### **Ipsden Music at the Barn**



#### The Vicar writes ...

July brings our Patronal Festival, which we celebrate this year on Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> July, this being nearest to the Feast Day of Saint St Mary Magdalene which falls on 22<sup>th</sup> July. As well as celebrating our patron saint, we celebrate our life together as a church family in our worship and witness. Mary Magdalene has many mistaken traditions associated with her, but what is certain from the four gospels is that she was one of the women who witnessed both Jesus' death on the cross and also his resurrection from the dead. She told this good news to Jesus' disciples and so became known as "the apostle to the apostles". I hope that our church is known for continuing this joyful spreading of the Gospel almost two millennia on.

One way we do this is by Christening babies and infants into our community of faith and confirming adults in these same baptismal promises. This month we welcome Percy and Elizabeth who will be baptised at the Family Service, and we continue to host adults exploring the Christian faith to St Mary's in Wallingford at 6.45pm on Wednesday evenings throughout July, with the option of confirmation when the Bishop next visits (provisionally set for the last Sunday in August). It is not too late to join.

One popular objection to faith is that science has made it obsolete – personally I think that they answer fundamentally different questions, i.e. Science's "How?" as opposed to Faith's "Why?" and we need the best answers for both. But don't take my word for it because we are privileged to welcome the Revd Jen Brown as our guest preacher on 17<sup>th</sup> July. Jen has experience as a Science Missioner in our area, having studied the relationship between science and faith which she combines in her own life. Come and hear some of her answers to those who might think that science disproves faith.

### **News from Howbery Park**

#### Fire crews train in HR Wallingford facilities

HR Wallingford welcomed Oxfordshire Fire and Rescue Service to Howbery Park to host its water rescue training.

The firefighters spent a week in one of our basins, which are more usually used for global engineering projects. We generated waves to simulate flooding and open water conditions.

The service has previously used a number of open natural water courses such as lakes and rivers to train their crews in a wide range of environments that they are likely to encounter on emergency calls. However, with the increased risk of flooding in urban environments, the use of our facilities meant that conditions could be replicated to the service's specifications in order safely to carry out the training in a single location with a clean water source.

Their training covered two broad categories. The first was rescuing people or animals who have got into difficulty in water. The second was firefighter safety in and around water, teaching crews what to do in the event they fall in at an incident and need to rescue themselves.

One of the exercises carried out in the basin was to maroon a vehicle in the water and place a 'casualty' in it, who was then rescued by the crews. This simulated people being caught in a flash flood, a situation where it is extremely difficult to anticipate the depth and flow of flood water.

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

#### **Parish Council notes**

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 9th June. Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Julian Park, Liz Ryall, Fleur Stevenson, Jay Anderson, Julia Streete, David Rowley and David Topliss, and Parish Clerk Sue Rance. District Councillor Andrea Powell attended part of the meeting. There were apologies for absence from Cllr Stuart Soames, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet, District Cllr Cooper and County Cllr Bloomfield.

#### Matters arising from the May meeting

Thanks were expressed to Cllr Rowley for organising the Big Jubilee Lunch event on 5th June, and to Cllr Streete and the Clerk for their help. Jubilee mugs have been distributed to children in the parish and all those attending the primary school. Please let the parish clerk know if any children under 12 have not yet received one.

#### **Finance**

The council agreed a grant of £250 to Home-Start Southern Oxfordshire.

FCC has agreed to pay £67,238.74 towards the pavilion improvements, subject to meeting the necessary conditions. This was the full amount the parish council applied for. Thanks go to David Rowley and Sue Rance for their work on the application.

Payments agreed included £320 for games at the jubilee lunch, £650 for the barn dance band, £350 for the jazz band and just over £500 for other expenses. The Cubs and

Beavers will retain the £235.80 raised by them at the event. Other payments included salaries and expenses, £166.39 for dog bin emptying, £297.34 for lawnmower service, £300 for audit fees, £280.80 for geraniums for flower tubs in Crowmarsh Gifford, £1165.50 to Scofell for grass cutting and nettle spraying in the nature area.

#### Consultation

P22/S1705/FUL Former Council Offices, Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EE. Change of use of land for a grounds maintenance depot consisting of the siting of 5 shipping containers for storage, provision of a welfare unit, fuel storage and skip area. The application site is just part of the car park and described as a temporary storage compound. Recommend temporary approval for a maximum of 3 years.

# Public open space on the Newnham Manor development

The parish council wishes to take on the management of all the public open space at the Newnham Manor development for the benefit of the community and to ask for a commuted sum towards its maintenance as part of the

legal agreement with the developers. The chairman will contact the planning officer to negotiate an amount.

#### **District Council report**

A new round of Councillor grants is now open: each District Councillor has £5000 this year and grants will be awarded in two tranches.

Water quality status is to be applied for at 'Wallingford Beach' just by the bridge as part of the District Council's bathing water project. This will involve recruiting volunteers to take regular measurements. Cllr Ryall reported on safety issues here that were also discussed in the River Users Group.

#### **County Council report**

The marking of double yellow lines in Stephens Field is complete. The closure of the old access road to the Riverside Park will now be referred to SODC and OCC for action.

