News from Crowmarsh Gifford CE Primary School

Past Times with David Beasley

Christmas Day at the Workhouse in 1901

The popular view of Victorian workhouses at Christmas is that they were very grim, unhappy places, and that there was little celebrating of Christmas in the homes.

But if that is so, Wallingford must have been the exception. Every effort in the workhouse seems to have been made to celebrate Christmas to a level many of the inmates had before. The morning started with a service by Revd Babington of St Peter's Church who was chaplain to the workhouse. The dining hall and the infirmary were both seasonably decorated under the supervision of Mrs Longhurst, the Assistant Matron.

All work was entirely suspended on Christmas Day, and little luxuries and extra food were given out, their plates being filled as much as they wanted at mealtimes. At the breakfast coffee was added to the menu. For dinner there was sufficient roast beef and plum pudding to satisfy the keenest appetite: there was enough plum pudding for a pound per head to be served.

A generous donation of tobacco, snuff, oranges and sweets followed. In the evening tea or coffee was served by Mr and Mrs Cawse and Miss Cawse. The festivities were attended by 126 inmates, and 30 elderly inmates from the Infirmary. At the end of the day each inmate was given a Christmas booklet by Miss Fairthorne.

No children are mentioned because they were all in Cottage Homes. The Homes at that time had 32 children in the three cottages that made up the Homes. On Christmas morning the children were so excited they were up dressed as early as a quarter to two in the morning. They were of course sent back to bed, but by three they were up and dressed again. The day finally started with boys, led by Master Longhurst with a cornet, singing carols at the Homes and the Workhouse. At eight o'clock the children were given a good breakfast of rolls and butter. At half past ten the boys attended a Christmas service at St Peter's, Revd Babington officiated, followed by a Christmas dinner.

After dinner for the girls and younger children there was a large Christmas Tree, the daughters of Mr Newton junior of Crowmarsh, had dressed nine dolls for the girls. Till bedtime, which had been extended till ten o'clock, the children were allowed to play with their gifts. Many of the presents were contributed by the ladies of the district, Miss A Hedges gave each child an orange and walnuts, Miss Fairthorne gave a packet of sweets and a book, all the presents were in the stockings of the children.

This seemed to be an enjoyable Christmas for all in the Workhouse and Cottage Homes.

Parish council notes

Crowmarsh Parish Council met on Thursday 5th December 2024 at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall. Councillors John Griffin, Anna Best, Stephen Sherbourne and Andrew Johnson, Parish Clerk Sue Rance, Finance Officer Yvonne Peet and three members of the public attended.

A member of the public asked whether, following the site meeting with the Highways Engagement Team, there was any further news about extending the pavement at the entrance to the French Gardens development at Benson Lane and the improvements to Footpath 2. Information has been forwarded to the relevant officers and a reply is awaited.

A member of the public expressed concern about road safety near the entrance to the French Gardens site and suggested a sign should be displayed warning drivers about children crossing the road. Arrangements are in hand to cut back the trees in this area prior to an extension to the pavement.

Matters from previous meeting

The Clerk will ask Cllr Park about progress with the tree survey. Money will need to be allocated in the budget to pay for this.

The deep cleanse of certain areas has been carried out and favourable reports were received about the tasks completed.

Finance

Payments agreed included £630 to Benson Tree Services for tree work at Robert Sparrow Gardens, £632.89 for lawn mower servicing and £136.21 for allotment insurance.

A donation of £250 was agreed to the organisers of the Thames Run 2025, a fundraising event in support of Crowmarsh Gifford School and Style Acre.

A request had been received from Revd Kevin Beer, on behalf of St Mary Magdalene Church, for £5000 towards the cost of improvements to the church facilities including a toilet and babychanging area, a kitchen/servery and drainage connections. After discussion, it was proposed by Cllr Sherbourne and seconded by Cllr Griffin that a grant of £5000 be made and this was agreed. This will be paid from Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money and the parish council is looking forward to more community use of our historic church.

The accounts status at 30th November showed total receipts for the year to date were £124,275.02 and total payments were £73,039.22. The balance at the bank was £231,818.58. A copy of the Community Infrastructure Levy return has been uploaded to the website.

The main finance item was consideration of the budget for 2025/26 and the precept to support this. The Finance Officer had met with Mr Chris Strange to assess the potential income and expenditure for the pavilion and recreation ground and maintaining the nature area. At present the draft budget projected a deficit of £13,000 on running costs, some of which was for specialised regime of cutting to encourage biodiversity on the nature area, which is proving successful.

