



#### **Parish Council news**

The next parish council meeting is on 4th February at 7.30pm. The parish council did not meet in January, but we report this month on the discussion about traffic speed and motorcycle noise held on 8th December with the Police and Crime Commissioner and police representatives.

There will be parish council elections on 4 May 2023. All registered electors in the parish are eligible to stand for election. Please contact any councillor or the parish clerk if you would like to find out more about what the parish council does and how you could get involved. There is a need for more parish councillors, especially in Mongewell and North Stoke, which are currently under-represented.

## Thames Path closure at Benson weir

The Environment Agency has closed the Thames Path footbridge over Benson weir for an unspecified time because of potential impact damage caused by floating debris.

The Thames Path is open to Benson Lock on the Wallingford side, subject to the flooding abating, but not across the lock or the weir.

River conditions may be checked at riverconditions.environment-agency.gov.uk.

### Traffic speed and noise

The parish council hosted a meeting in December with Matthew Barber, the Police and Crime Commissioner for the Thames Valley, Chris Hulme, Traffic Management Officer on behalf of Thames Valley Police and Claire Benson of Roads Policing at Thames Valley Police. The local MP and county councillor were invited but did not attend.

As well as parish councillors and local residents, a Henley Standard reporter attended plus representatives of Benson, Nuffield, Bix & Assendon, Nettlebed and Warborough Parish Councils.

The meeting was a follow-up to one held in December 2021 at Benson with Matthew Barber and John Howell MP about speeding and noise on the A4074 and A4130. Residents wanted to know why so little action had been taken by the police and what will be done now to address these problems. Most people agreed that the problem has worsened over the past few years.

Speeding and motorbike noise have long been reported as serious problems especially in fine weather. The H Café at Berinsfield has been a magnet for motor-cyclists for over 20 years, with some riders travelling from as far away as Surrey to use our local roads. Claire Benson reported that the police visit the H Café from time to time and have run safety checks including checking motorcycle silencers.

Speed data on the A4074 and the A4130 has shown excessively high speeds immediately next to residential areas: a motorcyclist had been detected doing 120 mph in the 30mph zone at Shillingford and motorbikes and cars have been recorded speeding on Crowmarsh Hill. Sound levels as high as 115 decibels have been recorded. There was also a recent incident when a car left the road and demolished a fence close to the Crowmarsh roundabout. Nuffield Parish Council had also reported motorcyclists exceeding 100mph on the A4130 but no action had been taken by the police.

Matthew Barber apologised on behalf of the police. He recommended that more enforcement should be carried out and the police could work with the county council to

achieve this. He favoured road network design and use of technology. The root cause is inappropriate behaviour but enforcement is a strategy to combat it. He agreed that police visibility would help, including speed vans.

Measures recommended included the use of sonic cameras activated by noise. These can be moved around and motorists are not aware of them. Matthew Barber said that these and possibly average speed cameras are the best options, and have been tried elsewhere, but there is significant work in setting them up and calibrating them. Conventional speed traps could be a deterrent if better publicised. Matthew Barber will ask his colleague in Surrey to share strategies used there. A toucan light-controlled crossing has been approved for the A4074 Portway in Crowmarsh; Benson should soon be getting a toucan crossing on the A4074 too.

Parish Councillors regretted the lack of communication via police community support officers (PCSOs). Matthew Barber said they are actively trying to recruit more such officers.

Crowmarsh Parish Council has applied for 20mph limits to be applied to our residential roads. Oxfordshire County Council wants to introduce this lower speed limit to 80% of areas in the county that are currently in the 30mph zone. There is a three-year countywide programme for lowering the speed limit in this way and Crowmarsh Parish is on the list for 2023-24. The 20mph project is hoped to be effective through creating blanket cover. In some areas where it has been introduced, there has been a 4 mph reduction in average speed, although 80% of drivers were still exceeding the new limit.

#### Actions from the meeting:

- Chris Hulme will send information about Community Speed Watch to the local parishes. A new scheme is in place that is easier to administer. It depends on volunteers using a speed gun and providing data to Thames Valley Police. Letters are sent out to offenders and after three offences the police will follow up in person. Signage provided locally could be also used.
- Matthew Barber to liaise with colleagues in the Surrey police for information on their strategies for dealing with these problems.

He will also research information on sonic cameras and average speed cameras.

- Cllr Sherbourne suggested positioning sonic cameras in pre-surveyed locations and moving these around as required.
- The police were asked to provide more frequent, more visible speed vans.
- Chris Hulme agreed to keep the parishes informed of what action is being taken by police and to increase their visibility.

