Benson Garden Club

For Benson Garden Club's February talk, we were treated to Ben Pope sharing with us how to grow and display our own cut flowers. As Head Gardener for a private garden, with a walled garden containing 36 raised cut flower beds, we may have been daunted by the prospect of replicating Ben's beautiful all-yearround home-grown flower arrangements. His gorgeous flower arrangements ranged from spectacular displays to simple posies or just a few stems in a vase, all stunningly beautiful. However, Ben's enthusiasm for why we should attempt it was engaging - cut flowers bring a room to life and growing them yourself is a source of pride; picking your own means you can break the mould and create unique flower arrangements; bought cut flowers are expensive and costly in terms of carbon footprint; and personality goes a long way to creating a beautiful display, which is difficult to create with commercially-grown identical blooms.

He then gave plenty of advice on how to use the area you have, whether you have large containers or flower beds, by staggering and layering to achieve three cuts from one space. Ben also gave advice on displays. For example:

Cut your flowers as early as you can in the morning and then leave them before using for 12 to 24 hours in a cool place outside, soaking up water.

Clean your vases as it's the bacteria in the water that makes flowers "go over" – for the same reason, make sure no foliage is in the water.

Be creative - for example, using racemes of Mahonia rather than the whole flowerhead will still provide its heady scent but give a delicate effect; use herbs to think outside the box, such as Moroccan mint; Nigella can be used in all its stages, so preflowering, when in flower, as well as the seed heads.

We were left with the reflection that bringing the seasons into your home with cut flowers from the garden was a precious thing to aim for. We are fortunate to have Nick Hamilton in March, the writer, author and radio broadcaster from Barnsdale Gardens, speaking about "Growing vegetables all year round". This talk will be held on 3rd March in Benson parish hall 7.30 for 7.45pm start (£2 for members, £5 for visitors - no need to book). We will also have our "Flower of the Month" competition (members only). Nick Hamilton developed his passion for gardening, aged 9, when his father, Geoff, purchased a derelict garden centre in Kettering. Geoff would later go on to purchase a piece of land adjacent to Barnsdale. This land formed the nursery and ultimately part of Barnsdale Gardens and Nick worked closely with his father in the family business.



Nick took over the running when Geoff died and has developed it into the inspirational garden that it is today, which is not only a credit to a great man but also to Nick's passion, foresight and hard work. These inspirational gardens are still run using organic and peat-free principles and are visited annually by about 30,000 people.

The Vicar writes...

Sometimes it seems that we are tossed about in a storm with wave after wave of bad news hitting us. Having had the worst of Covid pass, we have an increase in the cost of living and spiralling energy bills which will hit the poorest most. Now the sad reality of war in Europe is incredibly depressing, as we feel so helpless to do much about it. It is natural to feel fragile and we must be kind to one another, recognising that this stress is taking a toll.

As our Archbishops have said, we face real evil in this world. Until now, many of the psalms that rage against the writer's enemies have seemed quite alien to me, but yesterday at morning prayer we had Psalm 55 which speaks perfectly for the Ukrainian people as their neighbours trample over their freedom – these words seem to echo down the centuries and remind us that such things are not new, although thankfully scarce in our own generations. Please look it up if you don't believe me.

So, what can we do? Firstly, we can pray a Prayer for Peace in Ukraine:

God of compassion,

Have mercy this day on the people of Ukraine.

Restore to them the gift of peace.

Grant wisdom to the governments of the world.

Bring good in the midst of evil and suffering,

For the sake of Jesus Christ your Son,

Who gave his life to bring peace to your world. Amen.

Then, we can support and encourage our government to act, not just in gestures like lighting up public buildings in blue and yellow, but with practical support for the families fleeing for their lives

to safety. We also want leaders to actively reject all forms of corrupt influence, where previously these may have been regarded as relatively harmless. There will be hardships for us all as the economic realities of sanctions hit home, with central European nations suffering the most as we find alternatives to the Russian gas supplies. But this is the cost for standing against Putin's oppression and injustice. This is a small price to pay compared to the Ukrainians who give their lives for freedom, and we must do what we can to help them whilst avoiding escalation of the war, hence great wisdom is required.

