Crowmarsh Stores Closure

It was with very great regret that the village shop has been forced to close as it was one of a few still existing.

Its demise really goes back to quite a long way when the Post Office section was forced to close. It had been a busy Post Office and attracted therefore many customers buying other goods. John Ham who owned the house and shop as one property, soon realized his business was less viable and wanted to pack

up. The property was put on the market but no serious offer was made in over a year when potential buyers studied the books.

When John retired we were already half owners and Karin Selwood took over the running.

Unfortunately due to covid and the lockdown the shop closed and when we reopened months later, trade was noticeably down. Many suppliers no longer delivered and it became much harder to restock.

Also, the main goods we were selling, newspapers, tobacco, milk and lottery, have low profit margins and an 11-hour day is required to break even.

Then along came the Russia/Ukraine crisis which led to a very large hike in electricity prices for us which was a big blow as we were running fridges and freezers 24/7.

It all became untenable and we would be running at a loss.

Supermarkets and supermarket deliveries had long since taken over anyway but we know the shop will be sadly missed by a few loyal customers who liked the atmosphere, company and convenience.

Unfortunately life changes. We would like to thank those people who have supported us over the years. It was much appreciated,

Although I no longer keep a paper diary, there is something refreshing about looking forward to placing significant dates in the calendar, whatever the format. Past Times from David Beasley Crowmarsh's New Year Party

Tuesday evening, the 2nd January 1923, Crowmarsh Parish Church Congregation held a New Year party at Wallingford Pavilion (the pavilion was in St John's Road, Wallingford, now Trenchard Close). The Revd TWL Caspersz and his wife welcomed guests as they arrived.

Mr Jack Dean was the MC and he made sure everything ran smoothly all evening. Among those present were, Frank Ponking and daughter, Mrs Hughes and daughter from St Martin's Priory, Mr Jack Wilder, Mr Percy and Mrs Wilder, Mrs EO Payne and daughters, Percy Turner and party and practically all the parishioners of Crowmarsh, numbering over 260 members.

The programme for the evening opened with a Whist Drive, there being 29 tables in use. After the Whist Drive the chairs were rearranged and the tables removed and a short concert was given, which consisted of folk songs, folk dancing by the Crowmarsh children. Mrs Caspersz and Miss Dearlove were the accompanists.

During an interval Revd Caspersz gave an amusing speech, in which he claimed Crowmarsh was older than Wallingford and that William the Conqueror after the Battle of Hastings came to Crowmarsh and went into the Queen's Head for a drink. Revd Caspersz said he hoped the beer was better in those days, than it was in most places now. He also said he was sorry that Miss Goswell was unable to attend, she had spent a lot of time teaching the children the old English Folk dances and songs.

After the speech dancing commenced for young and old, the music being provided by "The Four Optimists". Supper was served between the dances by Mrs WJ Korbetov, the landlady of the Red Lion, Wallingford. Games were also provided for those who did not dance. The New Year party finished at 2am and had been enjoyed by all.

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

Online talk by Brigadier (Retired) David Innes, museum trustee, to tell the story of Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire men that went 'a bridge too far' followed by a live Q&A

The next in Soldiers of Oxfordshire (SOFO) Museum's series of online talks, *Arnhem and the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry* will be streamed on the museum website from 7pm, on 19th January.

"A tale you will tell your grandchildren.....", this talk will tell the story of the men of the county regiment who fought and died at Arnhem in September 1944. Though the Oxfordshire & Buckinghamshire Light Infantry's 2nd Battalion, the airborne unit that famously captured Pegasus Bridge in the early hours of D-Day were not as a whole involved in Operation Market Garden, many of the 1st Airborne officers that were at Arnhem had a past in the county's regiment.

As well as this, the 1st Airborne Divisional Defence Platoon incorporated members of 2nd Battalion when it flew to Arnhem.

Speaker and museum trustee, David Innes, explains "there is a Victoria Cross in this story, and we shall meet the officer you will remember from the film 'A Bridge too Far' who was armed with an umbrella at Arnhem as well as other tales of courage, fortitude and sheer luck".

