

Wallingford Country Market

The Country Market is open every Friday morning in St. Mary-le-More Church (behind the Town Hall) between 9.30 and 12 noon, where we sell a range of baking, plants and other produce, preserves, honey, eggs (when available) and crafts. The market has been a popular feature of the town for nearly 50 years.

Plants, produce and crafts will be available every week, but the bakery table will only be available on the first and third Fridays of each month: 4th & 18th November and 2nd & 16th December. There will be an extra special Christmas Market on 23rd December, the last market of the year. 18th November is when we start taking Christmas orders for most baked items we sell, and the market returns after the Christmas break on Friday 20th January 2023.

Baking will only be available each Friday in future if we can recruit new bakers. So, if you love to cook, (sweet or savoury), and feel that you may like to join us, please contact Alison (our Market Manager) on 01491-681596 or pop into the market one Friday morning and speak with her or any of the bakers. You would not necessarily have to bake every week, but any additional help will be very much appreciated.

Benson Garden Club

To open our 2022/23 speaker programme, Benson Garden Club's October talk was given by Nick Bailey. Nick is a freelance horticulturalist, best-selling author, awardwinning TV presenter, garden designer and speaker. He is a very engaging speaker and "Revive Your Garden" proved to be a practical and inspirational talk, starting with an unrelated fun fact that Chelsea Physic Garden (where he was Head Gardener for 7 years) has the most northerly fruiting grapefruit in the world.

Nick then took us through the steps and accompanying techniques needed to rejuvenate a garden from scratch. Understanding the nuances of your garden was Nick's starting point e.g. what type of soil do you have, what existing plants can you revive by cutting back really hard, where are the sun traps? Form follows function and Nick reminded us that the garden has to be practical as well as beautiful. Adding plenty of organic matter - Nick recommended mulching with milled manure – is also an important part of the rejuvenation process.

Nick showed us examples of different pruning techniques – my favourite was the canopy lift, which can transform your garden's appearance. He also described how you can layer into existing plants for successional planting with dramatic effects. For example, clematis are beautiful plants that can grow through other plants. Adding annuals to existing borders is another way to rejuvenate a tired patch – sowing Mosquito Flower seeds was one suggestion. Nick also suggested sowing self-seeders such as Nigella (Love-in-a -mist), which often create some of the best effects.

We received plenty of creative tips and inspirational ideas – what a fantastic start to our speaker programme!

Our next talk on 3rd November will be given by another very experienced and well-known gardener. With over 40 years' experience in retail and production horticulture, Andy McIndoe is an author and regular contributor to a number of magazines, blogs and BBC Radio. Andy has also been awarded the prestigious Veitch Memorial Medal. Andy's talk, "The Winter Garden", will cover foliage, flowers, stems and bark that come into their own during winter. As usual, our venue will be Benson parish hall doors open at 7.15pm for 7.45 start (£2 for members, £5 for visitors – just turn up on the door, no need to book). We will also have our "Flower of the Month" competition (for members only).

Under pressure to use an energy pre-payment meter?

Citizens Advice can help

In the concluding months of 2022, Citizens Advice is expecting to see more cases of a disturbing trend: low-income families with energy supply debts being pressured or even coerced into using pre-payment meters for their gas and electricity. Energy supplied by pre-payment meters costs more than energy paid by direct debit or on-demand, and this comes at a time when drastically increased price tariffs this autumn will probably see most people's fuel bills double.

Energy suppliers are legally obliged to negotiate repayment plans with customers who are falling behind on their bills, but many suppliers are ignoring this requirement and proceeding with installing pre-payment meters - or, for customers with smart meters, remotely switching them to prepayment.

If you are one of the many people who are confronting this problem, or are generally floundering amidst your finances, worried about the future, or want to discuss your in confidence, get in touch with Citizens Advice on Adviceline 0808 278 7907. Past Times with David Beasley The Sale of Howbery Estates

It was on the 15th February 1858 that finally Howbery Estates came up for sale, after being advertised for a number of weeks in the local papers. Franklin and Gale were the auctioneers who held the auction in the Corn Exchange. The auctioneer was John Gale, who succeeded in disposing of 39 of the 49 lots. There was considerable interest locally in the auction, the property being well known in connection with the late proprietor William Seymour Blackstone, who was for several years MP for the borough of Wallingford. The Howbery Mansion was uncompleted because Blackstone was declared bankrupt and was unable to pay for the mansion to be completed.

