News from Crowmarsh Gifford Primary School: Year 6 goes green

With COP 26 being in the news recently, everyone is becoming more aware of the impacts of climate change. This is just as true for everyone at Crowmarsh Primary School. We are realising that there is more that we can do to help as part of the community. As Year 6, we have been taking the lead in making the whole school more aware about the climate change crisis.

One of the main things we have been doing is researching climate change to understand more about the causes, but most importantly what we can do to make a positive impact. As part of this, we have set up a group known as the, 'Climate Organisation Of Kids In English Schools' (Cookies!). Our job is to influence the school to make each class more eco-friendly. We hope that this will then have an impact on their families at home, causing a butterfly effect throughout the local area.

Some of the solutions we have been looking at include the following:

Recycled paper

This is important because it can reduce the amount of trees being cut down and actually, is more energy efficient than creating paper from new sources. So we have learnt how to create our own recycled paper, which we will introduce to the other classes.

Christmas jumper swap

This is important for numerous reasons. First of all, throwing away clothes creates rubbish which biodegrades releasing greenhouse gases. Secondly, buying new clothes involves transport which releases even more greenhouse gases and pollutes the air. For these reasons, we are going to organise a jumper swap where families bring in their old Christmas jumpers that no longer fit them, for other people to wear. Of course, we will be extra cautious to take protective measures due to COVID-19.

Tree planting

We are researching the most cost-effective way to plant trees, which will help reduce the

amount of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. We have found that at this time of year, plants are sold more cheaply as 'bare root stock'. We have trees on order from the Woodland Trust which we will plant around the school grounds.

So, we hope you have gathered some useful information about the kind of things that we are doing to help, that you could do at home. The next time we write, we hope to tell you about the positive impacts that we have created, and give you more ideas to try. Even though these might seem like very small steps, we have learnt that "large walls are made of small bricks".

So what ideas do you have to help us in the battle against climate change?

Last year we experienced a Christmas like no other as many families were forced to celebrate separately with only Zoom to share the festivities. Thanks to the vaccine rollout and availability of testing, this year we hope to see our loved ones in the flesh in a far more relaxed and intimate manner. This itself is a metaphor for Christmas.

When God came to Earth in the flesh as a human, our relationship with Him changed forever. Buy local with free parking in the run up to Christmas

Shoppers in South Oxfordshire are being given a helping hand to buy local this Christmas.

Those who are unable to get to local businesses by walking, cycling or public transport can take advantage of free parking in district council car parks.

The annual free parking is provided by South Oxfordshire District Council in their car parks to encourage people to shop locally for their Christmas presents, which is even more important this year following the economic impact of the coronavirus pandemic.

The free parking days also mean that you don't have to pay to park to catch up with friends and family in pubs, cafés and restaurants during the festive period.

Drivers will be able to park for free in Wallingford on **Thursdays 9, 16 and 23 December** and there's no need to display a ticket, although maximum stay times will still apply in some car parks. Cllr Sue Cooper, Cabinet Member for Environment, Climate Change and Nature Recovery at South Oxfordshire District Council, said: "We have a great selection of independent shops offering very different and original gifts which would make the perfect Christmas present, and by buying local you will also be supporting your own community. Past Times

Fire at Charles Clare's workshop

The Clares were a fifth generation family of wheelwrights living in Crowmarsh.

The family moved into a house in The Street next to Home Farm (where Chris O'Donnell lives today) in the 1750s.

In 1859 the business was run by Charles Clare. On 3rd August 1859 at about 8 o'clock a fire broke out in the workshop situated at the back of the premises.

The fire spread at an alarming rate. It was right next to Home Farm, which had several ricks in the farmyard. There were also a number of thatched cottages nearby.

However, the alarm was quickly raised and thanks to the prompt action of the villagers the fire was confined to the workshop, which was totally destroyed, along with its contents.

The contents of the Clares' house were removed in order to save them from the fire, but unfortunately they were damaged by the process of removal. In fact removing the house contents proved to be unnecessary, as the house was not damaged by the fire. Mr Clare was only partially insured so the fire was a serious financial loss to him.

Charles Clare then moved his business to the premises now occupied by Colliers, which may have been because of the damage caused by the fire.



Benson garden club

For Benson Garden Club's November talk, we were treated to RHS Chelsea Flower Show Gold medal winner Martin Cook.

Martin shared with us how he created his three Chelsea gardens, from forming the initial creative idea, to developing the brief and then building the actual garden. His first attempt won a Silver Gilt with "A Literary Garden". Designed as a retreat for a poet, this garden incorporated Martin's expertise as a specialist letter carver, with hand-carved garden art an intrinsic feature of the design. The hand-carved lettering and accompanying planting (by Bonnie Davies) were exquisite, but Martin also spoke of the practicalities of building a garden at Chelsea, with the wry comment that water will leak if you introduce a water feature.

