comment on it and make other suggestions so that it will become a community-owned assessment. In the meantime, if you can help the plan process with survey work and other tasks that need to be done, we would welcome you aboard. The planning stages for Newnham Manor and land east of Benson Lane are that the revised Newnham Manor application will go to the Planning Committee in the next couple of weeks, while Bloor/Hallam have lodged an

appeal against the refusal of their application to develop land east of Benson Lane. The date for the Bloor/Hallam appeal hearing has yet to be announced.

SODC is coming home to Crowmarsh

South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse District Councils have announced their decision to return to new offices on their site in Benson Lane. We expect to welcome them back to Crowmarsh Gifford in 2020, which will be five years after the premises were destroyed in an arson attack. Work is due to begin in January 2018, with the demolition of the remaining structure.

Crowmarsh School

What a busy term we have had at Crowmarsh, but we wouldn't have it any other way. As I mentioned last month, we welcomed head-teachers and teachers from South Africa into our school - they enjoyed being a part of our classrooms and taught us a great deal about joy and always demonstrating how thankful they were by suddenly erupting into beautiful song and dance. It was an honour to be able to share teaching strategies and school policy with them and hope that our partnership lasts for a very long time.

Our Ofsted report will be published on the Ofsted website during the first week of November, when we have returned to school or you can find it on our school website. As we mentioned in the letter sent out to parents, "You will see that our overall 'grade' awarded to our school has not changed since our last inspection in November 2012. As is always the case in education, the grade boundaries and expectations have changed somewhat since our last inspection so whilst the grade may be the same, the level it takes to achieve that grade has increased quite significantly.

"We continue to improve and always look to seek how we can develop practice and policy in our school. Our school development plan already had all of the inspector's key next steps built in, so before he had even arrived, we had actioned ways to further strengthen these areas. At Crowmarsh we often do things very differently to other schools; however, this is what sets us apart. Therefore, this Ofsted report is absolute confirmation that what we are doing is the right thing. However, we always seek to improve and develop further and this is what we will continue to do."

The staff at Crowmarsh always put the children at the centre of what they do - they truly ensure that every child is given what they

need to succeed. We have a dynamic team who always go above and beyond - thank you to those who make Crowmarsh the school that it is, governors, parents and of course the children - they are the reason we do what we do.

A huge thank you must also go out to our community - thank you for your support. Thank you as well to all those who give their time to come and help us throughout the year with various events and activities, our children truly benefit from time that is spent with them.

The month of November brings us many visitors and exciting events. The week beginning November 20th is the start of our Grandparents' Week and we welcome you into our school from Tuesday until Friday from 2:00 onwards to see our classrooms in action.

The Peace Celebrations of 1856

In 1856 the country celebrated victory in the Crimea, the peace treaty having been signed in Paris at the end of March. The war with Russia was fought from 1853 to 1856, not only in the Crimea, but also in the Baltic and the Pacific. The British Army fought the war using tactics used in the Napoleonic Wars, but were armed with modern rifles, while the Russians still used muskets. Of the British Army's 21,000 deaths, 80% were caused by diseases, such as cholera. With the fall of Sebastopol, the Russians sued for peace.

Benjamin Bailey Massey of St Leonard's Lane, Wallingford, fought at the Battle of Alma, with the Grenadier Guards. He was wounded by several Russian musket balls in the arm and shoulder. He lay overnight on the battlefield before being collected and taken to hospital, where he was nursed by Florence Nightingale. He recovered from his wounds, but was discharged from the Army because of his intemperate habits.

Despite celebrations elsewhere in the county, it was feared there would be no commemoration of the peace in Wallingford, as it was felt there was no public interest. As soon as it was realised that there was interest, the Mayor (Edward Wells, who lived in the High Street) convened a meeting and a Committee was formed, with the Mayor as chairman. A collection was held at the meeting and nearly £200 was raised.

Events began on Wednesday 3rd June and the town was very lively in the evening, with many food vendors selling their wares, and crowds gathering and singing in the streets.

The following day, town inhabitants were woken around 4am by the sound of cannon and all kinds of firearms being fired in the Market Place. By 6am banners and flags were being flown from most of the houses in the town and all the buildings in the Market Place were decorated with evergreens. The banners were inscribed with "Peace and Plenty" or "Unity over the Earth"; most of the flags were Union Jacks or the French Tri-colour. The bells of St Mary's were rung during the day, the

Long Crendon Band were hired and they played on and off throughout the day.

