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
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Letters to the Editor

(1) Crowmarsh and the Developers

Six years ago in the High Court, our community defeated Bloor Homes' third successive bid to develop land east of Benson Lane. The first proposal, submitted by Bloor Homes / Hallam Land Management, was for 420 dwellings on the triangle of land belonging to Farmer Edwards, straddling Marsh Lane. Successive bids have been for smaller plots of this same land, with more modest numbers of dwellings, but all intended as phased developments of the whole plot.

A new surprise attack came to us in the Village Hall at a Bloor Homes exhibition on 18th October. This was again a poorly concealed plan to develop up to 450 houses on the same land, in a phased development; phase 1 consisting of 150 houses. Emotions were clearly running high at the exhibition, as many of us remembered the previous battle. But Bloor will not lie down and capitulate, so again we need to prepare for battle. Bloor's proposal comes hot on the heels of an unpopular move by Lightwood Strategic, to develop a site at Newnham Green on the other side of the village.

But this time we are not just trying to save these 'green lungs' of the village, we are trying to save the village itself. Why? Because now we are faced with development proposals from all sides: 80 houses at Newnham Manor (our approved site with the Planning Department); 85 at Newnham Green; the prospect of 80 or so houses on the SODC site; and CABI, who want to develop their land on the By Pass.

The total could amount to over 700 new houses, or 400 excluding further phases of the Bloor project. We do need some new houses though, and the 80 houses at Newnham Manor, and the likely 80 or so at the SODC site in Benson Lane will surely satisfy that need, without impacting on the community.

Currently, Crowmarsh Gifford is about 450 dwellings. Our roads can barely cope with the traffic generated by ourselves, the workers in Benson Lane and elsewhere in the village, and the Wallingford through traffic. Our excellent school is just coping with demand. Our sewer-

age system copes for some of the time. Yet we are a community with no easy access to shops, many of us finding better facilities in Didcot and Benson, rather than attempting to park in Wallingford. In the future, Wallingford Bridge may be closed to traffic during the day. Clearly, the various developers have preconceptions about our infrastructure which they must have inspected wearing rose-coloured spectacles.

We need to Save Crowmarsh. We have a preferred development site at Newnham Manor, and a large brownfield site at SODC. Housing development at Newnham Green, with entry and exit adjacent to the school, is nonsensical given the twice daily mayhem that already occurs in Old Reading Road. By the same token development east of Benson Lane, which is out of proportion with the capacity of the village, is unacceptable as it would change us from a village community into a small characterless town, albeit one with virtually no facilities and a serious traffic problem.

We must now fight to save these sites from the clutches of the developers, not as NIMBYs, but so that we Save Crowmarsh for ourselves and for our children. If you too would like to help achieve this goal, please contact CRAG, the Crowmarsh Action Group, on facebook.com/savecrowmarsh/.

(2) Community Development

It will soon be two years since the council offices burnt down. In that time the council have indicated that with the plans for some form of unitary council across the county they are very unlikely to re-occupy the site. In an effort to maximise their income it is probable that they intend to use it for housing. This is despite the fact that the land has never been designated for housing. With at least three developers considering applications for other sites within the village the last thing we need is more houses.

The likely growth of the village means that we all need to decide what our community development priorities are.

We currently have the village hall and the pavilion, both of which are single storey buildings. This limits the sporting activities that

they can accommodate. With this in mind I suggest that we need a sports/youth hall similar to the one in Cholsey. This has the size and height for a badminton court with additional meeting and storage rooms. It supports a multitude of activities.

I regard such a hall as a minimum requirement. When I was growing up in the village we had access to indoor swimming pools at Carmel College and Turners Court. Both are long closed. Anybody wanting to learn to swim or exercise now has to travel to Berinsfield, Didcot or Henley. The Crowmarsh and Wallingford area needs its own 25-metre indoor pool. The only plans South Oxfordshire District Council seems to have is for a new swimming pool at Didcot. They have no plans for new facilities for us.

Both of these buildings will be expensive to build and run. So where is the money going to come from? It may surprise people to know that as of the 31st March this year South Oxfordshire's accounts show that they had total reserves of £113 million and useable reserves of £89 million.

