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
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Jubilee Barn Dance

The Vicar writes...

A belated Happy Easter everyone! May is one of the most joyful seasons in the church as we continue to celebrate Easter for 40 days until Ascension Day on Thursday 26th May when we join the other congregations of our Wallingford Team at a special evening celebration Eucharist at St Agatha's, Brightwell. We then enter a 10 day wait to bring us to 50 days, giving the festival named Pentecost (or Whit Sunday) we remember the coming of the Holy Spirit and the birth of the Church.

One of the most frequent questions we are asked as Street Pastors by younger people out drinking in Wallingford is whether we believe in "all that stuff about Jesus". Well, I obviously do otherwise my career path would have been a very strange choice! So, to those that just think it is a nice story, I ask you to consider these questions:

- Do you believe there was a real man called Julius Caesar? How do you know? What evidence is there from near the time of his life and death?
- How much more evidence is there about the other man with the initials "JC" who lived at a similar time? Clue: as well as the testimonies of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, the man Jesus is recorded in both Roman and Jewish histories.
- If Jesus was just a man who died, why did his disciples not just give up, go home and stay quiet? For clues, read Acts of the Apostles!

My conclusion is that Jesus was not just a good teacher who performed miraculous healings, but was actually the Son of God who overcame human mortality, and his resurrection changes everything. It is not wishful thinking or a made up story but the truth that makes sense of our existence: we are here because God created us and loves us so much that he came in human form so that we can share his eternal life. If you have an open mind and would like to explore further, I invite you to come and see. But I should also warn you: it can change your life!

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 7th April.

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Johnson (part of meeting), Jay Anderson, Stuart Soames, Julian Park, David Topliss and David Rowley, and Mrs Sue Rance (Parish Clerk). District Councillors Sue Cooper and Andrea Powell attended part of the meeting. There were apologies for absence from Councillors Stevenson, Ryall and Streete.

Finance

The parish council has accepted the quote from The Landscape Group for cutting the grass verges and other areas in Crowmarsh Gifford and the recreation ground at North Stoke. Crowmarsh Gifford recreation ground is now maintained in-house by our groundsman Chris Strange. The contract with SODC for emptying dog bins has been terminated and a new contract signed with the Shield Group, who charge £2.00 per bin. They will collect the waste every Tuesday.

The council gave a grant of £300 to Riverside Counselling Service for their work to support the mental health and wellbeing of adults and young people from South Oxfordshire, including residents of Crowmarsh.

We agreed payments including £1950 to Simpson Architecture for work on the pavilion project, £148.32 for Jubilee lunch posters, £480 to Suggs Security for repairs to the pavilion fire alarm, £1,148.63 to Scofell for supplying and planting 15 trees at the nature area (for which a grant of £957.19 was received from the district councillors' fund).

The financial regulations were amended to raise the tender threshold in line with national regulations. The publications scheme was approved without amendment.

Planning

Decisions by SODC

P22/S0399/HH: North Stoke Farmhouse, The Street, North Stoke OX10 6BL First floor rear extension including alterations to front door and first floor front window. Planning permission.

P22/S0234/HH: Archgate, The Street, North Stoke OX10 6BL Construction of a new timber barn garage with an electrical charging point, integral log store, ground floor outside covered dining area and a first-floor gym space in part of the attic without restricted headroom. Planning permission.

P22/S0306/LB: 1 Church Cottages, Church Lane, North Stoke OX10 6BH Repair/replace the porch roof and bread oven roof. Listed building consent.

Consultations

P22/S0930/HH: Lalique, Mongewell OX10 8BP Two-storey rear extension, thermal upgrade, replacement windows and new entrance canopy. Alterations to existing extension. No objection.

P22/S1045/FUL: UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology, Maclean Building, Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BB. A number of locations are proposed for installation of a ground mounted solar array, maximum area of 580m² in any location. Recommend approval. (Cllrs Griffin and Johnson declared an interest as employees of UKCEH.)

