We are all looking forward to 2022 with the opportunity to revive exciting 'post Covid' scouting activities for members of the Beavers, Cubs and Scouts Sections and to welcome new young people who have not yet experienced the delights that the Scout movement offers.

The Group will also welcome those interested in becoming leaders or helpers of its scouting sections and in joining its Executive Committee. The Vicar writes...

I wish you a very happy New Year, and if you are reading this before the 12th night, also a very Happy Christmas to you and yours!

Our celebrations of the great festival of Christmas do not end with indigestion and the Queen's Speech, or even the Boxing Day football fixtures and holiday ads on the TV, but we continue to dwell on the Good News that God chose to come to us in human form, to share the troubles of this life and to show us, not just a better way of living, but a whole new life. Indeed, for Christians the extended festival incudes the Epiphany season as Christ is first revealed to the wise men and ends with his recognition by elderly prophets at his presentation at the temple when the gift offering is made for a first-born son. Filling this Epiphany sandwich, we hear about his baptism and the beginning of his ministry with his first miracle of water into wine at the wedding at Cana in Galilee.

Epiphany is the time when we celebrate God being made "manifest". In my former career in logistics, a shipping manifest said exactly what is contained in a delivery. When the baby Jesus was delivered in Bethlehem, he came with a manifest and a manifesto and that's why our Christmas season continues throughout January, as we try to understand exactly what has been made manifest and why. We can only know God because he reveals himself to us, otherwise we all invent a God of our own imagination. When people say to me "I don't believe in God", then this is normally what they mean: that the God of their childhood imagination was found to be inadequate and not worthy of worship. In which case, I invite everyone to join us as we discover the true God, as he chooses to reveal himself to us.

Past Times

The unsuccessful hunting of hares by the Berkshire Hounds

On the 12th December 1868, the Berkshire Hounds met at Mongewell Park, the residence of George Brettle, to hunt hares. Mr Brettle showed his usual hospitality and provided an excellent luncheon.

A hare was found near Mongewell House and ran with great spirit over the hills to Oakley Wood, where the hounds were unable to follow, and so escaped. A second hare was found near Mongewell Plantation. She ran through Ipsden where she turned and made for Newnham Murren, crossed Charles Hedges' land, then on to Mongewell Park, swimming across the lake, she then entered the bailiff's house. The Master of the hounds caught her and set her free.

A third hare was then found, she ran straight for the plantation and then on to North and South Stoke, over the hill to the White House at Ipsden, then towards Woodcote, disappearing into Oak's Wood, where the hounds were unable to follow. This run lasted some forty minutes and covered an estimated seven miles. The Master of the hounds said it was the best sport he had in years and the hares deserved to escape.

The absolute terror these hares must have experienced was awful, and although these three hares escaped, they usually didn't and their end doesn't bear thinking about. Thank goodness it is now banned.





Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 9th December.

Present

Cllrs John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Fleur Stevenson and David Rowley and Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer) and Sue Rance (Clerk).

Following advice from the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils in the light of the continuing COVID-19 pandemic, it was decided to delegate authority to enable the clerk to make decisions on behalf of the council in case it cannot meet in person.

Items from the previous meeting

Grundons have delivered daffodil bulbs. Cllr Johnson suggested planting some at the Emery Owen allotments.

Finance

The council agreed the precept (the parish share of the council tax) for 2022-23 should be £42,553. This will keep the amount each resident pays at the current level, but is up £2,948 on last year because of new housing in the parish.

The council agreed its budget for 2022-23, based on income of £142,298 and expenditure of £147,190, resulting in a small deficit at year end of £4,892, which can be covered by reserves.

Payments this month included £300 towards tree planting on the riverside meadows, £100 deposit for the ceilidh band at the Big Jubilee Lunch next June, the final £416.97 payment to Eibe on the playground and £1,380 for grass cutting in October.

P21/S3932/HH 1 Winterbrook Wallingford OX10 9DX New carport and modifications to front entrance gates. Planning permission (not in our parish)

P21/S4223/FUL 'The Sycamores' Land east of 206 Crowmarsh Hill Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BG. Alterations to extant planning permission P20/S0267/FUL (Erection of five dwellings and associated works). The new proposals include habitable rooms in the roof spaces with roof lights and a lower storey for the two semi-detached houses. Siting and other aspects appear the same as the approved plans. Planning permission (since the meeting)

P21/S4578/HH 54 Park View Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BN First floor rear extension over existing. Two-storey extension to rear and side. Single-storey rear extension. Singlestorey side extension. Planning permission (granted since the meeting)

Withdrawn

P20/S0545/FUL The Woodyard Constitution Hill Mongewell. Construction of a single detached dwelling that will re-use the existing building as an ancillary garage/ outbuilding; amenity space provision and associated works. (As amended 21 September and 7 October 2020). (The parish council objected to this application.)