### Past Times from David Beasley

#### The death of Nora Isabella Marshall

When Nora Isabella Marshall was found drowned on Saturday 25th May 1918 it caused considerable shock throughout the town. She was born in Wallingford in 1859, the youngest daughter of John Hedges Marshall, who was a doctor in the town until his death in 1893. Nora had lived with her elder sister Mary in Castle Villas, in Castle Street, for nineteen years. She was very public spirited and served on the Local Food Control Committee, she supported the suffrage movement, was a Sunday School Teacher, and a district visitor in St Peter's Parish.

Nora was in the habit of taking her Pekinese for a walk along the bank towards Benson each day. On Saturday, she left at ten o'clock to take the dog for its walk, saying that she would not be long. At about 11 o'clock Mrs F P Chamberlain of Crowmarsh Battle Farm was rowing with some friends to Wallingford, when near the bridge over the brook that flows past Hedge's Boathouse, she heard a dog barking and crying. The water is some five feet deep at this spot. She took the dog into the boat and later gave it to Percy Turner at the landing stage by the bridge.

Percy Turner realised the dog belonged to Miss Marshall. Friends walked along the riverbank but they found no sign of her. The Police were informed, Inspector Webb started dragging operations but they found nothing. On the Sunday again friends searched the riverbank with no result. On Monday PC Kimber started dragging the river again at about midday. Miss Marshall's body was found and was brought to the bank. It was thought that the dog slipped down the bank and Miss Marshall in trying to help the dog fell into the river and was unable to save herself and drowned.

The funeral was held on the following Thursday in St Peter's Church. It was so packed with mourners that some of the congregation had to stand outside the church during the service. Miss Marshall was buried in the Wallingford Cemetery, and a memorial plaque was placed on the wall in St Peter's, paid for by public subscription.

#### **Benson Garden Club**

On Thursday 5th January, Benson Garden Club held its AGM, followed by a talk by award -winning garden designer Christine Gibbs.

The Chair's report included an encouraging summary of how the club has managed to resume a full programme of speaker events and garden visits following lifting of Covid restrictions. We also introduced some initiatives in 2022, including a seed swap and a "flower of the month" competition, both for members only.

Christine's talk was on "Gardening with the environment in mind". This topic was a great start to the year, inspiring us to change our perspective on how we garden. She spoke about how to garden in a sustainable way, including how to encourage wildlife into our gardens. Christine provided many suggestions to make our gardening both more sustainable and fulfilling: creating lots of different habitats, recycling wherever possible, ensuring winter refuges for wildlife and not wasting resources on buying plants ill-suited to your garden's conditions.

Our next talk on Thursday 2nd February will be by Charlotte Popescu on "In praise of apples". Charlotte is an experienced gardener and writer, including "The Apple Cookbook".

Then on Thursday 2nd March Pip Smith will give us a talk on "Nuts about narcissus." A landscape architect with over 13 years' experience as a professional horticulturist, Pip has been head gardener at several private and public gardens, most recently at the highly acclaimed Wollerton Old Hall in Shropshire.

On 30th March, Michael Holland will give a talk from his "Tales from the fruit bowl" titled "Saucy and spicy" (focusing on the nightshade family). Michael is a writer, lecturer and author with a 25-year career at the renowned Chelsea Physic Garden in London.

For all three talks, our venue will be Benson Parish Hall. Doors open at 7.15pm for a 7.45pm start. £2 for members, £5 for visitors – just turn up on the door, no need to book.



# Christmas Treecycling scheme raises a tree-mendous £87,000 plus for Sue Ryder

National healthcare charity, Sue Ryder, is thanking people across the Thames Valley for supporting its Christmas Treecycle initiative, helping them to raise more than £87,000 for families needing their care.

The palliative, neurological and bereavement support charity, Sue Ryder, which operates the Sue Ryder Duchess of Kent Hospice in Reading and Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub South Oxfordshire, ran a green scheme with their tree-ly amazing volunteers to collect real Christmas trees direct from people's front garden or driveway in return for a donation. The collected trees were then chipped and recycled to create an organic product which can be used for mulching gardens, topping up garden or woodland paths, surfacing children's play areas, or as biomass fuel. This meant that residents who chose to Treecycle were not only helping to raise vital funds for Sue Ryder but also helping to reduce landfill.

Sue Ryder worked with 27 volunteers and were kindly supported by big-hearted corporate partners Rabbits Vehicle Hire, G A Butler & Sons, Arborfield Tree Care, Ashburton Ltd Landscaping, Reading's Transit Man Removals, Garnet Hill Tree Services and Fernoak Tree Surgeons Ltd to collect and recycle trees from postcodes in their area.

The 837 trees collected from across the Thames Valley were a huge part of the 5822 trees gathered across the country by Sue Ryder. Overall the scheme has raised a firtastic £87,391 for the charity so far, with more donations coming in, which will go towards helping to continue Sue Ryder's expert and compassionate palliative care and bereavement support.

