Jewsons site

As reported previously, parish and district councillors met with representatives of T A Fisher on 23rd September to find out more about their declared intentions to transform the empty builders merchant site into a highquality residential scheme. They told us they are developing a plan for 15 2-storey one and two bed housing units, retaining the original brick and flint listed building, with cottages facing directly onto The Street that reflect the neighbouring buildings and using the existing entrance. We were assured that they will carry out a public consultation before they submit their full application to give neighbours and other residents a chance to examine their proposals and make any representations direct to them before the formal planning process. The parish council will report back as soon as there is any more news.

Past Times with David Beasley Revd. Porter's Retirement Presentation

At the end of September 1893, the Revd. Richard Ibbetson Porter, Crowmarsh's Rector for the past 15 years, was compelled to resign because of ill health. On Wednesday 27th September his parishioners gave Revd. Porter a presentation, held in the Crowmarsh Schoolroom, at which he was given a purse containing a large sum of money collected in Crowmarsh. Also, a copy of the address given by Mr Joseph Philips, which was framed and signed by his parishioners. In his address, Mr Philips referred to the high esteem in which Revd Porter was held in Crowmarsh and the neighbourhood. After the short speech a tea for all was given, an entertainment in the form of a concert was given by the parishioners. Among the performers were the Misses Dearlove who gave a pianoforte duet and a pianoforte solo by Miss Elsie Bradford. In the second half, the School Children performed "Fairy Fay", the performers being George Dunsdon as King of the Goblins, C Wheeler, W Keen, W Scudds, and E Lovegrove were the Imps and the part of "Fairy Fay" was beautifully performed by A Wilder. Mr Johns gave a fine rendition of the "Lost Chord" and Miss Johns touched hearts of all present with her performance of "Children's Home". At the conclusion of the entertainment Mr Joseph Phillips gave a vote of thanks to the performers and to Miss Dust and Mr Stevens who organised the concert. Revd and Mrs Porter shook hands with everybody as they left the schoolroom.

Revd Porter moved to Powderham in Devon, where he died in September 1896. He was born in September 1837, to Thomas and Isabel Porter, in St Pancras, London. He married Phoebe Man in 1862 and had four children, Willoughby, Mildred, Cecil and Sibyl. In 1862 to 1868 he became Rector of St Andrews, South Stoke, moving to Chipping Ongar, in Essex from 1869 to 1878, from there he came to Crowmarsh where was Rector from 1878 to 1893.

The Vicar writes...

December can feel like chaos – lots of social events, services, Christmas presents to buy, neverending to-do lists and the pressure to create the perfect Christmas. But in the midst of this chaos, our churches offer an opportunity to find peace during this busy time. Our church's theme for Advent and Christmas 2024, Follow the Star: Calm and Bright, draws on the world-famous carol, Silent Night: "Silent Night! Holy Night! All is calm, all is bright..."

One of the reasons that this carol is so universally loved is the way it invites us into the still centre of the Christmas story, to contemplate Mary holding the new-born Jesus, the Light of the World.

The angelic messages we encounter in the biblical story of Jesus' birth typically hold together the need for calm in the present ("Do not be afraid" ... "Fear not") with the hope of a bright future ("for you have found favour with God" ... "for behold I bring you tidings of great joy"). Throughout Advent, we seek some calm during this busy period, with a chance to pause during the busy season as we prepare for Christmas and put it in its original context – away from all the pressures of adverts telling us what a perfect Christmas must be, but to the hope of God joining us in the midst of "woes of sin and strife" that another carol describes.

The time of preparation for Christmas, called Advent (meaning 'coming'), begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas which falls neatly on the 1st December. We will mark this with an Advent Carol Service at 4pm at Newnham Murren - this year the theme is "Looking for the Light", which seems even more appropriate in this church which has no electricity or heating, so wrap up warm! Afterwards, we are invited for mulled wine and mince pies next door at the farmhouse to raise money for the Churches Conservation Trust who maintain Newnham church (suggested minimum donation £3 please).

