

A Crowmarsh Wedding

A large crowd gathered at Crowmarsh Church, not only from Crowmarsh, but from Wallingford and neighbouring villages, for the wedding of Frances Caroline Williams-Wynn, second daughter of Henry Bertie Williams-Wynn of Howbery Park to Samuel Richard Brewis, of Ibstone House, Bucks. Frances was only 18 at the time. The wedding was due to start at 11am on Wednesday 6th November 1872. Large crowds began to gather up to an hour before the commencement of the ceremony. The road from Howbery Park to St Mary's Church was lined with people and the churchyard was full of spectators. The pathway from the street was carpeted and over the gate an arch was erected made from evergreens and flowers, topped with a flag bearing the words "May you be happy" (there was no lych-gate in 1872).

Around the entrance to the church, ferns and flowers had been arranged; inside the decorations were very elaborate. All the floral arrangements were done by Miss Eleanor Trollope and her sisters, daughters of the Rector, Revd J Trollope. As soon as the church was opened, people crowded in filling all the pews, with the exception of the chancel, which was reserved for the family and their guests, (about fifty in number). Many of the villagers who had come to witness the wedding were unable to get into the church, but were able to watch the ceremony by looking through the windows.

The bride, who was accompanied by her father, was the last to arrive. She was met at the church door by her six bridesmaids. The bridesmaids were her three sisters, Jessie, Bertha and Henrietta, Countess Marie and

Countess Helene Bismarck (two of the bride's cousins) and Miss Emily Conant, cousin of the bridegroom. The bridesmaids were dressed in white silk tunics over white muslin, with pink and blue trimmings, with headdresses of lily of the valley and orange blossom with white tulle veils. The best man was Mr Percy Brewis, the bridegroom's brother. The bride wore a white silk dress, trimmed with Brussels lace, with a headdress that matched the bridesmaids'. The service was conducted by the Revds H Savell-Young, Studholme Brownrigg (an uncle) and the Rector J Trollope.

After the service, the happy couple walked down the aisle to Mendelssohn's Wedding March. As they left the church, the bells of Crowmarsh and Wallingford were rung. The path from the church to the road was lined by flag-waving school children; flowers covered the path up to the gate. The couple were conveyed to Howbery Park by carriage, where a wedding breakfast was served to the fifty guests. After the breakfast, the usual toasts and speeches were made. The bride and groom left for Didcot Station, from where they went on to Bath by train.

In the evening a dance was held at which a hundred guests were invited, the music being provided by Slapoffski's quadrille band. Guests were also able to view the presents which were on display in the morning room.

It's interesting to note that Frances' two bridesmaids, Marie and Helene, were related to Karl Otto von Bismarck, the German Chancellor. Marie was his daughter and Helene was his niece; her mother, Charlotte, was the sister of Henry Bertie Williams-Wynn, of Howbery Park.

The History of Glass and Glasses

December's talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) will be given by Dr Stephen Head, who will present 'The History of Glass and Glasses'.

The White Tower under the Normans

January's talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) will be given by Jeremy Ashbee (English Heritage), who will present 'The White Tower under the Normans'.

Following his excellent talk on the Tower of London in the 13th and 14th centuries at the recent 'Castles of the Thames Valley' conference in Wallingford, Jeremy will be talking to us again about the Norman core of the Tower, the White Tower.

Based on work he did some years ago ahead of a major conservation campaign at the Tower, the talk will present a synthesis of documentary and archaeological examination of the building, and comparison with other parts of the complex and other towers elsewhere, to suggest what the intentions of the Normans were when they built it, and how that contrasts with how it subsequently evolved and was used in practice.

Citizens' Advice Bureau

Heat your home and save money

Are you having problems heating your house, or do you feel that you're paying more than you should? South Oxfordshire Citizens' Advice is urging people to take action, cut their bills by checking that they are on the best possible deal, switch tariff or supplier, or take up offers of help to insulate their homes.

You could benefit from savings of up to £320 a year from energy efficiency measures, an average of £100 by paying by direct debit, and up to £200 by shopping around.

Citizens' Advice has published new energy advice information and links to comparison tools. To find out how you can benefit, visit www.citizensadvice.org.uk/advisernet/consumer/energy/energy-supply

Citizens' Advice has also issued eight moneysaving tips:

- 1. Check your bills carefully and read your meter regularly so you can check that you're paying the right amount.
- 2. Talk to your supplier if you think your bill is wrong or if you have problems paying. They will give you advice or talk you through repayment options.
- 3. Make sure that you are on the cheapest tariff. Check with your supplier and use an accredited tariff-switching website to see who is offering the best deal. Most energy suppliers offer fixed price tariffs, ie the price of a unit of energy will stay the same for the length of the deal.
- 4. If you use a pre-payment meter, remember that standing charges will be added daily, even when you aren't using energy. Check how much these standing charges are and keep your meter topped up to avoid unexpected charges.

