Speed and noise nuisance



Thames Path temporary closure at Benson weir

The Environment Agency has closed the Thames Path footbridge over Benson weir for an unspecified time while river levels are high, because of the potential for impact damage caused by floating debris.

The Thames Path is open to Benson Lock on the Wallingford side, but not across the lock or the weir. River conditions may be checked at riverconditions.environment-agency.gov.uk.

SODC recycling quiz

People across South Oxfordshire have the chance of winning a hamper worth £100 by putting your Christmas recycling knowledge to the test.

The quiz aims to encourage everyone to put the correct items into their domestic recycling bin over Christmas and to reduce contamination so that the recycling is clean and the materials can be sold on to make new products.

Christmas is when people have the most waste, so the council is reminding people to put only recyclables in your green bin. If recycling is too contaminated it has to be

rejected at the recycling sorting facility, and a whole lorry load of items will be wasted. Last year 434 tonnes of recycling was rejected between December and January as too contaminated.

Nappies, food and black bin bags are the worst contaminants, but people also put items in the green bin that they hope are recyclable but which should actually go in the grey waste bin, such as broken drinking glasses, plastic Christmas decorations and sweet wrappers.

If you take part in the quiz, you can find out how much you know, or don't know, about Christmas recycling, and those with the highest scores will be put into a draw to win a hamper full of reuse and zero-waste goodies.

Past Times from David Beasley

A gift to Crowmarsh Church

In December 1895 a peal of tubular bells was presented to Crowmarsh Church by the daughters of the late Mr Bertie Watkins Williams-Wynn of Howbery Park (who had died earlier that year).

The Revd Studholme Brownrigg preached a sermon entitled "So the House of the Lord was perfected."

The bells were manufactured by Messrs Harrington and Latham of Coventry. They are in the key of "C" and are very sweet in tone and can be easily rung by one person.

They also had a tablet that commemorates the gift mounted on a wall. Mrs Williams-Wynn also presented Crowmarsh church with a silver chalice and paten in memory of her late husband, and a stained glass window to the memory of her sister, Mrs Lismond.

A further gift of large sanctuary lamps was presented to the church by Lady Williams-Wynn.

The Williams-Wynn family were generous to the church and village. They would give food to villagers who were sick and arrange for the sick to have their washing cleaned by their own staff. A tea party was held most years for the villagers.

Benson Garden Club

Benson Garden Club's November talk was by Andy McIndoe, an author and regular contributor to magazines, blogs and BBC Radio, with over 40 years' experience in retail and production horticulture. His deep knowledge and expertise were evident throughout his very engaging and informative talk on "The Winter Garden".

Andy set the scene for how the winter garden has changed over time. Forty or fifty years ago, plants would have been cut back in autumn and the earth forked over to make the garden tidy - and winters were long, typically with heavy snow. The changing climate with milder winters, combined with the wider range

of plants available, mean that gardeners now consider garden design for all four seasons. We seek out plants that look good in winter and retain, rather than cut back, those that provide much needed structure during the bare months.

Supporting wildlife is also an important consideration that has changed our habits, with gardeners choosing to clear the garden much later to offer greater protection.

Andy shared some dramatic illustrations of iconic winter plants to show how foliage, flowers, stems and bark come into their own during winter. Here are a few of his recommendations:

Helleborus x hybridus is very good for establishing under deciduous trees, with the advice to remove the foliage now and mulch, and then enjoy the flowers in January. Pittosporum "Tom Thumb" was recommended as a compact, trimmable plant whose foliage becomes intense in colour as the weather gets colder. To retain the gorgeous stem colour for Cornus sanguinea "Midwinter Fire", Andy advised cutting stems back to 2-3cm in late March.

For pots, Skimmia japonica "Magic Marlot" does well. Nandina domestica "Obsessed" reaches a couple of feet in height and is good for narrow, shaded borders. And Sorbus vilmorinii was recommended as a good tree for smaller gardens, with pretty pink berries. Andy finished by encouraging us to think about how we can improve our gardens for all seasons, and we now have plenty of ideas for winter.

Our next talk on 1st December will be by Dr Michael Leach on "The origins of Christmas Part II". Then on 5th January 2023, award winning garden designer Christine Gibbs is speaking about "Gardening with the environment in mind". For both talks, our venue will be Benson parish hall. Doors open at 7.15pm for 7.45pm start (£2 for members, £5 for visitors – no need to book).





Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 3rd November. Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Jay Anderson, Andrew Johnson, David Rowley, Stuart Soames, Liz Ryall, Fleur Stevenson and Julia Streete, plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and District Councillor Andrea Powell and two members of the public.

Matters arising from the previous meeting

First Class Tree Surgeons will carry out the pruning of the hedge at Home Farm on Thursday 8th December.

Cllr Streete reported on a meeting she attended in Charlbury about tree planting. Some free trees are available and she has ordered two for Park View and replacements will be planted for trees planted last year that died in the summer drought, including those the Earth Trust planted on the riverside.

The application for bathing water status for Wallingford beach has been submitted on behalf of SODC and the Town Council.

The chairman will set up a meeting with Benson Parish Council to discuss management of the green open space on the Newnham Manor development.

The Clerk has emailed County Councillor Bloomfield about the crossing at The Springs, North Stoke, Cllr Soames has spoken to The Springs who are also chasing this up with the County Council. The police speed detection van has visited North Stoke recently.

