# The Vicar writes ...

March is when we march towards the Spring Equinox and the days lengthen, which gives us the name for our church season of Lent. It is a season of preparation, of getting ready ... but for what?

*"In the spring, at the time when kings go off to war…"* is found in the Old Testament (2 Samuel 11:1), going back to the time of King David. From ancient times, all the way through the Civil War armies would go into winter quarters to break from fighting and then embark on new campaigns in the spring. This seems to be true today with the war for Ukraine and also with the tensions in the Holy Land between Israelis and Palestinians. Religion is often used to justify war and it is even said that Putin has persuaded the Russian Orthodox archbishop to support his cause. It gives an easy, if lazy, excuse for people to dismiss all religions.

So where is Jesus in all this? He was a man of peace, indeed the Prince of Peace. In his first sermon, he said *"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God."* However, knowing our human nature (as a creator would), he also knew that peace on earth is a distant hope, as we have the fight between good and evil within each of us. Indeed, he prophesied: *"For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom, and there will be famines and earthquakes in various places"* (Matthew 24:7). Does this mean forever, literally 24/7? No, there is another way.

Although the Jews were expecting the Messiah to be a military hero like King David, on Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem on a donkey, symbolising peace, instead of a warhorse. Therefore, most didn't recognise him and he was rejected and crucified. But this innocent victim rose again from the dead, convincing his disciples that his Kingdom is coming. Likewise now, during Lent, his followers prepare our hearts to welcome him so that we may know his peace, starting with ourselves. He said: *"I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have conquered the world!"* (John 16:33)

May his peace be with you. Rev Kev

### **Mongewell Park Fête**

A fete was held at Mongewell Park on Tuesday 5th July 1871 followed the opening of the Free Library in St Leonard's Square, Wallingford [now the Methodist Church Hall]. The Free Library opening ceremony began at 2 o'clock, when all the shops in Wallingford were closed.

When the opening ceremony was concluded at about 4 o'clock, a large number of the public made their way to Mongewell Park, which Mr George Brettle, the owner of the Park, had opened to the public as part of the opening celebrations. It was thought that over 3000 people attended.

They were allowed to wander around the grounds and listen to the bands of the 10th Hussars and the Foresters Brass Band. A large number of spectators watched the donkey and boat races, and the slippery pole, which gave great amusement to all who weren't actually trying to walk the pole! The prizes for the winners of these races were given by the tradesmen of Wallingford.

There were a number of vocalists, the principal singers being Lottie Cherry and Frederick Albert of London. The children were entertained with a Punch and Judy show from the Crystal Palace.

In the early evening dancing was held on the lawn in front of the house, and the 10th Hussars and Wallingford Foresters provided the music. A firework display started at 9.30 which lasted until 10.30. Mr Brettle generously paid the entire cost of the display. The grounds weren't cleared of all the visitors until after eleven.

# Benson Choral Society Spring Concert

### Mendelssohn's Elijah – first choice for Benson Choral's new MD Steven Grahl

Singers in Benson Choral Society are in high spirits as they rehearse for their spring concert under their new Musical Director Steven Grahl. Steven is already Director of Music at Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford.

Mendelssohn's *Elijah* is an inspired choice by Steven for his first concert with us. It's at the heart of the British choral tradition, premiered at the 1846 Birmingham Musical Festival and conducted by Mendelssohn himself at the height of his powers. It is a great and dramatic story with text well chosen from the Old Testament. Elijah has to deal with the Israelites' desperate for rain after a drought, who are tempted to look to any gods who might help them. Elijah sees off the false prophets of Baal, and trusts in his true God and the rains arrive. After many adventures, Elijah dramatically gets to heaven with the help of fiery horses and fiery chariots.



It was an immediate success and remains so today. It's a great and dramatic story. There are many fine moments for chorus and soloists in this impressive oratorio is a pleasure for singers and audience alike. A fine quartet of soloists includes Giles Underwood in the title role.

# Wallingford Museum news

We are looking forward to Wallingford Museum's opening on March 1st for the 2023 season. Throughout the closure period the team have been busy creating not one but two new exhibitions.

This year, 2023, The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society (TWHAS) are celebrating 50 years since their foundation. Our first exhibition reflects TWHAS's development from its early beginnings through to the establishment of the museum and the impact of the historical and archaeological research on the heritage of the town. All led by volunteers, awarded in 2019 the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

### House detectives: history behind the door

The houses in this exhibition have been chosen to reflect the changing development and use of houses in Wallingford, from the medieval period to the 20th century, including a fictional fun mystery house.

On your journey through the museum you will discover how we became house detectives and how you could become one too!

Look out for Wallingford's Guided Historic Town Walks starting again. Each walk is led by an expert guide from The Wallingford Historical and Archaeological Society, exploring the backstreets and bringing to life the history of the town and its buildings from Saxon times to the present day.

# Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 2nd February. Present were Councillors John Griffin (Chair), Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Jay Anderson, Andrew Johnson, Stuart Soames, Fleur Stevenson, David Topliss and Julia Streete, plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet, and District Councillor Sue Cooper and six members of the public.

