



Update on A4074 junction and Toucan crossing

We would like to express our gratitude to all the people who attended the site meeting at the A4074 Portway on 11th September to discuss the proposed new junction to access the Newnham Manor planning application. Jason Sherwood and Ian Marshall from Oxfordshire Highways explained why they had actually vetoed the junction design that was part of the plans passed by SODC in January: they were concerned that the complicated junction design would dangerously confuse motorists.

They are currently working on a simplified design which crucially will include a Toucan crossing (light-controlled, for pedestrians and bicycles). They reassured us that the proposed development and its necessary access junction off the A4074 will not be passed by them without the Toucan crossing.

There are still design issues to be overcome to avoid a situation where vehicles turning right from Cox's Lane are in conflict with vehicles turning right from the proposed new development. They also undertook to examine the implications of making all of the traffic emerging from the new development turn left towards the roundabout.

Additional speed reduction features were also suggested in an effort to improve the road safety of everyone crossing or using the road.

It is unlikely that the amended planning application will come before SODC's planning committee before November. Thank you again to all those people who supported us.

Past Times: Crowmarsh in 1966

In 1966 Crowmarsh was a bit different from how it is today.

The Newnham Green Estate had yet to be built, and the thatched house called Newnham Croft, was opposite St. Mary's Church. This house was demolished to make way for the road into the new estate, now Thames Mead.

The village Post Office and Store was managed by F Lock, who was also Chairman of the Parish Council, alongside Joe Gardener as the Vice-Chairman. Among the decisions made by the Parish Council at their July meeting that year, they decided to turn down a planning application for a petrol station opposite Walter Wilders Foundry. In August, the Parish Council recommended permission to to regularise Teddy Townsend's summertime caravan park next to his house at Bridge Villa on The Street. The streets and pavements of Crowmarsh were kept clean by Harry Allnutt – we could do with him today.

Harry Nosworthy was landlord of the "Bell Inn", having moved to Crowmarsh eleven years earlier from Newbridge, on the Thames near Standlake, where he was landlord of "The Maybush". Arthur Fayers had been landlord of the "Queen's Head" for nearly 20 years.

Mrs Hasthorpe was headmistress of Crowmarsh Gifford Primary School in Benson Lane, with 96 children attending in 1966. The school prize day was held on 20th July that year. Among the prize winners were: Head Teacher's prize for religious knowledge, Patricia Tipper. Examination prizes were won by Julie Dunsdon, Wendy Greenaway and Patricia Tipper. Class prizes for Juniors were awarded to Jenny Garner, Robert Waite, Rosina Gesner, Rosemary Farrand and Susan Pitson. Infants prizes were awarded to Auriol Collins and Phillip Smith, and Lower Infants prizes to Hazel Dunsdon and Leslie Pitson. Swimming prizes were awarded for 10 yards to Nicholas Lock, Stephen Sherbourne, Martin Fautley, for 25 yards to Elizabeth Haines, Julie Dunsdon, Wendy Greenaway. The 100 yards swim was won by Rosemary Farrand.

There was much concern with the toilet facilities at the school: although they were flush toilets they had not been updated since the school was built in 1908. In wintertime the children had to put on their coats and run across to the far side of the playground to use them, and they were often frozen during cold spells in winter. The building of the new school in Reading Road finally resolved the problem.

Crowmarsh had very strong boys' football teams. In June the under 16's team played Blewbury and won 5-2, the team being R. Marcham, D. Tipper, G. Strudwick, R. Passey, J. Usher, R. Gesner. R. Clarke, P. Berry, D. James, D. Howard. The goal scorers were R. Clarke (2), P. Gesner, D. James and P. Berry. The under 16's side didn't lose a game all season, scoring 44 goals in total. The club also ran under 15's, 13's, and 12's sides, who were equally successful. Their football pitch was off Cox's Lane, now buried under the A4074.

