Council elections on 4th May

Get election ready – check your voter registration and ID before it's too late

On Thursday 4 May, residents will go to the polls to choose local councillors who will make decisions on important issues, such as where we should focus our efforts locally to help tackle climate change, where and how new housing gets built, how we ensure there's enough affordable housing, and much more.

Everyone aged 18 or over who is eligible can vote in the local elections, but you must be registered at your current address by midnight on 17th April – if you need to register, apply now at gov.uk/registertovote

To vote at a polling station on 4th May, you must bring valid photo ID with you. This is a new Government requirement. Find out what ID you can use at electoralcommission.org.

If you don't have an accepted photo ID, apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate at www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authoritycertificate by 5pm on 25th April.

Or you can vote by post – the deadline for postal vote applications is 5pm on 18th April.

Or you can ask someone else to vote on your behalf (a proxy vote). The deadline to apply for a proxy vote is 5pm on 25th April. To apply for a postal or proxy vote visit southoxon.gov.uk or call the District Council on 01235 422422.

Past Times from David Beasley

The residents of The Street in 1939

Miss Mabel Gertrude Brown, a 72-year-old spinster, lived at The Giffords on the Street, Crowmarsh, with her sister, Florence Margaret. Mabel's father was John Brown, a clergyman from Compton, Berks, who had been living for many years at Didcot. Sharing a room with them was a retired teacher named Ruth Denham.

Rose Cottage next door was occupied by Matilda Kate Shick, a 75-year-old woman, blind from birth. Living with her as her companion was Amelia Maria Way. Occupying the cottage next door was Mrs Winifred Rose Danby, whose occupation was listed as Unpaid Domestic Duties, which was the case for most housewives in 1939. Her daughter, named Lewis, was a member of the Women's Land Army. The landlord of the Bell Inn, George Robert Bryant, served in the Royal Flying Corps during the First World War, and was married to Ada Bryant. Next door was Thomas Wigley, who worked as a van driver and carpet and lino fitter and was the son of William and Mary Wigley. He died in 1954 at the age of 50.

Opposite the Giffords is the Queens Head – in 1939 the landlord was Sidney Walter Shinn, born in Brixton in September 1885. His parents were George and Ann and his father's occupation was described as a Professor of Music. In 1903, Sidney obtained a job in Nigeria working on their railways. He joined up in 1916, served in Africa and was in action in 1917. Sidney married Alice Chudleigh in 1930, and returned to England in the 1930s. In December 1935, he and his wife moved to Acton and lived there until 1938, when they moved to be landlords of the Queens Head. He died in Brighton in 1965.

The Vicar writes ...

April brings the climax of the church's year as we enter Holy Week and the Easter season. We hope that you will join us in worship as we commemorate and celebrate these historic events which still change lives today.

So how can the cross, an instrument of execution like the guillotine or the electric chair, be good news for anyone? The difference is that it wasn't an ordinary man who was crucified on "Good Friday", but rather God himself in human form. He was sentenced to death for blasphemy, because he claimed to do things that only God could do: not just teaching beyond human wisdom and performing miraculous signs and wonders, but forgiving people their sins – only God can do that.

But because God stands for the ultimate good, all the bad things (sin) could not just be ignored. There were damages to be paid for and a sentence to be served. Therefore, God's act of restorative justice was to take that death penalty upon himself for all our sins on the cross. Although he was innocent, he took our place, so that we are forgiven and all our debt of sin written off in full. Now that's good news! And it gets even better when Jesus rises from the grave, conquering death itself so that we too can live his risen life! That is love in action, love that invites a response...

Wallingford Museum news

50 years of TWHAS, The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society

This exhibition reflects TWHAS's development from its early beginnings through to the establishment of the museum and the impact of the historical and archaeological research on the heritage of the town.

The museum's main exhibition is family friendly: our younger house detectives are invited to discover the family living in our mystery house by playing the mystery house game. Benson Garden Club

Benson Garden Club's talk on 2nd March 2023 was "Nuts about Narcissus" by Pip Smith. He reminded us of Wordsworth's celebration of the joy of daffodils in his famous poem. The daffodil's Latin name *narcissus* was the name of the flower that Narcissus turned into in the Greek myth. It was probably the Romans who brought daffodils to Britain, but the Reverend George Engleheart (1851-1936) could be called the father of the modern daffodil, with 720 cultivars to his name. Today there are over 27,000 cultivars.

Pip stressed the importance of planting daffodil bulbs in September (or even the end of August, if possible), as they need at least 8 weeks' warmth. He advised paying for the biggest bulbs you can afford, as the bigger the bulb, the better the flower. Once flowering has finished, only deadhead the actual seedhead, rather than the whole stem. The leaves should be left for around 5-6 weeks to allow the daffodil to photosynthesize.