At eleven, crowds began to assemble outside the Mayor's residence, where the Committee were having luncheon and the procession was formed, the order of which was: Gentlemen on horseback, with banners; Prince of Wales Club with flags; Odd Fellows in uniform with flags; Children with banners; Crimean Hero on horseback (possibly Benjamin Massey); The Labouring Classes; Borough Constables; Mace Bearer; The Mayor and Revd John Langley; The Corporation; Town Crier; The Gentlemen of Trade.

All the principal streets were paraded, and they finished in the Market Place where the Labouring Classes were given a dinner, served by the Mayor and Corporation. The dinner consisted of beef and mutton with an ample supply of beer, and after the meal they were supplied with tobacco and pipes. This meal was only served to the men of the town, about 400 in number.

After the dinner, the Mayor gave a short speech, finishing with a toast to the Queen. The Revd John Langley proposed three cheers, "for our country, and the Army and Navy." The National Anthem was then sung.

The children, after parading from the Mayor's house to the Market Place, sat down at the tables used by the men for their dinner. There were more than 600 children, and they were served tea and cakes.

Everybody then moved to the Kine Croft for the sports, where it was thought that 5-6,000 people were present. The main attraction was a Gingling Match, which consisted of a 40-foot pole erected vertically, and greased; the aim was to climb the pole to the top. If this was achieved, a prize of clothes was given to the winners.

Other events consisted of wheelbarrow races, jumping at treacled rolls, and donkey races in which the last home was the winner. These events lasted until it was dark. After singing

the National Anthem, everyone went home very happy.

Through all of the above events there was no mention of the ladies of the town receiving any refreshment or gifts.



Your very last chance to see.....

There is a last chance to see this year's special exhibition 'Wallingford Castle - the Inside Story' at Wallingford Museum, as the Museum closes for the winter on the 30th November, to prepare for new major presentations in 2018.

'Wallingford Castle - the Inside Story' presents a closer look at different parts of the Castle as revealed in the new documentary research. Alongside are two more exhibitions of local interest:

 Pettits: past to present' exhibition gives a history of Wallingford's department store, and the family who have run it from its beginning in 1856 to the present day. - 'Ways to Wallingford' describes how Wallingford has been an important crossing point on the Thames since Saxon times.

There is also the 'Midsomer Murders' display and the growing 'At home with the Queen of Crime: Agatha Christie' where information has been presented that has been learned from several people in the town who came into contact with the famous crime writer.

The Museum is open until 30th November on Tuesdays to Fridays 2pm to 5pm, and Saturdays 10.30am to 5pm. www.wallingfordmuseum.org.uk



Blewbury - A Saxon surprise and a Roman religious site

November's talk at The Wallingford Historical & Archaeological Society (TWHAS) will describe Blewbury - A Saxon surprise in a test pit and a Roman religious site on the Downs.

The talk will be given by local archaeologists, SOAG Chairman Dr David Carless and Lindsey Bedford, both project leaders of the Blewbury Big Dig. This is a joint venture by Blewbury Local History Group and SOAG to conduct a programme of test pits in the ancient village of Blewbury in search of the past that is missing in historical sources.

The project led in 2015/16 to the discovery of an early Saxon sunken featured building in someone's back garden, and another venture investigated crop marks on the Berkshire Downs, which English Heritage recorded as a possible Romano-British temple. The sunken featured building was cut into chalk, being well preserved and yielded some lovely finds and the possible Roman site delivered its own surprise in the form of a deep shaft. Both David and Lindsey also work on the TWHAS Urban Test Pit programme in Wallingford, so they will have lots of insights to share with us.

This talk will be held on Wednesday 8th November, 7.45 for 8pm, at St Mary's Church, Wallingford. Visitors (£4) are most welcome. www.twhas.org.uk

SODC Local Plan Consultation

The Local Plan policies map shows the locations of housing and employment allocations and other location specific policies within the plan, including changes to the boundary of the Oxford Green Belt. These were included in appendices 2-5 and appendix 13 of the version of the Local Plan that was published on 11th October.

The stand-alone policies map can now be viewed on the SODC website and in the following locations:

- the council office at 135 Eastern
 Avenue, Milton Park, Abingdon, OX14 4SB from 8.30am to 5pm Monday to Thursday,
 8.30am to 4.30pm Fridays
- all public libraries in South Oxfordshire during their usual opening hours
- Abbey House Abingdon, Abbey Sports Centre Berinsfield, Chalgrove Post Office, Clifton Hampden Post Office, Cornerstone Didcot, Culham Science Centre, Didcot Wave Leisure Centre and Oxford City Council's St Aldates Office during their usual opening hours.