In June 1966 the first edition of the The Crowmarsh Chronicle was published by the Crowmarsh Area Social Benevolent Society. The Editor was F Lock, and it cost 6d (2½p). This Society was established for the benefit of certain sections of the community: old peoples' clubs, youth clubs and schools. The magazine had a two-page gardening section, a monthly report on the youth club and the football club, and several poems by local residents. The Benefit Society ran a monthly raffle, which was drawn in Crowmarsh post office, and the list of winners was displayed each month. A report of the monthly Parish Council meetings was also included. The Revd Roberts, Rector of St. Mary's Church, published a list of all births, marriages and deaths in Crowmarsh.

In future Past Times I plan to pick a year from each decade and use these early *Crowmarsh Chronicles* to write a review of that year.



Citizens Advice – parking tickets

There can be few experiences as disheartening as floating back to your car after some marvellously therapeutic shopping trip, laden with parcels and shopping bags, to find a black and yellow parking notification attached to your windscreen, like some enormous striped stinging hornet – and certainly having a stinging effect on your feelings too.

It could spoil anyone's day – but don't let it! Don't panic, don't curse and don't waste any time before getting to grips with the problem.

The Citizens Advice website has a useful section which you should consult: https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/law-and-courts/parking-tickets/

If you think the ticket was justified (and let's face it, some of them are), if you pay the fine right away there is a substantial discount:

- 50% if you pay a Penalty Charge Notice or Excess Charge Notice within 14 days
- 40-60% if you pay a Parking Charge Notice within 14 days

If you think that you were parked correctly and within the rules, or there were mitigating circumstances, you can try an appeal, but don't pay a ticket issued by a parking company that is not a member of the Accredited Trade Association: they can't force you to pay or take you to court.

If you appeal, you should explain that you didn't break any rules, and, if possible, send evidence to prove it.

Citizens Advice is frequently consulted about parking tickets. If you get one and aren't sure how to proceed, it's comforting to know that there are sympathetic people you can talk to.

Tough stance on council tax non-payers

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils recovered over £1.2 million in council tax arrears last year thanks to tough enforcement action.

The councils took prison action against 36 people, with four receiving suspended prison sentences. 80 people were caught claiming discounts on their council tax that they weren't entitled to and 53 discount cheats were fined and ten prosecuted in court.

Council tax makes a substantial contribution to meeting the costs of our key public services, such as social care, police, waste & recycling collections and road repairs. It is absolutely vital that everyone pays their fair share towards these costs and we will not hesitate to take action against anyone who does not.

If you are genuinely struggling to pay the council tax then help is available, but if you deliberately avoid the problem it will make matters much worse, so let SODC know immediately if there is any problem.



Autumn – a time to give thanks...

As Christians, we are grateful people. According to Billy Graham, "Thankfulness is the natural outflowing of a heart that is attuned to God. A spirit of thanksgiving is always the mark of a joyous Christian". Our main service each Sunday is a "Eucharist" which is a Greek word meaning "giving thanks" (to God) – see Luke 22:19: "And he took bread, and when he had given thanks [eucharistēsas] he broke it and gave it to them".

We celebrate God's gift of himself to us in the life, death and new life of Jesus. Autumn also brings specific reasons for the wider community to join us in giving thanks.

it has been a glorious summer, and this meant that animal feed has been in short supply and thus more expensive, but at least this is manageable, unlike the unknown effects of Brexit on our farming community and what this might mean for crop prices for next year's harvest. So, we pray for stability for our farming community and wisdom for decision makers in government.

At the end of half term, we will be holding a "Light Party" at 4pm on the Sunday afternoon before Hallowe'en. We want to reclaim the Christian heritage of this festival to remind us that witches, ghosts, skeletons and vampires and any other bogeymen have had their day, because Christ has conquered death itself so no child of God need be scared.

All families are welcome to join us for crafts, games, tea, fun and worship at St Mary Magdalene – more positive than "Trick or Treating"! Then, on All Saints' Day (which we celebrate on the next Sunday's Family Service on 4th November), we give thanks for all who have gone before us in this faith.