Through Lent, we journey with Christ to the cross. The paradox is that it is there that we find our hope. We worship the Servant King who gave up everything, even his life, for us so that we may know his resurrection. The things that we may be asked to give up this year will be far more important than chocolate or alcohol, but in so doing we seek his Kingdom of peace and justice for our whole world.

GreenArt Tree Pledge: 2,022 Trees in 2022

With the Queen's Platinum Jubilee tree planting initiative well underway, GreenArt Director, George Smith, is joining in by pledging to plant 2,022 trees in 2022. George is an ex-resident of Crowmarsh and still runs his business from Wallingford, living close by.

To keep track of our mission we've put up a large tree graphic in the office and every time we plant a tree we put a yellow sticker on the tree as a visual tally of all our efforts!



All the trees have so far been planted in private gardens across South Oxfordshire, by our Landscapers and Gardeners as part of the finishing touches to our new garden designs.

Tree number one was planted at a new build in Benson. The Himalayan Birch is a rather vigorous tree, growing up to 18m tall offering privacy from any unwanted guests! Its luminescent white bark makes it stand out from the crowd, with beautiful yellow leaves in the Autumn. Its Spring-time catkins are great food for insects and birds too.

We chose the award-winning Prunus Accolade, regarded as one of the most attractive of the early flowering ornamental cherries, to complement a dramatic water feature in Henley. The shell-pink flowers in Spring, fall to reveal a fresh canopy of dark green leaves in the Summer providing shade, perfect for providing a cooler area in your garden on a hot Summer's day!

To enhance an existing boundary hedgerow and provide instant impact for one of our

regular gardening clients in Dorchester, we planted five large Lilac trees. At 2.5 metres tall this screen will be full of colour by late Spring/early Summer.

We also planted an Apple espalier against the wall of their vegetable garden. Both a decorative and functional way of training a fruit tree for easy pickings, as long as you have enough linear space in your garden. The variety chosen was the 'Pitmaston Pineapple', so called after Mr Williams of Pitmaston near Worcester in the 1780s. It is best known for its distinctive pineapple-like flavour!

With Spring just around the corner and a bounce in our step, will we continue to steam ahead with our pledge, and will keep you updated of our progress. So watch this space or you can follow our tree planting adventures via the Blog page on our website: www.greenart.co.uk

John Howell MP writes...

In my newsletter last month I wrote about the need to learn to live with the Covid virus as we move from pandemic to endemic. I know that many people have welcomed the Prime Minister's Statement which was first made on 19th January which set the path for further removal of regulations. We will hear more of this later this month, probably by the time this letter is published in some magazines! In January many parents and young people welcomed removing the requirement for secondary school students to wear face masks in classrooms. However, some people were concerned that more widely face masks become advisory rather than mandatory. I understand some of the concerns but do support the view that we need to allow people to make their own judgements. I appreciate that as more regulations are set to be removed some people remain anxious, but we have come a long way in the last couple of years. When all of this started, we did not know what we were dealing with. We did not know how to treat the virus and had no medicines at our disposal. Thanks to research we now have effective ways to treat the virus and a range of drugs at our disposal to relieve symptoms. We do, of course, also have the vaccines and it is good news that at last the Novavax vaccine has been approved in the UK too. I am aware of a number of constituents who volunteered to take part in this trial and of the difficulties that some have faced as a result of the delays

to the approval. I am grateful to those who have taken part in trials without whom we would not have effective vaccines and trust that all are relieved that it is now among the approved vaccines. Moving forward with Covid we need to learn to manage it in the same was as we have always managed seasonal viruses and I trust that we will see some measures coming forward to respond to this.