Consultations

P21/S4814/LB 47 The Street Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EA, Replacement of attic bedroom window. Recommended approval but ensure that the new timber-framed unit is double-glazed (option 1).

P21/S4665/FUL Sheringham House Crowmarsh Hill Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BG Removal of existing dwelling and garage. Erection of three detached four bedroomed two storey dwellings. Recommended refusal: (1) demolition of such a recently-built house would be wasteful of materials and the embodied energy in its construction; (2) cramped development for three houses; (3) this is not a suitable site for more dwellings so close to the A4074 road and the Crowmarsh roundabout, where heavy and accelerating traffic produces significant noise and pollution.

P21/S5054/LDP Land to the east of Reading Road Cholsey OX10 9HG Repairs to 15.5m of the river bank, comprising woven willow spiling, backfilled soil and turf (subsequently withdrawn).

P21/S3778/HH Summerlea Cottage Pocock Lane North Stoke OX10 6ET Erection of a bespoke traditional (aluminium frame) ¾ span greenhouse against the side of dwelling. Recommended approval.

Major development

Since the parish council meeting, the District Council's planning committee unanimously approved the Newnham Manor (P16/S3852/ FUL) hybrid planning application for 100 new residential dwellings, with new access road off the A4074 and toucan light-controlled crossing. public open space, pedestrian and cycle connectivity and provision of land for the primary school. The design and layout of this application had been greatly improved by consultation with the Chilterns Conservation Board, Oxfordshire Highways and others. The parish council expects to take on ownership and management of the public open space on this development and to receive a lump sum towards the cost.

Environment and recreation

A Sustainability and Climate Change Policy that had been circulated to councillors was discussed and approved and will be posted on the website.

The council agreed to declare a climate and ecological emergency in recognition of the clear evidence that climate and ecological change represent a threat to the life opportunities and well-being of future generations and need to be addressed at all levels of government.

We recognise that addressing the challenges of climate change will result in many benefits in terms of health, wellbeing and community resilience and so all our future actions and decisions will take account of the need to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and reach net-zero carbon.

The Council supports Oxfordshire County
Council and South Oxfordshire District Council

in their commitments to net-zero carbon, and agreed to support the Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill in parliament, to commit national government too.

Tenders for the pavilion improvements project are due in on 10th December. A contribution from the Parish Council of up to 50% of the costs (£75,000) was approved in a total budget of up to £150,000. It was agreed to apply for a SODC capital grant, which had to be done by 17th December. The Finance Officer and the Clerk are authorised to sign the grant documents and to submit the application. We will also apply in the New Year to the FCC Community Action Fund (previously WREN).

Traffic and transport

A meeting to discuss road safety and noise from motorbikes will be held at Benson on 16th December with the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner Matthew Barber, John Howell MP, and representatives of several parish councils affected by this (see update on the next page).

Next meeting

The council does not meet in January, so the next meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 3 February 2022, starting at 7.30pm. Please contact the parish clerk if you would like to attend.














Parish council update

Representatives from Benson, Shillingford and Warborough, Nuffield and Crowmarsh Parish Councils attended a meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner, Mathew Barber, on 16th December, facilitated by our MP John Howell, to discuss what can be done about the noise and danger caused by motorcycles and cars travelling at excess speeds along the main A4074 and A4130 roads.

There was a strong consensus about the nature of the problem and the need to do something about it. Various ideas are being trialled in adjoining counties, including noise cameras and average speed cameras. Installing an average speed camera system between Nuffield and the Crowmarsh roundabout could cost in excess of £120K.

Mr Barber cannot direct the operational priorities of Thames Valley Police, but he did undertake to ask the Roads Policing team to try a series of operations to target offenders at weekends and evenings when the problem is at its worst. This would be most effective later this year when better weather will exacerbate the problem. Another meeting will be arranged to follow this up.

Citizens Advice information on vanishing energy suppliers

Many people have had the disconcerting experience of seeing their energy supplier break up and go out of business during the recent energy price fluctuations. If you are affected, remember these key facts: first of all, the gas or electricity supply itself won't be interrupted, so don't be concerned about that, and secondly, Ofgem, the industry regulator, will automatically move you to a new supplier. This usually takes a few weeks. Wait for your new supplier to contact you. They will explain what will happen with your new account. But do contact the new supplier yourself if you haven't heard from them within two weeks. You can check on www.citizensadvice.org.uk ("check who's taken over your energy supply") if you're not sure who your new supplier is.

While you're waiting to hear from the new supplier, it's a good idea to take meter readings (and a photo of the readings) and make a note of your account balance too. Keep any old bills you have, as these can help prove your payment history, credit balance or debt. If you aren't happy with your new supplier or tariff, you can switch suppliers. Look at "switch energy supplier" on our website www.citizensadvice.org.uk or ring the Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline on 0808 223 1133.
