Past Times from David Beasley

While sitting in my office, compiling this month's article for the Crowmarsh News, I can see the foothills of the Chilterns, where cornflowers used to grow. Around here, there are some very attractive villages, including Crowmarsh, Mongewell, North Stoke, Ewelme, the Moretons and Ipsden.

Personally, my favourite village is Ipsden – being off the beaten track it has no short cut through to any large town, and the traffic is mainly local. Entering the village from the main Reading to Crowmarsh road, you pass the monument and pond. On your right, the monument was erected by Edward Reade, who lived at Ipsden House from 1860 to 1882, to the memory of his brother John Reade, who died in India whist serving with East India Company.

The old post office is just along the road, previously served by Janet Lindsay, who was Postmistress here for almost 50 years. She was born in Fife, Scotland in 1873, and was 90 when she died in December 1962. She lived most of her life in Ipsden.

The track opposite the Mere leads to the School and Newtown and past "Druids Temple", which has a collection of some 10 or 11 stones in a circle. Today they are very overgrown and not easy to find, but despite its name they were only erected in 1827, by Edward Anderdon Reade of Ipsden House.

Near the old School is "Ben's" Cottages, a pair of cottages built in memory of Bennett Remnant, the only son of Peter Remnant M.P. of Ipsden House. Ben was a young officer in the Rifle Brigade who was killed on 26th January 1945 in Holland during the 2nd World War. Hailey Open Air Sanatorium was situated near Hailey House and was run by a Dr.Reinhardt from the 1890s for about 12 years. When it was closed, Mr Glynne Williams built the present house.

Ipsden to me is a quintessential English village, the walks around Ipsden are truly beautiful and it's an area I will always return to.

Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met on Thursday 7th September 2023 at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall.

Those present were Councillors John Griffin, Stephen Sherbourne, Julian Park, Fleur Stevenson and David Rowley, Clerk Mrs Sue Rance, Finance Officer Dr Yvonne Peet, District Councillor Sue Cooper and three members of the public.

Public comment

A resident of The Street raised concerns about light pollution from the beacons at the zebra crossing. The County Council have promised to fit shrouds and the Finance Officer will contact Drayton Construction to find out when these will be fitted.

A resident of Winters Field reported that the boundary of the former SODC office site has become badly overgrown and poses a fire risk in the current dry weather. District Cllr Cooper will speak to the new head of property at SODC to ensure that the site is properly maintained, whatever its future might be.

Members of the public are welcome to attend all our meetings and may address the council at the start of the meeting for up to 3 minutes, with a maximum of 15 minutes set aside for public speaking.

Matters arising from previous meetings

Yvonne Peet, the council's Finance Officer, agreed to represent the parish council on the group who are working on the community larder project.

The Parish Council has expressed interest in the county council's electric vehicle charging station scheme for the village hall and the pavilion.

Finance

Payments were agreed including £126,676 for the zebra crossing (to come out of the Community Infrastructure Levy receipts), £100 to Oxfordshire Museums Service to acquire an item of mediaeval treasure found in the parish, \pounds 3124 for architectural project management of the pavilion project and \pounds 480 for tree surgery at the nature area.

Planning

The Planning Inspectorate has dismissed the appeal against refusal of application P22/ S2233/FUL to demolish a rear single-storey extension and erect a two-storey single dwelling at Sheringham House, Crowmarsh Hill, Crowmarsh Gifford, OX10 8BG. The parish council had recommended refusal).

District Council report

The District Councillors' report had been circulated and was discussed.

Following public demand in view of the hot weather, the riverside splash park would reopen over the weekend.

A campaign is under way to educate residents in kerbside recycling to avoid lorryloads being rejected due to contamination. SODC recycling remains excellent, second place in the country for the percentage recycled. A second application is being prepared for bathing water status on the Thames at Wallingford.

There was again no report from the county councillor.

Environment and recreation

There was an update on the final stages of the pavilion improvements, which are virtually complete, although the builders, SCM, have gone into liquidation. Building regulations approval is still awaited and there are a few outstanding issues to be dealt with. The next meeting of the Environment and recreation committee will be held on 28th September. A further £36,000 in grant money is due from SODC on completion of the project.

Residents of French Gardens have been consulted and responded positively to the proposed location of a dog waste bin. The council plans to install a bin and will review the need for additional bins in due course.

Traffic and transport

A letter will be drafted to be placed on the windscreen of parked vehicles causing an obstruction in Benson Lane. There had been no response from OCC Highways on work needed to improve footpath no. 2 off Benson Lane.