The thematic pattern of Advent-Christmas-Epiphany can be seen as darkness-light-manifestation or as promise-fulfilment-proclamation. I hope you will join us in church for each step of the journey through the Advent, Christmas and Epiphany season to appreciate the anticipation and preparation, celebration and reflective appreciation of the Incarnation – as "O come, all ye faithful" invitation carol gives the joyful and triumphant reason for the season: "Word of the Father, now in flesh appearing"!

Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met on Thursday
7th November 2024 at Crowmarsh Gifford
Village Hall. Councillors John Griffin, David
Rowley, Anna Best, Stephen Sherbourne,
Andrew Johnson, Fleur Stevenson, Julian Park
and David Topliss, Parish Clerk Sue Rance,
Finance Officer Yvonne Peet, District
Councillor Sue Cooper and five members of
the public were present.

A member of the public thanked Cllr John Griffin and District Cllr Cooper for responding to their concerns about possible future use of the former SODC site, which could result in sewerage problems. It was noted that consultation on the joint local plan ends on 12th November but the site has not been allocated for any specific purpose and residents will have an opportunity to respond whenever there is a planning application.

Matters from previous meeting

The Finance Officer is still seeking an internal auditor for next year's audit.

The Clerk has submitted the parish council's request for items to be included in the forthcoming deep cleanse: litter picking in Clacks Lane, litter picking and weeding in Benson Lane and at the end of Thames Mead. Cleaning of street signs has also been requested.

Cllr Sherbourne was unable to attend the River Users' Group 3 meeting on 10th October.

Finance

Councillors agreed a grant of £250 to the Wallingford Volunteer Drivers, and £682 to North Stoke Village Hall Committee to fund grass cutting charges for the year.

The pavilion had been revalued at £1.487 million resulting in the additional premium of £210.48. Other payments agreed included £579 for the clerk's new laptop, £160 to Liam Bridges for installation of defibrillators and £2400 to First Class Tree Surgeons for clearing vegetation and dead trees from Watery Lane.

At the next meeting the precept and budget for

next year will be considered. The Finance Officer will circulate a draft before the meeting.

P24/S2586/FUL Carmel College, Mongewell OX10 8BU. Part retrospective temporary permission for filming for up to 14 Days as well as preparation and clean-up of the site between August and December for a total of 28 days. Planning Permission.

Consultations

P24/S3334/HH 18 Wallingford Road, North Stoke OX10 6BB. Two-storey side and rear extension. Single-storey rear extension. Replacement single garage. Associated landscaping and internal and external works. No concerns about the wider impact but SODC needs to consider strong objections from neighbours.

P24/S3436/LB & P24/S3435/FUL The Grange, The Street, North Stoke OX10 6BL. Residential conversion self-build of an existing barn with associated access off Pocock Lane, together with parking, landscaping and all enabling works. No objection.

Major developments

A decision on the Newnham Manor application legal agreement is expected by the end of the year.

Neighbourhood plan

We agree to follow our planning officer's

recommendation and follow the simplest and quickest review process that will bring our neighbourhood plan up to date so that it will robustly defend against speculative development. The local plan and national policy are still going through consultation and we will need to revise our plan again after that.

In the emerging Joint Local Plan, Table TCR1 has misclassified Crowmarsh Gifford as a Tier 3 village/local centre: this is being challenged with SODC.

County council matters

County Councillor Bloomfield's priority grant fund is still open for applications. The Clerk will apply for £300 for tree planting at the recreation ground.

District Council report

District Councillor Cooper highlighted the new waste strategy and the trial of an electric refuse collection vehicle.

Strategic priorities

Vegetation has been cleared from a length of Watery Lane and the next stage is to improve the surface.

Defibrillators have been installed at Park View and Mongewell. Thanks were expressed to Mr Liam Bridges for fitting them.

Strategic priorities will be reviewed at a special meeting to be held in January.