I respectfully suggest that some of that money should be used to make Crowmarsh fit for the future, however it is forced to develop in the coming years.

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A Crowmarsh Rummage Sale

Because the Elementary Education Act of 1893 raised the school leaving age to 11 years, there was an extra cost on the school budgets. The Crowmarsh and Newnham School Managers estimated this at £80 (over £8000 today). A sum of £55 had been raised by various donations by August 1894, and to raise the remaining £25, the School Managers decided to hold a Rummage Sale.

The Vicar (Revd. Ennor) offered to host the Rummage on the Vicarage lawn and the date chosen was Thursday 27th September. A Committee consisting of Mrs William-Wynn, Misses Hedges, Misses Trollope, Mrs Greene, Mrs Fuller and Mrs Ennor was formed to receive the contributions.


On the day, the weather was fine, and during the afternoon and evening large numbers visited the Vicarage and it was thought that there were many bargains to be purchased. There were five stalls: the first sold only new articles, a second sold furniture, on the third all articles were a penny, the fourth sold hats and caps, and the fifth was the refreshment stall run by Mrs George Phillips, Mrs Dearlove and Mrs Gutteridge. Each stall was inside an opened sided tent and after dusk the tents were lit by Chinese lanterns. To provide shelter from the sun, large and colourful Japanese umbrellas were scattered around the grounds.

Various attractions were also provided. One of these was run by Master Allen Stevens and consisted of a large battery. For the sum of one penny he gave you an electric shock. Surprisingly he made 4 shillings (20p), which meant he had 48 customers! A children's entertainment was given in the dining room of the Rectory, which was also used for an exhibition of fine art in the evening, arranged by Mrs Parker. But the viewing of Charles I's head had to cancelled, as it was claimed the head had to return to Windsor on state business.

During the afternoon, the Berrick Brass Band played a fine selection of music. Amongst those who gave articles were Mrs Williams-Wynn, Mrs Ennor, Mrs Platt, Mrs J Phillips,

Mrs Parker, Miss Ellen Hedges, Miss Ada Hedges, Miss Alice Hedges, Miss Lucy Trollope, Miss Alice Trollope, Miss Newton, Miss Nora Marshall and Miss Mackay.

The School Managers were also present: Mr de Mornay, Mr Manley, Mr Dearlove and the Revd Ennor. In the evening, any remaining articles were up for auction by the Revd Farrar, and most of them were sold. Messrs Fry and Co donated a large case of chocolates, which arrived too late to be auctioned on the day but was sold privately on Saturday. The sale was a great success as the sum raised amounted to £35, enabling the debt to be paid off with a little left over.

William came to Wallingford

1066 commemorations are coming to a close. However, the English did not submit after their defeat at the Battle of Hastings in October 1066! A highly organised Norman campaign of intimidation and attrition saw one town yield after another, with the most important being Dover, Canterbury, Winchester, and finally Wallingford.

The Norman army probably arrived in Wallingford in late November/early December. They crossed the Thames outside the South Gate, approximately at Bradford's Brook, and pitched camp on the Crowmarsh side of the river.

Over the next few days the details of the eventual surrender of the English were negotiated with Archbishop Stigand, who had a residence inside the town. After concluding successfully, the army moved north to Great Berkhamsted where Prince Edgar, other nobles and the Archbishop of York formally surrendered to William.

Wallingford Museum's special exhibition '1066 – William comes to Wallingford!' will close on

30th November. It features William the Conqueror's impact on Wallingford - including his crossing of the Thames here with his army, 950 years ago after the Battle of Hastings.

Gary Lock returns to present a talk to The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) about the excavations at Marcham and Frilford.

Gary is Emeritus Professor of Archaeology at the Institute of Archaeology, Oxford University. Extensive excavations at Marcham and Frilford have exposed a complex of Iron Age and Romano-British evidence in the form of structures, features and material culture. It seems that during both periods this site was a focus for religious and ritual activities, suggesting strong elements of continuity and change in the ways people worshipped over approximately 1000 years.