Martin's next entry, "The Mindfulness Garden," was designed to encourage us to focus even when surrounded by external chaos. He collaborated with Gary Breeze for both this and his third garden, with both gardens achieving a coveted RHS Gold medal. A riot of colour, Jackson Pollock style, provided by 6,000 plants, represented the chaos. But in the midst of this mass of distracting colour, you were led to focus upon Martin's hand-carved slate roundel, "Listen to your quiet mind," placed at the end of a long steel tube. Martin's ability to bring to life the journey from a bare patch of earth to a Chelsea garden in all its glory allowed us to feel almost as if we had been there.

Martin's third garden, "The Antithesis of Sarcophagi," was ground-breaking for Chelsea, because when you approached it, there was no visible planting. Instead, it appeared as it some terrible catastrophe had occurred. There was a huge block of granite sitting on ash surrounded by charred wood. There was strange, undecipherable lettering on one face of the block, (Martin's beautiful hand-carved lettering was once again a feature of the overall design). However, there was life inside the tomb (hence the title), showing how nature will re-generate despite the destructive impact of civilisation. You could only view the re-generation by looking through tiny holes, with clever mirrors inside the block appearing to reveal a woodland without boundaries (four foxgloves appeared to be an endless swathe). Once again, the practical hurdles that have to be overcome to

create a Chelsea garden, which here included positioning a 44 ton granite cube, were incredible. And the end result was so staggeringly beautiful and thought-provoking.

CPRE Oxfordshire flooding and pollution report

Results of a survey of Oxfordshire's Town and Parish Councils, 2021

Campaign to Protect Rural England Oxfordshire works to improve, protect and preserve the landscape of Oxfordshire and its towns and villages for the benefit of everyone. Findings of this survey show that at least 17% of towns and parishes in Oxfordshire experience flooding problems and at least 20% experience issues with sewage / sewerage infrastructure.

CPRE Oxfordshire wants to see:

- Thames Water setting out clear measures to address the issues raised in this report, including targets and investment commitments.
- Local MPs supporting the Sewage (Inland) Waters) Bill and the Environment Bill, to ensure water companies are legally bound to stop discharging raw sewage into the ocean and rivers.
- Oxfordshire Plan 2050 to ensure all new developments demonstrate that their associated infrastructure will either maintain or improve water quality, will not add to the risk of flooding, and will be in place before the site is occupied.
- The River Thames to achieve Bathing Water designation.

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 4 November.

Present

Cllrs John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Fleur Stevenson, Stuart Soames and David Rowley and Sue Rance (Clerk).

Items from the previous meeting

It was agreed that a 20mph limit on residential roads in Crowmarsh Gifford and North Stoke would improve safety and should be pursued with Oxfordshire County Council.

Cllr Sherbourne confirmed that Grundons will donate a sack of native daffodil bulbs this year.

County Council matters

There was no report from County Councillor Bloomfield. Cllr Griffin met online with OCC cabinet members, senior officers and other parish councils to discuss how OCC's strategic plans may affect communities like ours. We hope to have more such meetings.

District Council matters

The brown bin garden waste collection service is back to normal and everyone using this service has had their subscription period extended by three months to compensate for the lack of collections over the summer.

South Oxfordshire District Council is launching a new round of its Capital Grant Scheme with grants of up to £75,000 available for local voluntary and community organisations and parish councils. This grant can fund up to 50 per cent of the total cost of capital projects. Applicants will need to show how their project will contribute to at least one of the council's Corporate Plan 2020-2024 priorities, such as 'protect and restore our natural world', 'action on the climate emergency' or 'improved economic and community well-being'.

Next April there will be minor changes to how parking is enforced in District Council car parks, including how people can appeal against a parking fine, and there will be two levels of fine. Look out for public notices explaining this.

The District Council agreed a series of motions aimed at boosting efforts to address the climate emergency, to protect and enhance the natural environment and increase biodiversity. These motions all highlight the need for

government to take action to remove unnecessary barriers to measures to tackle the climate emergency at a local level, which will be vital if the UK is to lead by example in the fight against climate change.

Planning

Consultation responses

P21/S4223/FUL 'The Sycamores' Land east of 206 Crowmarsh Hill Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BG. Alterations to extant planning permission P20/S0267/FUL (Erection of five dwellings and associated works). The new proposals include habitable rooms in the roof spaces and a lower storey for the two semi-detached houses. Siting and other aspects appear the same as the approved plans. Recommend approval as long as other aspects such as environmental footprint and landscape treatment remain unchanged.