Finance

The council agreed a grant of £150 to North Stoke Parochial Church Council for the printing costs of The Window magazine, distributed monthly in Ipsden and North Stoke.

Two grant instalments had been received from the FCC Communities Foundation towards the pavilion project. Overall expenditure to date on the project is £82,000 and income has been £53,000.

The rate of pay and hours worked by the Clerk and Finance Officer were reviewed and an increase was agreed. Chris Strange's salary will be reviewed by the Environment and Recreation Ground Management Committee.

Payments approved included dog bin emptying, grass cutting for September and hall hire for September.



Large developments

It has been reported to the parish council that the footpath (No. 2) from the new Bloor development to Benson Lane is overgrown and the surface is poor. Residents need to use this path to take children to school and to walk to the village and Wallingford. A high Leylandii hedge is overhanging the surface of the path. This will be raised with the County Council.

District Council report

The District Councillors reported that SOHA is to build more social housing in the county.

The sewage pumping station at Newnham Farm has now been completed and hedges and trees will be re-planted.

District Cllr Andrea Powell is on the SODC Environment Group. Insulating homes is a key priority. Cllr Johnson suggested that a survey could help to identify where residents could access grants to improve their insulation. The cost of living area on the SODC website includes suggestions on this topic. A thermal camera could help in identifying homes requiring improved insulation. A winter wellbeing pack including grant and benefit information is available from Age UK Oxfordshire.

There was no report from the county councillor.

Environment and recreation

The pavilion project is expected to be completed by the end of November. The ramp

and stairs have been modified to ensure that they comply with building regulation requirements for disabled people.

Anyone parking in the recreation ground car park is reminded to remove their vehicle before the advertised time of closing the gate, or they will be locked in overnight.

The chairman reported on a meeting at Wallingford Town Hall to discuss tree planting under the Queen's Green Canopy initiative. which was on the same day as the national hedgelaying championships at Clack's Farm. The Oxfordshire Treescape report shows a wide range of possibilities for planting trees and hedges, which requires partnership with landowners. Cllr Streete will order free trees to replace those lost from the nature area, where ideal species are alder, birch and willow. Volunteers may be recruited to plant them. Additional trees could be planted at the recreation ground between the cricket nets and the nature area. Oak trees would be suitable for this location. The Earth Trust is planting replacement trees on the riverside.

Due to the outbreak of avian flu, anyone finding three or more dead birds together, particularly owls and water fowl, should report it on the government website gov.uk, where more details can be found.

The boundary hedge between the recreation ground and Jethro Tull Gardens will be pruned early in 2023.

Traffic and transport

County Councillor Bloomfield will again be asked to chase progress on highways issues.

In response to the Parish Council's letter about speeding, Police and Crime Commissioner Matthew Barber and representatives of Thames Valley Roads Policing will attend the December parish council meeting to give an update on the problem of speeding traffic on the main roads through the parish. County councillors and our MP will be invited and Neighbouring parish councils will attend.

The speed indicator device in The Street does seem to make drivers more aware of their speed.

Some street lamps on Wallingford Bridge are still not working and despite previous requests,

the street lamp in North Stoke still has an orange sodium light instead of a white LED. The Clerk will report these matters again.

Parking on pavements in Newnham Green and Thames Mead has been reported, which creates a hazard for pedestrians, especially those with prams and pushchairs and is against the Highway Code (new edition published this year). Drivers are asked to make sure they always park safely on the roadway or their own drive and not on pavements or anywhere that might impede access for pedestrians or other road users.

Next meeting

John Howell MP writes

Having been through a rather turbulent period I am pleased that we now have Rishi Sunak as our Prime Minister. He has had my support over the months, and I believe that he will be the person to get to grips with the key issues that we face.

It is interesting to reflect on the issues that have been before us in recent months, and also the reactions that come forward. Understandably there are strongly held views and in this time of Remembrance it seems to me that there is plenty of room for shared understanding, moderation and mutual tolerance.

Take for example the attendance of the Prime Minister at COP27. Within a few days of taking office his initial response was that he could not attend due to needing to focus on the immediate national issues before him. He faced a backlash on that and, once he had

been able to assess the workload on his desk, agreed that he could go. However rather than this being seen as a decision based on assessment of the situation it was dubbed as a U-turn. If politicians 'stick to their guns' they may be accused of not listening. If they give serious thought to an issue and have a change of heart they are accused of a U-turn. Either way there is an accusation to face.

It is good that the Prime Minister has pledged to return to the 2019 manifesto which was supported through the General Election. It promised an ambitious environmental programme with robust action on climate change and nature loss. It is important to note that protecting our environment does not mean sacrificing economic growth. Green measures can reduce the cost of living, create employment, investment and export opportunities, and safeguard our long-term prosperity and security. It is also important to ensure that measures taken are affordable and encourage people to make environmentally friendly decisions. It is precisely this need to bring people with us that protest groups overlook. It is not about who shouts loudest or makes the grandest gestures but about how we work together to resolve the important issues of our time.

Let us also consider the issue of storm discharges where untreated sewage is released into rivers. I completely agree that sewage pollution is not acceptable but when these discharges of untreated sewage are released into a river it is when water levels are exceptionally high and there is risk of flooding to properties. If you live in a property which would be flooded with raw sewage this might have a strong influence on your view and the realistic timescales for improvement.