Our last Market for 2016 will be held on Friday 23rd December. We re-open after Christmas on Friday 13th January.



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
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Services for November

There will be no service on the morning of Sunday 20th November as we will be worshipping together in St Mary's, Wallingford at 10am.

November has always been a season of remembrance as we begin the month with All Saints Day (1st November) followed by All Souls Day when we remember the faithful departed (which we marked at St Mary Magdalene on the last Sunday in October).

These chances to remember should be taken with gladness – they need never be seen as a morbid obsession with those who have died, but a chance to say thank you for their lives, and perhaps even to acknowledge that they are still part of us and have made us the people that we are today.

This year's Remembrance Sunday will again be especially poignant, 100 years after the horrors of the Battle of the Somme. By this time, any ideas of a noble, chivalrous or glorious war had been replaced with the pure evil of having to go over the top into walls of barbed wire and machine gun fire, or the silent killers such as mustard gas hanging low in the mud of the trenches.

Such was the experience of the local lads of this area, each a real person, mourned by a local family. Men such as Alfred George Skeates, Private 17020 in the Princess Charlotte of Wales' Royal Berks Regiment (1st Battalion) whose family lived at Newnham Farm, who was killed in action on 14th November 1916. The family had already lost another son, Albert William Skeates, a 19 year old stoker serving on HMS *Formidable* which was sunk by a U-boat on New Year's Day of 1915. These are just two of the seven who died in WW1. Even more sad is that another five names would be added within a generation, and a reminder that we have a duty to work for peace, beginning with prayer.

I do hope you will be able to join us on Remembrance Sunday, 13th November (exact arrangements are still being finalised and will publicised nearer the time). Or, perhaps, just to take your own "time-out" when you walk past the lych gate, remembering those who gave their lives. The church will be open for you where another memorial can be found to these men, in the presence of God who knows all about giving his life to save others...

May they rest in peace and rise in glory!

District Councillor's Report

Scrutiny

We recently looked at the emerging Strategic Economic Plan for Oxfordshire with colleagues from the Vale at Joint Scrutiny Committee.

We share concerns over the way that the Plan as it stands is very Oxford-centric and focuses on the 'science and technology spine' from Bicester through to Harwell. Both councils have concerns that this focus means that areas like ours, and the need for infrastructure, both physical and technological, and premises for small businesses to grow into have not been addressed. A document containing our concerns has been drawn up with a recommendation that Cabinet refer the Plan to full Council for debate.

Public consultation on changes to local health services

Public opinion and feedback on proposed changes to health care provision in the district is being requested as part of a public consultation starting in January 2017.

Earlier this year, the local NHS ran a series of county-wide events, seeking the public's views on the options developed by Oxfordshire's healthcare leaders, to make care clinically and financially sustainable for the future. Health services affected include maternity and children's services, mental health and primary care.

Proposed changes will be significant and include how care is delivered, and the number and location of sites from which it is provided. No decisions have been made about proposed changes, and no actions will be taken until the public consultation is complete, so the consultation feedback will help shape the transformation of healthcare services in Oxfordshire for the future. Waste Recycling – South Oxfordshire top again

According to provisional rates published by Letsrecycle.com, we look set to retain our place as the country's top recycling authority. So far, South Oxfordshire is top of the Let's Recycle league table, with residents recycling 66.5 per cent, with the Vale of White Horse second at 64.8 per cent.

Recent issues with contamination have resulted in a decrease of 0.8 per cent from last year for both districts. This is being tackled this Autumn with a ban on black sacks. However, with nine out of the top ten districts experiencing a drop in recycling over the last year, we are not the only ones with this issue. DEFRA will announce the official result later in the year.

Changing sacks to boost recycling

Reminder: from 3rd November, we'll only empty green wheelie bins if the recycling in them is loose or in clear sacks.

Despite a recent campaign to raise awareness about the problem of contamination, some continue to contaminate recycling with food waste and dirty nappies, resulting in whole truckloads of recycling being rejected at recycling centres.