The officer with the umbrella in the film was inspired by Major Allison Digby Tatham-Warter, formerly of the Oxf. & Bucks, then serving with 2nd Parachute Battalion. He was well known for carrying the item with him, reportedly disabling an armoured vehicle at one stage by poking the driver in the eye after pushing his umbrella through the vehicle's observation slit, and aiding a Chaplain pinned down by enemy fire with the line "don't worry, I've got an umbrella".

Lieutenant John Grayburn, another former officer of the county regiment serving with 2nd

Parachute Battalion at Arnhem, was posthumously awarded the VC, the highest award for gallantry. Despite having been wounded multiple times, for nearly four days, despite this and a lack of food or sleep, he refused to be evacuated and stayed to lead his company. His citation for the award states that without his 'inspiring leadership the Arnhem bridge could not have been held for so long'.

The online event will also salute the skill and daring of the men of the Glider Pilot Regiment, and the outstanding bravery of the local Dutch population who found themselves caught up in the aftermath of this infamous battle.

An archived feed will remain available using the same link, shortly after the live event ends. Free to view, like all the museum's online events, donations will be encouraged from those that wish to support SOFO Museum's work in preserving the county's military heritage and collections.

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
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Parish Council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 8th November. Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Andrew Johnson, David Rowley, Liz Ryall, David Topliss, plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and District Councillor Andrea Powell and two members of the public.

Matters arising from the previous meeting

First Class Tree Surgeons have pruned the hedge at Home Farm.

Crowmarsh Stores has closed permanently in its current location.

Finance

The draft budget was approved, but will be reviewed in February/March. £105K is projected for strategic priorities, including pedestrian crossings and improvements to the surface of Watery Lane. The tax base has changed because of the new houses, and it was agreed that the precept for 2023/24 will be £46,633.60, so there will again be no increase in the parish council.

The council agreed to consider grant applications at the February meeting.

Payments approved included £166.39 for dog bin emptying, £113.66 for refuse collection, £114.17 for allotment insurance, £233.82 for trees and stakes, £102.00 for graphics for the pavilion refurbishment, £2,362.48 for service and emergency drain clearance at the pavilion and £540.00 for hedge cutting at Home Farm. Total payments were £6,401.84

Arron Twamley, planning agent for Avant Homes, has written rejecting the proposal for the parish council to manage the open spaces on the Newnham Manor site. We have told the planning officers and our district councillors that we are disappointed and wish to discuss it with them.

District Council report

The District Councillors were at the annual District Council meeting but had submitted a report.

Environment and recreation

Many thanks to Cllr Streete, who has planted trees at the nature area to replace those that died during the summer drought.

The pavilion project is expected to be completed in the new year. There are some ongoing snagging issues. It was agreed to delegate authority to the Environment and Recreation Ground Committee to purchase fixtures and fittings, tables and chairs.

Traffic and transport

The meeting was adjourned to address the Parish Council's concerns about speeding and motorcycle noise. The Police and Crime Commissioner, Matthew Barber, and representatives of Thames Valley Roads Policing attended to give an update on the problem and answered questions from local residents, parish councillors and

representatives from neighbouring parishes. The County Council and our MP had been invited but did not attend. A report will appear in the next Crowmarsh News.

The chairman and district and county councillors will also attend a meeting next week (12 Dec) to discuss a draft OCC strategy for the whole A4074 corridor and raise feedback from residents.

Oxfordshire County Council Report

The Queen's Green Canopy

250 Jubilee Citizen trees were planted at Wittenham Clumps on Friday 2nd December as part of the Queen's Green Canopy Oxfordshire.

New British citizens living in Oxfordshire were offered the opportunity to donate a tree for planting on their behalf. This was part of the Queen's Green Canopy Platinum Jubilee earlier in the year. Since the start of the programme in February 825 trees have been donated.

