

The Crowmarsh Parish Neighbourhood Plan 2021-2035

From the Crowmarsh Parish Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group

A big thank you to all who voted in the referendum on Thursday 2nd September and overwhelmingly supported the Crowmarsh Parish Neighbourhood Plan.

96.6% voted in favour: 374 yes, 13 no. The turnout was 28.3%.

Garden Bins

SODC's garden waste collections are now re-starting after SODC and Biffa agreed a temporary arrangement.

Garden bins will be emptied every four weeks but you can put out twice as much garden waste as normal. The extra waste should be in a cardboard box, old compost or bin bag.

Customers' brown bins will be emptied on the same day of the week as normal. Collections in North Stoke start on Thursday 7th October and in Crowmarsh Gifford on Tuesday 19th October

To make up for the disruption to the service the council will be extending customers' current subscription to the service by three months – they will do this by delaying the collection of the customers' next Direct Debit payments by three months.

Any residents who do not wish to renew their current subscription will continue to receive garden waste collections for three months after the subscription was originally due to end.

SODC are sending out letters and emails to their garden waste customers explaining the situation in more detail, along with a copy of the temporary timetable.

This temporary arrangement will be reviewed at the end of October to see if it is possible to resume normal service.

Food waste collections will continue to take place weekly, and recycling and rubbish collections will continue to take place fortnightly as normal.

From John Howell, MP

It is just over 10 years since I started to write a monthly newsletter to parishes. Out of curiosity over the summer I looked back at some of the early issues. For a few months I ran a little mini-series at the end of my newsletters seeking to answer questions that were frequently asked about the work of an MP and the workings of parliament. Such questions are still regularly asked as people take a new or different interest in politics and so I thought it might be worth revisiting some of the questions in the coming months.

An overarching question asked of many MPs by people of all ages, and one frequently asked on school visits, is what does an MP do?

There is no job description, and each MP has to work out the best way to pursue the role for themselves. Indeed an MP may change the way in which they work over the years as issues and needs change.

The last 18 months have forced some changes in working patterns and some forced changes have proved to be for the better. For example, I intend to continue doing my advice surgeries virtually as this has proved to be very popular. With the geographical size of the constituency, people often had to travel long distances for a relatively short meeting. The ease of access which virtual meetings has offered has been welcomed. They reduce the need for travel and can save constituents a considerable amount of time. Working this way can also enable me to reduce the waiting time for an appointment.

The main task for an MP is to consider and propose new laws as well as raise issues relating to the constituency or constituents. This is not always easy as contentious and divisive issues are often debated with several differing views. These tend to be the issues that the media is quick to pick on. For my part I think it is important to listen to different views and to weigh up arguments. I am happy to have robust but polite debate, but an MP is not a delegate and in the end, as with the rest of my colleagues, I have to make my own judgement on how I respond on any particular issue. With a Party-political system it will be no

surprise that an MP on the whole supports the Party on whose manifesto they stood for election.

For the most part an MP's time is divided between working in Parliament, representing parliament elsewhere (as I do at the Council of Europe), and working in their constituency. When Parliament is sitting, MPs are generally expected to be in Westminster from Monday to Thursday and so time in the constituency is limited. Outside of sitting weeks there is more time for constituency meetings and visits. I am looking forward to the forthcoming recess when I will be meeting in person representatives from several of the 85 Parish Councils and Parish Meetings across the constituency. Something that has not been possible for some time now.

When in Westminster, every day brings competing demands on an MP's time. Days can include time spent scrutinising legislation, attending debates, ministerial question sessions, committees, briefings and other meetings, and also responding to correspondence. There is also a hierarchy of demand in that the business of the House must come first and when asked to sit on a Bill Committee to scrutinise the detail of a particular Bill this is expected to take precedence over other things. These competing demands mean that it is not always possible to attend a particular debate or drop-in session that someone may ask me to attend, although I do try to fit in as much as I can each week.

It is often thought that an MP sits at the top of a hierarchy of Government and has power to direct local councils. This is not the case.

Although local councils are required to conform with central government policy, within this they are fully autonomous, and MPs do not have any jurisdiction over local council decisions. Thus the primary focus of questions that MPs raise will be relating to Parliament and the work of Government departments such as the NHS, HM Revenue and Customs, and the Department of Work and Pensions. These questions may arise from an MP's own concerns or may be on behalf of constituents. Questions can be formal written or oral questions; however, I have found that it is often better to discuss issues privately with

Ministers. With local issues MPs can write to councils on behalf of a constituent, and this is something that I often do. However, there are locally elected representatives to these councils who should really be the first point of contact for council issues. I will write more about this in a later newsletter.



The Vicar writes... A Time for Action?

There has been enough talk about climate change for everyone to realise that it is bad for us and our planet, and a potential disaster for our grandchildren. We cannot continue with our existing consumer lifestyles and assume that economies will continue to grow at the expense of our planet's limited resources - this is simply not sustainable. Change is needed and COP26 is critical.

Whether you agree with the direct methods taken by "Insulate Britain" in blocking the M25 or not (personally I don't), we cannot just keep kicking the ball down the road, as demonstrated by our fragile gas supplies and being held to ransom by Putin's Russian pipelines.

Ironically, the pandemic has demonstrated that international air travel and package holidays are not essential and that we can live without them. Perhaps our greatest strength as humans is our ability to adapt, although sadly this is not an option for the many species that are becoming extinct as their natural habitats are lost, whether forest or coral reef.