Environment and recreation

The play area grassy mounds have become unstable and the tunnel has been inspected by Eibe who recommended replacement. There is also a worn area under the basket swings. Cllr Rowley will circulate quotes before the next meeting.

Cllr Park reported that 130 of the 420 trees planted at recreation ground had died, due to the flooding early in the year. The Clerk will contact Cllr Bloomfield and request his grant support to buy replacement trees.

The CCTV Policy was reviewed and approved with no amendments.

Trimming of overgrown trees at the bottom of Cox's Lane and between Robert Sparrow Gardens and Park View is in hand.

Traffic and transport

The meeting with the Highways Engagement Team took place on 7th November and various sites in the parish were visited. Speed reduction measures were discussed in Benson Lane, Nosworthy Way and along the B4009 to North Stoke. The meeting will be followed up with details of specific requests. Cllr Sherbourne reported that the Speed Indicator Device in Benson Lane is not working. Dropkerbs on village pavements can be requested via the highways engagement team.

Cllr Best reported that OCC Highways has agreed to the Autospeed watch camera being sited on one of their lamp posts. A licence is needed to view the data: Cllrs Best and Johnson will do this. Cllr Best will request a pro forma invoice for the camera and will obtain a 'Speed Camera' sign to be sited on the next lamp post. Cllr Park offered to help with the fitting of the camera.

Cllr Topliss reported that the 30mph sign by Wallingford Bridge has been removed and the speed limit will now be 20mph through Crowmarsh Gifford and Wallingford. He would like to request some more repeater 20mph signs to be fitted in The Street.

Other matters

Cllr Best will help with a review of the accessibility of the website.

Next meeting

The next meeting will be on Thursday 5th December at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. The draft budget will be discussed. Members of the public are very welcome to attend.

St John the Evangelist Catholic Church Centenary

The year 2024 has a particular significance for the church of St John the Evangelist Catholic Church in Wallingford! It marks the 100th anniversary of the building as a catholic church. The site is considerably older.

A church community has existed in the corner of the Market Place since the late 17th century, and the Wallingford Independent Church maintained the religious connection from 1785 until 1798. The congregation declined after the mid-19th century and was disbanded in 1881.

The building was then used by the YMCA the Evangelisation Society and for non-denominational services before becoming auctioned off in 1905.

Following refurbishment and alterations the chapel re-opened in late 1924 as a Roman Catholic Church. Prior to this Catholics had to travel to Dorchester to attend Mass.

As the congregation grew, the need for larger accommodation became apparent and in 1958 the incumbent priest Fr Kearney was granted planning permission for rebuilding and renovation of the church.

In 1993 a major renovation took place when the organ loft was removed, a large window replaced two smaller windows behind the altar. Fr O'Brien directed the project.

The amalgamation of the parishes of Didcot and Wallingford took place in 2006, when Fr O'Sullivan served both churches.

Today the church flourishes with the arrival of Father Dominic Adeiza in 2022 and with a lively and active congregation.

On Sunday 22nd September 2024 the 100 year Anniversary was celebrated.

The 11am Mass was co-celebrated by Father Dominic and Canon Peter, accompanied by the church choir. This was followed by refreshments and drinks and a special Anniversary Cake in the church hall. The event was attended by over 160 people, in the church, church hall and overflowing to the outside area!

News from your MP

Dear Residents of Crowmarsh,

The past few months have been a whirlwind, and I'm really grateful for the chance to represent and serve our community. It's been a busy time getting to grips with the role and meeting so many of you, and I'm looking forward to working together to make a positive difference here in Crowmarsh.

Reflecting on the experience of my first three months in the job, I'm pleased with where I've got to – but I recognise this is very much just the start.

Firstly, I'm delighted to share that after a busy summer period of hiring I now have a full team in place, including five caseworkers based in our new Chalgrove office who are working hard on the backlog of emails, and going above and beyond on individual cases. Parliament has already presented me with a great deal of exciting opportunities including joining clubs that offer trips from the US to the Falklands, but I'm clear I've been sent to parliament to serve the constituents of Henley and Thame. Whenever the parliamentary schedule allows, I make sure I'm here in the constituency working on the issues that matter most to you.