In our move to live more normal lives we are seeing the economy open up again and people returning to some of the activities that have been prohibited or curtailed for many months. Alongside this inevitably there has to be an end to special funding that has been made available to try to mitigate for the negative impact of Covid. Among these is a support grant for bus companies to help bridge the gap in fare income with reduced passenger numbers. Although I fully support the gradual withdrawal of the specific Covid funding I am concerned that use of public transport has not yet reached pre-Covid levels and that the removal of this grant may adversely affect our bus services. To this end I have written to the Secretary of State for Transport to raise my concerns on this and to seek continued funding to ensure that we can keep our bus services running. I appreciate that it is especially difficult in rural areas where the volume of passengers on individual routes is just not at the level of urban areas and thus the journey cost per head is prohibitive. In such cases where there is a key route for a community it has long been within the remit of County Councils to budget for appropriate subsidies. It is, of course, a political decision where any administration allocates its funds. In response to both the Covid impact and in support of climate initiatives I would like to see our local Council make this a budget priority especially in light of the generous Local Government Settlement this year which has given substantial increases to our local Councils.

On the world stage there is great concern at what is going on to stop war between Russia and the Ukraine. This is not just a distant issue but could have a significant impact on the UK. It is a particular concern to me as a senior Vice-Chairman of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe. Both Russia and Ukraine are members of this Assembly - although how serious Russia is may be doubted when one senior Russian fell asleep publicly when moving an objection to an amendment

in a debate I was chairing! The Council is doing all it can to help bring about peace between the two countries and I have personally worked closely with my opposite number in the Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe.

The role of the Council of Europe is often overlooked in Britain but all members of the Delegation that I lead share my concerns. It is often derided as just a human rights organisation. But while human rights are crucially important, it is much more than this and has had a key role to play in maintaining the peace in Europe since the late 1940s.

I am always interested to know the views of constituents even if we agree to differ. If there is an issue that concerns you please do share your thoughts. 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


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Wallingford Museum News

We are delighted that the museum will be open from 1st March with the exception of the Wallingford story, which is under development. Please check the web site for opening times.

This year's exhibition, "Caring for the Sick - A history of Wallingford's Hospitals" which was devised well before the current crisis, traces the fascinating history of Wallingford's hospitals, caring for the sick in the town from medieval times to the present day. Its portrayal of the challenges of dealing with plague, leprosy, smallpox, scarlet fever and other such outbreaks, as well as more common illness and disabilities, brings the past vividly to light. Ironically, it puts our present troubles in their historic context.

Wallingford Museum has proudly received a painting by GD Leslie on behalf of the nation. https://www.wallingfordmuseum.org.uk/news

GD Leslie's painting 'A Thames-side Conversation' has been acquired for the nation through the Acceptance in Lieu Scheme, which is administered by the Arts Council, and allocated to Wallingford Museum.

GD Leslie (1835-1921) was a well-known Victorian artist who lived in Wallingford at Riverside in Thames Street between 1884 and 1891. He was an ardent lover of nature, and particularly of the River Thames and this painting depicts a scene on the riverside, probably at Pangbourne. It was exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1864.

Our amazing exhibit, the new Wallingford castle model is also on display, created in collaboration with Ben Taggart. Wallingford Museum's dedicated team of researchers have worked with architectural model maker, Ben, to create a 1:300 scale model (1.5m x1.6m) of Wallingford's royal castle as it may have been in the mid-14th century.

Cost of living crisis on the way Citizens Advice warning



Citizens Advice has issued press releases warning that inflationary factors leading to higher food prices and energy bills will cause hardship for many this year. Unavoidably we will be paying much more for essentials (rent or mortgage, food, telephone and broadband, household bills, Council Tax) by the middle of 2022.