The consultation period has been extended to 5pm on Thursday 30th November. This is to provide people with the opportunity to consider the Local Plan policies map and the Strategic Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment (SHELAA).

The SHELAA provides a technical assessment of the suitability, availability and achievability of land for development. It is an update to the Housing and Employment Land Availability Assessment (HELAA), which was published in March 2017. The updated document is available to view online.

November is the season of remembrance. We begin the month by celebrating All Saints on Sunday 5th November with a Family Service at 11am, featuring a joyful rendition of "O when the saints go marching in". This is followed by a more reflective All Souls' Memorial Service at 6pm when we remember the faithful departed - we will read the names of those whose funerals we have taken in the past three years and invite families to light a candle for them.

If you wish to include the names of anyone known to you, please add their name to the list at the back of the church (which is open daily). We thank God for their lives, and acknowledge that they are still part of us and have made us the people that we are today.

This year's Remembrance Sunday is again a poignant one, marking the centenary of the Battle of the Passchendaele (or the Third Battle of Ypres) from the end of July to November 1917, during which 325,000 Allied and 260,000 German casualties were sustained as the front line moved back and forth over no

more than five miles of devastation and mud. There are two men on our memorial who died in 1917, Thomas Lovett (d.30th June and buried in our churchyard) and William John Edwards (d.15th August). In addition to these, there are two others who are recorded as residents of Crowmarsh at the time they enlisted, Albert Edward Robey (d.30th May) and William Jones (d.16th August)

I do hope you will be able to join our Act of Remembrance for these and the many others who have made the ultimate sacrifice. This is on Sunday 12th November, gathering at 10.45am around the Lych Gate War Memorial.

They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old:

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun, and in the morning,

We will remember them.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 5th October 2017

Present: Cllrs John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Nigel Hannigan, Denise Hall, Stuart Soames, Fleur Stevenson, David Topliss, David Rowley, Andrew Johnson, David Mannering and Francesca Jones; Sue Rance (Clerk), Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer); County Councillor Mark Gray, Mrs E Ryall and Mrs P Shields.

Apologies for absence from District Cllrs Bloomfield and Pullen.

New member: The council agreed unanimously to co-opt Mrs Elizabeth Ryall to fill the vacancy and is now at full strength again.

Crowmarsh News

Mrs Pat Shields addressed the meeting about the need for public liability insurance. The committee would like the parish council to consider taking the Crowmarsh News back under their jurisdiction. A separate meeting will be arranged with the Crowmarsh News Association committee to discuss the way forward.

Matters arising from the meeting on 7th September 2017

The Botany Gardens play area had not been cut as the contractor had had difficulty with the padlock. The grass cutting agreement with Oxfordshire County Council will be signed and returned once it has been confirmed that the council has £10 million public liability insurance.

It was agreed that the Parish Council will pay a sum of 10.75% for administration costs to WREN as a condition of a grant application for refurbishment of North Stoke Village Hall,

although a decision has yet to be made on the grant.

Display boards have been purchased and were used at the neighbourhood plan exhibitions.

Finance

A schedule of payments was agreed. Expenditure relating to the neighbourhood plan will be shown separately in the accounts in future.

Grants and donations were agreed at this meeting:

- Be Free Young Carers: £100
- Wallingford Volunteer Centre: £100
- Guideposts: £100
- Victim Support Services: £100
- Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum: no donation.

Planning

Decisions: The Council noted the following decisions from SODC:

P14/S2860/O (Outline): Residential development comprising 555 dwellings, a one form entry primary school, associated landscaping and open spaces, construction of a new access onto the A4130 Calvin Thomas Way/Bosley Way, construction of a public transport link/emergency access onto Wantage Road and other supporting infrastructure works and facilities. Land to the West of Wallingford (Site B) (Neighbouring parish consultation).

PERMISSION GRANTED.

P17/S3195/LDP (Lawful Development Permission): Formation of habitable room in roof-space with rear-dormer and gable buildup. 176 Crowmarsh Hill, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8BG. PERMISSION REFUSED.

Applications: The Council agreed its response to SODC on the following applications:

P17/S3221/HH (Householder): Double storey side extension. 22 Howbery Farm, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8NR.

P17/S3067/LDP: New vehicle gate with similar height and same location. Southern Gas Networks AGI Offtake, Ipsden (on A4074), OX10 6AF.