So, we are insisting on clear sacks or no sacks to help identify contaminated bins. Until 3rd November we'll leave a bin hanger on any bins containing black or coloured sacks explaining the problem. We'll empty the bin on that occasion, but if it happens after 3rd November we won't empty the bin but will leave a note to explain why.

Keeping safe against cybercrime

With increasing numbers of people from any background, age or income caught out by online scams, cybercrime is a real concern for many of our residents.

Science Exchange Wallingford Uncovering the Building Blocks of the Universe

Science Exchange Wallingford's next meeting is at 7.30pm on Tuesday 22nd November in Wallingford School Library, St George's Road, Wallingford. Professor Alan Barr of the Department of Physics at the University of Oxford will give a talk entitled 'Uncovering the Building Blocks of the Universe'.

The search to understand the basic constituents of matter has led scientists to

build international collaborations and some of the largest scientific projects in the world. This talk will describe work at the Large Hadron Collider, and discuss what it has already told us and what it might tell us in the future about the world around us.

Professor Barr is active in communicating physics to the public. As well as television interviews with Sky, ITV and Channel 4 News, he presented a documentary on Large Hadron Collider physics that was broadcast by the National Geographic Channel. He has been involved in a number of school events, including organising visits to the LHC, and has been awarded the Institute of Physics 'High Energy Particle Physics Group' Science in Society Award.

Science Exchange meetings are very informal. Speakers talk for about half an hour, then we break for refreshments and return for a lively question and answer session. We are grateful that the support of local company Triaster, Wallingford School and the generosity of our speakers ensures that each event is free to attend. Notes of the Parish Council Meeting at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 6th October 2016

Present: Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Nigel Hannigan, Andrew Johnson, Francesca Jones, Ann Sharp, Stephen Sherbourne, David Mannering and Stuart Soames; Sue Rance (Clerk) and County Councillor Mark Gray.

Apologies were received from Councillors Andrew Hermsen and Fleur Stevenson.

Kieran Moloney (recently appointed Finance Officer) was welcomed. He has worked in finance throughout his career and is a Fellow of the Institute of Management Accountants. Four members of the public attended part of the meeting.

Matters from previous meeting

Cllr Sherbourne reported that roadside vegetation at the Crowmarsh roundabout has now been cut back, partly by the county council's contractors and partly by Mr Sherbourne himself. He will photograph the roundabout as a record of how it should look so that this can be kept under review.

Cllr Jones will report the large pothole at the entrance to the Riverside Park to the Highways Authority via 'Fix my Street'.

Cllr Sharp will meet with a resident in Jethro Tull Gardens to discuss concerns about the ash tree.

In addition to three grit bins needed at Park View, Cllr Sherbourne reported that an additional bin is needed at the entrance to Crowmarsh Hill from the Henley Road.

Finance

A schedule of payments made in September was approved, including £714.00 to Scofell for grass cutting and £186.94 to Grundon for refuse collection from the pavilion.

A report on receipts and payments at 31st August showed the bank balance on the current account was £48,375.83. Funds on deposit were £91,286.97 and there was £2850.50 in the Unity Trust Account.

Grass cutting

Cllr Sharp recommended that for next season two cuts of the verges and open spaces should be carried out in April, May and June and one cut in July, August, September and October, a total of ten cuts (which could be adjusted if necessary, depending on weather conditions). The Crowmarsh Gifford Recreation Ground will still need to be cut on a weekly basis.

It was agreed that ten cuts would be needed next year for the North Stoke Recreation Ground, but first it would require remedial work to prepare the ground for ongoing maintenance. Cllr Soames thanked the scouts for clearing the path to the recreation ground.

Cllr Sharp will seek quotes for all these areas for next year's grass cutting.

Report of County Councillor

County Councillor Gray reported that the county council favours a single unitary authority for the whole county of Oxfordshire, with locality meetings in each of the five Districts. Oxfordshire would then be the third largest authority in the country after Birmingham and Leeds. This arrangement is expected to save £20-30 million per year. The district councils disagree: they favour three unitary councils.

A large majority of councillors voted to oppose introduction of grammar schools.