However, much can be done to manage the expected debacle, and setting your own personal budget is a key step. Start preparing now, making a budget and seeing if you can maximise your income. Look closely and objectively at your financial figures – how much comes in every month, how much goes out, so that you have a clear picture of your situation. Take an average over a period of, say, six months, so that quarterly bills are taken into account. Decide what the priorities are and reduce your costs even on essentials if possible. Do remember that inflation will increase your outgoings.

There are various helpful resources which you can take advantage of. Citizens Advice can tell you about fuel vouchers, benefits or government grants and Covid support that might be available, as well as the Household Support Fund, administered by the local district councils of South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse at https://www.southoxon.gov.uk and https://www.southoxon.gov.uk and https://whitehorsedc.gov.uk The Citizens Advice website at https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk has tips on how to reduce your living costs.

Past Times with David Beasley

Death of Colonel Charles Roberts

When we visit Crowmarsh Church or as we just walk past, we give little thought to the headstones in the churchyard and who are remembered on them, or what they achieved in their lives.

To the east of the churchyard is a weathered granite Celtic cross and carved into it is one name, that of Colonel Charles Roberts, unknown today but very well known in his day.

Charles Roberts was born in East Retford, Nottinghamshire, in 1843 as the only son of John and Harriet Roberts. He had three sisters, Maria, Annie and Sarah and was the first cousin of Earl Roberts V.C, one of the most successful generals of the British Army in the 19th century. He joined the 93rd Foot (Black Watch) in 1861, later transferring to the 73rd Foot when it became the 2nd Black Watch. He saw service in India and Canada and fought the campaigns in Burma and Assam. He also fought in the Afghan War of 1878-80, where he was under the command of his cousin, General Roberts, and took part in the famous march from Kabul to Kandahar.

On leaving the Army in 1905 he purchased Bridge House in Wallingford, he was a member of the Town Council, and in 1909 became a Justice of the Peace for Berkshire. Although a bachelor he was fond of children and was known to rarely pass a child in the street without stopping to talk to them. He helped form the Boy Scouts movement in Wallingford. When war broke out in 1914, he was the main force in raising the Wallingford Volunteer Training Corps and was its Commanding Office until his death in 1916. In 1915 he was asked by the War Office to train young officers in a camp in the north of Scotland. He drove himself to the camp, a distance of over 600 miles, and spent three months there, often going out training with the much younger officers. He was 72 by this time and found the training very arduous and so was forced to return home to Wallingford. But his health was broken and after a trip to Abingdon in an open car in bitter cold he was taken ill on his return to Wallingford and died of bronchitis on the 11th April 1916.

His funeral took place on a very wet Sunday on the 16th April, at St Mary's Church where he worshipped each week, a Sunday afternoon was chosen to allow as many members of the Wallingford Volunteer Corps to attend as possible. The 200 members of the Volunteer Corps paraded behind the coffin, the roads were lined by hundreds of people from Bridge House to Crowmarsh Church. The coffin was followed by his servants from Bridge House, the Wallingford Volunteer Training Corps, and Wallingford Police Force led by Inspector Webb. The procession stretched from Thames Street to the Crowmarsh side of Wallingford Bridge. So many people attended the funeral that they filled the church and churchyard, even spilling into the road outside the church. A volley was fired over the grave followed by the Last Post, then the whole of the Wallingford Volunteers filed past the grave to pay their last respects.

You may wonder why a man of 72 was given such a strenuous command, but his cousin Field Marshall Roberts was Commander in Chief of the Army at the age of 82! He died on the 14th November 1914 at St Omar, while inspecting Indian troops.

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 3rd February.

Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson, Julia Streete, Stuart Soames, Julian Park, David Topliss, Liz Ryall and David Rowley, with Yvonne Peet (Finance Officer) and Sue Rance (Clerk). District Councillors Sue Cooper and Andrea Powell attended part of the meeting.

We are pleased to have a new co-opted parish councillor, Julia Streete from Park View. There is still one vacancy on the council: if you are interested please contact the parish clerk or speak to any councillor.