P22/S0925/LB & P22/S0866/HH: Brook House, The Street, North Stoke OX10 6BL Conversion of 19th century plant room into boot room, including creation of new doorway and new window. No objection.

P22/S0958/HH: The Grebe, 13 Chalmore Gardens, Wallingford. First floor extension, replacement porch, wood-burning stove flue and other work. No strong views – no effect on our parish.

MW.0115/21 (County Council): Application for planning permission to extract and process sand and gravel at land at White Cross Farm, Wallingford. The parish council objected to mineral working on this site on the edge of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, close to the former Carmel College listed buildings and St John's church. It would have a harmful impact on the River Thames and the Thames Path and prevent biodiversity recovery in the Wallingford to Goring Conservation Target Area.

District Council report

The District Councillors reported on the Homes for Ukraine Scheme.

Proposals for the former SODC office site in Benson Lane are now being drawn up and the Parish Council will be kept informed and consulted. Biffa is trialing an electric refuse collection vehicle. The current waste and recycling collection contract has two more years to run.

Environment and recreation

The parish council received an update on the pavilion improvement project and agreed to go ahead with the selected contractors. Materials should be delivered on site immediately after the Jubilee weekend and the project duration is estimated at 20 weeks. This will be partly funded by grants and partly by the Parish Council out of the Community Infrastructure Levy. Access to the toilets from the playground will be maintained during the works.

The Big Jubilee Lunch will take place on 5th June at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall. Posters are on display and further information is in Crowmarsh News and on the website. If you plan to attend or can offer help, please contact the Parish Clerk soon.

Traffic and transport

Matthew Barber, the Police and Crime Commissioner, has announced a Road Safety Summit in May. Cllr Sherbourne plans to attend to discuss speeding and other concerns including motorcycle noise.

The Clerk has sent a reminder to OCC Highways about the requested speed surveys at the A4074 (Portway).

The next meeting will be held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 5th May, starting at 7.30pm. Please let the parish clerk and chairman know if you would like to attend.

The Annual Parish Meeting, the opportunity for all electors to hear reports and raise any issues or questions, will be held at the Pavilion on Thursday 26th May at 7pm, representatives of the police, county and district councilors and Thames Water will be invited.

The Perfect Golden Circle - Benjamin Myers

Next month there is a special bank holiday weekend to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and the good folk of Wallingford will be celebrating with picnics in the castle gardens and a flotilla along the Thames. The shop will, without doubt, be awash with bunting and our team of booksellers will be powered as always by tea and biscuits whilst giving you Jubilee themed recommendations (*Peppa's Royal Party anyone?*).

Our book of this month remembers a rather more sombre anniversary. Forty years ago on 28th - 29th May 1982, The Battle of Goose Green marked a turning point for The Falklands War. Benjamin Myer's *The Perfect Golden Circle, is set in 1989, and touches deftly on the war through the discourse of its two main protagonists, Calvert and Redbone, whilst they design and create elaborate crop circles to baffle and bemuse the British public and press. t's a gem!*

The Perfect Golden Circle will published in hardback by Bloomsbury on 12th May and will be £16.99.

The Wallingford Flower Club 1970 – 2021

At the end of December 2021 the Committee of Wallingford Flower Club reluctantly decided the time had come to close the Flower Club. It was no longer viable for the Committee to continue without the input of a younger membership.

The Club was originally formed in 1970 by a group of ladies in Wallingford and has enhanced the life of the Community for over 50 years both in Wallingford and the surrounding Villages. Our ladies have arranged flowers at Wallingford Hospital, Church Flowers, Flower Festivals, Rush Court Nursing Home, The Falklands Chapel at Basildon Park, local Weddings and many other venues. We have also in the past held an annual Plant and Pot Sales in Wallingford Market Place, Open Evenings in the Corn Exchange Theatre and engaged some of the top Flower Arranging Demonstrators from the National Association of Flower Arrangers to show their skills.