It was recommended that a salary increase of 5% should be included for budget purposes although the actual pay increase is yet to be determined. Costs may also increase if the council will need to pay the increased employers' national insurance.

After discussion, an increase of 5% in the precept was proposed by Cllr Sherbourne and seconded by Cllr Griffin, with a view to achieving a balanced budget in future years and this was approved along with the draft budget for 2025/26, which will be reviewed in the new year.

Quotes of £200 and £300 had been received from two potential internal auditors. After reviewing the terms and conditions it was agreed to accept the lower quote for next year's audit.

Planning

Appeal decision: planning permission refused.

Consultation

P24/S3572/HH 12 Home Farm, Crowmarsh Gifford OX10 8EL. An air source heat pump next to the boundary of a neighbour's property. SODC's Environmental Protection team had no adverse comments with regards to potential environmental nuisance issues. Recommend no objection.

Major developments

A decision on the Newnham Manor application legal agreement was expected.

Neighbourhood plan

Dr Nicholas Robins has commissioned a redrawn base map of the parish for the neighbourhood plan.

County council matters

The Clerk will apply for £300 from County Councillor Bloomfield's priority grant fund for tree planting at the recreation ground.

District Council report

District Councillor Cooper highlighted the council's new waste strategy and the trial of an electric refuse collection vehicle.

Strategic priorities

The council agreed to accept the quote of \pounds 300 for the final design of the interpretation boards. A strategy planning meeting will be held on Thursday 16th January 2025 to review the council's priorities for 2025 and beyond.

Environment and recreation

The official portrait of His Majesty King Charles III is now on display in the pavilion. A new flood marker is in place on the path.

Cllr Rowley is reviewing quotes for repairs to the play area grassy mound and tunnel. This matter will be discussed by the Environment and Recreation Ground Committee at their meeting in January.

The trimming of trees at the bottom of Cox's Lane and between Robert Sparrow Gardens and Park View was a great improvement.

Traffic and transport

Cllr Johnson reported that from time to time the phasing of the traffic lights on Wallingford Bridge is set to prioritise traffic leaving the town, which can create long queues in Crowmarsh. This will be raised with the Highways Engagement Team.

A Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) is to be developed linking Benson to Crowmarsh, Wallingford and Cholsey. The county council will arrange a steering group meeting in the new year which Cllr Griffin will attend.

Other matters

The Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils has recommended that parish councils sign up to the Oxfordshire Councils' Charter. This had been circulated and after discussion it was agreed that the charter be adopted.

The government is currently consulting on allowing remote attendance and voting at local government meetings including County, District and Parish councils.

The County Council is introducing a booking system for its Household Waste Recycling Centres in 2025, including Oakley Wood.

The next meeting will be on Thursday 6th February 2025 at Crowmarsh Gifford Village Hall, starting at 7.30pm. Members of the public are very welcome to attend.

Benson Garden Club

Our event for December, 'A Christmas Table Decoration', gave us the chance to create our own festive table decorations in time for Christmas. The atmosphere in the hall was decidedly festive as members and their guests were treated to mulled wine and mince pies on arrival. Carefully laid out piles of fir, pine and other foliage wafted their own Christmas scent into the air, foraged treasure which we viewed with eager anticipation. Annie Smith got things going with a practical talk and demonstration.

Annie started with how to prepare our containers to secure the stems (her favourite is to use chicken wire) and then deftly made her arrangement, explaining how to achieve a professional finish. Tips and tricks included how to use dried oranges – take three slices and layer on top of one another, bend a piece of florist wire in half and poke both ends through the oranges' centre and twist. You then wind the wire around a stick. A similar technique was applied to pine cones – wrap florist wire around the base, before attaching to a stick. If you want to add some baubles, remove their tops and insert a stick (make sure to use only plastic baubles for this). Sticks and florist wire are clearly very useful!

After admiring Annie's beautiful creation, we then started on our own decorations. There was a plentiful supply of greenery, pine cones, teasels, dried oranges, cinnamon sticks and other lovely things for us to use. We were also given the opportunity to try a greener alternative to the traditional floral foam. Then there was much snipping of greenery, standing back to check the overall shape and, of course, plenty of convivial chatter. By the end of the evening, we had our beautiful table decorations – all unique, Christmassy and ready to add festive cheer to our homes.