### Finance

The council agreed grants of £500 to Sue Ryder Palliative Care Hub, £500 to Oxfordshire South and Vale Citizens Advice, £200 towards a sponsored walk in aid of Floatability and the Churches Conservation Trust, and up to £200 towards coronation celebrations in North Stoke.

Mr Chris Strange's annual salary review had been carried out by the Environment and Recreation Ground Management Committee and the council accepted an increase to reflect his increased workload, to be backdated to April 2022.

Payments were approved including dog bin emptying, refuse collection, a new distribution board at the pavilion, church lighting, water, a TV screen for the new pavilion meeting room, membership subscription to Community First Oxfordshire, a replacement dog bin for North Stoke and £18,312 to SCM for work at the pavilion. Water bills will be paid by direct debit in future. Shield Maintenance will be asked to quote for cleaning the bus shelters on Nosworthy Way.

Three quotes will be sought for this year's grass cutting, to include the roadside verges and other areas in Crowmarsh Gifford, the North Stoke Recreation Ground and Newnham Murren Churchyard. The parish clerk would like to hear from anyone who can suggest a possible contractor.

### **District Council report**

The District Councillors reported that the annual budget is looking more positive than in previous years.

A new Community Infrastructure Levy strategy has been introduced for developments approved from the beginning of 2023. There was still no news of what the Council proposed for the former district council offices site on Benson Lane: the clerk will ask for information.

Problem areas identified immediately included Benson Lane, Clacks Lane and the Crowmarsh to North Stoke B4009 road. A community litter picking event in the spring was proposed and equipment can be borrowed from SODC: volunteers will be welcome.

There was no report from the county councillor.

#### **Environment and recreation**

The pavilion project is nearing completion and the committee is starting to make arrangements for an opening event.

It is hoped to carry out tree planting at the end of the recreation ground. Three hundred free trees should be available in November. The council agreed that planting a community orchard would be an excellent project to mark the Coronation of King Charles III.

#### Serious injury accident involving a

#### pedestrian

Following the December meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner and Thames Valley Police on speeding and motorcycle noise, there had been little action taken and it was reported that a serious injury accident had taken place on Monday 30th January just south of Crowmarsh roundabout on the A4074.

It was agreed that Thames Valley Police should be held to account and the traffic and transport sub-committee will meet within the next two weeks to discuss appropriate action. Initially ClIr Sherbourne will draft a letter and circulate it to the sub-committee, asking Thames Valley Roads Policing to send a representative to the parish council meeting in March. Copies will be sent to neighbouring parishes, the MP and the county council.

Cllrs Topliss and Streete will investigate how we might set up a Community Speedwatch scheme with volunteers.

#### Strategic projects

The county council had suggested possible contractors for the pedestrian crossing at The Bell: the Clerk will contact them and offer to send them the approved plans.

Cllrs Griffin and Park continue to work on planning improvements to Watery Lane. Cllr Park had circulated information outlining possible locations for information boards to show details of rights of way and help promote the Country Code.

The next parish council meeting will be held at Crowmarsh Village Hall on Thursday 2nd March 2023 at 7.30pm.

Anyone who might consider standing for the parish council in the May elections is encouraged to talk to the clerk, the chairman or any councillor.

## Parish councillors needed

The parish of Crowmarsh includes Crowmarsh Gifford, Mongewell and North Stoke. There will be 12 parish council seats up for election on 4th May: three for North Stoke ward (which includes Mongewell) and nine for Crowmarsh Gifford. North Stoke and Mongewell are under-represented on the parish council.

Residents over 18, including those who have moved into the village, are encouraged to come forward to join the parish council for the four-year term to 2027. The parish council is not party political, but tries to work for the

benefit of the whole community. It meets monthly on a Thursday evening for about two hours and we have a significant budget to spend for the benefit of our residents, organisations and future generations. We have a say on guiding new development by responding to planning applications and try to work closely with the district and county councils, police and other authorities. The council manages allotments, recreation facilities and green spaces, and we take responsibility for dog waste bins, bus shelters, church floodlighting, flower planting and much more. The council is well supported by our part-time staff - parish clerk, finance officer and recreation ground manager - and employs contractors for much of our work.

In the last four-year term we have built a children's playground and outdoor gym equipment, completed our Neighbourhood Plan extended and improved the pavilion, installed speed indicator devices on several roads, planned pedestrian crossings and improved our nature area and allotments. There is more to do to improve our environment and we have plans to plant significant numbers of trees, increase biodiversity generally and improve Watery Lane and other walking and cycling routes, provide more safe road crossings and find ways to control traffic speed and noise.

# **Benson Garden Club**

Benson Garden Club's February talk was given by Charlotte Popescu on the topic "In Praise of Apples". Charlotte is an experienced gardener, writer (including author of "The Apple Cookbook") and publisher. Her love of apples stems from her childhood home which had an apple orchard with many different varieties. She began her talk by sharing an eclectic selection of historical facts and myths featuring apples. For example, all apples derive from the crab apple and evidence of them have been found at Avebury's Neolithic site. The Roman army carried apples on their marches and planted pips along the way, with trees spreading northwards along their routes. And the Trojan War started with the fruit of temptation, the Golden Apple. Charlotte also shared some interesting folklore and customs, including apple wassailing on Twelfth Night and the saying that if it rains on St Swithin's Day there will be a good crop of apples.