In the early 2000s the Club changed its venue for monthly meetings to Crowmarsh Village Hall. We have therefore decided to plant a tree in the grounds of Crowmarsh Village Hall in recognition of the Club and its 50 year history.



The tree planted was a Weeping Cherry (Prunus Kiku-Shidare-Zakura) and can be found by the entrance to the Hall. Its pink blossom is very attractive in April/May. In 1973 the then ladies of Wallingford Flower Club planted a Swedish White Beam (Sorbus) tree In the Kine Croft opposite the Cross Keys. This tree still survives today, recognizable by its white trunk. The tree was planted in the then drive to plant trees in the "Plant a Tree in 73" Campaign to replace trees lost at that time due to the Dutch Elm Tree disease.



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John Howell MP writes...

As nature springs into life, and the weather gets a little warmer we are reminded again that we live in a beautiful part of the country. Sometimes it is when we stop to appreciate our own environment that we can get a feel for the importance of looking after it. When world issues swamp us appreciating what we have locally and playing our small part in caring for it can be very helpful. The uniqueness of one of our landscape features, chalk streams, has been powerfully captured in a recent film made by Nicola Schafer, a resident of Watlington, in her documentary 'The Chalgrove Brook'. Working with local people the film tells the story of the brook and the importance of preserving it. It is an interesting, informative and wellmade film which is well worth watching. You can view in online at www.thechalgrovebrook.uk.

Issues around the environment and climate change are never far from our minds. The latest report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC), which has just been published, sets out the stark consequences climate change is having on our planet and again reminds us of the need for decisive international action. There is always more that we can do, and we should take heart that everything and anything that we do is worth it. When the recent report was published the IPCC Chair said "I am encouraged by climate action being taken in many countries. There are policies, regulations and market instruments that are proving effective."

In this context it is good news that the Government has recently put substantial funding towards buses and that Oxfordshire has benefitted. Firstly we had the news of £200 million funding to deliver almost 1,000 new green buses across the country. This is part of the ZEB-RA (Zero Emission Buses Regional Area) scheme and Oxfordshire will receive a share of the new funding to deliver 159 new electric or hydrogen powered buses. Secondly Oxfordshire is to receive £12.7 million of new funding to deliver vital improvements to local bus networks. This is part of the Government's £1.2 billion bus transformation programme. I have lobbied the Government for us to have a share of these funds locally and am therefore delighted at this news.

There is no doubt that that we need to reduce our dependence on fossil fuels and we need to do so in a way that is manageable and financially affordable. As the IPPC report also high lights progress is uneven with the largest gaps among lower income populations. Whilst recognising this as a global concern the same can also be true within country. In the short to medium term we will continue to need oil and gas supplies. The recent actions of activists from groups such as Just Stop Oil and Extinction Rebellion blocking access to oil terminals and thus creating fuel shortages at the pumps is not helpful. Action that disrupts the lives and livelihoods of people in already difficult times can have a negative impact rather than encouraging people.

The invasion of Ukraine has added to the volatility of wholesale gas process across the world and also raised concerns about food security. This is something that I discussed recently when I met with local farmers. It was interesting to learn their views on striking a balance between rewilding and retaining sufficient land for food production. If the balance is wrong it could lead to increasing our dependence on imports which add to negative overall environmental impacts.

When considering the impact of policy decisions and environmental tax measures the Government has to balance a diverse range of concerns. I know that there are a wide variety of views on what we should do first and there will always be robust debate. We have to take people with us and make it as easy and as cost effective as possible to encourage change.

Benson Garden Club Liz Harrison



For Benson Garden Club's April talk, we were treated to Pip Smith giving advice on "Perfect Pots and Containers". Pip is a Landscape Architect with many years' experience working as a professional

horticulturist, but in our talk he focused on what striking gardening displays you can achieve in the smallest of areas. After extolling the virtues of container gardening he focused on the merits of various types of pots. For example, terracotta pots are porous so excellent for succulents. Pip also reminded us of the importance of good drainage, so to always consider suitability before making a purchase. For very big pots he recommended filling half with polystyrene to save on the cost of compost (unless planting a large plant).

