### **Past Times** from David Beasley Military camp at Howbery Park affected by wet weather

The last few weeks have been very wet, but some 96 years ago in the middle weeks of September 1927, the weather was so wet that a military camp in Howbery Park had to be shortened because the cavalry regiments and the monster tanks (as they were called then) could not participate in the planned manoeuvres.

The 10th Hussars was a regiment in which Prince Henry served as a Captain. Prince Henry was the 3rd son of George V – the late Queen Elizabeth was his niece. The Hussars returned to their headquarters at Aldershot along with several other regiments, and because of the weather the three-day mock battle was cancelled. In fact only the artillery was able to operate as planned, and cavalry, tank and aircraft units were ordered to return to Aldershot. Thankfully when they finally met the German Army in combat, the weather was fine and dry.

The Lamb Corner in the centre of Wallingford presented great difficulties, particularly when howitzers hauled by large lorries coming from Didcot had to turn into Castle Street. In some cases it took around half an hour for one gun to manoeuvre around the corner. One military expert was of the opinion that the day of large tanks had passed, because they had such great difficulty in moving at all in the wet of that September.

At the beginning of the second week the planned attack on Wallingford had to be scaled back to an attack on Rush Court, an



area well above the floods. One of the benefits of the disruption of these manoeuvres was that Wallingford was full of very large numbers of troops in the evenings, much to the satisfaction of the pub landlords.

### Crowmarsh Gifford C of E Primary School

It has been an extremely busy time at the school since our new Headteacher Vania Eaglen took over at the beginning of the year. It has been an exciting period of change, with a number of new staff and governors all working as a team to push the school forward.

Anyone walking past will have noticed the lovely new gates and site improvements thanks to a new maintenance team making great progress and parents chipping in with some gardening help during the summer term. The summer term also saw the return of Ofsted, with lots of great feedback including the school retaining its status of Good.

It would, of course, be remiss not to mention the pupils, and the lovely children of Crowmarsh Gifford Primary make this a pleasure. With last year's school leavers moving on to Wallingford and elsewhere, having achieved great results in their SATs, it was an exciting day for everyone when the new children arrived in early September, full of nervous energy. As expected they have settled in really well and are enjoying everything Crowmarsh provides.

As mentioned last month, the school is looking to recruit new governors; there is always a natural cycle of progression in any governing body and some very experienced governors came to the end of their time with us. Being a governor is an exciting and rewarding opportunity to give back to the community and have a strategic influence over the education of future generations. ### The Vicar writes ...

We are delighted that our next Rector of the Wallingford Team has been selected. Revd Sarah Nesbitt, a long-term resident and former Church Warden of Crowmarsh, will begin her new role from early March next year. Sarah has lived in the village for 34 years and is married with two sons, a daughter-in-law and a baby granddaughter. She was ordained in 2018 and has spent the past five years serving in the United Benefice of Shiplake with Dunsden and Harpsden, most recently as Assistant Rector and as Assistant Area Dean in the Henley Deanery. She is also one of the Wallingford Street Pastors. Her hobbies include paddle-boarding and ballet, and she sings in an a cappella quintet called 'Shiraz'.

For the festive season ahead, we have a number of extra services, all at the Parish Church except the Advent Carol Service at 4pm on Sunday 3rd December at Newnham Murren Church (suggested minimum donation of £3 for mince pies and mulled wine afterwards).

We extend a warm welcome to all villagers to join us at these and every other Sunday service at 11am at St Mary Magdalene's ...

But why not beat the rush this year and extend the joyful season with us?

Our Advent services are a wonderful way to prepare for the festivities ahead as we light another candle on our Advent wreath each week, and hear the readings which anticipate Jesus's arrival as the long-awaited Messiah.

And of course, there are the 12 days of Christmas, so the Sunday afterwards (31st December) will also be full of carols and celebrations. Then the Sunday after that, 7th January, brings the celebration of Epiphany, traditionally the date when the Wise Men arrived to pay homage to the newborn King.

So, we have a choice at Christmas. Like our dinner, we can either cram, stuff and binge for a short period or we can savour the flavours and go deeper for a full appreciation of the reason for the season... that is "Joy to the world" as we celebrate Emmanuel, God with us!

### **Benson Garden Club**

Benson Garden Club's talk on 2nd November was by Chris Day on "Taming the indoor jungle - houseplants made easy". Chris is a professional horticulturalist who served his apprenticeship at Rochford's nursey. This nursery became a leader in the production of houseplants (one of the family owners even coining the phrase "houseplant', in the 1940s).

Before his talk, Chris had taken two large tables and covered them with an extensive variety of houseplants, some familiar, some less so. He then proceeded to share plant care advice and stories for each one, giving us a variety of interesting tips.

First up was that the much-loved Norfolk Island pine (related to the Monkey Puzzle tree) requires ericaceous soil. I was also surprised to hear that moth orchids should be planted in clear pots because their roots need light and that (along with many houseplants) they also dislike sitting in water – roots need oxygen as well as water, so too much water will "drown" the plant.