Georgia Thornton, Community Fundraiser from the Sue Ryder Thames Valley fundraising team, said: "We want to say a huge thank you to the local community for supporting our Christmas Treecycle scheme this year. It can be difficult to know what to do with your real tree once the festivities are over, but by recycling with us and making kind donations, you have helped to reduce landfill and raise vital funds so that we can continue to be there for families when it matters.

"We also want to show our appreciation to all of our volunteers for donating their time and for their incredible efforts and hard work – without their support we really couldn't make the initiative happen."

#### The Art of World War II

An exhibition of diverse, original artwork, all produced during, and depicting scenes from, the Second World War, will go on display at the Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum in Woodstock, from 25th February to 7th May.

The exhibition has been curated from John Noott's personal collection, gathered together during his career as an art collector and dealer for over 40 years. Drawn together, the art forms a history in pictures of the Second World War while showcasing incredibly personal perspectives which reflect a varied range of experiences before, during, and after the war. Through the work of artists of the time, visitors will see the war unfold 'as it happened'.

Visitors to the exhibition will be able to see a view of Dunkirk as troops are evacuated, painted by a nephew of Winston Churchill, John Spencer Churchill, a reflection of what he had witnessed during his own army service. The artist would return to England to inform his uncle personally of the need for boats to assist in rescuing the troops there.

Elsewhere, the plight of both evacuees and refugees is seen as artists of the time depict the many people displaced by war, such as those coming to Britain as part of the *Kindertransport* rescue programme in the build up to the Second World War.

The artists whose work is included in the collection range from skilled amateurs to professionals, from those already renowned at

the time to those who would go on to make a name for themselves in a post-war world. A sketch by Eduardo Paolozzi, better known as a pioneering pop-artist, contrasts newly arrived American troops with a typical Oxford scene of a student cycling through the city. The artist faced discrimination and internment under the Enemy Aliens Act, along with many of his family, when they moved to Britain from Italy.

The exhibition also features art from *Vogue* fashion illustrators forced to flee Paris, and *Beano* cartoonists who turned their hand to cartography to aid General Montgomery in North Africa.

Collector John Noott grew up in wartime Britain and his lived experiences inspired him to gather the collection throughout his career.

The Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is open from Tuesday-Saturday 11am-5pm and on Sunday 2pm-5pm. The county's own military history museum is located in the gardens of the Oxfordshire Museum, Park Street, Woodstock, on the doorstep of Blenheim palace. #### John Howell MP writes ...

I agree with the Prime Minster when he said that New Year should be a time of optimism and excitement, and yet many look ahead to 2023 with apprehension. There are indeed many concerns at home and abroad. The concerns that dominate for each of us will vary according to our own circumstances and needs.

Over the Christmas and New Year holiday period. I had several conversations on the fallout from the pandemic, with many people feeling that the negative effects, particularly in relation to mental health and well-being, are still taking their toll. The nervousness at the news that China would reopen its borders is an example of the fear that lingers, not only in relation to physical health, but also over the dread that life could be restricted once again. However, we must remember that we are in a very different place to where we were at the start of the pandemic, with knowledge, vaccines and medicines available to help prevent such devastating measures being taken again.

For those concerned at the continued cost of living issues, I was pleased to see the Government announcement of further support this year for pensioners and those on low incomes. It is also good to see the continued support in relation to energy costs for business and non-domestic customers. This is subject to on-going review in a fast-changing situation.

I know that many constituents are concerned over issues relating to Thames Water. I have written previously of my concerns on storm discharges. I have also raised a number of other specific concerns with the company over time. I was saddened, although not entirely surprised, to read in the Ofwat annual assessment of water company performance that Thames Water fell amongst the worst performers. I am in touch with the Chief Executive of Ofwat on this. He has confirmed that they are very concerned over this and advised me that Thames Water have committed to spending an additional £2bn in the 2020-25 regulatory period, on top of the £9.6bn final determination, to turnaround their performance. He acknowledges that there is

much to be done and has confirmed that they are monitoring the situation closely. We will be keeping in touch on progress.

Another concern that also tends to arise with the new year is changes to bus services when timetables are reviewed. I fully appreciate that when bus companies make changes, some people will be inconvenienced having become used to services running at particular times. Although buses are run on a commercial basis there are some subsidies available to support services in specific circumstances. These are administered by the County Council. Having investigated some of the concerns. I understand that for bus companies there are many issues to consider when looking at the sustainability of services. In some cases, it is simply a matter of low passenger numbers that makes a route unsustainable, and the companies need to divert resources to other routes where there is greater usage to keep these running. However sometimes the issues are wider. For example, on one route up for change, the bus company wanted to use double decker buses across the whole route. Some of the rural roads included in the journey were not suitable for such vehicles. Whilst the Government does have a National Bus Strategy, the challenges in rural areas are many. As we know all too well, some routes are simply lost altogether due to lack of use.

There are of course, many big issues which affect us all, which are well rehearsed in the national media and which the government is already working to address. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts.
