The Vicar writes ...

We have a double reason to celebrate at our Family Service this month as Pentecost falls on the Jubilee weekend.

Look on any coin any you will find the Queen's Head and also some initials "DG REG FD": this is shortened from 'Dei Gratia Regina' which is Latin for 'By the Grace of God, Queen'. But for us in the church, the second part is equally important: the FD or "FID DEF" stands for 'Fidei Defensor' which is also a Latin phrase and means 'Defender of the Faith', which reflects the Queen's position as Supreme Governor of the Church of England.

Even if you can't come to church, I invite you to take a coin in your hand and to take a moment to reflect on her reign over these past 70 years and her powerful witness. As she said in one of her many Christmas messages: "For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none."

Then we have the "golden anniversary" of Pentecost (meaning 'fiftieth' or fifty days of celebration), which has its roots in the Jewish Feast of Weeks, which was completed on the fiftieth day after Passover. On the fiftieth day of Easter, God sends his Holy Spirit to empower the Church to perform the mission which the risen Christ has shared with us: sharing the good news in all languages. Pentecost celebrates both the Holy Spirit and the Christian Church. It was originally the crown and completion of the Easter season. The time of Pentecost became a regular occasion for baptism in early Christian centuries, and the services of Pentecost also reflect this baptismal theme. Christ's disciples are born again of water and the spirit.

For anyone wishing to know more about baptism and confirmation, from 15th June we will be hosting introductory sessions on Wednesday evenings (6.45pm -7.45pm at St Mary's church in Wallingford). All are welcome to attend and to ask questions, so contact me if you would like to know more.

Wallingford Museum is planning some

really exciting events to offer our visitors through the summer months. The museum is in Flint House in the High Street, next to Wallingford Library, opposite the Kine Croft.

As usual the Museum will join in the National Festival of Archaeology, organised by the Council for British Archaeology, with a family hands-on archaeology day.

Citizens Advice

In March the Office for National Statistics reported that approximately 1.7 million people in the UK were experiencing self-

reported long Covid. Over half of these had symptoms such as fatigue, loss of sense of smell and difficulty breathing, for at least a year. This can have a far-reaching impact. There is ongoing research into long Covid as so much is still unknown, and new groups are forming to provide information and mutual support.

In the short term, if you are employed and ill, sick pay may be available. See the information at <u>www.citizensadvice.org.uk</u> if you think you are not receiving the correct amount. If your income has dropped, an online benefit calculator will show whether you may be entitled to additional financial help, such as Universal Credit, Council Tax Reduction and Personal Independence Payment (PIP). Details of how to claim benefits, including contact numbers, are on our website. An unexpected drop in income means that debts can quickly mount up and it is better to take action to manage the situation sooner rather

than later. You can talk to an adviser on our debt helpline: 0800 240 4420. There is also a link to webchat in the debt section of our website. If you are being dismissed from work due to long-term illness, there is also advice on our website, or you can speak to an adviser by phoning Adviceline: 0808 278 7907.

Benson Garden Club

Benson Garden Club's May talk, "Propagation and Planting Techniques" at Purely Plants was given by Andy Ledbury. Beginning with sowing seeds, Andy gave us a practical demonstration on how to do it right. First, you should always break up the compost as there are likely to be lumps. Then fill the tray two thirds full, smooth the compost flat, water it with a rose on the watering can and leave for 20 minutes to soak.

You are then ready to sow your seeds and cover with a vermiculite layer of the correct depth. The next part seems quite tricky because for germination you need a constant temperature – too cold and it prohibits germination or causes "damping off". You then have to wait for your first pair of "true" leaves, before you plant on.

When you transplant your seedlings, Andy explained that it is useful to cover them with fleece initially, to reduce the shock of the roots being suddenly exposed to the air. You get a healthier plant if you plant on in stages, so leave 2 to 4 weeks before potting on again.

Andy's talk provided a wealth of practical information and tips. I particularly took note of Andy's instruction that you should never firm the compost down – roots need air, so keeping air cavities in the soil structure are important. And there I was thinking I was tucking in my plants nice and snug!

We have now finished our series of speakers for the year and will re-start in October, with our first talk to be given by Nick Bailey, the TV gardening presenter and garden designer.