There was also welcome advice on light conditions. Many plants, such as Tradescantia, need a lot of bright, indirect light to thrive, whereas generally the bigger the leaf, the less light a plant requires. Fatsia japonica was suggested as one that can tolerate dark halls and landings. By the end of the evening, we had a wealth of hints and tips on how to keep our houseplants healthy!

On Thursday 7th December, Paolo Arrigo will be speaking on "From seed to plate". Paolo is MD of Franchi Seeds UK, 'Slow Food UK Person of the Year' 2019, a cookbook author, biodiversity campaigner, multiple RHS medal winner and he is passionate about responsible food. He will cover vegetables from Roman times to present day, look at the seed industry and then take you on a food journey around Italy. Franchi claim to be the oldest family-run seed brand on the planet, established in 1783 and still run by the same family after seven generations. They specialise in seeds of endangered, heritage, ethical and regional varieties with provenance and lost flavours. Paolo will have seeds to sell at a discount perhaps a Christmas stocking-filler for a keen gardener or a treat for yourself!

On Thursday 4th January we will start the new year with a motivating talk, "A successful year in the kitchen garden." Hélèna Dove will talk us through how to plan for this, explaining when to sow and harvest some of the more common vegetables for those new to gardening as well as looking at a few alternative crops for the more experienced. Hélèna aims to provide plenty of hints and tips, but also encourages people to come with questions and to use it as a troubleshooting session.

Hélèna was a teacher before she re-trained in horticulture. After her trainee year, she worked as the kitchen gardener at Myddelton House Gardens, a historic property in North London before she went on to work at Kew. In addition to her practical work as a kitchen gardener, Hélèna writes books on the subject. It should be an excellent talk to get us planning for a horticulturally productive 2024.

Both events will be at Benson parish hall, OX10 6LZ. Doors open at 7.15pm for 7.45pm start. Visitors are very welcome to attend for £5 each (just turn up, no need to book).



## Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met on Thursday 2nd November 2023 at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall. Present were Councillors John Griffin, Stephen Sherbourne, Fleur Stevenson, Julia Streete, David Rowley and David Topliss, Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet, District Councillor Andrea Powell and one member of the public. Councillor Julian Park attended online.

#### **Public comment**

A member of Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall Committee spoke in support of their grant request towards repairs and improvements to the area outside the entrance to the hall.

#### Matters from the previous meeting

Cllr Park thanked the Clerk for her work on the grant application to the District Councillors' Fund for the tree planting project. The application is still being considered by District Council officers.

On 11th November, Cllr Sherbourne will meet with the surveyor who has carried out the tree survey at Newnham Murren Churchyard. Three quotes will be sought for carrying out the necessary work.

Alternative quotes are also being sought to replace the sewage pump at the pavilion.

The finance officer will instruct Shield Maintenance to supply and install a dog waste bin in the agreed location at French Gardens.

#### Finance

A grant of £2,000 was made to Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall Committee towards the cost of improving the entrance to the hall.

A £300 donation was agreed to Oxfordshire Mind to support residents with mental health issues. In the past year 173 people in the local area had received help from them.

North Stoke Parochial Church Council had requested a grant towards the printing costs of the magazine 'The Window', which is delivered to Ipsden and North Stoke. The total print costs are £300 per year and a grant of £200 was agreed.

Payments were agreed including £534.00 to Oxford Direct Services for a tree survey at

Newnham Murren Church, £166.39 for dog bin emptying, £108.00 to Ashburton Limited for grass cutting at North Stoke Rec, £390.42 to Origin Amenity Solutions for line paint and nozzles for football pitches, and to Morgan Fire Protection Limited £540.00 for risk assessment and £547.11 for fire extinguishers.

#### Planning

#### Decisions by SODC

P23/S3125/FUL Black Barn Farm, Church Lane, Ipsden. Change of use of redundant pig building to workshop. Planning Permission

P23/S2817/HH Broomfields, 113 The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EF. Proposed loft conversion with dormer to the rear and front roof window. Planning Permission

P23/S2887/HH Broomfields, 113 The Street, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EF. Front porch. Planning Permission

#### Consultations

P23/S3376/FUL Sheepcote Farm Mongewell OX10 8BP, Change of use of former pig buildings and yard to provide small storage units. This is part retrospective. Councillors felt it could be approved if the highway authority agreed.

P23/S3358/S73 Blenheim Farm, Icknield Way, OX10 6PR, Variation of condition 12 (materials) on P20/S0826/FUL to change horizontal softwood timber weather boarding (unstained) to horizontal composite woodgrain cladding in charcoal. The new material will have a greater carbon footprint but require less maintenance and the council had no strong views.

#### Major developments

The agent for the Newnham Manor development had circulated details of the layout proposed for staff parking and drop-off and the forest school area in the area off Old Reading Road to be transferred to the school. After discussion it was agreed that the Parish Council supports this whole package. Oxfordshire Highways and the Chilterns Conservation Board have also been consulted.

There was no news of proposals for the former SODC offices site.