- 5. If you use heating oil as your main fuel, buy before winter and see if there are any local oil-buying clubs you can join. A scheme covering many local villages is the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council's Bulk Oil-Buying Scheme visit www.oxon.rcc.org.uk
- 6. Make your home energy-efficient. Insulate lofts and cavity walls, install double glazing or use thick curtains to keep the heat in. Get your boiler serviced or replaced to ensure that it is energy-efficient. There are schemes to help pay for this and Citizens' Advice can tell you about them.
- 7. Save money and energy don't leave appliances on standby. Fix leaking hot water taps and turn off the light when you leave a room.
- 8. Do a home energy check visit the Energy Saving Trust home energy check at www.hec.est.org.uk Use this check to get a full report with details of your home energy use and the savings you could make.

Lastly, if money is tight, contact your local Citizens' Advice. They can look into your situation and see whether you are getting all the benefits you're entitled to, or if you can get help paying your bills.



Notes of the Parish Council Meeting held at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 5th November 2015

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Nigel Hannigan, Francesca Jones, Stephen Sherbourne, Andrew Hermsen, Ann Sharp, David Mannering and Stuart Soames; Sue Rance (Clerk), Melanie Malcolm (Finance Officer) and members of the public.

Apologies: from Councillors A Johnson, Mo Fillmore and Fleur Stevenson.

Matters arising from previous meeting

Grass cutting: the Crowmarsh Hill end of the footpath to Park View had still not been cut but must be included in the contract for next year. Cllr Soames had asked Scofell to do a final cut on the recreation ground at North Stoke.

The SODC Waste Team will not approve any new dog waste bins and has decided that litter bins recently requested by the Parish Council are unnecessary. Dog waste may now be placed in litter bins where no dog bin is available: signs need to be added to make this clear. Howbery Park do not plan to install a bin at the bus stop by the entrance to their site in Benson Lane but will continue to pick up litter there as necessary.

Cllrs Sherbourne and Griffin attended the Agrivert Liaison Meeting. There were no serious problems to report. Agrivert supply compost for both Botany and Emery-Owen allotments and are open to applications to support community projects.

The Chairman had attended the recent Town and Parish Council Forum and asked about the future of the SODC office site. A settlement with the insurers is expected by the end of the year, after which an announcement will be made.

Concerns about possible exposure to asbestos and vermin will be reported again to SODC and to our District Councillors.

It was agreed that retiring councillors may be presented with a long service certificate (gifts of monetary value are not allowed from public funds). The details will be discussed at a future meeting.

Finance

Payments were approved and the income and expenditure noted. A draft budget will be presented at the 10th December meeting. It was agreed that a budget working party will meet beforehand to prioritise suggested projects for presentation to the full council meeting.

The Finance Officer reported that the Council Tax Relief Support Grant, which has been received in the past from SODC, is being withheld this year, but grants may be applied for from SODC for specific projects.

The County Council is looking at devolving responsibility for a number of maintenance tasks to town and parish councils. Funding is not passed on in most cases, so parishes would have to find the costs from their budget, but might be able to manage the work more efficiently and could call on volunteers.

The council's insurance arrangements were reviewed and approved. The Finance Officer will review the council's asset register.

Grants of £100 each were agreed to the Crowmarsh and the North Stoke British Legion Poppy Appeals.

South Oxfordshire Food and Education Alliance: The Clerk will request more information about the charity's financial position and ask whether local people are benefitting from the service they offer.

County Councillor's report

Cllr Gray reported that the planned £50,000,000 of County Council cuts to services such as children's centres could be avoided by increasing council tax by 10%. This would require the County Council to hold a referendum and win it. At the 'Talking Oxfordshire' meeting held at the Regal Centre in Wallingford to discuss the cuts, there was a call for a public referendum on an increase in council tax.

An on-line consultation is taking place on children's centres: these may be withdrawn and replaced by eight resource centres in the major towns. More children are being taken into care than ever before so an early intervention service is needed to reduce this. Cllr Gray is working with children's centres to see what can be done in terms of locality support and to try to obtain some funding from other organisations, including parish councils.

The 134 Wallingford – The Stokes – Goring bus service is unlikely to be cut. There are currently 100 users of this service per day. However, other subsidised bus services will be affected.

OCC is asking parish councils to take on some of their responsibilities through a scheme called Oxfordshire Together: for example, grass cutting (which Crowmarsh Parish Council already does), school crossing patrol, sign cleaning and minor tree maintenance. Verges are now cut twice a year except for areas where safety is a consideration.

P15/S2158/FUL: Amendment no. 1: Proposed partial demolition of The Springs Hotel and part conversion, along with new build development to create 19 dwellings. The Springs Hotel, Wallingford Road, North Stoke OX10 6BE:

RECOMMEND REFUSAL as original application.