Pip then shared his top 25 varieties. N. "Geranium" was recommended for its sweet scent and longevity in flowering. N. "Dutch Master" looks like a 'proper' daffodil, such as a child would draw, with large yellow flowers. N. "Pipit", sweetly fragrant, is a suitable choice if you don't want too much foliage.

He finished by recommending some lovely places to see daffodils, including Dymock Woods in Gloucestershire, where you can view them in a woodland setting, and the Royal Horticultural Society Garden at Wisley, Surrey.

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Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 2nd March. Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames, Liz Ryall, David Rowley and Julia Streete, plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and District Councillor Sue Cooper.

Finance

Payments approved included dog bin emptying, refuse collection, £592.99 for a more robust cabinet for the defibrillator at the village hall to replace the one that was damaged, £212.38 electricity charges in January at the pavilion and £416.70 membership fees for the Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils.

Additions to the council's financial regulations were agreed; the financial risk assessment was reviewed and approved unchanged. Three items were added to the asset list: a flagpole, a line marking machine and a TV screen for the pavilion, totalling £2,145.75.

Three quotes have been received for this year's grass cutting contract, to include roadside verges, North Stoke recreation ground and Newnham Murren churchyard. Scofell will continue to maintain the nature area at the same price as last year. Two companies expressed interest in quoting for the pedestrian crossing near the Bell and plans have been sent to them.

Some changes were agreed to the budget, including provision for extra help to manage the recreation ground. Annual allotment fees will remain at £20 for a full-sized plot.

P22/S1045/FUL UK Centre for Ecology & Hydrology, Maclean Building, Benson Lane, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8BB. Ground mounted solar arrays to the north-east and west of the site (amended plan and flood risk assessment received 6 October 2022). Planning Permission.

Consultations

P22/S4164/FUL Land east of Reading Road, Wallingford OX10 9HG on Thames riverbank (neighbouring parish). Change of use of land to informal private leisure use, to include an area allocated to the open storage of nonmotorised boats and the siting of a trailer storage shed (retrospective). No strong views.

Major application

Following a meeting with Avant Homes and their agent, district councillors and planning officers about the management of the open spaces on the Newnham Manor site, the applicants still insist that a management company is their preferred option rather than transferring the open space and management responsibility to the parish council. The parish council expects to be represented alongside residents on the management board. Arron Twamley, agent for the developers, agreed to provide further information.

District Council report

District Councillor Sue Cooper reported on the budget for 2023-24. The District Council's share of the council tax will increase by £5 a year for an average Band D property, which represents a below-inflation rise of 3.6 per cent. In 2022-23 the Band D rate was ninth lowest in the country for a shire district council.

Bookings have opened again for the bulky waste collection service. Electrical and nonelectrical items will be collected on the same day but have to be kept separate.

There was a discussion on how to tackle the problem of litter, and following the parish council meeting a litter picking event was organised in Crowmarsh on Saturday 11th March to coincide with the Wallingford event run by the 1155 charity - thanks to them and Andrew Townsend for assistance and to the nine volunteers who came to help.

SODC's contractors Biffa are responsible for collecting litter on main roads and have been asked to clean up Clacks Lane and the B4009 Crowmarsh to North Stoke road as priority areas. If a request with Biffa needs chasing up, the SODC waste team will investigate if you email waste.team@southandvale.gov.uk. The council's general enquiries number is 01235 422422, or 422410 out-of-hours.

There was no report from the county councillor.

Environment and recreation

The environment and recreation ground committee were authorised to buy furniture and other items for the pavilion. They are making plans for the opening event.

An application (successful) had been made for 420 mixed species trees to be planted at the recreation ground / nature area and these will be delivered in November.

Traffic and transport

The committee met on 27 February and further letters would be sent to the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Chief Constable of Thames Valley Police about the lack of action on speeding and motorcycle noise. All correspondence is copied to neighbouring parish councils, the MP and the county councillor. The council agreed to move forward with a Community Speedwatch scheme with volunteers. Anyone interested should contact the parish clerk.

Local elections

Parish and District Council elections will be held on Thursday 4th May. There are three parish council vacancies for the North Stoke ward that includes Mongewell and nine for Crowmarsh Gifford. It was stressed that photo ID will be required when voting at a polling station, but as usual there is an option to vote by post or proxy.