The above APPLICATION was WITHDRAWN - no further action.

South Oxfordshire Local Plan 2033

Following consultations and evidence gathering, SODC are about to submit the Local Plan for independent examination. A six-week publicity period will run from 11th October until Wednesday, 22nd November 2017.

After the publicity period they will submit the plan to the Secretary of State, who will appoint a Planning Inspector to carry out an independent examination and make a decision on whether the Local Plan is "sound" and "legally" compliant.

Neighbourhood plan

Exhibitions on the neighbourhood plan had been held at Crowmarsh Village Hall on 23rd September and at North Stoke Village Hall on 30th September. Both were well attended and a few more volunteers came forward.

A questionnaire was included in the last Crowmarsh News – please return yours now if you haven't yet.

It was agreed to appoint the following members of the steering group: Cllrs Hannigan, Stevenson, Jones and Topliss, Mr Nick Robins and Mr Simon Millsop.
Cllr Hannigan and Mr Nick Robins will attend the local plan meeting at Didcot. Our neighbourhood plan support officer at SODC is Rona Knott: she would meet the steering group in Crowmarsh Pavilion on Thursday 12th October.

O'Neill Homer, who have been neighbourhood plan consultants for Brightwell and Benson, have submitted details of how they could support our neighbourhood plan. There will be grant funding from SODC and the government to cover this and other expenses. It was agreed to ask the steering group to take this forward. Items of major expenditure will always be referred to the Parish Council for approval.

Cllr Hannigan will write to SODC expressing concern that they are not contesting the result of the CABI appeal.

It was proposed by Cllr Soames that the Parish Council should withdraw its objection to the proposed Newnham Manor development now that its junction on the A4074 has been modified, but this was not agreed.

Environment and recreation committee

Pavilion and recreation ground

- It was agreed that the electrical wiring at the pavilion should be checked. Two quotes would be obtained.
- Mr Strange has received quotes for tree and hedge pruning and for pollarding the willows and maples. It was agreed to obtain comparative quotes.
- Access to toilets would be discussed by the Environment and Recreation Ground committee when they meet in October.

Play area action group

 Cllr Rowley reported that the council can now apply for planning permission. A flood compensation scheme will be required: a pond at the nature area could be considered, but concerns were expressed about safety.

Replacement noticeboards

Cllr Jones reported that the resident of 13 Park View has given permission for the noticeboard in the hedge at the front of his property to be removed, after 14 days' notice.

North Stoke Village Hall and Crowmarsh Church have given permission for the boards on their premises to be replaced. Cllr Jones has been advised to contact SODC's licensing department before replacing noticeboards on public land.

Traffic and transport committee

- Cllr Jones reported that there will be another meeting of Parish Transport Representatives in the county soon. She and others have complained to Thames Travel about the lack of notice given about reductions in the 136 bus service between RAF Benson and Cholsey.
- The traffic survey has been carried out on the A4074. Cllr Hall will contact the police about speeding traffic and request their speed data.

County Councillor Gray's report

- Cllr Gray reported that repairs to street lights and illuminated bollards are currently taking a long time to be carried out as they are on a separate contract from road maintenance.
- The domestic waste recycling centres will all remain open, including Oakley Wood. A new company is now managing these centres. Charges for recycling DIY materials have increased from £1 to £1.50 per item.
- The OCC housebuilding infrastructure fund is intended to support the building of new houses by supporting major road infrastructure, including the A34 and A40. Support for infrastructure such as drainage, schools and other facilities comes from developers' contributions.
- The government is considering a new formula that could reduce the number of houses to be built in Oxfordshire.
- Crowmarsh School was inspected by Ofsted on 4th October.
- OCC's special needs education provision has also been inspected recently.
- Cllr Jones reported on difficulties she has encountered in making telephone contact with the Highways Authority. Cllr Gray would make enquiries.

Website

The Neighbourhood Plan questionnaires have now been posted on the website. The annual financial return and a notice about extra garden waste collections will also be included. Crowmarsh News will be asked to always include a reference to the parish website. Help is needed to maintain the Facebook page, which should also include notices of meetings and other news.

Other business

- It was noted that the hedge on the west side of Portway, where it joins The Street, is overgrown and reducing visibility: this needs professional cutting back and will be added to the list of trees and hedges requiring attention.
- A local resident will attend the November meeting to support his request for a scout hut.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be on Thursday 9th November at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. All are welcome.
