

### **Our Neighbourhood Plan**

From the Crowmarsh Parish Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

There are two compelling reasons why we need a neighbourhood plan:

- 1. Crowmarsh Parish has recently been awarded a series of major housing developments that may yet threaten to overwhelm our infrastructure. The neighbourhood plan will help to safeguard us from further speculative planning proposals that aspire to yet more housing development on greenfield sites in the Parish. You have repeatedly told the Parish Council your concerns over further housing development in the area and so no new land is allocated for housing development in the plan. The plan strives to safeguard the countryside and especially the green spaces in and around Crowmarsh Gifford.
- 2. The neighbourhood plan will attract additional funds for projects within the parish. When developers build new houses, they need to pay Local Government a sum of money called the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). This is used to help towards improving facilities to meet the increased burden on infrastructure that any new development might cause. The regulations state that any parish with an adopted neighbourhood plan shall receive 25% of the CIL revenues raised within the parish, while a parish without a neighbourhood plan will only receive 15% of the CIL, subject to a cap of £100 per existing dwelling.

Our neighbourhood plan is currently going through its final inspection stage and will be put to a referendum once it is finalised.

### Horse chestnut tree

The tree at the end of Thames Mead by the bus shelter, a well-loved part of the street scene, and a source of conkers in autumn, is causing serious concern. After a branch fell, the parish council commissioned an expert survey. The conclusions are that we have two options: to fell the tree and replace it, or to carry out major tree surgery to prolong its life.

### Past Times from David Beasley

#### Palm Sunday in Crowmarsh

In April 1982, the Anglican Churches around Crowmarsh held what was becoming an annual procession on Palm Sunday, between Crowmarsh and Wallingford. That year over 150 people took part, with many more lining the route.

Richard Fanstone, a six-year-old boy from Crowmarsh, played the part of Jesus riding a donkey into Jerusalem (in 1982, the donkey was named Annabel).

The procession started at St Mary Magdalene's church, led by the Revd Martin Gillham, Rector of Crowmarsh. It passed up The Street towards Wallingford, over the bridge, where the police were on duty controlling the traffic, and into the Market Place where the Revd Haigh Elches conducted a service. This revived a similar procession that had been held towards the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

### The Vicar writes...

The Crowmarsh Community Café is open again at the Village Hall on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> July, 10.30-12.30pm. This is a great way to meet new neighbours who have recently moved into the parish. Our Family Service on 4<sup>th</sup> July is our annual "Pet Service", when we welcome families to bring their pets with them into church. We thank God for all the joy that they bring to us, and ask his blessing upon them and our relationships with them as part of his creation. Then towards the end of the month, we celebrate Mary Magdalene, in whose name our church is dedicated, with our Patronal Festival on Sunday 18<sup>th</sup> July.

#### An open appeal:

As well as the obvious impact on health and wellbeing, the pandemic will have a lasting impact on finances. 

### Free Covid-19 testing kits

To help reduce Covid-19 risks to everyone at school, their families and contacts, parents and others in households of school children can use the free twice-weekly home testing kits for those without symptoms.

Home lateral flow test kits can be delivered to your door, so you can test yourself and your family without leaving your home. You can also get them from pharmacies.

It is understood that 1 in 3 people do not have any symptoms but can still pass it on.

You can order 1 pack of home test kits containing 7 tests from www.gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests. Your tests should arrive within 2 days.

Do not use a rapid lateral flow test if you have coronavirus symptoms: get a PCR test and self-isolate.

## From our MP — John Howell writes ...

I know from mail received, that many of you were hoping to see all COVID restrictions removed this month and will be disappointed that the date has been pushed back to 19th July. In recent weeks there has been growing unease at lifting all restrictions on the proposed June date. The Delta variant is a serious concern and the advice from experts was that we should wait a little longer until the vaccine has been offered to all adults.

