

Grand opening of the new pavilion facilities

A fine crowd of local residents and friends, parish and district councillors gathered on the Crowmarsh Gifford recreation ground on Saturday 17th June to celebrate the completion of the two-year project to improve the facilities at the Pavilion.

Andrew Johnson, chairman of the parish council's environment and recreation committee, explained that the project followed on from the success of the 2018 play area and continued a change in thinking by the Parish Council. By winning funding and support from organisations like South Oxfordshire District Council and the FCC Communities Foundation, we could go from providing

facilities that were just good enough to provide the very best for our residents.

The new facilities include public toilets, a new disabled access ramp, an attractive new patio, a servery selling food and beverages and a new state-of-the-art small meeting room. This design came about largely thanks to parish councillor David Rowley and was realised by our architect Michael

Simpson, project managed by the committee, with the help of builders SCM and huge day-to-day help from Chris Strange to keep everything running.

Kellie Hinton, Vice Chair of South Oxfordshire District Council, also thanked the committee and praised David Rowley's drive in working so hard on the details and liaising with SODC. She appreciated the amount of fund-raising, planning and time commitment that has gone into making this pavilion even better than it was. SODC contributed over £73K to this project from their grants fund, which was the largest grant given that year.

John Griffin, Chairman of Crowmarsh Parish Council, echoed thanks to Andrew, David and all the fantastic team who saw this project through to success, and to SODC and FCC for



their maximum grants that have meant very efficient use of Parish Council funds. He encouraged people and local groups to come forward to make use of the meeting room and the servery and the pavilion as a whole.

Kellie and John then jointly cut the ribbon to open the facilities and Andrew thanked the volunteers for serving fantastic cakes to help raise funds for the church, and encouraged everyone to enjoy the jazz band and view the fantastic show of historic photos in the main hall, curated by David Beasley.

Past Times from David Beasley

The Crimean War peace celebrations

The morning of 30th May 1856 was very overcast and the sun was not seen all day. Despite the weather, the whole population of Wallingford and Crowmarsh were aroused at nine o'clock by the ringing of bells and the firing of cannon at the start of the peace celebrations commemorating the end of the Crimean War. Crowds began collecting in the Market Place from Wallingford, Crowmarsh and other surrounding villages.

At eleven o'clock the Aldermen and Town Councillors, accompanied by the band of Long Crendon, with members of St Stephen's Lodge of Odd Fellows, went in procession to the house of the Mayor, Mr Edward Wells, at 47 High Street, where the members of the Corporation were given an excellent collation.

At 12 o'clock they returned with the Mayor to the Market Place, where tables had been laid out with seating for 400 of (as newspapers of the day called them) the working class. They had received tickets in advance entitling each man to 1lb of cooked meat, 1lb of plum pudding, two pints of ale and 8ozs of tobacco. The females of the town received nothing but were allowed to cook the meat - how generous!

The meats were laid out for inspection, with all their garnish of vegetables, in Mr Clark's house (where the Corn Exchange now stands). At exactly 1 o'clock the Mayor took his seat in a chair on a raised platform and Grace was said by the Revd John Langley, Rector of St Mary's.

The band played during the meal, toasts were proposed and responded to. The duties of serving at the tables was performed by the members of the Committee. Every house in the town was more or less decorated with flags and banners with appropriate national comments

The shops in the town closed their windows, which it was thought somewhat marred the liveliness of the scene, but as a demonstration intended to leave a remembrance of a return to peace in the year 1856 the celebrations could be considered an undoubted success.

The Vicar writes ...

Now that summer is truly upon us after a late start, our minds turn to holidays and a chance to unwind. Have you planned yours yet? I know I'm looking forward to a break. Just knowing that this is in the diary helps me to relax! I also find that the journey is as important as the destination, despite any travel disruption, delays and strikes which seem to be a feature of these times. The word holiday derives from "Holy Days" as a reminder that spiritual refreshment is also important.