P21/S4578/HH 54 Park View Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BN First floor rear extension over existing. Two storey extension to rear and side. Single storey rear extension. Single storey side extension. Recommend approval subject to any views from neighbours.

Major developments

Carmel College, Mongewell (P11/W2357)
Redevelopment to provide 166 residential dwellings (C3), refurbishment of Grade II and Grade II* listed buildings including provision of a restaurant, community cafe and swimming pool and retention of boating facilities and associated landscaping, access and parking arrangements. This development was approved in 2016 and is now going ahead.

Newnham Manor (P16/S3852/FUL) Hybrid planning application for 100 new residential dwellings including new access road off the A4074 (including a new layout with a light-controlled crossing) and public open space (full application) plus the provision of school land (outline application). An amendment has been received including a new energy statement based on air source heat pumps. This application is expected to go back to be considered by SODC's planning committee on 15 December 2021.

Finance

A donation of £100 was agreed to Cleanslate, a charity supporting victims of abuse in Oxfordshire. Donations of £100 each were agreed to the British Legion poppy appeals for Crowmarsh Gifford and North Stoke.

Payments in October included £549.99 for a

new laptop for the Finance Officer, £450 for pressure washing the tennis courts and £1,722.24 for dog bin emptying for three months. Charges for dog bin emptying have risen sharply and the Environment and Recreation Ground Management Committee will consider ways to manage this.

Environment and recreation

The committee met on 2 November. The car park barrier, CCTV and new energy-efficient floodlighting for the hard courts have been installed. A service agreement with Crowmarsh Youth Football Club could benefit them and the parish council: they can receive charity funding to maintain the pitches. Fees for the pavilion will be increased in January in line with those agreed for the village hall.

Plans are being considered to re-wild part of the west side of the recreation ground and plant more trees. A meeting will be held on 4 December with neighbouring parishes about plans to plant many more trees as part of the Queen's Jubilee Green Canopy project. Tree planting on the riverside meadows, delayed from last year, is planned for 11 December – volunteers should contact the chairman or the Earth Trust.

Details were discussed of the proposed community lunch on Sunday 5 June 2022 to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This will involve many village organisations. Please contact the parish clerk if you might be interested in helping to plan this event.

Traffic and transport

Cllr Sherbourne has drafted a letter of complaint to the police about the lack of action on noise from motorbikes. A meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner is being arranged.

Speed checks in North Stoke have not been carried out since 2011 and the Clerk has requested that these be re-instated following the recent speed survey, the results of which have been sent to the police. A Mongewell resident reported speeds of up to 80mph in the 50mph zone along the B4009.

A speed survey will be carried out near The Bell before the pedestrian crossing there can go ahead. The speed survey near the church showed speeds were too high for a zebra crossing to be considered. Parking restrictions at Stephens Field have been agreed and will be actioned by Oxfordshire Highways.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 9 December 2021, starting at 7.30pm. Please contact the parish clerk if you would like to attend. The council does not usually meet in January.

John Howell MP writes...

Last month I said that during the parliamentary recess I would be meeting with representatives from a number of parish councils across the constituency. This proved to be a helpful use of time and whilst there were several individual local concerns there were also some key themes emerging around transport, policing, health services and planning.

With policing there were several issues around visibility of a police officer and in several parishes it was felt that higher profile could be a helpful deterrent where there are local concerns over such issues as drugs trading. There are also several parishes in the middle of the constituency affected by leisure motorbikes with issues of speed and noise. I have met the Police and Crime Commissioner to raise these concerns and he has committed to meet with those parishes concerned with the motorbike issues and to look into the other policing issues on our behalf.

There have been a number of concerns raised with me over local health services, particularly access to GPs which have also been picked up in the media. In response to these concerns I have recently met with some of our local doctors which proved very interesting. It is true that the pandemic has created a backlog at primary care level as well as in our hospitals. However there are ways of working in health that have been slowly changing prior to the pandemic which have been accelerated, perhaps too quickly, as a result of pandemic.

Last but by no means least there are concerns about planning and development. ...

Neighbourhood Planning can help, but I would like to see it being given more prominence in the process. Along with many others I am waiting with interest to see what the long-awaited planning reforms bring forward.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock has identified an unknown Oxfordshire officer killed during the First World War in 1917 as Osmond Bartle Wordsworth, a descendant of the poet William Wordsworth. Remains of an unidentified officer of the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry were first discovered in Northern France in 2013 and reburied in 2015. Museum Volunteers were able to narrow down probable identities to three different officers and DNA testing has now identified him.