Changes to early years foundation stage provision at Crowmarsh

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at North Stoke village hall on Thursday 5 May following a site visit to the North Stoke recreation ground.

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames, Julian Park, Liz Ryall, David Rowley, Fleur Stevenson, Julia Streete, Dr Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer), District Councillor Andrea Powell and two members of the public. Apologies for absence: Councillors Anderson and Topliss, Parish Clerk Sue Rance and County Councillor Bloomfield.

Cllr Griffin was elected as Chair and Cllr Sherbourne as Vice-Chair for 2022-2023. Members of the Environment and Recreation Ground Committee and the Traffic and Transport Committee were re-elected.

Matters arising from the April meeting

Grass cutting arrangements are in place, with Chris Strange contracted to mow the recreation ground and The Landscape Group the verges and open spaces, but Newnham Murren churchyard had not yet been cut: Cottrells were asked to start this immediately.

The Clerk has contacted Greene King about their plans to refurbish and re-open The Bell and a reply is awaited. A new flagpole is being erected at the Pavilion. Geraniums are on order for the flower tubs at the Queen's Head roundabout and in The Street.

The Clerk has contacted County Councillor Bloomfield about reinstating the gate at the end of Old Reading Road. The gate and adjacent fence were erected in the 1980s when the road was closed: the land is thought to be still owned by Oxfordshire Highways.

Finance

The council agreed a grant of £660 to North Stoke Parochial Church Council for grass cutting at North Stoke church and pound and up to £100 towards the Mongewell Jubilee party, on receipt of invoices.

The internal audit report 2021-22 was reviewed. There were no concerns about any of the internal control objectives. The annual governance statement 2021/22 and the accounting statements for the annual return (certified by the RFO) were completed and approved. The accounts and audit statement will be available for public inspection from 6th June to 15th July, and notices will be posted.

Payments agreed included £1062 for 300 jubilee mugs, £166.39 for monthly dog bin emptying, £180 for repairs to the smoke and fire alarm in the pavilion and £114 for installing the new flagpole.

The Finance Officer reported that all allotment invoices had been paid. The council registered a vote of thanks to Yvonne Peet for her work in completing the audit.

In view of the size of the proposed extension and the lack of information, such as a design statement to justify the substantially changed appearance, it was agreed that we should ask our district councillors to consider calling it in to committee for decision if it is recommended for approval.

District Council report

The District Councillor reported on the Homes for Ukraine Scheme: 550 Ukrainian refugees are now living in the district in more than 200 households.

Proposals for the former SODC office site in Benson Lane are still being drawn up and the Parish Council will be kept informed and consulted.

The District Councillors' report had been circulated. The council has a policy of no-mow May to allow wildflowers to grow and support pollinating insects.

County Council report

The marking of double yellow lines in Stephens Field had just begun. A donation of £1000 from the County Councillor's fund will support Crowmarsh School's Forest School project. Highway matters remain a high public priority.

Review of strategic priorities

North Stoke recreation ground was added to the list of priorities for infrastructure spending, which also includes pavilion improvements, pedestrian crossings, improvements to the surface of Watery Lane and tree planting. It was noted that the first tranche of community infrastructure (CIL) money received from developers has to be spent by 2024.

Environment and recreation

The parish council received an update on the pavilion improvement project. The grant of $\pounds73,016$ from SODC had been confirmed and an additional grant application has been submitted to FCC. An asbestos test will be carried out at the pavilion before building work starts, expected to be in June.

Following a site visit it was agreed that North Stoke recreation ground needs immediate action to maintain this facility for public use. Local residents will be consulted but the decision is the council's as trustee of this open space. Cllrs Stevenson and Streete will prepare an online survey as well as a written form for North Stoke and Mongewell. Cllr Stevenson will investigate rabbit control, which is a statutory requirement.

Thames Water sewerage work at Newnham Farm is planned to be completed by October.

Traffic and transport

The council has applied to OCC for 20mph zones in residential streets in the parish and will gauge public support (see below). A member of the public expressed his interest in pedestrian safety and introducing 'living streets' (www.livingstreets.org.uk).