This year I am leading a mini-pilgrimage that is named after St Birinus, the patron saint of our diocese, who first brought the Gospel to this area, converting Cynegils, the King of Wessex, in 635. On Saturday 22nd July, we will walk from "Churn Knob" in Blewbury to Dorchester Abbey stopping at various churches on the way. You will be able to join at various points if you don't want to walk the entire 11 miles. For those who don't wish to walk, perhaps you would consider being a driver to get us all back to the start! If you would like to meet the current Bishop of Dorchester (who succeeds Birinus by a mere 1,374 years!) then please join us for the Team Communion at St Mary's in the centre of Wallingford. This service replaces our Family Service which is usually on the first Sunday of each month, but that returns on Sunday 6th August with our popular "Pet Service", where we bring all varieties of animals into church and give thanks for them.

July also brings our Patronal Festival, which we celebrate this year on Sunday 23rd July, this being nearest to the Feast Day of Saint, St Mary Magdalene, which falls on 22nd July. As well as celebrating our patron saint, we celebrate our life together as a church family in our worship and witness.

The Environment Agency has reported that repairs to the pedestrian bridge across the Thames at Benson weir will not be completed before 2026 and diversion signs are in place.

However Bygone Boating based at the Benson marina have started running a passenger ferry service across the river between the Riverside Café and Benson lock while the bridge is closed. This will depend on them having enough staff to operate it, so it is best to call 07375 677823 before setting off on your walk to check that the ferry will be running.



District Council waste services: give us your views

Recipe of the month: Mrs Bun The Baker's Lemonade Scones

You can't beat these lemonade scones: the kids can really get stuck in with these. Just 3 ingredients and mix them all together, it couldn't be simpler. Once I make these with my classes they don't go back to the traditional method, they use this one. But the BIG question is... jam or cream first? [No question, it's jam first! - Ed.]

400g self-raising flour175ml double cream175ml full sugar lemonade

HOW TO MAKE

- 1. Preheat the oven to gas mark 5 or 190°C (fan oven 170°C).
- 2. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.
- 3. Place the flour into a bowl.
- 4. Measure the cream into a jug and add in the lemonade. Watch it fizz!
- 5. Pour it into the flour and stir with a spoon until you have a soft dough mixture. You might have to get those hands in to give it a squeeze.
- Sprinkle some flour over the work surface, place the scone dough on the top, sprinkle with a little more flour.
- 7. Roll the dough lightly. You only want it to be 2cm in height. You can always press it down with your hands, so you don't get it too thin!
- 8. Use a cutter (around 4-6 cm) to cut out the scones.
- 9. Place them on the baking tray.
- 10. Brush with a little egg or milk and sprinkle some sugar over them.
- 11. Place them in the preheated oven for 12-15 minutes.

TIPS

- Turn the scones over when they are on the baking tray, so the scone dough that rested on the baking tray becomes the top: I find they rise better!
- Use a shapes cutter to make flowers or stars.
- 3. Add some spice to them or a few raisins if you like.
- 4. As you cut the scones don't turn the cutter, instead try to pull it straight out, this helps the scone rise evenly and create a natural break in the scone, so you don't have to cut it open with a knife.

Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall on Thursday 8th June.

Present: Councillors John Griffin, Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Liz Ryall, Julia Streete, Andrew Johnson, Fleur Stevenson and Andrew Nesbitt plus Parish Clerk Sue Rance and District Councillor Sue Cooper and two members of the public.

Finance

Payments agreed included monthly salaries and expenses, dog bin emptying, refuse collection, grass cutting and maintenance, repairs and servicing, as well as items for the pavilion improvement project and a £200 donation towards the North Stoke coronation celebrations.

SCM builders had submitted a final interim claim of £29,890 for pavilion improvements. There are still final grant payments to come in and the finance officer will compile a full report and balance sheet once the project is completed.

It was agreed to accept the lower of two quotes received for the pedestrian crossing near The Bell, but the Finance Officer will contact the Highways department to ask for a contribution to the parts that involve repair of the road. [See note on page 4]

Environment and recreation

Cllr Johnson reported on progress being made to complete the pavilion improvement project in time for the opening on 17th June. There are a few snagging issues but these will not affect the use of the building. Some enquiries have been received from people interested in running the servery. The charges for hiring the meeting room and servery will be agreed by the committee.

Cllr Park reminded the council that stakes will be needed for the 700 new trees which will be delivered in October or November. He will obtain quotes and report back.