Whilst I am amongst those very much looking forward to all restrictions being removed, there is some sense in waiting just a little longer. Looking at the situation in Oxfordshire, while cases may have gone up 6-fold, the numbers of hospitalisations and deaths have not. This shows the importance of vaccination. There is also an inherent fairness that every adult should be offered the opportunity of vaccination before all restrictions are lifted.

We have to remember that when the Prime Minister announced the Roadmap to Recovery, the dates were the earliest at which each stage would be introduced and not finite dates. We must take the long view, get everyone vaccinated and do all we can to avoid restrictions having to be imposed again later in the year.

As we carefully and cautiously continue our journey out of lockdown, we must be mindful that the coronavirus outbreak continues to affect all of us, but especially unpaid carers, who have been supporting relatives, friends and loved ones who may be disabled, ill or elderly. Carers must be recognised for the difficulties they are experiencing, respected for all they are doing, and provided with information and support to keep themselves- and those around them - safe and well. Yet, a lack of awareness of carers and the physical and mental cost of caring persists. Throughout the pandemic we have worked to support all unpaid carers, including young carers, who have the added pressures of work, schooling and their own health and wellbeing issues to manage. This has included making carers a priority group for Covid-19 testing and vaccination and asking local authorities to identify unpaid carers and support them. We have provided funding to the Carers Trust to support unpaid carers experiencing loneliness during the pandemic and to Carers UK's helplines, information and support services. Carers make an incredible contribution to the life of this country. Together, we must support their wellbeing, help them achieve their life goals and create more carer friendly communities – making caring more visible and valued. Supporting our carers supports us all – thank you.

## A new future for the Chilterns AONB

On 24 June 2021 Natural England published its ambitious new Landscape Designation Programme, part of broader Government plans aimed at delivering better outcomes for nature, landscapes and people.

As part of this programme, Natural England will explore a 'boundary extension' to the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), taking into account an application made by the Chilterns Conservation Board in 2013 and proposals set out in the independent Landscapes Review (the "Glover Review"), commissioned by the Government.

Natural England has also announced plans to work with the Chilterns Conservation Board, local authorities and other stakeholders to consider new management and governance to support improved conservation, understanding and enjoyment of the Chilterns landscape.

The Chilterns AONB (which includes most of our parish outside the built-up village of Crowmarsh Gifford) extends north and west through Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire and is home to many vibrant and growing communities.

An extension to the AONB would provide direct access to high-quality natural environments from urban areas such as Luton, Hemel Hempstead and Slough. Newly-designated protected land would give people living in these areas greater opportunities to access to the countryside, to benefit from the tranquillity it provides and to get away from the pressures of everyday life. It could also contribute to the Government's "30 by 30" target to protect 30% of the UK's land by 2030.

This announcement is equally important for Chilterns' wildlife and habitats, with its globally rare chalk streams, wildflower-rich chalk

grassland and prehistoric settlements (including Bronze and Iron Age hillforts).

Dr Elaine King, Chief Executive Officer at the Chilterns Conservation Board, said: "This is an exciting chapter in our history, which will help bring more people closer to nature and increase opportunities for recreation and enjoyment of this special landscape. We are also excited at the opportunity to explore new and innovative approaches by which we can tackle the impacts of climate change, reverse declines in nature, support our local businesses and improve people's wellbeing and access to our special landscapes. This is even more important as we all work to recover from the impacts of the Covid pandemic."

The Chilterns Conservation Board (CCB) looks forward to working with Natural England, local authorities and others to help address the huge challenges facing the Chilterns landscape and improving its resilience for nature and people.

The proposal to redesignate the Chilterns AONB as a National Park continues to be an option supported by the CCB, but no decision will be made until the Government has considered fully and responded to the recommendations in the Landscapes Review, as this may have implications for what it means to be a National Park.

### Nature-based citizen science

Do you stop to listen to birdsong or watch the behaviour of an insect? Spending time in nature is good, but research suggests the quality of the engagement is more important than the length of time taken.

Nature-based citizen science makes a valuable contribution to research, but it could also be beneficial to your wellbeing!
