

#### Learn about hedgehogs, trees and more at Howbery Park for Great Big Green Week

To mark Great Big Green Week, Howbery Business Park is holding a lunchtime talk focusing on hedgehogs and launching its Tree Trail. The talk and trail will be open to the general public, as well as those based on the park, free of charge, as part of Howbery's aim to raise awareness of biodiversity.

The talk will take place on 28th September in the Manor House at Howbery Park and will cover hedgehogs and other areas of biodiversity at Howbery. It will be given by Biodiversity Manager Simon Blackley and senior beekeeper Robin Sergi from the Nurture Group, which looks after the Howbery grounds.



Howbery Park is working with the Nurture Landscapes team to make its grounds hedgehog friendly this year, as part of a sixyear biodiversity scheme. The team has already installed seven hedgehog houses and is surveying food sources in the park to ensure that the spiky creatures have ample to eat all year long round. The talk will help people understand more about hedgehogs and other wildlife in the area and how they can help in their preservation.

Nurture's Biodiversity Manager Simon Blackley explained: "Hedgehogs need support as their numbers have been dwindling for years. Their numbers dropped by about 70 per cent between the 1970s and the 1990s, and a further half of the population of native hedgehogs were lost from the British countryside over the last two decades."

The park will also be launching its new Tree Trail during Great Big Green Week. From 26th September, visitors and people based on the park will be able to pick up a free map from the Manor Café (also open to the public) – between 9am and 4pm on weekdays. The trail will take in eleven of Howbery's notable trees, which are marked by plaques in the grounds.

Howbery's beautiful grounds are open to the public from 8am to 6pm on working weekdays and are only a short walk from the centre of Crowmarsh Gifford. There is a bus stop outside the site and ample parking

#### The Vicar writes ...

After the relatively relaxing time of the summer holidays, September brings a hive of activity as we have Bunkfest and children going back to school. In church, we begin September with our popular Pet Service, when pets of all shapes, sizes and species are welcome in church as we thank God for them and ask his blessing on all of his creation, a theme which continues until our Harvest celebrations in the first weekend of October and our first ever Harvest Dinner on Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> October at the Village Hall.

At our September Community Café and in church, we will have the plans on display for our new toilet and servery area at the back of the church. These are going forward for Diocesan approval this month, so please do have a look and join us in making this long-awaited project happen. The work will also remedy the damp problems that have been affecting our Grade I listed building for a number of years with a new drainage system and replacement floor. We hope that all villagers will want to maintain what is without doubt a wonderful historic asset at the heart of our village with its original Norman features. As Wallingford spends thousands on maintaining what is left of their castle ruins, we should appreciate the history of our equally ancient building on this side of the river, even if we were usually on the opposite side of history, whether Stephen vs Matilda or Roundheads vs Royalists. It is a privilege for our church council to be custodians of the building but the challenge of maintaining and keeping it useable as a community space falls upon us all.

One way of fundraising is to take part in the sponsored "Ride & Stride", visiting as many churches as possible on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> September in aid of the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust, one of the charities that will be helping us with our building project.

#### **Chiltern Chase Charity Run**

The Chiltern Chase is a run of 5km, 10km and 15km through the stunning Chilterns. 435 people from Oxfordshire and beyond put their best foot forward on 12th June, to raise money for local charities. For the first time ever, Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub South Oxfordshire was named as the charity partner of the event, the other beneficiary was Ewelme Primary school. An incredible £2,750 was raised.

2022 marked the 16th year of the Chiltern Chase, and the first year of two that Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub South Oxfordshire will be the chosen charity of the event.

Running enthusiasts enjoyed picturesque bridleways and rugged trails of the Chiltern Hills. Before taking part in their chosen distance, runners pulled on their running shoes and got their blood pumping with a workout from a personal trainer in the Army. A vast number of supporters turned up to cheer the runners on, sharing tea and cake whilst taking in the beautiful views of the Chilterns.

Luckily for both the supporters and runners, the day stayed relatively cool, making for an even more enjoyable day for everyone. A commentator was on hand to reel off the names of the winners, which were Connor Morgan (fastest male) and Holly Curtayne (fastest female) in the 5K race with times of 18.36 and 26.14 respectively. Simon Fraser (fastest male) and Nicola Taylor (fastest female) won the 15K race with times of 57.31 and 1.07.03 respectively. Unfortunately, due to a marshalling issue, they were unable to identify the winners of the 10K race.



#### **Parish Council notes**

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford village hall on Thursday 4th August. Present were Councillors Stephen Sherbourne (Chair), Jay Anderson, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames, Fleur Stevenson, Julia Streete and David Topliss, Parish Clerk Sue Rance, District Councillor Andrea Powell, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and two members of the public.

#### Matters arising from the July meeting

Chris Strange has cut the grass at the recreation ground eight times this year and will be paid an additional £240 in September.

Action is to be taken to control rabbits at the North Stoke recreation ground.

#### **Finance**

The council agreed a grant of £150 to Clean Slate, a charity that provides long-term emotional support to survivors of abuse in Oxfordshire.

Payments agreed included £166.39 for dog bin emptying, £580 for strimming nettles in the nature area, £972 for grass cutting in June, £540 for tree surgery at Newnham Murren Church, £17,204.81 for the pavilion project, £30.00 for Chiltern Society membership, £310.11 for church floodlighting (April – June) and £806.26 for maintenance of the sewage pumping system at the pavilion.