Turning to the charm of different apple varieties and their origins, Charlotte said that you could eat a different apple grown in the UK every day for six years and still not sample every variety (worldwide there are around 7,000 varieties). An apple pip does not breed true, which is why we graft them, although some of the most well-known varieties were grown from pips (such as Cox's Orange Pippin). The longevity of apple trees was surprising e.g. the much loved Bramley apple was first grown in 1846 and the same original tree is still growing today. And D'Arcy Spice is an old apple variety (prior to 1800), found growing in the gardens of Tolleshunt d'Arcy, in Essex.

Charlotte also shared some planting choices which would enable you to enjoy apples over a long season, starting with an early variety such as George Cave which ripens in early/mid-August and finishing with Ellison's Orange which is ready from late September to late October. Finally she recommended storing the fruit wrapped in newspaper, so that their season could be extended.

For our next event on Thursday 2nd March, Pip Smith will give a talk on "Nuts about Narcissus". A landscape architect with over 13 years' experience working as a professional horticulturist, Pip has held the post of Head Gardener at several private and public gardens, most recently at the highly acclaimed Wollerton Old Hall in Shropshire.

Then on Thursday 30th March, Michael Holland will give a talk from his "Tales From the Fruit Bowl", titled "Saucy & Spicy" (focusing on the nightshade family). Michael is a writer, lecturer and author with a 25-year career at the renowned Chelsea Physic Garden in London.

For both talks our venue will be Benson parish hall. Doors open at 7.15pm for a 7.45 start (£2 for members, £5 for visitors – just turn up on the door, no need to book). We will also have our "Flower of the Month" competition (for members only).

# Council elections in May – take ID to vote!

At the council elections on 4th May, you will need to take an identification document with a photo in order to be able to vote at the polling station. A range of photo ID will be accepted, including a passport, driving licence, disabled parking blue badge, concessionary bus pass or proof of age PASS ID card.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can apply now for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

### John Howell MP writes ...

As readers may know I lead the UK Parliamentary Delegation to the Council of Europe on behalf of the Government. Whilst this does take me away some of the time it also enables me to steer a positive contribution for the UK as well as all other Member countries. For example at the January meeting of the International delegation I put forward a paper for the introduction of a new International Convention or Treaty on the protection of the environment in times of armed conflict. Whilst this could seem remote what it would mean is that we would have something with which to prosecute a crime such as deliberately exposing a community to chemical weapons. I have been working too with the UN on this. Something long needed.

Whilst on the subject of Europe there has been talk of the UK leaving the European Court of Human Rights. I am a firm believer that we should stay a member of the Court and of the Convention on Human Rights. The Court is not a foreign court but is an international body in which we share responsibility with the other countries who are members. I believe that leaving the Court would be disastrous for the UK. I am sure we will hear more on this in the coming months.

Much more locally I have been pursuing issues relating to our GPs. I fully appreciate that some constituents have been frustrated at issues around access and face to face appointments. At the same time many of our GPs are feeling under huge pressure. Towards the end of last year I met with some of our GPs to listen to their concerns and this month I called together a meeting with other Oxfordshire MPs and the Chief Executive of the local Integrated Care Board (ICB) which oversees primary care provision. Among the issues raised was that of some GP practices closing their books to new patients. My view is that this is an unfair move for other Practices and for residents who cannot register locally. Further it does not solve the problem. The senior ICB team agreed to meet with local GP teams and pursue this and other issues with them. I will be following up on this in due course.

Also working with other Oxfordshire MPs, I have been looking into the issue raised with

me by a number of parents of the decision by the County Council to withdraw its 'spare seat scheme' for school transport on some services. This is essentially a scheme where any unallocated seats on school buses could be offered to parents of children not eligible for free school transport for a fee. Removal of this scheme inevitably leads to a negative impact for working parents, but it also puts many more cars on the road. The latter flies in the face of the County Council's own environmental ambitions where they have promised to reduce car journeys by 1 in 4. There are also safety implications for those children who would have to walk along busy roads not served by footpaths to get to school. The County Council said that as it did not have a statutory duty to deliver such a scheme it did not need to involve parents in the decision making. We have urged them to reconsider this decision as a matter of urgency as it is causing huge stress to many families.

I have long supported the part that apprenticeships play in the transition from full time education to work as a robust alternative to a university or college course for some

people. I am therefore delighted to see that for young people seeking apprenticeships as an alternative to university there is good news. Plans have been launched to allow young

people to use the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service, more commonly referred to as UCAS, to search and apply for apprenticeships alongside degrees. This will give them a better understanding of all the options available to them so they can get the best possible start in life. This will take time to get up and running and will be available from next year.

There are, of course, many big issues which affect us all which are well rehearsed in the national media and which the government is already working to address. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. 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