P15/S3211/HH: Single storey side and rear extension. 14 Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8ED: RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

P15/S3221/HH: Double and single storey rear extensions. Replacement glazing. PV panels to rear roof slope of existing house and roof slope to new rear extension. Demolition of existing outbuildings (as amended to reduce the depth of the extensions). 24 Wallingford Road, North Stoke (in the parish of Crowmarsh), OX10 6BB: RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

P15/S3350/HH: Garsons Cottage, Pocock Lane, North Stoke (in the parish of Crowmarsh), OX10 6BG:
NO STRONG VIEWS.

P15/S3387/FUL: Demolition of existing buildings and creation of a new headquarters for CABI, erection of 91 dwelling houses, comprising open market and affordable housing, provision of open space, landscaping and parking and other associated works. The residential part of the proposal is made in full while the CABI headquarters part is made in outline form with all matters reserved for future consideration except access: CABI International, Nosworthy Way, Mongewell (in the parish of Crowmarsh), OX10 8DE: RECOMMEND REFUSAL for the following reasons:

1. In planning terms this application consists of two distinct parts: an outline application for a replacement headquarters building for CABI, and a full application for a commercial housing development (intended to fund the new CABI building). The harm caused by the major

"enabling" housing development in visual, amenity and environmental terms would greatly exceed the benefit of replacing the existing CABI offices with a sustainable new HQ building in the area of outstanding natural beauty.

- 2. The main reason for recommending the refusal of this application is that it proposes major new residential development in an isolated location in the countryside. This is a substantial proposal for 91 housing units in a rural area away from the settlements of Crowmarsh Gifford and Wallingford. This is not a location where housing would normally be allowed. It is not a sustainable location for residential development and is contrary to Core Strategy policy CSS1 and SOLP policies G1 to G4 and H6: "Except as specifically provided for under other plan policies, planning permission will not be granted for new houses: (i) in the countryside, (ii) in settlements not listed ..., and (iii) on the edge of settlements ..." The site is approximately three-quarters of a mile from the settlement of Crowmarsh Gifford (designated as a larger village in the Local Plan) across open fields with no direct vehicular access.
- 3. This site is part of the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, where only development that conserves or enhances the landscape quality of the AONB will be allowed (SOLP policy C2, Core Strategy policy CSEN1, NPPF paragraph 155). The residential development proposed will not conserve or enhance the AONB.
- 4. The proposals greatly expand the built footprint of a mainly green site, destroying biodiverse green areas (contrary to SOLP policy C6 and Core Strategy policies CSG1 and CSB1) and urbanising the area, including the setting of the popular public bridleway along one side of the site.
- 5. The site is accessed off the A4130 Nosworthy Way, a very fast piece of road, on a curve, with restricted visibility. The residential development will cause significant extra traffic as almost all travel between this remote site and any services or facilities will need to be by motorised transportation.
- 6. The outline application for the new HQ

complex depends entirely on the "enabling" additional housing to fund it. We have serious concerns that if the full application part of the proposal is approved prior to a fully approved application for the HQ complex it could allow the site to become a housing development without the proposed HQ complex being completed. In any case this is not the best location for a sustainable office development and is only put forward because CABI already occupies the site.

Recreation Ground & Environment Committee

The tennis club has moved to Benson. We need to promote greater use of the hard courts, which we have invested in.

The tree survey has shown that a number of willow trees near the river need to be made safe and action on this is under review. It was agreed to put up a notice and fence off part of the area and the public are asked to keep away from the riverside end of the nature area. It is hoped that some tree planting can be carried out in the main nature area soon.

Requests had now been received for remedial work on two ash trees. It was agreed that Tom Cottrell would be asked to carry out the tree work at Howbery Farm and to submit an estimate for the tree at Jethro Tull Gardens.

Traffic and Transport committee

Cllrs Sherbourne and Sharp expressed interest in joining Cllr Jones on this committee.

On 10th November a decision was to be made by Oxfordshire County Council about cutting bus subsidies. The final decision has not been made but the cuts are severe and a Parish Transport Representatives' meeting will discuss this on 25th November.

Dial-a-Ride has been withdrawn and a volunteer drivers scheme to replace it could be a project to consider when drawing up the 2015/16 budget.

The Chairman has received a letter from the Hampshire and Thames Valley Police Operations Unit agreeing to meet to discuss the issue of speeding on the A4074 Portway.

There is no further news about the access road to the riverside park.

Report on the Thames River Users' Group (RUG3)

Cllr Mannering reported that there would no longer be public access to fire extinguishers at locks. Health and safety issues have been identified associated with the use of poles at locks. Riverside trees are to be managed by the relevant landowners rather than the Environment Agency. The fine for non-payment of mooring fees is £100. This applies to any boat using the river.

Next meeting

The next Parish Council Meeting is on Thursday 10h December at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. All welcome. The council does not normally meet in January.

Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall is ideal for children's parties and can be booked for £10.00 per hour (minimum 2 hours).