SODC is carrying out a deep cleanse in the parish from 5th to 8th September. They will be asked to remove weeds and litter from the Newnham Green service road behind the Queen's Head and Jewsons, where there is overhanging vegetation, and also other streets if they have time.

Traffic and transport

A meeting has been arranged with Superintendent Lewis Prescott-Mayling of Thames Valley Police on Thursday 29th June to discuss speeding and noise issues on the A4074 and A4130 roads and other concerns. Neighbouring parish councils and other interested parties have been invited to attend.

Community Speedwatch training of volunteers is under way. Cllr Nesbitt offered to help. Teams of three are required to do the monitoring, which will be carried out on the A4074 and the A4130.

Consultation on 20mph speed limits in the parish has been launched by Oxfordshire County Council. Wallingford Bridge and new developments will also be included.

Pedestrian access to the new estate from Benson Lane is being discussed with Oxfordshire Highways and the Countryside Access and it is hoped a site meeting with them can take place soon. Correspondence had also been received about inappropriate parking in Benson Lane near the entrance to French Gardens.

Strategic priorities

Work on the pedestrian crossing of The Street near the Bell is to start on 24th July.

Cllr Sherbourne will contact Oxfordshire Highways for more details on the duration of the project and information to be given to residents. [See note on page 4]. The County Council is being asked for a grant because of the poor state of the road where the crossing is to be built.

Cllr Park presented information on his research into suitable locations for countryside interpretation boards, which could show a map of the parish with rights of way and items of interest, as well as a QR link to the parish website and the Countryside Code. Four possible locations will be investigated. Permission from landowners will be required.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Thursday 6th July 2023 at North Stoke Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm.

John Howell MP writes ...

In a month when the temperatures are rising, and many people are getting out and about more to enjoy the countryside, it is good to see some recent announcements that will benefit the countryside and also support our farmers. Of course, this is not to suggest that these issues are of concern all year around!

In the middle of May the Secretary of State for the Environment. Food and Rural Affairs (Defra) announced new funding for farmers and landowners to support projects to create new habitats for wildlife, help protected sites and boost efforts to reach net zero. It builds on the success of the first round of the scheme announced last year and will help with work to protect and enhance landscapes. It will deliver environmental benefits while also supporting farmers. Natural England and the Environment Agency will take the lead on the work and will select specific projects based on a number of criteria such as their environmental and social impact and, for the first time, there will be a food production criterion. This is important as it will be used to ensure that projects take food production into consideration and mitigate any negative impacts on this where possible.

Also announced last month was a commitment to protect the interests of our farmers in future trade deals. I know that this has been a concern within the constituency and am delighted that the Prime Minister has brought together representatives from the whole food supply chain for the 'UK Farm to Fork Summit.' This will include representations from the UK's farming, horticulture and agri-food sectors and is welcomed by the National Farmers Union.

Then at the beginning of June Defra launched another initiative with the publication of 'Unleashing Rural Opportunity.' This is a policy paper setting out plans to grow the rural economy and communities. It involves some key planning proposals which will involve consultation in the near future. Details of this are yet to be published. I hope that anyone with an interest in the growth of our rural communities will take an interest in this paper which can be found on the GOV.UK website by searching the title of the document.

Perhaps with a focus on the rural economy it is worth also mentioning the Procurement Bill

which has its final reading in the House in this week that I write. The Bill was introduced last year and, among other things, seeks to bring forward more effective Government procurement and to help smaller businesses (SMEs) win a greater share of government expenditure. I know from correspondence with constituents in business that some of the former complexities of the government procurement process has effectively ruled them out. I am pleased that this has been worked on to create easier access. If the Bill is passed there will be a duty on contracting authorities to have regard to the particular barriers facing SMEs throughout the procurement lifecycle, and to consider what can be done to overcome them. During the course of the progress of this Bill through parliament there have been some concerns on issues such as national security. However I believe that these have been dealt with at different stages. Although it takes some time to get a Bill through parliamentary process, one of the merits of the staged progress is that there is time for issues and concerns to be raised and for amendments to the original Bill to be made before it is passed into law.