On Thursday 9th January we have Chris Day on 'Growing Under Cover'. Chris is a professional horticulturalist, gardening magazine editor and writer, and regular podcaster and speaker. Whether you are growing plants this season under a cloche or cold frame, or in a polytunnel, greenhouse or conservatory, timely advice will be on offer. Chris will be looking at specific plants for protected cropping, the logistics of growing crops and ornamentals under glass and plastic, and some of the pitfalls of this type of cultivation.

Then on Thursday 6th February we have Dr Stephen Head coming to talk to us about 'Garden Ponds for Wildlife'. Stephen is a zoologist and ecologist who had a lecturing career before, amongst other things, helping to run the Wildlife Gardening Forum. He has also made radio and television appearances to promote wildlife gardening.

Both events will be at our usual venue, Benson parish hall, OX10 6LZ. Doors open at 7.15pm for a 7.45pm start (£2 for members, £5 for visitors – just turn up, no need to book).

Winter Recitals Wallingford

Winter Recitals Wallingford (WRW) returns with two exciting chamber concerts this winter.

WRW was founded by pianist Anita D'Attellis in 2018 to programme and perform a wide variety of music, mixing rarely-heard 'hidden gems' with very familiar works. Her fellow performers are established musicians at the top of their field, or younger, talented instrumentalists at the start of their careers.

WRW is a not-for-profit venture and has raised over £21,000 for charity. The proceeds will be shared between St Mary le More Church (the venue) and the Sue Ryder South Oxfordshire Palliative Care Hub.

On Sunday 26th January, Romantic Dreams will include Wagner's Wesendonck Lieder, songs by Duparc, Rachmaninov and Tchaikovsky, and instrumental pieces for piano and strings.

Crowmarsh Church building appeal

We have exciting plans for our ancient village church to improve its amenities and enlarge its use for the community.

I am sure that most Crowmarsh residents know of the Grade I listed village church of St Mary Magdalene. Picturesquely sitting behind yew trees by the bus stop in The Street, it was built soon after the Norman Conquest and has several Norman features, including its font and windows, which make it of exceptional historical importance.

Over hundreds of years, thousands of local parishioners have worshipped under its ancient portals, celebrated marriages and baptisms, and honoured their departed. It is likely that many people still living locally will view it with fond memories.

For years its enthusiastic congregation has wanted to make its building more 'user friendly', especially for the elderly and those with young families, by providing a toilet and installing a kitchen and servery to provide refreshments. Several plans had been prepared to no avail, but at last a plan has gained the necessary approval, so now the hunt is on for the money to pay for the improvement project.

As well as complicated building work inside the church that will comply with rules governing ancient buildings, the project will embody excavations for plumbing and drainage, replacement of rotten flooring and a land drain on the outside to cure damp problems, which will involve excavating part of a burial ground.

The project will cost £150,000 of which £50,000 has already been raised through parishioners' donations over the past 20 years, legacies and events. To raise the £100,000 still needed, the church's fundraising subcommittee has launched an appeal.

Applications for grants from funding bodies are under way, along with plans for local events. Already Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust has promised £30,000. More applications are being made and will be favourably viewed by funders if local people themselves are seen to be supporting the efforts. So, citizens of Crowmarsh! Please ask yourselves what you can do to help make your historic church more 'user friendly'. Personal donations, large or small, will be most welcome (preferably with Gift Aid), or why not consider running your own small fundraising event such as a 'Friends & Family' coffee morning or a 'Bring & Buy' sale: all sums mount up, as well as the events being fun!

We would also welcome help from anyone with expertise in communications and publicity to ensure that the message about our project gets to a wide local audience.

Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum asks visitors to share their bears

In 2025, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum will launch a brand-new exhibition of original artwork by E H Shepard, best known as the original illustrator of A A Milne's *Winnie-the-Pooh* and the 1931 edition of Kenneth Grahame's *The Wind in the Willows*.

The Woodstock-based museum is asking visitors and local people to share the impact

the characters Shepard drew to life have had on them, and to bring in their own Winnie-the-Pooh character teddy bears to go on show alongside the exhibition.

By the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, Ernest H Shepard had already become a regular contributor to the popular *Punch* magazine, and he often drew cartoons about the war for the publication, among many others. By 1915 recruitment increased to include those over 30 and Shepard soon enlisted, serving as an officer in the Royal Garrison Artillery, first in France and later Italy. From the start of his officer training in 1915, he began to document the war as he saw it, in pencil sketches, pen and ink drawings, and even watercolours.

The collection of Shepard's work, including some of his children's illustrations alongside a wealth of his Great War sketches and comic art, come to the museum on loan from the University of Surrey Archives and The Shepard Trust and will be on show for the first time in Oxfordshire.

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