Having covered the practicalities of container gardening including which soil to use and how to feed, Pip shared with us an array of container gardening displays to illustrate good design. Grouping pots together for dramatic effect; selecting different shapes, textures and height for interesting visual displays; using containers for statement plants in the border; and the choice of colour to create different effects were some of the ideas he covered. Pip closed his talk by reminding us to consider both pot and location, to choose plants carefully, to remember to feed, and to be bold and brave!

Chosen by Pip, our "Flower of the Month" competition was won by Teresa McTeague with her gorgeous purple hyacinth.

Our next event on Thursday 5th May is a members' visit to Purely Plants nursery to learn about propagation and transplanting techniques. Then on Saturday 14th May we have our annual plant sale at Bob's Corner, High Street, Benson from 9am to midday. This sale is always very popular and there will be a wide selection of plants available – and advice on how to grow them.

News from Howbery Park Birds boxed off at Howbery

In recognition of completing a year of initiatives to support birds on the park, Nurture Landscapes presented us with a second inscription – the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) – on our Biodiversity Award. Over the last 12 months, we have installed four bird feeding stations, monitoring stations, three tawny owl boxes and other new boxes for songbirds.



We also participated in last year's Big Garden Birdwatch and surveyed the plants and trees in our grounds to check there are plentiful berries and grains for birds to feed on. By completing these initiatives we met criteria set out by Nurture Landscapes and the BTO. The second inscription on the award, which has six petals, joins that of the Bumblebee Conservation Trust logo, which we earned the previous year for our work championing bees.

Nurture's Biodiversity Manager Simon Blackley said: "The year-by-year approach is giving real structure to Howbery's biodiversity work, and encourages everyone to think

about the needs of one particular area of conservation for a year. I'm particularly encouraged to see the bird feeders next to the café's terrace, allowing people inside and out to observe the birds. This meets one of the aims of the scheme – to raise public awareness." The focus year is just the starting point for ongoing work – we won't suddenly stop supporting them. This year we are planning to add more bird boxes and the Nurture Landscapes team will continue to monitor them. Already this year, they have spotted an owl on top of one of our new owl boxes. Plus we took part again in the Big Garden Birdwatch

Cholsey Repair Café's next event will be at the Cholsey Pavilion on Saturday 21st May, opening from 11.00 to 1.45pm and offers help and advice on repairs to many kinds of domestic items (instead of throwing them away), a sharpening service and electrical safety testing. The repair cafe runs regularly on the third Saturday of odd-numbered months and coincides with the Cholsey Community Café, where you can get tea, coffee and tasty cakes.

Experimental Wildflower Meadow

Under the walnut tree in Howbery Farm the grass is being left to grow to its natural height. The wild flowers that will also grow will provide nectar for pollinating insects and support our declining wildlife.

Native wild plants and seeds will be added where needed through the season and long dormant species may regrow. All will be cut back in August, when the seeds have fallen, and the grass then cut as usual until winter. If successful this could be repeated each year and extended to other sites around the village if desired.

Councils to let wildflowers bloom during No Mow May

Wildflowers could bloom in more public areas next month after South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse District Councils pledged their support for No Mow May.

The two councils already designate wildflower meadows which they only cut two to three times a year but this year they will trial leaving several additional areas of land uncut for No May Mow, a national campaign which encourages people to not mow gardens and public areas during May. The campaign aims to get people to let grass grow long to help boost biodiversity and provide a feast of wildflower nectar for bees. Not cutting lawns for a month encourages more flowers to grow and May is the point at which grass starts growing at its fastest rate.