Wallingford U3A

At our September meeting Dr Martin Holmes gave us a revision of Prime Minster Harold Macmillan's reputation, dispelling illusions of "SuperMac" as an avuncular, aristocratic statesman from a civilised bygone era. He argued that Macmillan was brilliant but ruthless, a moderniser, a foreign policy initiator but neither a decent nor a nice man.

He pursued vendettas and blocked R.A. Butler's path to the premiership, although he was the obvious candidate. Domestically, Macmillan's strove to keep the Conservatives in power even if it meant adopting Atlee's "Socialist" policies: Keynesian economics, full employment and the NHS. He won a huge majority in 1959, but economically it failed, and Wilson took over with inflation at 27%.

Macmillan's foreign policies have had lasting impact, taking us into the Common Market and accelerating the end of the Empire and independence of former colonies.

Arguments continue about Macmillan's involved in repatriation of thousands of Cossacks, refugees, slave labourers and prisoners of war to Stalin's Russia in 1945. Many of these were killed on arrival or sent to gulags. Macmillan denied any responsibility for this disgraceful episode which was in breach of the Geneva Convention and seriously harmed Britain's reputation.

Dr Holmes maintained that Macmillan had a cavalier attitude to the truth and that "his memoirs are a work of fiction".

Next meeting: October 3rd, Dr Penny Billyeald will speak about "Local poets of World War I".


New documentary research is revealed in the exhibition 'Wallingford Castle - the Inside Story' which presents a closer look at different parts of the Castle.

Oliver Good (of Cotswold Archaeology) will talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) about the archaeological excavations on the former Waitrose site.

Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 6th September

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Nigel Hannigan, Denise Hall, Andrew Johnson, Francesca Jones, Elizabeth Ryall, Stephen Sherbourne, Stuart Soames and David Topliss; District Councillor Sue Cooper; County Councillor Mark Gray; Sue Rance (Clerk) and Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer).

Apologies were received from David Rowley.

Matters from the previous meeting

A quote has been received to make the culvert at North Stoke safe: County Councillor Gray would pay £1000 towards this, subject to the necessary application form being completed.

The boiler at the Pavilion has been repaired.

Finance

A schedule of payments made in August was agreed. The accounts status report to the end of August showed income of £36,854 and expenditure of £24,251. There had been an increase in expenditure, which included sewage pump maintenance and repairs to an external wall at the pavilion. A full report for the period to 30th September 2018 will be presented at the next meeting.

The Finance Officer has obtained quotes for insurance cover and it was agreed to accept the lowest, a fixed price of £3114 per annum for three years, from Axa.

Thames Travel will pay for repairs to kerbstones, gates and guttering at the pavilion, damaged by their bus: estimated cost £3000.

The external auditor has queried the high level of reserves: evidence of planned expenditure on major projects has been submitted.

John Howell MP will be asked to contact the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government to ascertain why he had not replied. Councillor Cooper will contact Cllr Jane Murphy, Leader of South Oxfordshire District Council, to ask why she had not replied.

Neighbourhood plan

A meeting has been arranged with our new SODC officer for the Crowmarsh Neighbourhood Plan, Cheryl Soppet, on 9th October to go through the current draft of our plan. We will use SODC's preferred reviewer, and the review will be in two parts, first a "health check" which is a quick look through the documents and then there will be the review report. Dr Robins will inform the Finance Officer of the expected costs.

Review of strategic priorities

The playground project is currently in hand and information is awaited from WREN about the council's grant application. A site meeting is to be held on 11th September with County Highways officers about the crossing on the A4074 at Portway. No further action will be taken on the pedestrian crossing in The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, until these two matters have been resolved.

Other matters

A resident has expressed concern about a leaning tree at the recreation ground. This has been noted and will be monitored.

There has been a complaint about shading from an overhanging tree near the Emery Owen allotments. Cllr Johnson will raise this with the Emery Owen Trust.

The Parish Council's privacy notice has been circulated and was approved with one minor amendment.