Following the wishes of His Majesty the King upon the passing of Her Majesty, the initiative has been extended until the end of March 2023 to allow more people to plant trees in memoriam.

Council Renews its Commitment to the Armed Forces

As a Military Champion for Oxfordshire I am delighted OCC have renewed their commitment to our armed forces as a new law comes into place. The Armed Forces Covenant, which I signed in 2011 is a voluntary 'promise from the nation' that those serving or who have served in the armed forces (and their families) should be treated fairly and not disadvantaged in their day-to-day lives.

Oxfordshire is home to 25% of the UK's RAF personnel and 49% of RAF Reservists, 50% of UK Army logistics capacity, 2,200 cadets across various units including Sea Scouts, 6,500 recipients of armed forces pension/compensation. We also have five major military bases including RAF Benson, an important part of this Division. We encourage all organisations and businesses to consider how they can uphold the ambitions of the Armed Forces Covenant and support Oxfordshire's armed forces community..

John Howell MP writes...

Whatever your personal beliefs Christmas brings with it a spirit of goodwill. As always I am writing my newsletter in the middle of the month and there are just a couple of weeks until Christmas. However due to publication lead times for some this will be included in a January magazine. As a new year dawns I hope that something of the Christmas spirit of goodwill might linger on.

I know that for many life is not easy and personal and global struggles can weigh us down. I share the concern for all those who struggle and who worry about making ends meet. I know that cost of living issues are a very real fear for many, especially in relation to heating and power. There is real hardship, and while the Government has helped, the actions of others outside of the UK, such as Russia, take their toll on us all. It is not just in the UK. Inflation is increasing across the world and there is great need to bring it under control. I know that the Government will continue to do all that it can to assist, and I will wholeheartedly support them.

Social media and the internet are very welcome in many ways. However they also bring another very real fear when misused. We cannot ignore the very real harms people face online every day and this is one area where Government can and has The Online Safety Bill, which is currently going through parliament, introduces new laws to protect children online and tackle the worst abuses on social media, including racist hate crimes. As it has progressed through the House the Bill has been strengthened to address some concerns and at the same time seeks to protect freedom of speech which has been a concern expressed by some. In order to address the latter Ministers agreed to amendments that will get freedom to adults to express views online that can legally be expressed elsewhere and replace it with a fairer, simpler and more effective mechanism which will focus on user choice, consumer rights and accountability whilst protecting freedom of expression. The Bill still has stages to go through for scrutiny and I look forward to this becoming law in due course so that the vulnerable are protected.

Both here at home and across the world there are many deserving of our thoughts and concern.

The media will put an issue at the forefront but once something else comes forward it is easy for us to forget the plight of many. This year the war in Ukraine shocked us. The aggression of Russia continues to create so many problems and heartaches. Our thoughts go to all those weighed down by oppressive regimes and war. Through my work in the Council of Europe I have been privileged to speak directly with President Zelensky and parliamentarians in Kyiv and look forward to being able to do so again next year to offer continued support. I do sincerely hope that the New Year may bring some peace and joy.

In seeking to work together we need to get beyond the headlines. Sometimes we can do something to support a large number of people. At other times work is focussed on an individual as opportunity is afforded to us in our particular work. For me one such opportunity came along in my role as Rapporteur on Turkey for the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe. In this role I have been working for justice for arrested philanthropist and businessman, Osman Kavala. Together with my fellow Rapporteur from Latvia I have been granted the chance to visit Osman personally in January. This is a breakthrough as the visit was previously rejected. We hope that this is a sign of a softening attitude by the authorities on human rights issues.

As we begin 2023 and the year progresses I hope that we will all do what we can to ease the burdens of others. Any action however small carries on the spirit of goodwill. There will, of course, always be differing views on important issues and often some conflicting approaches to similar ends. There is rarely, if ever, a perfect answer. It is good to discuss issues, and sometimes discussion may be heated, but when disagreement turns to abuse, and protest causes genuine difficulty to others we have lost our democratic compass.