A large number of prospective buyers assembled in the Corn Exchange and the competition was very keen. The total sales amounted to almost £35,000. The arable land and meadows, lying in Crowmarsh Gifford and Newnham Murren, fetched from £40 to £80 per acre. The Howbery Mansion, with two adjoining farms, comprising altogether some 240 acres and a fishery, were purchased by Alfred de Mornay, for a price amounting to nearly £17,000. The purchaser bid in person, and it was understood that he intended to finish and fit up the mansion and live there. The announcement of the sale of the mansion was received with considerable applause.

The Castle Grounds Estate, comprising of the site and ruins of Wallingford Castle with its magnificent trees and views, was sold to Mr John Kirby Hedges, whose residence it adjoins for \pounds 3, 250, exclusive of timber.

It was thought at the time that the prices realised were very satisfactory. Alfred de Mornay didn't stay long at Howbery, having completed the construction of the mansion he sold the house to Mr Williams-Wynn in 1862, and bought Col d'Arbres Estate (Cold Harbour) and lived there until his death in 1895.

We avoid West End theatres and choose local theatres which are up to a couple of hours drive away. Our trips are made in a luxury coach and leave Wallingford and Didcot mid-morning, arriving at the venue in time for lunch before the performance. We leave for home shortly after the performance ends, getting back to Wallingford or Didcot early in the evening. Altogether an enjoyable day out.

Because we are able to get discounts for group bookings ticket prices are reasonable so the current cost to members of the theatre ticket and the coach trip combined is around £60 per person.

Back in 1780 Mozart composed his Vesperae Solennes de Confessore, consisting of five psalms and a Magnificat. It includes the famous Laudate Dominum, whose soprano melody set against a choral background is among the most magical of all Mozart's vocal writing. Benson Choral Society is joined by four soloists and the West Forest Sinfonia Orchestra under distinguished guest conductor Nicholas Cleoburv.

Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 6th October. Present were Councillors Stephen Sherbourne (Chair), Julian Park, David Rowley, Stuart Soames, Fleur Stevenson and Julia Streete, plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and District Councillor Sue Cooper.

Matters arising from the previous meeting

Cllr Sherbourne is awaiting a reply from Lee Turner of Oxfordshire Highways about several highways issues. The clerk has contacted

cabinet members at OCC about our application for a 20mph speed limit and this is on the list to be considered next year.

The school has reminded parents to be careful when parking in Old Reading Road. It is hoped that The Bell will allow parents to park in their car park when dropping off and collecting their children, as the Queens Head does, and that parents can walk with their children either from home or from a safe parking place.

The Finance Officer has requested a quote from Shield Maintenance for cleaning the two bus shelters on Nosworthy Way. It was agreed to engage First Class Tree Surgeons to trim the Home Farm hedge at a cost of £450+VAT as no other contractors had responded.

Finance

The council agreed a grant of £100 each to the North Stoke and Crowmarsh British Legion Poppy Appeals. A donation of £250 was agreed to Wallingford Volunteer Drivers (formerly Wallingford Volunteer Centre).

Staff salaries will be reviewed next month after taking advice from Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils (OALC) and the Society of Local Council Clerks (SLCC) and neighbouring councils.

Payments approved included batteries and fuses for the speed indicator device in the Street (£121.98), repairs to the tennis courts (£4,495.50), maintenance of the nature area (£598.50), the council's external audit (£480), grass cutting (£972.00) and electricity supply at the pavilion for Quarter 2 (£300.87).

Decision by SODC

Newnham Manor development – management of the open space

We now have a calculated commuted sum to be paid to the parish council to manage the open space on this development (excluding highway and estate roads and the area to be conveyed to Crowmarsh Primary School). The parish council agreed in principle to accept the money to manage this area for the benefit of all residents. We will consult Benson Parish Council about their experience as they have taken on a management responsibility for a number of green spaces on new housing developments in their parish.