Cllr Griffin has spoken to Cllr David Nimmo-Smith (cabinet member at OCC) about the delay in opening the new access road to the Riverside Park from Stephen's Field. Cllr Gray will chase this up with Cllr Nimmo-Smith. It is hoped that grants for community projects will continue. It is also planned to offer training for volunteers.

Planning

Neighbourhood planning

The Chairman has contacted Nettebed Parish Council about neighbourhood plans and will discuss this further with them. No decision has been made.

Parish Council responses to SODC:

P16/S2961/FUL (Full Application): Erection of two detached houses with new (shared) highway access. Land fronting Wallingford Road, North Stoke (in the parish of Crowmarsh), OX10 6BD.

RECOMMEND REFUSAL for the following reasons:

- 1. Crowmarsh Parish Council considers this is over-development of the site.
- 2. The shared access arrangement and limited on-site parking for two four-bedroomed properties have the potential to create a dangerous situation on the B4009, taking into account the close proximity to the bus stop.
- 3. The size, design and positioning of the proposed development will have a significant

impact on the neighbouring properties with the scale and bulk resulting in overlooking and potential loss of light.

P16/S3040/HH: Single storey front, side and rear extensions. 15 Newnham Green, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8EW. RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

P16/S3175/HH & P16/S3176/LB: Demolition and replacement of existing lean-to boiler housing, replacement of timber boards forming the roof the front porch and alterations to the front door. 1 Church Cottages, Church Lane, North Stoke, OX10 6BH.
RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

P16/S3186/HH: Garage conversion to habitable accommodation and second-storey extension above. 27 Howbery Farm, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8NR.
RECOMMEND APPROVAL.

Environment and recreation ground

The half-court for basketball practice will be a facility available to all residents. Consideration is being given to refurbishment of the children's play area. Grants are available for projects of this type and applications will be made to SODC. It has been agreed to accept the cheapest of three quotes for the basketball court, which is £5,400 plus VAT. We plan to delay installation until we have applied to SODC for a grant: the scheme opens on 31st October.

Cllr Johnson is in the process of completing a Centenary Fields application for the Crowmarsh Recreation Ground to dedicate the space to all in perpetuity in remembrance of the First World War.

Some of the saplings planted at the nature area by Scofell are now becoming established, including a number of black poplars. Cllr Johnson will arrange for Scofell to spray the nettles and lay bark chippings to improve the path.

It was agreed to investigate improving the water supply for allotment holders, maybe covering the water troughs to prevent the water from becoming stagnant or installing a tap with an automatic shut-off.

Traffic and transport

Cllr Jones will circulate minutes of the recent county-wide Parish Transport Reps' meeting.

The design work on the A4074 Portway pedestrian crossing has been received. It was agreed to proceed with a formal request to OCC and to obtain costings for the project.

Footway improvements have been carried out in The Street in Crowmarsh Gifford from the roundabout to Newnham Manor.

There has been some traffic speed monitoring on the A4074 recently. Cllr Sherbourne will ask the police to carry out more speed checks on the A4074.

The county council has cancelled the Go Ride contract for the school run to Wallingford School and is now using a taxi service. This will be taken up with County Councillor Gray.

Benson Parish Council does not consider there is a need for a shelter at the bus stop on the A4074 opposite the end of Benson Lane. This will be kept under review. A shelter is to be erected in Benson Lane opposite the village hall.

Correspondence

- Letter from a resident about the proposals for a new housing development behind the Newnham Green estate.
- Email from Mr Rupert Shute regarding a planning application he plans to submit shortly. The Clerk will respond.
- Letter from a resident expressing concern about possible flooding in The Street which could result when the spring is running as the ditch has been filled in. It was noted that ditches are the responsibility of the riparian landowner. The Clerk will reply.

Other business

- Cllr Sharp raised the question of footpath improvements needed in Crowmarsh. This will be discussed at a future meeting.
- Computer equipment needed for parish council officers will be discussed at the next meeting.
- A draft letter from Cllr Sherbourne

regarding possible future use of the SODC site will be circulated (now submitted to *Crowmarsh News*).

- Strategic spending priorities will be reviewed at the November meeting.
- Storage of sandbags will be discussed at the November meeting.