Finance

The council agreed a donation of £500 to Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub. Payments for January and February include £105.07 for allotment insurance, £365 for printing, £1,722.24 for dog bin emptying, £498 for speed surveys in The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford and at North Stoke, £850 for a second-hand sit-on mower for the recreation ground and £1200 to Glanville Consultants for professional services

preparing for a pedestrian crossing at The Bell. The dog bin emptying service is no longer subsidised by SODC and the Finance Officer will look for an alternative contractor. We are also retendering for our main grass cutting contract and we have taken the cutting of the recreation ground back in house, to be carried out by our groundsman Chris Strange.

New dwelling with garden and laid out parking area and improved entrance. Amendments to approved scheme. No objection, given that planning permission has been granted here already.

County Council report

The process is under way to get double yellow lines marked around Stephens Field and including the frontages of Nos 3 and 24 Bellamy Way and residents have been consulted on the proposals.

Community groups and organisations in the parish are invited to get in touch with Councillor Bloomfield if they might benefit from some grant funding.

District Council report

The government's provisional local government finance settlement announced on 16th December is the fourth consecutive one-year settlement and amounts to a real-term cut in council funding for SODC and for many other councils around the country.

SODC is now able to start taking on new customers for the garden waste service at www.southoxon.gov.uk/south-oxfordshire-district-council/recycling-rubbish-and-waste/garden-waste.

The council has a new Climate Action Plan, which will need to be taken up by every part of the council plus the wider population, including parish councils, if we are to achieve our targets of becoming carbon neutral by 2025 (the council) and by 2030 for the whole district. Details will be on the SODC website.

Through Community Infrastructure Levy and Section 106 agreements, SODC has secured £20,665,018 from developers, which will go towards local infrastructure to support the growth in our district: see www.southoxon.gov.uk/south-oxfordshire-

district-council/community-support/ infrastructure-to-support-communities. Projects include improving the Riverside pool and campsite, tree planting projects and the purchase of housing for social rent.

We are still awaiting news from SODC about the future of their former office site in Benson Lane.

Environment and recreation

Grass cutting: Chris Strange is now mowing the recreation ground himself using three types of mower purchased second hand from a local supplier. A new specification will be needed for the remaining grass cutting contract and quotes will be sought.

Tree planting at the nature area: a quote has been received from Scofell for £957.19 + VAT to supply plant 15 trees of species suited to the conditions. A grant will be sought from the district councillors' fund. Some trees at the nature area had been damaged in storms and Cllr Park offered to inspect the trees and ask Scofell to take appropriate action.

Football pitches: Crowmarsh Youth football team has the opportunity to be funded to maintain the football pitches to a higher specification. The club and the parish council will sign an agreement to support this initiative for up to ten years' duration.

Pavilion improvement project: We have applied to the district council for grant funding of 50% of the total cost of improvements to the pavilion. As we may not be awarded this in full, it was agreed to apply for a further grant from FCC Community Action Fund (formerly Wren). Cllrs Johnson and Rowley are in discussion with the company who submitted the lowest tender for the pavilion improvements.

North Stoke Village Green: The green is in a very poor state, overgrown and overrun with rabbits, making it unusable. A site inspection will be carried out when the parish council meets at North Stoke in May and the environment and recreation committee will discuss options at their next meeting.

Traffic and transport

The Clerk will ask for a speed survey at the A4074 (Portway) to be carried out and the survey at The Springs still needs to be done.

Public consultation on the Oxfordshire County Council local transport and connectivity plan runs until 16th April. Please let the county council know your views at letstalk.oxfordshire.gov.uk/ltcp – see the February Crowmarsh News for more details.

Bus services are vulnerable to cuts if government funding is not maintained until passenger numbers recover after the pandemic. This will be discussed in the committee and with our parish transport rep at the next parish council meeting.