Other matters

Streetlamps on Wallingford Bridge have been repaired shortly after the meeting. The broken steps from the bridge to the riverside are due to be repaired in June. Cllr Ryall is updating the parish emergency plan and will submit it to the county council once she has received full information about venues to be used in the event of an emergency.

Cllr Soames had received a request about the use of North Stoke Recreation Ground for football games. If there is a proven need for pitches, the ground will need remedial work to make it playable, which could be funded from our Community Infrastructure Levy.

Next meeting

The next parish council meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Village Hall on Thursday 6th April 2023 at 7.30pm. The Annual Parish Meeting will now be on Thursday 18th May at the pavilion, starting at 7.00pm.

Parish councillors needed

There will be 12 parish council seats up for election on 4th May: three for North Stoke ward (which includes Mongewell) and nine for Crowmarsh Gifford. North Stoke and Mongewell are under-represented at present.

The Parish Council has received details from John Ellmore about an electric car guide website (electriccarguide.co.uk) that aims to give guidance to owners (or prospective owners/drivers) of electric vehicles (EVs).

This site is non-commercial and free to use. It provides educational guides and resources to help people transition from petrol vehicles to electric ones.

The shift towards electric vehicles is a critical issue affecting local communities and the global environment and many people are still finding out about the technology and how best to adopt it.

Their Finest Hour Second World War collection day

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum aims to preserve people's memories

- Share your family's Second World War stories and objects to be digitized for an online archive
- Museum Open Day from 11am 3pm on Saturday 1st April 2023 with free admission to the SOFO museum in Woodstock
- See Second World War living history displays, kit displays, and art exhibitions in the museum galleries

The event is part of a nationwide campaign organised by Their Finest Hour, a team based at the University of Oxford and funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, which is collecting and preserving the everyday stories and objects of the Second World War.

As these stories are fast fading from living memory, it is vital that they – and the wartime objects that often accompany them – are preserved for future generations.

At the Digital Collection Day, stories about your family's wartime experience – and associated objects such as diaries, letters, medals, journals, and ration books – will be recorded, digitised, and then uploaded to the Their Finest Hour online archive, which will be launched in June 2024 and be free-to-use.

To encourage even more people to drop in and share their stories, the SOFO Museum will waive its normal admission fee on the day – entry will be free to all on 1st April. With often limited parking in Woodstock, Blenheim Palace will also be kindly supporting this event, offering free parking to those attending to share their stories. The museum is just a short walk from Blenheim Palace through the Woodstock Town gate.

SOFO will also be hosting a range of other Second World War themed events and exhibitions on the day. Visitors will be able to see displays from 1940s living historians inside the museum, a recently installed replica Anderson Shelter, as well as other exhibitions.

Visitors can talk to museum staff on the day about donating items to the museum's own

collection if they wish, but the focus will be on digitisation - photographing objects, recording stories and scanning documents - so original items can remain with their families.

Dr Stuart Lee, *Their Finest Hour* project leader, said, "We know from previous projects that people have so many wonderful objects, photos, and anecdotes which have been passed down from family members which are at risk of getting lost or being forgotten. Our aim is to empower local communities to digitally preserve these stories and objects before they are lost to posterity."

The project team is especially interested in collecting contributions from people from under -represented backgrounds in order to increase the diversity of the Second World War heritage we record.

John Howell MP writes ...

I am writing ahead of the Spring Budget which I know many await. Most people will have received support for increased energy bills automatically through their provider. However, there are several households not on mainstream supply or who have other specific arrangements, such as Park Homes. In February, the alternative scheme to ensure that support is available to such households went live for everyone and applications for support to the Alternative Energy Support Scheme can be made online.

With the coming of Spring, we are more aware of the countryside around us. In recent weeks, I have had numerous comments on the litter in public places. I agree that this is an eyesore, and we need to keep drawing attention to the need for people to take their rubbish home or use the bins provided. In recognition of the problem, the Government published its National Litter Strategy in 2017 which set out several ways to tackle the problem. This has been regularly reviewed, and initiatives such as The Great British Spring Clean have been well supported by volunteers across the country.

Thankfully, most of our children progress through mainstream education with little problem. However, there are some who have special educational needs, and accessing this is not always easy. The delays can cause considerable stress for children and their families, and the time lost can be critical. This is not just a local problem, and the Department for Education has been looking to see what changes need to be made to improve the system.

Following consultation, the Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) and Alternative Provision (AP) Improvement Plan has just been published with the aim of ensuring that the right support is given at the right time and in the right place. This is fully supported by the Department for Health and Social Care. There is much work to be done in this area, but the publication of this plan and the associated measures for improvement are an important step in the right direction. There are, of course, many big issues which affect us all, so if there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. 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
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