Noise nuisance from motorcycles continues. A speed and noise survey is required to take the matter further and the Clerk has sent a further reminder to OCC Highways about the speed surveys requested on the A4074 (Portway) but no response has been received. We will write again to John Howell MP and to the police and crime commissioner.

Next meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting, the opportunity for all electors to hear reports and raise any issues or questions, will be held at the Pavilion on Thursday 26th May at 7pm with reports from the police, county and district councilors and Thames Water.

John Howell MP wites...

On 10th May we had the State Opening of Parliament. This is a formal occasion which marks the start of the parliamentary year. It is a ceremonial event at which the 'Queen's Speech' is read from the throne in the House of Lords. The Speech is written by the Government and contains an outline of its policies and proposed legislation for the forthcoming parliamentary session, so it is effectively the agenda for the year.

All new legislation coming before parliament is, of course, important and different Bills will be more or less important to different people. I am particularly pleased to see the new Planning Bill in the list which it was said in the Queen's Speech, will give residents more involvement in local development. I know that there are a number of concerns over the current planning legislation that are widely shared, and I will be looking to see the impact of proposed change.

The Health and Social Care Bill is also good to see. The need for better integration between health and social care is well documented and the experience of many constituents bears out the need. For our younger people I am pleased to see that there will be some reform to education, especially in further and higher education. This will bring greater flexibility into further education making it more readily available for everyone.

I know from correspondence that many will be pleased to see the Animal Welfare (Sentience) Bill in the list. These are just a few from the long list of Bills, 38 in total, coming forward. I know that many people will have views on the different pieces of legislation, and I look forward to sharing thoughts going forward.

I am sure there are many people who, like me are looking forward to the celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. Whatever your view of monarchy there is no doubt that the Queen has served our country, and the Commonwealth nations, in an exemplary way over her long reign, and it is good to have reason to celebrate together.

I am also sure that there are many people who share my concern over the Queen's health. Her Majesty is, of course, a good age but let us hope, and where we are able pray, for her health so that she can truly celebrate her life of dedication and service. Whatever you are planning in your community, I send you my best wishes for a good celebration. I would also like to thank all those in our communities who work hard on behalf of everyone else – those who serve on parish councils, those who run the many voluntary and charitable organisations and those who on their own, perhaps behind the scenes, support other people. It is all of this work that makes a community, and it is good to read about it month by month in local publications.

On the world stage the war in Ukraine sadly continues and it is a worry as to what Russia will do next. You may have seen that I was sanctioned by Russia. As you may have seen in the media Ukraine is thankful for the support that we have been giving. Here the response to support Ukrainians has been great whether seeking to offer refuge to people or help in many other ways. After some initial teething problems the visa processing is settling down and over three-quarters of visas have now been granted. In some cases there have been complications due to a variety of reasons and my team has been very active in helping to assist where possible. There are some problems in rural areas where plans have fallen through as most of the people seeking refuge are from Ukrainian cities and would prefer to be in a city or town. I have also been told that many are applying for visas as a back up but for now prefer to stay in the region, which is quite understandable.

News from Howbery Park

Hedgehogs form spine of biodiversity scheme

We are thrilled to be focusing on making our grounds hedgehog friendly this year, as our third year working on the Nurture Biodiversity Scheme. We've got to work already, installing six new houses for hedgehogs, built for us by the Men's Shed charity plus another built by head gardener Ben on site. We've also put British Hedgehog Preservation Society (BHPS) stickers on our strimmers to remind the gardeners to check for hedgehogs before using them – as strimmers are often to blame for hedgehog injuries. We'll also be checking to ensure that they have a plentiful food supply in the park and safe corridors to travel through it. Our initiatives will be working towards criteria set out by Nurture Landscapes and the BHPS.



"Hedgehogs need support as their numbers have been dwindling over the years," Nurture's Biodiversity Manager Simon Blackley explained. "Their numbers dropped by about 70 per cent from the 1970s to the 1990s, and a further half of the population of native hedgehogs were lost from the British countryside over the last two decades. There are thought to be various reasons for their decline over the last decades: the removal of hedges from fields, a drop in the number of insects that they eat, and the combined use of pesticides, fertilizers and fungicides. Plastic litter is harmful to them too."