Secondly, I've set to work meeting with local stakeholders, particularly in the NHS to build the relationships needed to get results for residents. MPs don't hold any 'power' to force bodies like the NHS to do anything. Instead we have a convening power to bring people together and find resolutions together. MPs in some ways have less direct ability to demand an action than councillors – and have no access to the civil service – but I'll be putting my new .parliament.uk email and embossed parliament stationery to good use!

Thirdly, I've also got to grips with the suite of tools available to backbench opposition MPs. I'm occasionally asked what impact an opposition MP can have – especially when the government has a large majority. It's a valid question and impact relies on being active, and willing to use everything available to you. I make regular use of the opportunities presented to ask ministers 'oral questions', speak in the chamber on a debate, and pose 'written questions' to ministers. I'm delighted

too that our campaign on carers has broken through to the government, who now will increase the earnings threshold for carers allowance.

Since the July election, I've also been actively involved in local issues. I attended an excellent Q&A session on climate and nature in Benson last month and I would like to thank Bioabundance for organising it. I held an in-person surgery in Benson recently and I also had a tour of Benson Sewage Treatment Works to discuss the improvements that have been made to the site. Over the coming months, I will continue to meet with as many residents as possible. If you would like to get in touch or attend one of my surgeries, I would love to hear from you.

District Councillor's Report

Rethinking Waste

One of the most visible services provided by the District Council is the collection of household waste, including food waste and recycling. For several years, SODC has outsourced this service to Biffa, whose performance is regularly monitored and reviewed. Residents' surveys regularly reflect overall satisfaction with the way that both Biffa and the Council manage our domestic waste collection and disposal. South Oxfordshire recently moved to the top of the national league table for recycling, indicating a strong shared commitment between the council and residents to reduce our impact on the environment

The Council has recently extended its contract with Biffa and has also agreed a new Waste Resources and Street Cleansing strategy, which encourages everyone to rethink their approach to waste.

New Defibrillators in the Parish

The Parish Council has installed two more defibrillators. They are located in Mongewell and at the entrance to Park View. They are in stand alone temperature stabilised cabinets but are the same Defibtech DDU 120 models as those at the Pavilion and the Village Hall. They are stored in a 'ready' state and are fully automatic.

There is a comprehensive operating guide online. As with all defibrillators the same essential rules apply.

If the patient is unconscious or unresponsive and is not breathing or not breathing normally dial 999 for an ambulance. Give your precise location and the ambulance operator will tell you what the access code to the cabinet is, if appropriate. This is to ensure that an ambulance is en route before any attempt is made to use the defibrillator.

Once the patient is lying on their back you press the central On/Off button and follow the voice prompt instructions. You will need to expose their bare chest. All of our devices have the adult pads installed (if the patient is under 8 years of age or 25kg in weight you will need to swap to the paediatric pads which are inside the cabinets). It is essential to ensure that the best possible contact is made with the patient's chest.

Once this has been done the machine will assess whether it needs to shock the patient. It will warn you NOT to touch the patient when it is about to discharge into the patient and the shock required 'auto' light will flash.

Follow the machine's instructions to perform CPR if needed and listen to any further instructions it gives you.

Hopefully the ambulance will then soon arrive and take control of the situation.



Nick talked us through his year at the nursery, which starts with the deadheading of spent flowers, squeezing the seed pods gently to expel the moisture, then leaving them on a windowsill to dry out. The seeds are then stored away before they can be sown in March/April-time, germinating in 7-12 days. You can also take cuttings – Nick takes over 70,000 each year at his nursery. As a nice final touch, Nick brought a tray full of dahlia seed pods for us to take home to try our luck. As he pointed out, we might have picked a new variety waiting to be sown!