#### Code of conduct

A new model code of conduct for all councillors had been received. It was agreed to adopt this as the parish council's code of conduct. There is an emphasis on respect and courtesy and it aims to increase public confidence in local government.

#### **Environment and recreation**

The parish council received an update on the pavilion improvement project and the successful grant applications. The building work is due to start in June and arrangements for monitoring the work will be discussed by the committee.

#### **Traffic and transport**

A letter about motorcycle nuisance has been sent to John Howell MP and copied to Thames Valley Police, the Police and Crime Commissioner as well as neighbouring parish councils and others. It was agreed to ask for a speed survey to be carried out on the A4130 Henley road as well as the other locations already asked for. The parish council will ask Lee Turner of County Highways to attend a site visit with our County Councillor to discuss a number of highway issues.

Cllr Sherbourne will circulate a list of issues to councillors for approval before it goes to the County Council.

Feedback from the Annual Parish Meeting

Matters raised by the public at the annual meeting at the Pavilion on Thursday 26th May were considered and will be taken forward by the parish, county and district councils. Thames Water representatives were questioned extensively and several outstanding issues will need to be addressed further.

#### **Next meeting**

The next parish council meeting will be held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 7th July, starting at 7.30pm. Please let the parish clerk and chairman know if you would like to attend.

# **COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Study**

A new study on different options for a third dose COVID-19 booster vaccination in young people aged 12 to 15 has begun recruiting at the Churchill Hospital, Oxford. The University of Oxford-led Com-COV 3 study, supported by the National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR), aims to recruit 380 volunteers across nine UK sites.

All will have received two doses of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine, at least three months before joining. Researchers will deliver a third dose as part of the study. Participants will be randomly allocated to receive a full dose of the Novavax vaccine or a full, one-third or child dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. A control group will receive a meningitis vaccine followed by a Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine later in the study.

Participants will not know which vaccine they receive until three months later. Researchers will analyse the immune system responses and any side effects to these new vaccine combinations. They will also examine if a one-third adult dose is as good as a full child dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine.

The study investigators anticipate reporting initial results in 2022. The UK's regulatory body, the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA), rigorously assess the safety and efficacy of any new vaccine before considering market authorisation and subsequent rollout to patients.

The Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) provides expert guidance to UK health departments on vaccination, which takes into account a range of evidence, including data from trials undertaken to understand the immunological impact of booster vaccinations.

#### John Howell MP writes...

When I wrote last month we were anticipating the Jubilee Weekend and the celebrations that were planned. Whilst the weather wasn't quite what we might have hoped, from what I hear celebrations around the constituency went well. The national celebrations were certainly a credit to all of the planning, and it was lovely to see the Her Majesty the Queen at her public appearances. I think tea with Paddington Bear was one of the favourite events and shows that even in her 90th decade Her Majesty still has a great sense of humour. The Jubilee weekend was a great opportunity for community events and a chance to get together after so much separation in recent times.

Sometimes it is good to do something different and in May I did something else that I have not done before - I joined thousands of other people across the country in the Big Plastic Count. It was an interesting exercise where you have to count the single use plastic you throw away over a 7-day period. Some of the time I was at home, at others I was in the office or away. Overall I was quite shocked at just how much single-use plastic I get through in the different settings. The office is pretty good with glass replacing plastic water bottles and corn-starch wrapping used for many documents that are sent to me. But I was quite taken aback at just how much single use plastic there still is for food products. Clearly some of this is avoidable and the exercise certainly raised the profile of the need for us to cut back further. The Government Resources and Waste Strategy set out plans to reduce, reuse and recycle and was a step in the right direction. A promising start on which we are now building.

For some people the half term break was an opportunity to get away and I know that many people have been caught up in the backlog of passport applications. During the pandemic, around five million people delayed applying for or renewing their passports which has led to huge demand now that international travel has opened up. My team has been helping as best we are able and where the need to travel cannot have been anticipated, or where the delay in an application being processed has been longer than the advertised time, we have been able to assist some people. The Home Office has been doing all that it can to increase output and it does seem that the situation is

beginning to ease. Staff have been working 7 days a week and additional staff have been recruited. I understand that between January and March 2022, over 90 per cent of cases were completed within six weeks. However if you are planning to travel and need to apply for or renew a passport please do so as soon as possible and do not rely on being able to get a fast- track appointment as these are like gold dust. The official guidance is still to allow up to 10 weeks to get a passport. There is little that my team can do with late applications.

Another thing to watch out for are the new barcoded postage stamps. Royal Mail has introduced these new stamps as part of their drive to improve operational efficiencies and security. If you have bought stamps recently you may have noticed the change with the addition of a barcode alongside the image of the Queen's head. If you have a stock of stamps you can still use them until the end of January 2023. If you cannot use your stock before then you can swap them for new ones. Full details are available on the Royal Mail website under the heading 'Reinventing stamps for the next generations.' The change only applies to the regular stamps with the profile of the Queen's head on and not the special stamps such as Christmas stamps.

In any month a wide range of issues are raised with me from things in the general media to specialist issues. With the help of my team I do my best to respond to all polite correspondence but sometimes it may take a while, especially if an issue needs research.