The council approved a new investment policy, as recommended by the auditor. It was resolved to continue to hold all deposits with Lloyds Bank and review this when current major projects have been completed.

#### **District Council report**

SODC has published its 2022 Five-year

Housing Land Supply as at 1st April 2022. The Oxfordshire 2050 plan programme has been terminated: it proved impossible for the five districts to reach agreement on it. SODC and the Vale of White Horse are collaborating on a joint local plan.

Lots of activities are available during the summer holidays and a new grant scheme 'Everyone Active' has been launched. Cllr Topliss felt that the management of the Riverside splash park needs to improve.

#### **Environment and recreation**

The parish council received an update on the pavilion improvement project: building work is well under way and there are monthly meetings with the contractors, SCM, who are providing a running total of expenditure as the project proceeds.

The detailed specification of the meeting room will include suitable lighting for those with disabilities and built-in connections for communications to enable hybrid meetings.

The hot, dry weather is making it difficult to maintain the new trees at the Nature Area and it was suggested that some equipment could be purchased to assist Chris Strange with watering.

#### **Traffic and transport**

A resident has filmed motorcycles at Crowmarsh roundabout and reported again on excessive speeding and noise. The police are awaiting the results of the traffic survey on the A4130 before taking further action. When the results are known the council will arrange the follow-up meeting promised with Matthew Barber, the Police and Crime Commissioner, and neighbouring parish councils. The situation will be reviewed at the September meeting. Meanwhile it was proposed that safety awareness signs be posted on lamp posts.

Two more speed surveys are being done at North Stoke, one at the crossroads and the other outside The Springs. Cllr Soames reminded the council of the need for a suitable

crossing outside the Springs at North Stoke. The situation has become more dangerous as there are no sight lines on the grass verge here, which is apparently highway land.

Cllr Sherbourne will take this up with Lee Turner at Oxfordshire Highways.

There has been consultation on the pedestrian crossing at The Bell and the parish council is waiting for Highways to approve the design. Information on a crossing in Benson Lane is expected from Highways and Bloor Homes.

A local resident reported on use of the lay-by opposite the church in The Street, which has been increasingly used by vans and contractors' vehicles, reducing off-street parking available to residents. Cllr Anderson reported on the dangerous traffic situation in Old Reading Road and Newnham Green during school terms when pupils are dropped off and picked up by car. The Newnham Manor development should help to address this, but measures are needed before then.

Cllr Sherbourne is planning to discuss this and a number of other issues with Lee Turner of OCC Highways. It was suggested that residents' parking only should be introduced although enforcement could be difficult. District Cllr Powell reported that there are areas in Didcot where residents' parking schemes are in place. District Cllr Cooper may be able to suggest a solution.

#### **Planning**

There were no consultations this month. Work has begun on refurbishment of The Bell inn (approved in February, P22/S0688/LB).

#### **Next meeting**

The next parish council meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 1st September, starting at 7.30pm. Please let the parish clerk know if you would like to attend.

#### John Howell MP writes...

This month I am writing in early August. The House is in recess and there is a rest from the busyness of the daily schedule of the House with debates, committees and many other meetings. However MPs are not on holiday, unless taking a break as many others do at this time of year. Ministers continue the work of their Departments and MPs continue with their work with more of a constituency focus. My team continue to work as usual supporting constituents to resolve problems where possible, with the welcome opportunity to catch up on things as well as taking a well-earned break.

When we return to the House in September we will hear who the new Leader of the Conservative Party is and thus the new Prime Minister. I anticipate that whoever is elected it will be a busy time with the inevitable reshuffle of Ministers and changes that will follow. However the House will pick up where it left off and on the first day back we will have the second reading of the Data Protection and Digital Information Bill. This Bill has been brought forward to review regulation on the processing of individual data and the use of information. This is distinct from the Online Safety Bill which is to make provision for regulation by OFCOM of certain internet services. The latter is in response to broad consensus that there is a great need for regulation of online content and is a little further ahead in the parliamentary process. In the same week we will also have the second reading of the Financial Services and Markets Bill which seeks to bolster the competitiveness of the UK as a global financial centre and deliver better outcomes for consumers and businesses. So there will be important business to attend to as soon as the House resumes.

Having mentioned stages of the progress of a Bill through the House it might be worth a word on these stages. The second reading of a Bill is the first time that it is debated in the Chamber and all MPs can make a contribution should they wish to do so. Following this a Bill goes to a committee which will have been set up specifically for that purpose. At this stage those on the committee will go through the Bill in detail. This will then lead to the Report stage at which all MPs have the opportunity to consider the work of the committee and amendments may be put forward.

In the meantime I am spending time during the recess getting out and about in the constituency and also trying to catch up with key organisations. For example I took the opportunity to revisit Townlands Hospital in Henley which I have not been able to visit for a while due to the pandemic. This is a good news story that is going from strength to strength with Outpatients, Ear, Nose and Throat, Audiology and Radiology provided by Royal Berkshire Trust and Oxfordshire Health continuing to offer other services such as a busy Podiatry service. This summer they are also piloting a Rapid Access Care Unit which will support NHS services such as the South-Central Ambulance Service and the 111 service. I would like to see more such facilities available in other areas too.

When the House returns there will be much to do. It will be an interesting time as the new Prime Minister settles into the role and puts their stamp on it.