Environment & recreation ground committee

Lead tiles have been stolen from the roof of the pavilion and quotes are being obtained for rapid repairs. This theft has been reported to the police and an insurance claim will be made. The lead will be replaced with a nonmetal substitute.

Update on playground project

The outcome of the council's grant application to WREN was expected to be known very soon. The amount was increased to cover the cost of providing wheelchair access. A cheque has been received from Waitrose for £240, raised through their green token scheme in July, and the Clerk will write a letter of thanks.

Cllr Rowley and Mr Strange have visited the play area in Abingdon. It has been recommended that spare parts of the most popular equipment should be kept in stock because of likely delays in having repairs done during the summer season. This mlght require extra funding as a contingency.

Mr Strange is obtaining quotes to widen the front door at the pavilion to provide disabled access to the toilet out of hours.

Update on noticeboards

Cllr Jones has circulated four quotes for new notice boards and recommended the oak boards supplied by Greenbarnes. Their delivery charge is reasonable but does not include installation. Cllr Soames expressed a preference for an aluminium board outside North Stoke Village Hall, which is particularly vulnerable to damp and attack from insects.

No posts will be needed for the board at Robert Sparrow Gardens where the existing ones are in good condition. Cllr Jones was thanked for her hard work on this project.

Traffic and transport

Permission has been given for three different sites for a speed indication device to be installed: The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, A4074 at Portway and Benson Lane. A single unit will be moved between these three positions. It was agreed to accept the lower quote of £2400 which was from Elan City.

The misleading bus signs in The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, have now been corrected.

A resident has suggested that the school might run a competition to design a speed awareness sign and Cllr Stevenson will speak to the head teacher about this idea.

County Councillor's report

County Councillor Gray reported that John Backley of SODC and a representative from the county council have met to discuss the access to the riverside. Cllr Gray will ask for confirmation in writing of the proposed measures to be taken, including restricting parking in Stephens Field and stopping vehicles from using the old access road.

An officer from OCC Highways will make a site visit in the next few days to discuss plans for a modified toucan crossing for the A4074. A new planning officer is to be appointed for the Newnham Manor development.

The first liaison meeting between OCC and Parish Councils has been held in Abingdon. Further meetings are planned: the next one will be on Wednesday 19th September in Wantage and another will be held in Harwell on Thursday 18th October.

District Councillor's report

District Councillor Cooper reported that growth deal and sustainability issues in the local plan will be discussed in October.

An update is expected on the route for the Oxford – Cambridge expressway.

Councillor Cooper is monitoring the major planning applications in Crowmarsh.

Demolition work at the former SODC offices is in progress.

There is no news on a unitary authority for Oxfordshire at present.

Waste collection at the Riverside Park has improved, but there have been problems with algae in the swimming pool and splash park this year: Cllr Cooper will ask the management company to start a new cleaning regime next year.

An incident of fly tipping in Old Reading Road was noted.

Correspondence

Correspondence about dogs on leads at the Recreation Ground. The RoSPA guidance is to have plenty of signs about dog fouling. Although there are signs in the car park, it was suggested that a notice could be posted to the effect that dogs must be kept under control at all times. This matter will be discussed by the Recreation Ground Management Committee.

Other matters

It was proposed that a litter bin is needed in The Street (south side) between Old Reading Road and Meadow Lane. This will be discussed at the October meeting.

The Clerk will ask Tom Cottrell and Coulton Tree Services to quote for pruning the hedge at Home Farm. A new tree or trees will be planted to replace the recently felled ash tree in Jethro Tull Gardens.

Representation on outside bodies

Cllr Sherbourne and District Councillor Cooper will attend the Grundon Liaison Committee meeting on Monday 10th September.

Cllr Jones attended a meeting about disaster planning. There is a new simpler format for the emergency planning document, but under the General Data Protection Regulation, she has to contact everyone mentioned in the plan.

Cllr Ryall will attend the meetings of the River Users' Group.

Next meeting

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Thursday 4th October at North Stoke Village Hall starting at 7.30pm. All are welcome.