District Council report

SODC and the Vale of White Horse District Council have moved into offices in Abingdon temporarily. A planning application is being submitted to build new offices opposite Didcot railway station.

SODC is putting in an application for bathing water status for Wallingford Beach (as is Wallingford Town Council), and the parish council agreed to support this initiative to improve river water quality.

Environment and recreation

Cllr Rowley reported that a Pavilion project site meeting was held on 4th October. It is hoped to complete the project before the end of November. The next payment due will be $\pounds 10,795$. The first claim of $\pounds 9557.11$ has been

made to the grant-awarding body FCC Communities Foundation. It was agreed to ask the architect to produce additional drawings and information for the new ramp and stairs to ensure that they comply with building regulation requirements for disabled people.

Anyone parking in the recreation ground car park is reminded to remove their vehicle before the advertised time of closing the gate, or they will be locked in overnight. Cllr Soames reported that an oak tree planted in North Stoke last year is doing well, but around two-thirds of the trees funded by District Councillors for the Crowmarsh Gifford nature area died in the summer drought and only six have survived. Cllr Johnson will obtain a quote for replacement trees. It was reported that a resident of Ewelme has some saplings which he is willing to provide free of charge and there are other sources of free trees.

Traffic and transport

The Bell pedestrian crossing project is now awaiting approval of the plans by Oxfordshire Highways. There has been no news on plans for the crossing at The Springs, North Stoke, although the boundary of The Springs has been queried. County Councillor Bloomfield will be asked to chase up progress on highways issues.

In response to the Parish Council's letter about speeding, the Police and Crime Commissioner, Matthew Barber, and representatives of Thames Valley Roads Policing will attend the December parish council meeting.

Next meeting

The next parish council meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Village Hall on Thursday 3rd November at 7.30pm. Please let the parish clerk know if you would like to attend.

John Howells MP writes

With Party Conference season now over the House returns to business. For my part I was unable to attend Party Conference as I was asked to join two other UK parliamentary representatives on a Council of Europe delegation to Bosnia Herzegovina. The delegation was tasked with monitoring the Presidential and General Elections to verify that the elections were free and fair, and that there was no obvious corruption in the process. Election observation missions help to ensure that the crucial values of the Council of Europe in the matters of human rights, promoting democracy, and the rule of law are known, understood, and accepted, and that countries are committed to them in the ways in which they conduct elections. In this instance we were able to confirm that the election was peaceful and fair. However, in the longer term many questions remain about the stability of the country. This work of the Council of Europe makes an important contribution in working towards greater stability, both in Member States (of which there are 46) and beyond. Observations are by official request of the national authorities.

In recent years we have become only too aware of our global interdependence, both because of the pandemic and, more recently, as a result of the conflict in Ukraine. One aspect of our global interdependence is around food security and supply chains. The need for home production is ever more important for continuity of supply, and also to reduce the miles that our food travels. In an area where farming is important it is good to see the industry being given more independence and financial resilience. The new Environmental Land Management Schemes being rolled out will support farmers to not only produce high-quality food but also to protect and enhance the natural environment.

Another issue that I know to be of local concern is that of planning. I have long championed reforms in this area, seeking greater local input through Neighbourhood Planning, and I am pleased to see that the proposed legislation looks to strengthen this. I have also long expressed my concerns at the lack of infrastructure coming forward in line with development and will be watching closely to see how the proposals for a new Infrastructure Levy will work to ensure that we have the things we need for our communities, such as schools and GP surgeries. I know that some concern has been expressed at the proposals for Investment Zones, especially in relation to the environment. It is my understanding that key planning policies will ensure that developments protect our precious natural heritage and maintain national policy on the Green Belt.

For many the overarching concern at the moment is the cost of living. Whilst we await the details of the Government Financial Plan, I trust that everyone is aware of the support for which they are eligible. Full details of this can be found on the Government website at www.gov.uk/cost-of-living. At this link you can find the support set up for everyone, as well as support for those on low incomes, those with disabilities, for small business, and several other links.