At the end of the month, people are asked to take part in Every Flower Counts (<u>https://</u><u>www.plantlife.org.uk/everyflowercounts/</u>), a survey which will help to reveal how many bees the UK's lawns can feed and the councils will also review how the trial has impacted each area.

Cllr Sue Cooper, Cabinet Member for Environment, Climate Change and Nature Recovery at South Oxfordshire District Council, said "No Mow May is a great reminder that by making small and simple changes you can make a real positive difference to our environment.

Cllr Andrew Crawford, Cabinet Member for Finance and Corporate Assets at Vale of White Horse District Council, said: "It's really important that we do what we can to boost our biodiversity on our public land so I'm really pleased we are supporting No Mow May.It's a great campaign and requires no effort to get involved – if you have a garden please join in and see if new plants and wildlife start to appear outside your home.

Wallingford Museum is experimenting in new forms of interpretation namely podcasts and YouTube films.

Our first YouTube film is of Judy Dewey, Curator of Wallingford Museum describing how the castle model fits within the present day town.



The Museum's latest acquisition, GD Leslie's painting 'A Thameside Conversation' is the subject of an Anthony Wilder podcast. If you listen to the podcast at home, we hope you will be inspired to come to the museum to see this superb painting for yourself.

GD Leslie (1835-1921) was a well-known Victorian artist who lived in Wallingford at Riverside in Thames Street between 1884 and 1891. He was an ardent lover of nature, and particularly of the River Thames and this painting depicts a scene on the riverside, probably at Pangbourne. It was exhibited at the Royal Academy in 1864.

The good news is that Wallingford's Guided Historic Town Walks have started again, every Saturday morning at 11am from 16th April until 24th September. There is no advance booking, so just meet the guide under the Town Hall in Wallingford Market Place at 11am any Saturday. The round tour takes approximately an hour and a half. The cost is £10 per person (cash only please) which includes an open season ticket to Wallingford Museum for 2022. All walk proceeds help to support this splendid volunteer-run museum.

Each walk is led by an expert guide from The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society, exploring the backstreets and bringing to life the history of the town and its buildings from Saxon times to the present day. Improving Crowmarsh Pavilion Facilities

The Parish Council is engaged in a project to provide new facilities at the Crowmarsh Pavilion on the recreation ground for the local community. This will complement the success of the adjacent and popular playground, which was completed about two years ago, with the help of grants from SODC Community Capital Grants and WREN's FCC Community Action Fund, as well as Parish Council funding and contributions from others.

The project involves the conversion of surplus changing space to create new toilet provision, meeting room and a servery all within the existing external walls, without extending the building. Users have identified a need for additional toilet provision to serve the recreation ground and children's play area. The toilets will be externally, independently accessible and located near the children's play area. There will be two unisex toilets including Disability access and baby changing facilities. The toilets will be accessible by a ramp for wheelchair and pram users, and by new stairs.

There will be a new additional meeting room, as there is considerable demand on the existing Meeting/Club Room and the additional room will provide greater flexibility in the programming and use of the pavilion.

A drinks and snack servery with external hatch is to be included for the provision of refreshments to those using the sports fields and children's play area. This will allow the parallel use of the main hall and kitchen as required. It is hoped that a number of local groups (such as the school PTA, Beavers and Cubs, the local church group and sports clubs) will benefit from the upgraded facilities.

The access and upper landing will be reconstructed with metal balustrading to create a more open appearance with improved visibility for parents of children using the facilities.

The existing Meeting/Club Room will be improved with two new windows, giving more natural light and views, making it a more attractive as a venue.

At present there is a limited rear terrace that is not suitable for socialising or activities. This terrace is being improved, extended and made more visually attractive with planting boxes, tables and chairs, and will provide space for terrace games.

As well as contributing, the Parish Council is seeking funding from South and Vale Capital Grants and FCC Community Action Fund with the aim of starting building works in the second half of 2022. If parishioners have questions or comments, they can be addressed to the Parish Clerk at