20mph speed limit signs have been installed but signage is incomplete in some places including North Stoke, where speeding traffic on the B4009 is still a serious problem. The Speed Indication Device in the Street is not working and it was agreed to purchase a new one at a cost of £2,250.

Strategic priorities

Cllr Park shared information on proposed locations for five parish interpretation boards:

- End of Watery Lane near Wallingford Bridge
- Newnham Murren church
- Carmel / Mongewell
- Icehouse Hill near the lodge
- North Stoke, near the Village Hall.

Each board would be oak-framed, vertical, A1 size, showing the same information.

The Clerk will contact landowners as necessary and ask SODC if advertisement consent may be needed.

The chairman had responded to consultation on the Oxfordshire Strategic Active Travel Network to make sure Watery Lane is included as part of a Wallingford-Goring off-road route.

Residents will be consulted on future objectives for the parish council via a survey, both on the website: http://crowmarshgifford.org.uk and in Crowmarsh News.

Recruiting parish councillors

The parish council, like others in Oxfordshire, still has vacancies. We want to encourage residents, including recent arrivals, and particularly anyone living in Mongewell and North Stoke, to apply to join the council. There will be a publicity campaign, including a leaflet in Crowmarsh News, and people are invited to talk to any councillor or contact the clerk to find out more about the role.

Next meeting

The next parish council meeting will be at North Stoke Village Hall on Thursday 5th October 2023, starting at 7.30pm. Members of the public are welcome to attend.

Since then, Charles has become known as the Guru of No Dig and has published over 10 books on the subject and appeared on BBC Gardeners' World.

Just before schools returned, and the longawaited sunshine arrived, we hit the problem of the safety of school buildings due to concerns over reinforced autoclaved aerated concrete (RAAC). The potential disruption to education and the timing of the problem caused inevitable and understandable frustration. The Department for Education had been working to identify buildings which may have RAAC over the last year, and the advice had been to take RAAC areas out of use immediately if assessed by surveyors as 'critical'. Where they were assessed by surveyors as 'non-critical', the risk was not considered sufficient to require that these spaces be taken out of use. However, that position changed following cases that came to light over the summer and at the end of August, the Department for Education advised all establishments with buildings with RAAC confirmed by a surveyor to take the affected space out of use until suitable mitigations have been put in place. Whilst the concern was widespread thankfully once the list of affected places was published, I was relieved to see that no schools in this constituency were affected.

Following the media coverage of the introduction of Ultra Low Emission Zones (ULEZ), I received several emails from constituents raising concerns on what is being seen by some as a war on motorists. I appreciate that numerous residents in this area travel to London on a regular basis. Clean Air Zones focus on vehicle emissions and have a specific target of trying to improve air quality in problem areas. The ULEZ in London means that for those who do not have a compatible vehicle, there is now a charge of £12.50 a day to drive in these zones. As we have seen in the High Court challenge, the size of the zone and the unavoidable negative economic impact on some residents makes the scheme contentious. The decision to introduce the scheme was entirely that of the Mayor of London, is funded through local taxation, and not one over which Parliament has any say. The media reports of the Mayor of London seeking to hide research from Imperial College that guestioned the beneficial environmental impact of the scheme, simply led to the claims that it is nothing more than an anti-motorist cash cow. It is not difficult to see why motorists feel that 'war' is being declared on them.

From early days as an MP, I have been very clear that, particularly in rural areas, a car is not a luxury; it is an essential means of transport. Whilst we can argue for more public transport, the geography and nature of people movement will always make it a challenge to provide an efficient and economic system that meets the diverse travel needs. Sadly, when measures are introduced that seem to be excessive it leads to other more genuine measures being challenged too. Tackling air pollution is nothing new. Since the middle of the 20th century regulatory frameworks have tried to address such issues, and as we have learned more, this has been refined. The most recent Government Clean Air Strategy 2019 complements the Industrial Strategy, the Clean Growth strategy, and the 25 Year Environment Plan. However, the whole strategy is not just aimed at motorists, it is much wider.

I know that that online safety is a concern for many constituents, especially parents. The Online Safety Bill, which seeks to make the UK the safest place to go online, has taken some time going through parliamentary process due to some concerns over restriction. Some people called for it to be completely dropped. At the end of last year, MPs agreed to recommit certain Clauses and Schedules of the Bill to further scrutiny. The Bill finally completed its stages in the House of Lords earlier this month and returned to the Commons with amendments.