As I write this, there are fears that meat may be missing from our supermarket shelves due to a shortage of CO2 used during packaging and we may be forced to move to a more vegetarian (or "flexitarian") diet. Although the CO2 released as we open a meat wrapper is minuscule compared to the loss of rainforest for producing soya for chicken feed and grazing for cattle, even a small change to our diet will make an enormous difference - check out the www.meatfreemondays.com website to see more.

Back in March last year, I blogged about my own experience of trying to switch to an electric vehicle (see http://revkevbeer.blogspot.com/2020/03/practical-green-motoring.html). In this and many other areas, compromises are needed, so a hybrid solution is perhaps the best solution. But the main thing in this Harvest month, is that we learn to appreciate God's bountiful provision for us with a spirit of gratitude rather than exploitation.

Matters brought forward

Horse chestnut tree: It was agreed to accept the lowest of four quotes and to select Bowards to carry out surgery on the tree at the end of Thames Mead.

Noise from motorcycles: Copies of the letter to the Police & Crime Commissioner, Matthew Barber, will be emailed to District and County Councillors, John Howell MP and local parish council clerks.

A traffic speed survey is in place close to the crossroads in North Stoke and we have asked for another near The Springs. Another is in The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford, in connection with proposed pedestrian crossings.

Following the parish council's letter to Greene King about the future of The Bell, it was reported that they intend to refurbish the pub and reopen during 2022.

A site meeting was planned for 16th September to look at how to improve Watery Lane, which provides an off-road link between Wallingford and the Ridgeway National Trail.

A 2-storey house would be obtrusive (all the nearby backland developments are bungalows), the access road is a walking route to school, and a 2-storey building may impact on the setting of the Queen's Head (listed building).

P21/S3534/HH 5 Carmel Terrace, Mongewell OX10 8BX.

Two-storey side extension to dwelling. Window alterations to the Eastern elevation. Resubmission of P20/S3059/HH. Recommended approval.

P21/S3395/HH Archgate, The Street, North Stoke OX10 6BL.

Removal of three existing 1960s windows and make good reveals. Remove a bay window and block in with brickwork and stonewalling to match the adjacent farm buildings. Replace the three windows with newly painted hardwood frames. Infill one brick recess with local flint stonewalling to match the adjacent farm buildings and the bay window infill above. Recommended approval, subject to hand-built flint walling (permission now granted).

P21/S3465/HH Old School House, Constitution Hill, Mongewell OX10 8BS. Enlargement to existing dwellinghouse and annexe; creation of outdoor swimming pool and erection of new garden store. No objection.

P21/S3392/HH Rose Cottage, 65 The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EF. Erection of a carport (not adjoining the property). Recommended refusal because of the visual impact on The Street.

Neighbourhood plan

The referendum was held on Thursday 2nd September and 96.6% voted in favour: 374 yes, 13 no. The turnout was 28.3%. Thanks were expressed to Nick Robins and the team for this success and also to all who voted.

Finance

Payments made included salaries and expenses, annual inspection of the play area, grass cutting in July and August and replacement of the pavilion sewage pump.

Environment and recreation

CCTV is to be installed at the pavilion in September. The draft CCTV policy was accepted, to be revised for adoption at the October meeting.

It was agreed not to continue further Zoono treatments after 20th October. Three quotes have been received for replacement lighting on the hard court and GA's quote of £3550 was accepted.

The parish council is inviting people to come forward to help run a jubilee lunch (proposed for Sunday 5th June 2022) to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Please see the article on page 4 and contact the clerk if you would like to be involved.

We also hope to participate in tree planting as part of the Queen's Green Canopy, and the chairman attended a preliminary meeting with Wallingford Town Council and others about this project. We also hope to plant trees on the riverside meadows, plus one on the recreation ground in memory of a local resident.

Traffic and transport

Verges on the B4009 at North Stoke are being damaged by large agricultural vehicles and it was decided to write to the contractor.

How well do you really know Crowmarsh?

Old postcards of Crowmarsh can be quite fascinating, and in the absence of David Beasley's *Past Times* this month, we thought we would show one that dates from the early

years of the 20th century. Many of the buildings in this picture are still recognisable today, but they have changed. Can you work out where the photographer was standing?



Who remembers Bowden & Sons?

Anyone who has ever written anything for publication will know how annoying it is to discover some new vital fact while the material is going through the printing process. In the case of a book, published in this country but printed in China, the opportunity to make a correction before publication date falls to zero.

Exactly this happened to me recently. I had written a book about coachwork on Rolls-Royce cars in the 1920s and 1930s, and one of the coachbuilders about whom I needed to make comments was Bowden & Sons of Wallingford.

Easier said than done! After some pretty exhaustive enquiries, I ended up writing that "there is no hard information about Bowden & Sons." I had found nothing – not even an indication of where in Wallingford their works might have been.

Once the page layouts were safely shipped off

to China, the inevitable happened. I turned up a reference to a Bowden & Sons who used to occupy the site that now belongs to Colliers, just at the foot of Wallingford Bridge on the Crowmarsh side.

This is highly unlikely to be a coincidence. Though it's too late for the book (which will be published in a month or so), I would nevertheless love to know who Bowden & Sons were and what their main business was. I'm sure they were not primarily coachbuilders; maybe they were a carpentry and joinery business?

For what it's worth, they built just two bodies for Rolls-Royce chassis. One was a Tourer on a 1924 Twenty model, and the other was a Saloon, completed in 1931 on a 20/25 model. Both were built for the same customer, who was a resident of Ipsden and was the son of the famous Victorian Irish songwriter James Lynam Molloy.