#### Neighbourhood Plan

A review of the Crowmarsh Neighbourhood Plan will begin early in 2024. The process will be considered at the February meeting.

#### **District Council report**

The District Councillors' report had been circulated and was discussed.

A thermal imaging camera to assess heat loss and level of insulation in a building may be borrowed from the District Council. Residents should contact the parish council if interested in arranging a survey of their homes.

Pumpkins put out with food waste bins have not all been collected: district councillors will investigate.

Consultation on the new South Oxfordshire Local Plan will begin early in 2024. The Thames 21 charity has submitted a further application to secure bathing water status for the River Thames at Wallingford.

There was no report from the county councillor.

#### **Environment and recreation**

Final stages of the pavilion improvements are being finished off so the final SODC grant payment can be received. A fire risk assessment has been carried out. The CCTV policy was reviewed and approved with minor amendments.

The County Council rights of way department will carry out remedial work along footpath No. 2 and address encroachment onto the path, as well as getting the highways department to lay tarmac on the lower end to link Benson Lane with the French Gardens estate paths. Bloor Homes will be asked to remove their structures and reinstate footpath No. 3 to connect through to Marsh Lane

Delivery of over 300 trees, stakes and tree shelters is expected and a date or dates will be arranged for tree planting by parish councillors and volunteers. See the website https://crowmarshgifford.org.uk if you can help, or contact the parish clerk.

A laurel hedge near the school is very overgrown. The Clerk will send a letter requesting the owner to cut it back. Please will all residents with hedges or trees on their boundary keep them trimmed back from paths and roads.

The Clerk will ask Southern Gas Networks about a completion date for the current gas works on Thames Mead and The Street.

#### **Traffic and transport**

The Highways department will be consulted about reducing the speed limit on Nosworthy Way A4130 to 40mph around the entrance to the Cala Homes / CABI development, as has been done at the west end of the Wallingford Bypass, and a speed survey will be requested.

HGVs parking on residential roads are causing problems in Benson Lane and on the entrance to French Gardens. Cllr Sherbourne has drafted a letter to be put on the windscreen of offending vehicles. The council will work with Thames Valley Police to resolve this.

The new Speed Indicator Device (SID) in The Street is ready to be mounted in position and set to 20mph. The one in Benson Lane is now back in place and also needs to be reset.

#### **Strategic priorities**

Now that the pavilion improvements are nearly complete and the new pedestrian crossing in The Street is in use, the council is consulting about our next set of strategic priorities, so please fill in the survey on the website https:// crowmarshgifford.org.uk or complete the form enclosed with this issue of Crowmarsh News.

Cllrs Sherbourne, Park, Griffin and Streete will meet to discuss how to make progress on improving Watery Lane, starting with a survey of the vegetation and investigating resurfacing options appropriate for a rural bridleway.



### John Howell MP writes ...

The State Opening of Parliament marks the formal start of the parliamentary year and on 7th November the new session was opened with a historic King's Speech, the first for 70 years. The detail has been well covered in the media and there will be differing views on the Bills to be brought forward.

In the Prime Minister's introduction to the speech, I was personally pleased to note mention of the Holocaust Memorial Bill which will progress the construction of a national Holocaust Memorial and Learning Centre in London. I have been a Trustee of the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust for some time. The centre will provide a focal point for national remembrance and help to promote learning the lessons of the past.

As Leader of the UK Delegation to the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe I was also pleased to see the Prime Minister draw attention to the fact that he has ensured that illegal migration has been on the agenda of every international meeting that he has attended from the G7 to the Council of Europe. His attendance at the 4th Summit of the Council of Europe in Reykjavik in May was very welcome.

Now to a much more local issue which is regularly raised with me, that of Royal Mail deliveries. In some post code areas across the constituency mail is not being delivered on a regular basis and indeed at times people have not received post for over a week. I have challenged Royal Mail on this on a number of occasions and in September met with senior staff to pursue matters further, as I set out on my website at the time. In a recent follow up meeting I was advised that there have been some changes in senior personnel with someone specifically brought in to oversee improvements to delivery in this area.

Where there are delivery problems in specific post codes Royal Mail has promised a local investigation if given the post code detail. Staff shortages remain and if anyone is interested do look online on the Royal Mail website where vacancies are advertised. It was also interesting to learn that some of the delays are with distribution via third party carriers before mail gets to Royal Mail itself for delivery. With sight of the envelope the team at Royal Mail can use the codes to track the precise journey of a letter to see where they delays are coming from. It was interesting to learn that organisations such as the NHS use these carriers which may explain why some important letters offering appointments are delayed. The situation will remain under review with Royal Mail.

I would like to take this opportunity to wish all constituents a peaceful Christmas and to send my best wishes for the year ahead. I know that for many life is not easy and personal and global struggles can weigh us down. Whatever your beliefs I do sincerely hope that the peace of the Christmas season may bring some comfort and joy.

May I also take this opportunity to pass on my sincere thanks to the army of volunteers who give their time to help others in their communities in many different ways throughout the year. Our communities are strengthened by this generous service. Thank you all.
